## REVIVAL

Student councils across the country are seriously concidering the creation of a new national student union which may come into being at conference of student polititions in May. This confer ence will be $r \in l d$ at the University of Windsor.

The problems of student aid and university financing are the main reasons for the Niay meeting.

The proposal for this national student union came from: the student's council at Cueen's University, Kingston and has alreadiy received support from at least one other council, that of the University of Saskatchewan, in Fiegina.

Canada has been without a naticnal student orçanization since the dissclution of the Canadian Lnion of Students in the fall of ' 69. CUS' death was precipitated by the withdrawal of a number of student councils which were unhappy atout its political bias.

Patrick Riley, president of Queen's student council, said in an interview that he hoped that any new student organization would confine its activities to matters "directly related to students' lives", but, added that he didn't know how such an organization could be prevented from taking
stands on wider ranging political issues.

Also, up and coming, is a new Ontario Student's Association (successor to the Ontario Union of Students which disbanded last N:ay), probably to be formed in March after the conference of university student councils ard the University Affairs Minister, John White, to discuss the report of the provincial government's Commission on Post-Secondary Education.

There appears to be a general agreement on the desirability of re-establishing an Ontario student association whose primary focus would be on student aid.

Boutique owner, Harold Aviv, commented: "we sell pants and slacks here and since we don't sell many tops, why should the sales girls wear them?"
"I don't care bout sexism. I have kids. Besides, why should men go to a strip joint and pay money when they can come here and see almost the same thing for free."
"We called the Women's Liberation and told them of our scheme. They're against this sort of thing and we want them to protest. Ffter all, publicity is publicity. I don't care and coundn't care less atout female exploitation. The girls here are enjoying themselves and I'm making money."

## segregation

TORONTO (CUP) -- The Toronto Star is a newspaper that has always prided itself on its liberal conscience and its advocacy of the rights of the downtrodden. A memo recently issued by the Star's management, however, suçgests that there is a culf between the paper's theory and its practice.

The memo instructed the paper's editorial staff to eat at the other end of the staff cafeteria from the pressmen. That means the reporters aren't allowed to talk to the printers.

The reason given for this secregation is, of all things, the stains from the printers ink on the hands of the pressmen. The reporters might pick up ink themselves if they sat at the same tables (or shook hands with one of the printers).

This ink, the management fears, could then find its way into the sterility of the news-room and would generally muck thines up.

The more cynical observors at the Star see another reason for the separation of the reporters from the production workers: there has been talk in recent weeks of tighter relationship between the two unions that represent both factions.

These observors see the Star quaking in its corporate boots at the prospect of the reporters and the technical staff forming a common front to fight some common grievances against management.

La Presse, Montreal's largest daily newspaper, has been closed down since July when the various unjons banded together and agreed that none of the employees would gc back until nianägement settled their differ ences with every union involved.

Confronting that kind of unity among its employees really tests the Star's liberal conscience.

## FAILURE

The Student Administra+ tive Council at the University of Windsor is now in serious trouble owine to a dett amounting to $\$ 25000.00$. The board of governors is tc decide on the future of the council who owe the board $\$ 18000.00$. The administration has not yet paid the council the remaining $\$ 24000.00$ collected in student fees. If the board decide to collect the money owed to them
decides to collect the money owed to them then the
council is left with $\$ 6000.00$ to cover $\$ 2500 \mathrm{C} .00$ in external debts. This would force the termination of the council for the remainder of the year.

The money was lost through investments in the student run pub, which is expected to lose $\$ 11000.00$, and through mismanagement of student money by the council executive. The pub lost money through the hiring of extra security personal and expensive entertainment which failed to draw the expected crowds.

Though the board of governors has the power to smash the council it is expected that it will grant the council a reprieve and loan it the $\$ 18000.00$ that SAC owes the university.
