#### NINTH SESSION OF THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

#### FIRST DAY.

Montreal, Wednesday, 12th Sept., 1877.

#### SERVICE IN THE CATHEDRAL.

THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF ENGLAND AND IRELAND in Canada met, in accordance with the notice given by the Metropolitan, on Wednesday, 12th September, 1877, in the Synod Hall, Montreal, and proceeded to the Cathedral Church, for Service at 10.30 a.m. The Litany was said by the Bishop of Algoma. The Sermon was preached by the Bishop of Fredericton.

THE METROPOLITAN celebrated the Lord's Supper and was assisted by the RIGHT REV. J. WILLIAMS, D. D., BISHOP OF CONNECTICUT and the BISHOPS OF NOVA-SCOTIA, QUEBEC, ONTARIO and ALGOMA.

At 2.30 p.m. the Synod re-assembled for business.

The Metropolitan took the chair and read his Address as follows.

#### THE METROPOLITAN'S ADDRESS.

RIGHT REVEREND AND REVEREND BRETHREN, AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY:

When I look around me at this imposing and influential Assembly, and compare it with that which met here in solemn conclave sixteen years ago, I feel very thankful for the marvellous progress which our Church has made in these past years. The Provincial Synod was as yet in its infancy; and it then met to organize, to frame rules for self government, and to form a constitution in accordance with Apostolic precedent, but adapted to the existing age and to local circumstances. We were like men at the ocean brink, surveying the future with deep interest, but cautious as to each step we were taking, whilst confident in the unerring chart by which our course was steered. To-day however the Synod meets in its completeness, full of hope and expectation, having learnt experience by the trials which it has passed through; the goodness of God by the generous support which He has vouchsafed; and mutual confidence by the exercise of brotherly feelings towards one another.

Thanks to him who then filled this chair so wisely, so patiently, and with such consummate tact, there is little left for me to do but to follow in his track, and to endeavour, however imperfectly, to carry out the broad principles which he laid down; and little for you to do but to put in action that machinery which was then constructed. But let us not suppose that we meet to-day with all our perils past, or with one whit the less need of Divine guidance than we had in those earlier times. We need it as much as ever, and God is as ready to bestow it.

Since we last met, another Diocese has been added to our Body, and there has been a consequent increase in our numbers. Indeed during my own short experience of eight years the numerical dimensions of our Province have nearly doubled, having increased from five to nine Dioceses.

The work on which we are now about to enter is a most important one. May the Holy Spirit of God be vouchsafed to each and all of us, giving us that sobriety of judgment, and that wisdom and gentleness of speech, which we need in considering the many important questions which will be brought before us.

As to the subjects which will come under view in the present session, there is one, and that of some importance, which occupied much of our attention three years ago. In treating this subject I earnestly trust that not only learning and skill may be shown as before, but also a spirit of moderation, and a desire to meet the objections of those who are conscientiously opposed to an unconditional Canon. It will be well to consider calmly and dispassionately what are the historic precedents, as also the practice of our Mother Church in England, so far as that practice shall accord with our entire independence of state intervention. It claims your gravest consideration as affecting the liberty of action both of the Bishops and Members of our Communion,-we on our part, desiring nothing more than legitimate protection from the possibility of having an unfit person forced upon us for Consecration; and you on your part, guarding your respective Synods against any undue interference with their acknowledged right of election.

As to the future of our Church, and of the special branch of it comprized within this Province, I believe that God is with her, blessing her, prospering her, and enlarging her influence. I am very thankful that we are spared those painful scenes which have of late disfigured the fair peace of the Church in other lands. We have our ecclesiastical laws; and those laws are respected. There are, and ever will be, differences of opinion among us; but God grant

that love and harmony, zeal and earnestness, may be the stability of our times; and whilst we are valiant for the truth may we be ever closing our ranks, and be found fighting side by side, as those who have one common aim and object in view!

The last meeting of this Synod was marked by the welcome presence of one of our most eminent English Bishops: at our present meeting we shall have the no less welcome presence of several honored and beloved Brethren deputed by our Sister Church in the United States. This will add both dignity and interest to our present gathering. May I not bid them a very hearty welcome among us in your name? And as President of this Synod I may perhaps be allowed to express the feelings of the Lower House, as well as of my Right Reverend Brethren of the Upper House, if I now in your name invite the distinguished members of the Delegation from the General Convention to take their seats with us on this platform.

It only remains for me to commend your Deliberations, and your several Synodical acts, to the over-ruling guidance of God, in the earnest hope that they may greatly conduce to the increase and prosperity of the Kingdom of His dear Son.

The Metropolitan introduced the Right Reverend John Williams, D.D., Bishop of Connecticut, the Rev. Edwin M. Van Deusen, D.D., Rector of Grace Church and St. Luke's Memorial Church Utica, New York state, and the Rev. N. H. Schenck, D.D., Rector of St. Anne's Church, Brooklyn, New York.

The Right Rev. J. WILLIAMS, Bishop of Connecticut, conveyed to the Synod in a few kind, hearty words the cordial and affectionate greeting of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and assured the Bishops, Clergy and Lay Delegates that the warmest interest in the work

and progress of the Church in Canada was felt not only by the members of the General Convention but by the Church generally throughout the United States. His Lordship was followed by the Rev. Dr. Van Deusen and the Rev. Dr. Schenck whose hearty words of greeting were warmly received by the Synod.

The Metropolitan then informed the Lower House that their place of sitting would be the Synod Hall.

After naming the Ven. Archdeacon Whitaker as Chairman ad interim.

The Metropolitan, accompanied by the Bishops and by the Deputation from the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, withdrew to the chamber of the Upper House.

The Venerable Archdeacon Whitaker accordingly took the chair.

Moved by Judge McDonald, seconded by Mr. James Shannon,

That the Venerable Archdeacon PARNELL be elected. Prolocutor of this Provincial Synod.

The Venerable Archdeacon asked that his name might be withdrawn.

Archdeacon Whitaker was then appealed to by Mr. C. J. Brydges, supported by the House, and asked to reconsider his decision. Archdeacon Whitaker consented to withdraw his determination not to undertake the office, in consideration of the circumstances of difficulty in which the House was placed.

The motion that Archdeacon WHITAKER be Prolocutor was then again put and carried.

The Prolocutor, accompanied by Messrs. Brydges and Bethune and several members of the House, proceeded to announce the Election to the President and the House of Bishops.

That the Rev. Dr. Van Deusen, the Rev. Dr. Schenck and

other members of the Deputation from the General Convention of the Church in the United States who may attend this Synod, be requested to take seats upon the platform.—

Carried.

#### DECEASED MEMBERS.

By permission of the House, it was moved by Hon. Geo. IRVINE, seconded by Mr. BRYDGES,

That this Synod takes the earliest opportunity at its first meeting since the death of the late Hon. J. H. Cameron to record its deep regret at the loss which the Church has sustained in the death of one of the most distinguished members of this Synod, and who was for so many years so prominently connected with the Church in Canada.—Carried.

By permission of the House it was moved by Mr. Brydges, seconded by Rev. R. W. Norman,

That this Synod avails itself of the earliest opportunity afforded it, to express its sense of the great loss sustained by the Church in Canada, through the recent death of the Rev. Dr. Nicolls, a man of unfeigned piety and rare scholarship, who was for 32 years Principal of Bishop's College, Lennox-ville, and a member of the Provincial Synod from its outset.—Carried.

The Memorial of the Diocesan Synod of Nova-Scotia.

WHEREAS a Resolution was passed at the eighth session of the Provincial Synod that the number of representatives from each Diocese shall be reduced from 12 to 8 of each order;

AND WHEREAS such a reduction will be advantageous to the more distant Dioceses which will thus be more likely to secure an equal attendance of representatives with those nearer to the City of Montreal;

Your Memorialists therefore pray that the said resolution may be confirmed.

THE MEMORIAL of the Diocesan Synod of Nova-Scotia respectfully sheweth:

That one of the objects proposed in the original declaration of the Provincial Synod is "to provide fit regulations for the appointment of Bishops, Priests and Deacons, in accordance with the canons of the universal church and that no such provision has yet been made.

That This Synod is of opinion that one of such regulations should be that the consent of the majority of the Bishops of the Province shall be required previous to the consecration of the person elected by any Diocese to that important office, provided that in case the consent of the required majority shall not be given, then the dissentient Bishops shall severally, in writing, communicate to the Synod of the Diocese whose election has not been confirmed their reasons for their dissent within some specified time.

And This Synon therefore prays the Provincial Synod to enact a canon containing the aforesaid provision.

That this Synod respectully requests the Provincial Synod at its next Session to amend Canon 12, by adding to the first clause "use of shortened form of Morning and Evening Prayer" the following proviso: "provided, nevertheless that if a Clergyman has charge of three or more churches, in each of which Divine Service is performed on a Sunday or one of the before mentioned holydays, he may, with the consent of his Diocesan, use the Shortened Form of Evening Prayer in lieu of the Order for Evening Prayer prescribed by the Book of Common Prayer in one of those churches on each such Sunday or holyday."

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has passed the following resolutions and desires the concurrence of the Lower House in the same.

#### AMENDMENT TO ART. 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Omit in line 2 the words "united," "and Ireland."

In line 3, at beginning, insert "the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, at present constituting the Ecclesiastical."

In Art. 5, instead of "Church in," insert "Ecclesiastical Province of."

It was then moved by Mr. Justice RITCHIE, seconded by Rev. Dr. Hill,

That the House do now adjourn.—Carried.

The Prolocutor then pronounced the benediction and the House adjourned at 5.30 p.m.

#### SECOND DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

After Morning Prayer in the Cathedral the Lower House met for business at 10 o'clock, and was opened with Prayer by the Prolocutor.

#### REALING OF MINUTES.

The Minutes of the previous day were then read and approved.

Messrs. J. Bell Forsyth, W. Ellis, Rev. G. V. Housman, Rev. Dr. Schulte, Messrs. Chas. Henry, L. E. Morris, J. R. Cartwright, F. Farncomb, and S. G. Wood appeared and took their seats.

The Bishop of Connecticut then introduced to the House the Rev. Dr. Craik, President of the House of Deputies of the General Convention and stated that he had been requested by the Hon. Hamilton Fish to explain that his absence from his place as a member of the Deputation from the General Convention of the Church in the United States to the Provincial Synod of the Church in Canada was occasioned by circumstances over which he had no control and caused him great regret.

The Rev. Dr. Craik thanked the House for their hearty greeting and stirred the kindliest feelings of the members by the few earnest words which he addressed to them.

The amendment of Articles one and five of the Constitution sent down by the House of Bishops was then taken up.

Moved by Mr. Brydges, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Hill,
That the proposed amendment to Article I and Article
V of the Constitution sent down by the House of Bishops
be referred to a Committee consisting of Mr. Justice Ritchie,
Mr. S. Bethune, Mr. G. A. Kirkpatrick, Hon. Geo. Irvine,
and Mr. E. J. Hodgson. - Carried.

#### APPOINTING COMMITTEES.

The Prolocutor named the Rev. Canon Preston as Chairman of the Committee on the Diaconate, instead of Rev. Dr. Nicolls deceased.

#### PRESENTING MEMORIALS, &c.

The Rev. Dr. READ presented and read the following memorial.

#### MEMORIAL.

To the Right Reverend the Bishops, the Clergy and Laity of the Provincial Synod of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada.

The Memorial of the Synod of the Diocese of Niagara respectfully sheweth,

That in view of the importance of having one uniform Hymn Book in use in the Churches of this Ecclesiastical Province, this Synod desires to urge upon the Provincial Synod the taking of such steps as may to them seem most expedient for the accomplishment of this object.

This Memorial was unanimously adopted by the Synod of Niagara at its May session, 1877.

#### J. Bolton Read, Chairman Executive Committee.

The CLERICAL SECRETARY read a letter from Mr. George Cruikshank, President of the Mechanic's Institute, Montreal, kindly placing the reading room and library of the Institute at the disposal of the members of the Provincial Synod during the Session.

The Rev. Dr. Ketchum read the following:

REPORT OF THE DEPUTATION OF THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD TO THE GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES.

The Undersigned, Members of the Deputation appointed at the last meeting of this Synod to attend the meeting of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, held at New York, in October, 1874, to confer with a Committee thereof on measures affecting intercourse and fellowship with the Sister Church, beg to submit

the following report:-

First, the Delegation would express their deep regret, in which they are assured the Provincial Synod will share, at the death of one of the most prominent of their number, the Venerable Archdeacon Balch, D.D., who acted most efficient-

ly as their Secretary.

The Deputation was received and welcomed at New-York by the officers of the General Convention with the greatest kindness and hospitality. A Joint Committee was, at once, appointed by the House of Bishops and the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies, to meet the Delegates from this Synod, consisting of the Right Rev. the Bishop of Long Island, the Right Rev. the Bishop of Ohio, the Rev. W. Rudder, D.D., the Rev. Alexander Vinton, D.D., the Rev. Israel Foote, D.D., the Hon. Hamilton Fish, the Hon. Samuel B. Ruggles and Mr. Orlando Meads.

At a meeting of the Joint Committee, His Lordship the Metropolitan of Canada was appointed Chairman, and the Rev. W. Rudder, D.D., Secretary. After due consideration and kindly interchange of opinion on the subjects presented for conference, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

- "Resolved,—That it be recommended to be made by the Provincial Synod of Canada the duty of all Bishops in the Canadian Church to require testimonials and letters dimissory from the Bishop of the Diocese in which a Clergyman has last served before granting such Clergyman a license, if it be found that the case is not already provided for.
- "Resolved,-That Clergymen having charge of Parishes and Missions be requested to furnish families and individuals in their respective cures, who are about to emigrate to the United States or to Canada, such letters of commendation, and other information touching their character and wants, as will secure to them, upon their arrival, fraternal welcome and pastoral sympathy and care in the common fold in which they have been nurtured; and that, when practicable, duplicate letters be sent to the Clergymen under whose parochial charge the person or persons emigrating may come.
- "Resolved,—That it be recommended that on the suspension or deposition of any Clergyman from the Ministry by a Bishop of either Church, notice of the same shall be given by the Bishop suspending or deposing such Clergyman to all the other Bishops of the Church in the United States and in British North America.

"Resolved, — That until some organ for collecting and diffusing missionary information be established by the Church in Canada, it be recommended to the Board of Missions to take order that a department of the 'Spirit of Missions' be devoted to the use of the Canadian Church, under an editor to be appointed by that Church, in order that each Church may know what the other is doing to preach the Gospel to all men.

"Resolved,--That it is desirable that this Joint Committee should continue in existence, and hold its sessions and prosecute its labors during the next three years, by correspondence or otherwise, in order that such measures as have been suggested may be further matured, and reported to the General Convention and Provincial Synod of 1877."

On the presentation of the Address from the Synod the Delegation had the honor of being introduced to the House of Bishops, after which the following Resolution, on motion of the Bishop of Maryland was unanimously adopted by that venerable body:—

"That this House has received with respect and emotions of thankfulness to Almighty God and gratitude to our beloved Brethren the communication now made by the Most Rev. the Metropolitan of the Church of the Province of Canada with the Deputation of the Synod of the said Province."

Subsequently the Delegation was introduced to the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies, when the address from this Synod was read by the Revd. the Prolocutor, and the following minute was entered upon the Journal of the Convention.

"The address was received with marked attention, the members of the House standing to the close."

"The foregoing resolution was submitted by the Rev. W. Rudder, D.D., to the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies, and was adopted. They afterwards received the concurrence of the House of Bishops."

"On the part of the House of Bishops and the House of Clerical and Lay Delegates, the following members were appointed as a Delegation to attend the present meeting of the Provincial Synod,-

The following Resolution adopted by the Delegation from this Synod was subsequently presented to the General Convention, and entered upon the Journal.

NEW-YORK, October 13, 1874.

Resolved, That the Delegation from the Provincial Synod cannot return home without expressing their grateful appreciation of the cordial and affectionate manner in which they have been received by the General Convention, and of the hospitality extended to them by the citizens of New-York and Brooklyn.

And this Delegation feel assured that it will afford great pleasure to the Provincial Synod and to the Canadian Church should a delegation from this General Convention be appointed to attend the next triennial meeting of the Pro-

vincial Synod - which meets September, 1877.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Mr. Thos. White, Jr., read the following Report.

The COMMITTEE to whom it was referred to enquire into and report upon the right of the Rev. E. H. Cole to sit in the Synod as a Substitute in the place of, the Revd. Rural Dean Lett, certified as having been elected one of the Delegates of the Diocese of Toronto, and who is stated to be unable to attend at the present meeting of the Synod,

Beg to report,

That it appears by the Certificate furnished to the Secretary of this Synod in accordance with the 28th article of the constitution, that the Revd. E. H. Cole is returned at the head of the list of the substitutes; and this is the only evidence relative to the matter in question which has been furnished to the Synod.

By the Act 19 and 20 Vict., c. 141, section 2, relative to the meetings of the Provincial Synod, it is declared "that the "Bishops, Clergy and Laity may meet in General Assembly by such representatives as shall be determined and declared by them in their several Dioceses."

Without referring to the constitution, rules and orders of the Diocese of Toronto, the Committee have no means of ascertaining what provision has been made in that Diocese for certifying the right of substitutes to take their seats in the Provincial Synod; and not having been able to obtain a copy of such constitution and rules, the Committee are unable to report whether they have been complied with in this instance or not; but under any circumstances, the Committee are of opinion that in order to entitle a substitute to sit in Provincial Synod, it is necessary that the inability of any regularly elected delegate to attend should be certified to the Secretaries of the Provincial Synod.

The Committee are also of opinion that it does not satisfactorily appear by any evidence before the Synod that the Rev. Rural Dean Lett has either declined to act as a delegate or that he is now unable to attend this meeting of the Synod.

The Committee further report that the Rev. E. H. Cole has produced before them a letter from the Rev. Rural Dean

Lett, dated the 8th instant, in which he states his inability to attend this meeting of the Provincial Synod.

The Committee therefore respectfully submit the matter

to the consideration of the Synod.

Moved by Mr. White, seconded by Chief Justice Allan,

That in view of the circumstances relating to the application of the Rev. E. H. Cole, to be admitted as a delegate in the place of the Revd. Rural Dean Lett, who it is stated is unable to attend, as reported by the select committee of the Synod, this Provincial Synod admits the Rev. E. H. Cole to take his seat as a substitute for the Rev. Rural Dean Lett, it being understood that such admission shall not be drawn into a precedent for the future guidance of the Provincial Synod.—Carried.

The Rev. R. W. Norman read the

REPORT OF COMMITTEE UPON RESOLUTION OF UPPER HOUSE WITH REFERENCE TO THE ORDINATION OF DEACONS AT 21 YEARS OF AGE.

Your Committee beg to state that they have given the fullest and most respectful attention to the Resolution sent down by the House of Bishops, with reference to the age for admission to the Diaconate. The conclusion at which they have arrived is not merely based upon Ecclesiastical usage. This has varied from time to time, anterior to and subsequent to the Reformation. At the same time, the precedent of the primitive Church would, on the whole, suggest a more mature age than the one now required by the English ordinal.

Your Committee has been influenced by the following considerations.

1. The need for Clergy in this growing country is so great that if a relaxation of the rule as to age is once legalized, it is probable that early ordinations may become frequent rather than exceptional. 2. Moreover, however carefully any provision to the contrary may be laid down on paper, the necessities of the Canadian Church are so pressing, that there would be a risk of young Deacons of 21 being virtually, if not apparently placed in sole charge of a There is reason for believing that this risk is of occasional occurrence in the Church of the United States, and this notwithstanding the regulations are carefully elaborated and fenced round to all appearance by every imaginable safeguard. 3rd. Even supposing such a contingency could not occur, Your Committee, while they gladly recognize in the resolution an implied desire to make the period of the Diaconate a more real and practical preparation for the Priesthood than it is at present, nevertheless cannot concur with the proposition, also implied, to give a young man of 22 years a sole charge, at the discretion of any Bishop, the only required preliminary training being a year's work under the guidance and supervision of some elder Clergyman in full orders. 4th. Then again in this country · a Deacon in full work and certainly one in sole charge, would be so closely occupied, his time would be so filled up, and his energies mental and physical so sorely taxed, that really serious study would be out of the question. Thus a rigid and searching examination for Priest's orders would become almost a dead letter. It may be alleged, that the House of Bishops naturally desire to possess some such power of dealing with exceptional cases as is assured by what is called a Faculty in the Mother Church of England. This is a dispensation, which only the Primate of all England is empowered to grant. The power demanded in the resolution sent down by the Upper House hardly corresponds to it. The exact and strict analogy would be a Canon, which would give to the Metropolitan a power of dispensing with the Canonical rule in respect of age, in the case of persons of extraordinary abilities and special gifts for the Ministry. It has been urged that men are lost to the work of the Church from the fact that one training for the office of a Clergyman is compelled to wait two years longer before entering on his calling than one training for the professions of law or medicine, and that in this country such delay is a serious obstacle and inconvenience. On the other hand, to meet this difficulty, it may be suggested that as a general rule young men should complete their college course at 21, and then serve as lay probationers under approved Clergymen for two years. A young man would thus gain valuable experience before assuming official responsibility, and in some cases would learn by actual trial that he was not adapted by taste or habits for the office which he was seeking. Your Committee are of opinion that the proposed change might be the means of bringing into the ministry men of immature and unstable minds, who might discover that they had made a grievous mistake in the choice of their calling, and who, but for fear of public opinion, might be disposed to leave the ministry, and thus escape from what was to them a burdensome servitude.

The American Church has done her best to insure a good intellectual standard, inasmuch as a candidate is required to produce a certificate of an Arts Degree, or to pass an examination in English literature, logic, rhetoric, mental and moral philosophy, and physics, history and classics; one of these tests is the essential condition, acting as a preamble to the regular ordination examination. But, notwithstanding these or similar precautions contemplated in the resolution sent down by the Upper House, Your Committee are of opinion that the experiment is a dangerous one, and that the Church might incur scandal at the hands of careless or inefficient ministers. Every effort should be made to elevate the intellectual and spiritual qualifications for the Ministry. The proposed change would, in the opinion of Your Committee, have a tendency to depress both. If such cases would be frequent, the effect in all likelihood would be detrimental to the efficiency of the Ministry of the Church. If they were rare, it is not, in the judgment of Your Committee desirable to make so important a change.

With every anxiety to meet the wishes of the House of Bishops with respect to strictly exceptional cases, to which the proposed Canon can hardly be said to be restricted, Your Committee regret that they cannot advise the Lower House to concur in the Resolution as sent down to them.

That they respectfully recommend the Lower House to concur in the Canon, for the reasons given by the House of

Bishops in their resolution introducing the Canon;

They beg to suggest however, that some words should be inserted in the Canon to make it clear that by the Provincial and Diocesan Synods are meant the Synods of this Ecclesiastical Province:

They beg further to suggest that it will be very convenient to have "the Declaration of Submission to the Canons of the Provincial and Diocesan Synods" of the Province of Canada printed in extenso in the body of this Canon;

The Committee therefore recommend the Lower House to

adopt the following Resolution, namely:

Resolved, That the Lower House concurs in the Canon from the House of Bishops upon the Oaths and Subscriptions of the Ciergy, with the addition to section 2, of the words, 'as required by Canon II of the Canons of this Ecclesiastical Province;' and with the proviso that such Declaration of Assent be immediately after those words inserted at full length.

"For a Malefactor after condemnation," and Thanksgivings, for a recovery from sickness, and for a safe return from Sea.

It was moved by Mr. Walken, seconded by Rev. Canon Caulfield,

That the subject of Rev. J. Langtry's motion be referred to a Committee.

Moved by Mr. Elliot, seconded by Judge Kingsmill,

That in addition to the forms of prayers referred to in Mr. Langtry's motion the forms of prayer for family worship in the American Prayer Book be also referred to the same Committee.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Geo. Hodgson, seconded by Rev. John Abbott,

That inasmuch as Canon XII provides for most of the eases referred to in Rev. Mr. Langtry's motion it is unecessary to take any action respecting it.—Carried.

The main motion and that of Mr. Elliot were accordingly lost.

#### REPORT OF AUDITORS.

Mr. Thos. White, Jr., read the following Report:

The undersigned Auditors of the Provincial Synod beg to report:

That they have examined the accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer and have found them to be correct.

They find that the receipts since the last meeting of Provincial Synod were \$315.76, the balance in the hands of the Treasurer in August 1874 being \$32.10, making in all \$347.86.

The expenditures during the same period amounted to \$492.16, leaving a balance due to the Treasurer of \$144.30.

### CONFIRMATION OF AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE XII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Moved by Mr. J. Beard, seconded by Rev. H. Holland,
That this House do confirm the amendment of Article XII
of the Constitution substituting for the words "in preference to any other" in line 4, the following: "immediately
after the subject under consideration shall have been disposed
of for the time being, provided always that it shall be the
duty of the Prolocutor to read to the House the message

immediately on its receipt, and the House may by its vote, without discussion, decide on proceeding to its consideration at once."—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Canon Preston, seconded by Judge Hemming,

That the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution, which was adopted at the last session of Synod be confirmed.

—Carried.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor read the following Message:

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has agreed to suspend the Rule of Order No. 33 with a view to the consideration of the Canon on the consecration of Bishops, and desires the concurrence in the same by the Lower House.

#### A. MONTREAL.

Moved by Ven. Archdeacon Wilson, seconded by Mr. C. J. BRYDGES,

That the Message of the House of Bishops suspending number 33 of the Rules of Order be concurred in by this House.—Carried.

#### MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a Message to the President of the Upper House conveying the concurrence of the Lower House in the suspension of Rule 33.

The hour of 1 o'clock having arrived, the House adjourned.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2.30 p.m., the Lower House reassembled for business. The Rev. Canon Bedford Jones and Very Reverend Dean Lyster, from the Diocese of Ontario, appeared and took their seats.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Mr. STRACHAN BETHUNE read the following Report;

The Committee appointed at the 8th Session of Synod, to consider and report upon the motion of the Rev. Charles Hamilton, printed on page 54 of the Journal of the said 8th session, beg to report, that after due consideration of the subject matter of said motion, they do not consider it expedient to interfere with the free right of the several Diocesan Synods to deal with any Applications they may severally feel it expedient to make to the Provincial Legislatures with regard to the Repeal or otherwise of the Acts referred to.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

CONFIRMATION OF AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE IX OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Moved by Rev. C. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. C. J. Brydges,

That this House do confirm the amendment of Article IX of the Constitution striking out the words "shall record them in books provided for the purpose," and adding the following clause at the end of the article: "The printed Journal of each Session, certified by the signatures of the Prolocutor and the two Secretaries of the Lower House to a statement attached to one or more copies declaring the number of pages in the said Journal and the number of words corrected, with the words so corrected, shall be held to be the true and authentic Record of the Proceedings of each Session.—Carried

CONFIRMATION OF AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Moved by Rev. J. Langtry, seconded by Rev. R. W. Norman,

That the Article marked III in Constitution of the Provincial Synod be altered by changing the word "twelve" into "eight." -Lost.

The consideration of the Canon on the confirmation of the Election of a Bishop, of which the Rev. Henry Roe had given notice was by his request deferred.

Moved by the Very Rev. the Dean of Niagara, seconded by Rev. J. W. Burke,

That the House of Bishops be requested to give an expression of their opinion on the following point, whether the singing of a Hymn before Morning or Evening Prayer is a violation of the Rubric which prescribes that "at the beginning of Morning Prayer the Minister shall read with a loud voice one or more of these sentences of the Scriptures that follow."

The Question whether the motion was in order having been raised the Prolocutor decided that it was out of order, and suggested that the Very Rev. Dean Geddes would attain his object by addressing a memorial to the House of Bishops.

The Canon for the settlement of Parochial Disputes, of which Mr. R. T. Walkem had given notice was withdrawn.

The Rev. Theodore E. Dowling also asked permission to withdraw his proposed Canon on the Day of Intercession for Missions.

Moved by the Rev. Canon BLEASDELL,

Whereas it is advisable that some uniform system of Registration of Baptisms, Marriages and Funerals should be adopted in the Dioceses forming the Ecclesiastical Province of Montreal, and an approximation to the Parochial System of Registration prevailing in the Church in England, be duly considered; the Prolocutor is hereby requested to nominate a Committee of this House to confer with one of the House of Bishops for this special purpose, and that the said Joint Committee report thereon, if possible, during this Session of Synod.

MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor read the following Message from the President:

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has considered and adopted the following Canon on the Consecration of Bishops, and they desire the concurrence of the Lower House in the same.

A. MONTREAL.

#### CANON OF THE CONSECRATION OF BISHOPS.

1. Whenever an election is made by any Diocesan Synod within the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, of a person meet to fill the office of Bishop, the Chairman or Secretary of the said Synod shall transmit a certificate of the election to the Metropolitan, within seven days after the election.

2. Such certificate shall be in the following form:

3. On the receipt of this Certificate, the Metropolitan shall, within seven days, send formal notice of such election to all the Bishops within his Ecclesiastical Province.

4. Should any of the said Bishops desire to object to the Consecration of the person so elected, on the ground of Canonical disability, as hereinafter defined, he shall make the objection in writing, delivered to the Metropolitan within 14 days from the date of said notification to him of such election, setting forth the special grounds of his objection.

5. On the receipt of such objection in writing by the Metropolitan, or in case the Metropolitan himself object to such consecration, he shall summon the House of Bishops, to

meet within one month, to consider such objection, giving not less than 14 days' notice of the time and place of meeting.

6. The House of Bishops having heard the person so elected, or having given him every reasonable facility for appearing before them, if he be so minded and having heard the reasons in support of the said objection, shall decide as to its validity or otherwise; and their decision, with the reasons therefor, shall be communicated without delay to the person so elected, and to the Secretary of the Synod which elected him.

7. Thereupon, if the House of Bishops, or a majority of them, determine that the objection is canonical and has been sustained, the Synod of the Diocese aforesaid shall proceed to the election of another person to fill the office of Bishop.

8. No Bishop making the Canonical objection aforesaid shall vote at the final decision of the validity of the objection.

9. Should no such objection be made within the period specified, or after objection made, should the House of Bishops reject the same, the Metropolitan shall, with all convenient speed, proceed to the consecration of the said person so elected, and to that end shall summon two or more of his Provincial Bishops to assist him in such consecration; and it shall be the duty of such Bishops to attend at such time and place as he, the Metropolitan, shall appoint, and to assist in the consecration of the said person elected.

10. Before proceeding to consecrate, the Metropolitan shall cause to be read publicly in the Church, where the consecration is held, a duly attested certificate of the election of said person to the office of Bishop, and that no Canonical impediment to his Consecration exists, which shall there-

upon be given in for record.

11. No Bishop objecting to the Consecration, with or without reason assigned, shall be required to take part in such consecration.

12. The following objections shall be considered canonical

and none others :-

1. That the person elected is not fully thirty years of

2. That he is not a Priest in Holy Orders of the Church of England or of some branch of the Church in full communion therewith.

3. That he is deficient in learning.

4. That he is guilty of crime or immorality.

5. That he has taught or held doctrines or opinions contrary to the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England.

13. The Bishop so consecrated shall, previous to his consecration, subscribe a declaration of submission to the Canons of the Provincial Synod.

14. The duty in this Canon assigned to the Metropolitan, shall be performed by the Senior Bishop of the Province in case there shall be no Metropolitan, or in case he be incapacitated to perform the duty.

15. If a person shall be elected Bishop of a vacant Diocese who has been previously consecrated Bishop of the Church of England or of any branch of the Church in full communion therewith, the said election shall be notified to the Metro politan as hereinbefore provided, and the Metropolitan shall proceed as in the case of the election of a person in Priests' Orders, except that when no canonical objection has been received within the period limited for entering such objections or when such objections shall have been heard and rejected by the House of Bishops, the Metropolitan shall issue a Certificate to the Bishop so elected, and to the Secretaries of the electing Synod, that there is no Canonical impediment to the installation of the said Bishop.

16. In all cases in which the Bishop elected has been duly consecrated or a Certificate has been furnished by the Metropolitan, as before provided, the said Metropolitan shall either by himself or by some person duly commissioned to act on his behalf, formally install the said Bishop elect, inducting him into the actual possession of his Sec.

Moved by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Mr. C. J. CAMPBELL, That the Canon sent down by the House of Bishops be printed and referred for consideration to the Committee appointed this morning to confer with the House of Bishops upon the subject, with the addition of the following names, viz: Mr. S. Bethune, Mr. S. B. Harman, Mr. S. E. Dawson, Rev. Dr. Hill, Rev. G. W. Hodgson and Judge Kingsmill.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Prof. Roe, seconded by Rev. G. G. Roberts,

That the Canon be printed and be the first business in order to-morrow afternoon.

After some discussion Mr. Brydges' motion was by permission withdrawn, when

Mr. Roe's amendment became the main motion, and was put and lost.

Moved by Mr. Plumb, seconded by Rev. Dr. Jones,

That the Canon be printed, and be the first business after routine business to-morrow morning. —Carried.

By permission of the House, the following motion was put, Moved by Mr. Scott, seconded by the Rev. A. A. Von Iffland,

That the Rev. A. W. Mountain, of the Diocese of Oxford, England, and for many years a Clergyman of the Church in Canada and a member of this Synod, be requested, with the permission of the House, to take a seat on the floor of this House.—Carried.

The discussion of Rev. Canon Bleasdell's motion with reference to Registration was resumed.

# MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The PROLOCUTOR read the following Message.

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has passed the following Resolution, respecting a deputation from this Synod to the General Convention, and begs the concurrence of the Lower House.

A. MONTREAL.

"Moved by the Bishop of Quebec, seconded by the Bishop of Niagara.

"Resolved:—That a Deputation from the House of Bishops consisting of the Bishops of Fredericton, Huron and Niagara do attend the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America at its next session in Boston, with the view of maintaining fraternal intercourse, and that the Lower House be requested to select from their number one or more to accompany the said Deputation." REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS, MARRIAGES AND BURIALS.

It was then moved in amendment to Canon Bleasdell's motion by Mr. RICHARD WALKEM, seconded by the Rev. Canon Burke,

Whereas it is advisable that some uniform system of Registration of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials should be adopted in the Dioceses forming our Ecclesiastical Province and an approximation to the Parochial system of registration prevailing in the Church in England be duly considered, the Prolocutor is hereby requested to nominate a Committee of this House to consider the question of such registration and to report to this House at the next session of Synod.—Carried.

#### AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION.

Mr. Strachan Bethune read the following Report.

Your Committee appointed to consider the Message of the House of Bishops, on the subject of certain amendments made by that House to Articles 1 and 5 of the Constitution, beg to report, that they do not recommend concurrence in those amendments, and recommend instead that the First Article of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows:—

"1—The Provincial Synod shall consist of The Bishops of the Church of England in Canada, having Sees within the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, presently composed of the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, or executing by due authority the Episcopate as Assistant or Missionary Bishops therein, and of Delegates chosen from the Clergy and from the Laity."

And that the Fifth Article be amended so as to read as

follows :-

5.—In a vacancy of the Metropolitan See, a meeting may be called at the appointed period, or on either of the above requisitions, by the Senior Bishop of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada.

### READING OF MINUTES.

Mr. W. H. Carter appeared and took his seat.

## NOTICES OF MOTION.

Seven notices were read and handed to the Secretaries.

#### MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a Message to the House of Bishops announcing that the Lower House had concurred in the amendments of Articles Seven, Nine and Twelve of the Constitution adopted last Session and that it has withheld its concurrence from the amendment of Article Three.

Moved by Rural Dean Osler, seconded by the Rev. Dr. JARVIS.

That this House concurs in the appointment by the Upper House of their Delegation to the Convention of the Church of the United States, and name the Rev. the Prolocutor of the Lower House as their delegate with authority to name from each Diocese of this Ecclesiastical Province one Clerical or Lay Delegate to accompany him. - Carried.

#### MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a Message to the President of the Upper House announcing that the Lower House had concurred in the appointment of a Deputation to the General Convention and named the Prolocutor as their Representative with authority to select one Clerical and one Lay Delegate from each Diocese to accompany him.

## CANON ON THE CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP.

Moved by Rev. Professor Roe, seconded by Mr. Strachan BETHUNE,

That the Canon be now considered clause by clause .-Carried.

The Canon was accordingly considered clause by clause.

#### MESSAGES FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor read the following Messages:

The METROPOLITAN begs to inform the Prolocutor that the Report of the Joint Committee on Inter-communion with the Church in the United States has been adopted by this House, and the concurrence of the Lower House is requested.

## A. MONTREAL.

"The Joint Committee on Inter-communion with the Church

in the United States beg' to report as follows :-

"They have had the benefit of the assistance of the Right Rev. the Bishop of Connecticut and of some other members of the deputation to the Provincial Synod, appointed in New York at the session of the last General Convention of the 'Protestant Episcopal Church,' and have agreed to recommend as follows :

"1. That in case of Clergymen coming from the United States, great caution be exercised with respect to the Testimonials produced; and that formal Letters-Dimissory be required before granting a Licence.

"2. That Clergymen having charge of Parishes and Missions be requested to furnish families and individuals in their respective cures, who are about to emigrate to the United States, such Letters of commendation and other information touching their character and wants as will secure for them, upon their arrival, fraternal welcome and pastoral sympathy and care in the common fold in which they have been nurtured: and that, when practicable, Duplicate Letters be sent to the Clergyman under whose parochial charge the person or persons immigrating may come.

"3. That on the suspension or deposition of any Clergyman from the Ministry, Notice of the same shall be given by the Bishop suspending or deposing such Clergyman to all the other Bishops of the Church in the United States and in British North America.

"4. That in the event of the Board of Missions taking action in accordance with the recommendation of the Joint Committee in their Report dated New York Oct. 13th, 1874, the Metropolitan be respectfully requested to take steps for the appointment of an Editor to collect and furnish for insertion in the "Spirit of Missions," Missionary Intelligence from the Canadian Church.

CANON ON TRIAL OF A BISHOP.

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has adopted the following amendments to Canon IV, and begs the concurrence of Lower House in the same.

A. MONTREAL.

Canon IV-Heading as at present.

1. Any Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province may be tried if charged with any of the following offences.

(1) Crime or immorality.

(2) As at present, substituting "Church of England" for "United," &c.

(3) As at present.

- (4) "Wilful violation of the Constitution or Canons of his Diocese."
- 2. All charges, &c., adding "except that a charge of holding erroneous doctrine may be made by any Bishop of this Church or in communion therewith, not under suspension, deprivation or degradation."

3. "Whenever a Bishop of this Province," &c.

4. As now numbered 3.

5 Same as 4.

6. Same as 5.

7. No. 6, omitting "different Dioceses of the Province," substitute "three Dioceses nearest to the Diocese of the accused Bishop." At the end add "and shall direct them severally to attend at the time and place designated by him, to organise the Board and it shall be the duty of each member so notified to attend. The place of meeting must be within the Diocese of the accused. The Metropolitan or

senior Bishop shall send at the same time a copy of the charges to the senior dignitary of the Board."

(N. B.—Clauses 6 and 7 of present Canon are here amalgamated.)

8. As now.

9. Omit "Civil Courts of this Province" and insert "Criminal Courts of the Dominion of Canada."

10. After "presentment" add "together with a summary

of the evidence on which it is based."

11. In line 3, read "the said Bishop."

12. Line 6, for "members" substitute "secretaries." Omit all after "charges" in 9th line to the end.

13. As at present.

14. For lines 3 and 4 substitute "of the Bishop receiving it to make arrangements for the trial of the accused."

15. As at present.

16. The Bishop to whom the Presentment is made shall summon all the Bishops of the Province, other than the accusers and the accused, to attend at an appointed time and place; and it shall be the duty of every Bishop so summoned to attend, unless he be excused for reasonable cause to be approved by the Metropolitan. He shall also summon the accused Bishop by written notice, to be left at his usual place of residence, to appear and answer at the time and place so appointed; and shall also give notice to the complainants requiring them to attend at the same time and place to substantiate their charges.

17. The time appointed for trial shall be within two calendar months from the date of the summons; and the place

shall be within the Diocese of the accused Bishop.

18. The Bishop shall appoint a legal assessor at the time of trial, but such assessor shall not vote in any case whatever.

19 and 20. Same as 18 and 19.

21. The decision of the Court on all the charges shall be reduced to writing and signed by a majority of those members of the Court by whom the case has been heard.

22. Same as 21.

23. As No. 22 substituting in line 4 for "such Diocesan Synod" "the said Synods."

The present Nos. 23, 24, 25 to be cancelled, their substance having been inserted in other sections.

# PROPOSED CANON OF CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP.

The proposed Canon on Consecration of a Bishop, was resumed.

In clause 1, and 2nd line, the word "meet" was struck out.

In the same clause after the words "chairman or," the following words were introduced, "in case of his death, incapacity, absence or refusal, the clerical."

In clause 2 and first line, the words "representatives of the" were struck out, and for the word "Laity" were substituted the words "Lay Representatives."

In the same clause the words " in Priest's Orders of the Church of England" were struck out.

Clause 3 was adopted without any amendment.

Clause 4 was adopted without amendment.

The hour of 1 o'clock having arrived, the House adjourned.

"Moved by the Bishop of Quebec, seconded by the Bishop of Nova-Scotia, and Resolved

"That a Committee be appointed to consider and report upon the Canons of the Provincial Synod, and of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, affecting the electing of a Metropolitan.

"That the attention of the Committee be drawn to the aforesaid Canon and to the Letters Patent.

"And that the Committee be requested to report whether, in their judgment,

"1st. The agreement between the Synods has been rescinded;

"2. If it has been rescinded, what, by virtue of the Letters Patent, will be the title, status, and powers, of the future Bishops of Montreal,"

Moved by Rev. R. W., Norman, seconded by Mr. R. T. WALKEM,

That the Message from the House of Bishops relative to the appointing of a Committee, just read, be concurred in by this House .- Carried.

In clause 6 after the words "appearing before them" the following were introluced, "in person, or by counsel or by proxy." Also after the words "so minded" the following were inserted, "as well as the Diocesan Synod by its representative duly appointed, if the said Diocesan Synod shall express its desire to be so heard."

The Prolocutor read the following Message:

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has passed the two following resolutions and begs the concurrence of the Lower House in the same.

A. MONTREAL.

1. That Article Four of the Constitution be amended by striking out the words,

"On the second Wednesday in September."

2. That the following be adopted as a Rule of Order, "The Synod shall meet on the last Wednesday of September in every third year."

The proposed Canon of the Consecration of a Bishop was again taken up.

Clause 8 was struck out.

Clause 9, now become 8, was adopted.

Clause 10, now become 9, was adopted.

Moved by Chief Justice Allen, seconded by Mr. Brydges.
That the further discussion of the Canon be adjourned until
to-morrow morning.

The Prolocutor pronounced the Benediction, and the House adjourned.

MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor read the following Message:

SOLEMNIZATION OF MARRIAGES.

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has passed the following resolution, and begs the concurrence of the Lower House in the same.

A. MONTREAL.

"No Clergymen of this Ecclesiastical Province shall knowingly solemnize a Marriage forbidden by the 99th Cannon of the year A.D., 1603, which is as follows "No person shall marry within the Degrees prohibited by the laws of God, and expressed in a table set forth by authority in the year of our Lord God 1563."

The consideration of the proposed Canon on the Consecration of a Bishop was then resumed. In clause 12, now 11, also the sub-section 3 was adopted.

In clause 12, now 11, the following was inserted after subsection 3.

4. "That he has either directly or indirectly secured or attempted to secure the office by any improper means." Subsection 4, now 5, was adopted after the words "any other" were introduced next to the words "guilty of."

The hour of 1 o'clock having arrived the House adjourned.

## AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Lower House re-assembled at 2.30 p.m.

The proposed Canon of the Consecration of a Bishop was again taken up.

The Rev. J. Burrows Davidson appeared and took his seat.

### DEPARTURE OF THE BISHOP OF CONNECTICUT.

At this point the Bishop of Connecticut took leave of the Lower House which received with great cordiality, all standing, his few earnest parting words.

The Prolocutor responded briefly and bade farewell to the Bishop on behalf of the House.

#### CANON ON CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP.

Sub-section 5, now 6, was amended as follows: "That he holds and teaches or has within 5 years previous to the date of his election taught or held anything contrary to the doctrine or discipline of the Church of England."

The debate was then by motion adjourned until after the routine business on Monday next.

The Prolocutor pronounced the Benediction and the House adjourned.

# FIFTH DAY.

Montreal, Monday, 17 Sept. 1877.

# MORNING SESSION.

The Lower House met at 10 o'clock, after Morning Prayer in the Cathedral, and was opened with prayer by the Prolocutor.

#### READING OF MINUTES.

The Minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

One Notice of motion was read and handed to the Secretaries.

Dr. Henderson, of the Diocese of Ontario, appeared and took his seat.

#### CANON OF CONSECRATION OF BISHOPS.

The Canon on the Consecration of a Bishop was then taken up.

Clause 13, now 12, was adopted after the words "so consecrated" had been struck out and the word "elect" substituted for them, and the words "or installation" had been introduced after the word "consecration." Clause 14, now 13, was struck out. Clause 15 was adopted to be numbered 13. Clause 16 now 14 was adopted.

The following was adopted as a new clause 15.

The word "Metropolitan" wherever it occurs in this Canon shall be held to mean and include: "the Senior Bishop in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada," who may not be incapacitated, in every instance where the Metropolitan see is vacant, or the Metropolitan is incapacitated for any reason from acting as such.

The 7th clause was then amended so as to read thus:—
"Thereupon if a majority of the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical

Province determine that the objection is canonical and has been sustained, the Synod of the Diocese aforesaid shall proceed to the election of another person to fill the office of Bishop."

The further consideration of the Canon was then deferred until it could be placed in the hands of members in its amended form,

#### REPORTS.

The Report of the Joint Committee on Inter-Communion with the Church in the United States was then taken up.

—(See page 18 of this Journal.)

The PROLOCUTOR read the Report.

Moved by Mr. Blair, seconded by Rev. R. W. Norman.

That this House do concur with the Upper House in the adoption of this report.—Carried.

### MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a message to the House of Bishops conveying the above resolution.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ELECTION OF A METROPOLITAN.

Chief Justice Allen presented and read the Report of the Committee on the Canons affecting the Election of a Metropolitan.

The COMMITTEE to whom it was referred to consider and report upon the Canon of the Provincial Synod, and of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal affecting the electing of a Metropolitan,—

#### REPORT

That having met to consider the matters so referred to them, they found that the due consideration of them would require such a careful and deliberate examination of those Canons, and of several other documents, as could not be given by the Committee during the sitting of the Synod; they therefore request that their powers may be continued till the next meeting of the Synod, and that the various documents necessary to be examined may be printed for the use of the members of the Committee.

That the Report be adopted.—Carried.

CANON. OF TRIAL OF A BISHOP.

The amendments to Canon IV sent down by the House of Bishops were then taken up.—(See page 39 of this Journal.) Clause 1 and its subsections were adopted.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Dr. Ketchum, seconded by Rev. J. W. Burke,

That the consideration of the amendments of Canon IV sent down by the House of Bishops be referred to a Committee of five to report to this House as early as possible.—Lost.

Moved in amendment to clause 2, by Mr. VANKOUGHNET,

That the clause do read thus: "save and except that no Bishop of the Church within this Ecclesiastical Province, not under suspension or deprivation or degradation, shall be precluded from making a charge of holding erroneous doctrine, anything in this section to the contrary notwithstanding."—Lost.

Moved in amendment to clause 2, by Mr. R. T. WALKEM, seconded by Rev. Dr. Jarvis,

That the clause do read thus "No charge against a Bishop shall be made except in writing. When a charge is made, it shall be signed either by a Bishop of this Church or of a Church in communion therewith, not under suspension, deprivation or degradation, or by seven male communicants in good standing, of whom three at least shall be Priests."—Carried.

Clause 3 was adopted after the word "Ecclesiastical" had been inserted before the word "Province."

By permission of the House it was moved by Mr. Vankoughnet, seconded by Mr. Brydges,

That the name of Mr. S. G. Wood be added to the committee on the Canons affecting the Electing of a Metropolitan. Carried.—

The hour of 1 o'clock having arrived the House adjourned.

# AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Lower House re-assembled at 2.30 p.m.

The amendments to Canon V, sent down by the House of Bishops being taken up, it was

Moved by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Rev. R. W. Norman, That in consequence of the many articles involved, a Committee be appointed to consider the alterations in the Canon for the Trial of a Bishop and that the House of Bishops be requested to appoint a Committee to confer with the said Committee.—Carried.

By request of the House the Prolocutor named the following members to form the Committee.

Mr. Brydges, Hon. Mr. Justice Ritchie, Mr. S. G. Wood, Mr. E. Baynes Reed, Mr. G. A. Kirkpatrick, Rev. Dr. Hill, and J. A. Henderson, D. C.L.

## CANON ON THE CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP.

The Canon on the Consecration of a Bishop was then taken up for review prior to its adoption as a whole.

Moved in amendment to clause 8, by Mr. Brydges seconded by Mr. S. Bethune.

That in clause 8 the words "the House of Bishops reject "the same," be struck out, and the following be substituted, "the same not be sustained by the majority of the Bishops as aforesaid."—Carried.

Moved by Chief Justice ALLEY, seconded by Mr. Justice RITCHIE.

That the following be added as clause 16, "A majority of the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province shall constitute a quorum for the hearing of objections to the consecration of a person elected to the office of Bishop"-Carried.

Moved by Judge Kingsmill, seconded by Mr. J. D. Noble, That clause 6 be reconsidered with the purpose of inserting the words "in writing" after the word "communication" in the eighth line of such clause .- Curied.

Moved in amendment to clause 8 by Mr. Schofield, seconded by Rev. Canon BRIGSTOCKE,

That the words "his suffragans" be substituted for the words "His Provincial Bishops."-Lost.

Moved in amendment to clause 8 by Mr. HARMAN, seconded by Mr. Justice RITCHIE,

That the words "his Provincial Bishops" be struck out and the words "the Bishops of this Ecclesiastical Province" be substituted for them. - Carried.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor read the following message:

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has adopted certain Forms for the Consecration of Churches, &c., and desires the concurrence of the Lower House therein.

A. MONTREAL.

# FORMS OF CONSECRATION, &c.

The Bishop shall be received at the door of the church by the Clergy, (wearing surplices) the Church Wardens, and others. The following petition, signed by the Incumbent, Church-Wardens and others, shall be read, and presented to the Bishop :-

To the Right Reverend —————Bishop of-We, the Incumbent, Churchwardens, and other inhabitants of——having acquired a piece of land, more particularly described in a deed between——and——duly registered according to law——on the—day of——in the year of——and having built thereon a new church, which we certify to be free from any legal incumbrance, do humbly pray your Lordship by your ordinary and Episcopal authority to separate the same from all profane and common uses, and to consecrate the said church and set it apart forever for the worship of God according to the Rites and Discipline of the Church of England in Canada.

## CONSECRATION OF A CHURCH OR CHAPEL.

The Bishop, accepting the Petition, shall answer and consent, saying,

Brethren,—If this be your desire, and the desire of the Parishioners, we will now proceed to the act of consecration.

Prevent us, O Lord, in all our doings with thy most gracious favor, and further us with thy continual help: that in all our works begun, continued, and ended in thee, we may glorify thy Holy Name; and finally by thy mercy obtain everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then the Bishop and Clergy, preceded by the Church Wardens, entering the Church or Chapel by the principal entrance and proceeding up the midst thereof towards the east end, shall say or sing the 24th Psalm.

The earth is the Lord's, and all that therein is; the compass of the world, and they that dwell therein.

For he hath founded it upon the seas; and prepared it upon the floods

Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord: or who shall rise up in His holy place.

Even he that hath clean hands, and a pure heart; and hath not lift up his mind unto vanity, nor sworn to deceive his neighbor.

He shall receive the blessing from the Lord; and righteousness from the God of his salvation.

This is the generation of them that seek Him: even of them that seek thy face O Jacob.

Lift up your heads O ye gates, and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of Glory shall come in.

Who is the King of Glory? It is the Lord strong and mighty, even the Lord mighty in battle.

Lift up your heads, O ye gates, and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of Glory shall come in.

Who is the King of Glory? Even the Lord of Hosts, he is

the King of Glory.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost:

As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

When the Bishop is seated, he shall have the instrument or instruments of donation and endowment presented to him by the Founder,\* or some proper substitute, which he shall lay on the Holy Table, and then standing at the North side thereof, and turning to the Congregation, he shall say to them as follows, or otherwise, at his discretion;

Dearly beloved in the Lord, Forasmuch as devout and holy men, as well under the Law as under the Gospel, moved either by the secret inspiration of the blessed Spirit, or by express command of God, or by their own reason and sense of order and decency, have erected houses for the public worship of God, and have separated them from all profane and common uses, in order to fill men's minds with greater reverence for his glorious Majesty, and affect their hearts with more devotion and humility in his service; which pious works our heavenly Father hath vouchsafed to approve and accept; Let us not doubt but he will also graciously approve this our godly purpose of setting apart this place in solemn manner to religious worship, and let us faithfully and devoutly beg His blessing on this our undertaking, and say,

Then, all kneeling down, the Bishop shall say the Prayer following:

O Eternal God, mighty in power, of majesty incomprehensible, whom the heaven of heavens cannot contain, much less the walls of temples made with hands, and who yet hast been graciously pleased to promise thy especial presence in whatsoever place even two or three of thy faithful servants shall assemble in thy name to offer up their supplications and their praises to thee; Vouchsafe, O Lord, to be present with us, who are now gathered together to consecrate this place,

with all humility and readiness of heart, to the honour of thy great Name, separating it henceforth from all unhallowed, ordinary, and common uses and dedicating it entirely to thy service, for reading therein thy most holy Word, for celebrating thy holy Sacraments, for offering to thy glorious Majesty the sacrifice of prayer and thanksgiving, for blessing thy people in thy Name, and for all other holy Ordinances; accept, O Lord, this service at our hands, and bless it with such success as may most tend to thy glory and the salvation of thy people through Jesus Christ our blessed Lord and Savicur. Amen.

After this the Bishop shall say,

Regard, O Lord, the supplications of thy servants, and grant that whosever shall be dedicated to thee in this house by Baptism may be sanctified by the Holy Ghost, delivered from thy wrath and eternal death, and being made a lively member of Christ's Church, may ever remain in the number of thy faithful and elect children. Amen.

Grant, O Lord, that they who in this place shall in their own persons renew the promises and vows made by their sureties for them at their baptism, and thereupon shall be Confirmed by the Bishop, may continue thine forever; and being preserved in the unity of thy Church, may daily increase in thy Holy Spirit more and more, until they come to thine everlasting kingdom. Amen.

Grant, O Lord, that whosoever shall receive in this place the blessed Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ thy Son, may come to that holy ordinance with a true penitent heart, lively faith, and perfect charity; and being filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, may to their great and endless comfort obtain remission of their sins, and all other benefits of nis passion. Amen.

Grant, O Lord, that whosoever shall be joined together in this place in the holy estate of Matrimony, may faithfully perform and keep the vow and convenant betwixt them made, and may remain in perfect love together unto their lives' end. Amen.

Grant, O Lord, that all such as have, through thy mercy, been preserved in the great danger of Child-birth, and shall come to this place, according to their bounden duty, to give thee thanks for the same, may through thy help, both faithfully live and walk according to thy will in this life present, and also be partakers of everlasting glory in the life to come. Amen.

Grant, O Lord, that whosoever shall Confess their sins. and offer up their Prayers and Praises unto thy divine Majesty in this place, may be kept from all worldly and wandering thoughts, and may draw near unto thee with such steadfastness of faith, and with such seriousness; sincerity, and devout affection of mind, that they may be graciously accepted in thy sight. O Lord pardon their sins, compassionate their infirmities, enlighten and sanctify them by thy Holy Spirit, so to serve and worship thee here below, that finally they may be received into thy presence, to praise and glorify thee for evermore. Amen.

Grant, O Lord, that by thy Holy Word which shall be read and preached in this place, the hearers thereof may both perceive and know what things they ought to do, and also may have grace and power faithfully to fulfil the same. All these our prayers and supplications we offer in the name, and through the mediation of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Now unto the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only wise God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, be all glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Then the Bishop, sitting in his Chair, one of the Clergy or other person appointed by him shall read publicly the Sentence of Consecration which the Bishop shall then sign, and order to be recorded in the Registry of the Diocese.

The Service for the Day shall then be said, unless otherwise ordered by the Bishop.

Proper psalms. -84, 122, 132.

Proper Lessons,

The First. -1st Kings, viii, v. 1 to 31. or 1st Chron, xxix. v. 1 to 26. or Zechariah viii, v. 9.

The Second.—Hebr. x., v. 19 to 26.

Instead of the Collect for the Day, the Bishop shall say the following Prayer:

O Most blessed Saviour, who by thy gracious presence at the Feast of Dedication, didst approve and honour these and such like religious services, be pleased so to possess our souls by thy grace, that we may be living temples, holy and acceptable unto thee: and being cleansed from all carnal and corrupt affections, may be devoutly given to serve thee in good works, who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

After the General Thanksgiving, the Bishop shall say the following Prayer:

Blessed be thy name, O Lord, that it hath pleased thee to put into the heart of thy Servants to erect this house to thy honor and worship. Bless, O Lord, them, their families, and their substance, and accept the work of their hands: remember them concerning this; wipe not out this kindness that they have shewed for the House of God, and the offices thereof, and grant that all who shall enjoy the benefit of this pious work, may shew forth their thankfulness by making a right use of it, to the glory of thy blessed name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prayer ended, a Hymn may be sung. Unless the consecration shall take place in the afternoon the Communion Office shall form part of the office of consecration.

In that office instead of the Collect for the day, the following shall be said.

O Most glorious Lord God, we acknowledge that we are not worthy to offer unto thee any thing belonging to us; yet we beseech thee of thy great goodness, graciously to accept the dedication of this place to thy service, and to prosper this our undertaking. Receive the prayers and intercessions of all thy servants who either now, or hereafter, entering into this thine house shall call upon thee; and by thy grace prepare our hearts to serve thee with reverence and godly fear. Fill us, we beseech thee, with a deep sense of our unworthiness; that so approaching thy sanctuary with lowliness and devotion, and coming before thee with pure hearts, with bodies undefiled, and minds sanctified, we may always render a service acceptable to thee, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE EPISTLE, -- Ephesians, ii. 13.

But now in Christ Jesus ye who sometimes were far off are made nigh by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace, who hath made both one, and hath broken down the middle wall of partition between us; Having abolished in his flesh the enmity, even the law of commandments contained in ordinances; for to make in himself of twain one new man, so making peace; And that he might reconcile both unto God in one body by the cross, having slain the enmity thereby: And came and preached peace to you which were afar off, and to them that were nigh. For through him we both have access by one Spirit unto the Father. Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints, and of the household of God; and are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone; in whom all the building fitly framed together groweth unto an holy temple in the Lord: In whom ye also are builded together for an habitation of God through the Spirit.

THE GOSPEL, -St. John ii. 13.

And the Jews' passover was at hand, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and found in the temple those that sold oxen and sheep and doves, and the changers of money sitting. And when he had made a scourge of small cords, he drove them all out of the temple, and the sheep, and the oxen; and poured out the changers' money, and overthrew the tables; and said untothem that sold doves; Take these things hence; make not my Father's house an house of merchandise. And his disciples remembered that it was written. The zeal of thine house hath eaten me up.

The Sermon.

The sermon being ended, and the Offertory Sentences read, and the Alms reverently presented by the Bishop:

The Bishop shall then place on the Holy Table, as much bread and wine as he shall think sufficient, after which he shall say the Prayer "for the whole state of Christ's Church militant here on earth," the Prayer following, and the rest of the office for the Holy Communion.

O God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, our only Saviour, the Prince of Peace; Give us grace seriously to lay to heart the great dangers we are in by our unhappy divisions. Take away all hatred and prejudice, and whatsoever else may hinder us from Godly union and concord; that as there is but one Body, and one Spirit, and one Hope of our calling, one Lord, one Faith, one Baptism, one God and Father of us all, so we may henceforth be all of one heart, and of one soul, united in one holy bond of Truth and Peace, of Faith and Charity, and may with one mind and one mouth glorify thee; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

# ORDER FOR THE CONSECRATION OF CHURCH-YARDS OR CEMETERIES.

# 1.—CONSECRATION OF A CHURCH-YARD, TOGETHER WITH A CHURCH.

Before or after Service in the Church, the Bishop, Clergy, and the people, shall walk round the portion of ground which is to be

consecrated; and the Bishop standing in some convenient place, shall say the following Prayers:—

O God, who hast taught us in thy holy Word that there is a difference between the spirit of a beast, that goeth downward to the earth, and the spirit of a man, which ascendeth up to God who gave it: And likewise by the example of thy holy servants in all ages, hast taught us to assign peculiar places, where the bodies of thy saints may rest in peace, and be preserved from all indignities, whilst their souls are safely kent in the hands of their faithful Redeemer: Accept, we beseech thee, this charitable work of ours in separating this portion of ground to that good purpose; and give us grace, that by the frequent instances of mortality which we behold, we may seriously consider how frail and uncertain our own condition is, and may so number our days as to apply our hearts unto wisdom; That in the midst of life thinking upon death, and daily preparing ourselves for the judgment that is to follow, we may have our part in the resurrection to eternal life, with him who died for our sins and rose again for our justification, and now liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

O Lord Jesu Christ, who by thy death hast overcome death, and by thy rising to life again hast restored to us everlasting life; grant to all thy servants, who shall here be buried, that their bodies may rest in peace, and that through the grave and gate of death, they may pass to a joyful resurrection, through thy merits, who livest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

A Hymn may be here sung, and an Address given.

Benediction.

# 2.—CONSECRATION OF A CHURCH-YARD OR CEMETERY—SINGLY.

At the entrance of the Ground or Churchyard to be consecrated which shall be sufficiently enclosed, a Petition for its consecration shall be presented to the Bishop (as before presented in the office for consecration of Churches.)

After assenting to its prayer, the Bishop shall say the following Collect:—

Prevent us, O Lord, in all our doings, with thy most gracious favor, and further us with thy continual help; that in all our works begun, continued, and ended in thee, we may glorify thy holy Name, and finally by thy mercy obtain everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then the Bishop, Clergy and Laity, in due order, shall walk round the portion of ground which is to be Consecrated saying or singing Psalms xxiii. xxxix. xc. ciii. or either of them. Returning to the Church Porch or other convenient spot, the Bishop shall say;

The Glorious Majesty of the Lord our God be upon us; prosper thou the work of our hands upon us. O prosper thou our handiwork.

Then shall the Bishop, or some Clergyman appointed by him, read one of the following:

Lessons: Genesis xxiii. or St. John v., 21 to 30, or 1st Thessalonians iv., 13 to the end.

Then some Clergyman or other person appointed by the Bishop, shall read the sentence of Consecration, which he shall sign and order to be recorded in the Registry of the Diocese.

Then the Bishop shall say the Prayers before directed to be used in a Church-Yard consecrated together with a Church, and also the collect for All Saints' Day.

O Almighty God, who hast knit together thine elect in one communion and fellowship, in the mystical body of thy Son Christ our Lord; Grant us grace so to follow thy blessed Saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those unspeakable joys, which thou hast prepared for them that unfeignedly love thee: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

After which a Hymn may be sung, and an Address given. Benediction.

# OFFICE FOR LAYING THE FOUNDATION STONE OF A CHURCH OR CHAPEL.

All things being ready, the Priest, or Bishop (if present) shall say.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Except the Lord build the house their labour is in vain that build it.

Priest. Our help is in the name of the Lord.

Answer. Who hath made heaven and earth.

Priest. O Lord hear our prayer.

Answer. And let our cry come unto thee.

Priest. Blessed be the name of the Lord.

Answer. From this time forth for evermore.

All. The glorious majesty of the Lord our God be upon us, prosper thou the work of our hands upon us. O prosper thou our handiwork.

Our Father, &c.

Bishop, or Priest.

Almighty and everlasting God, who didst lay in Zion a precious Corner-Stone, not made with hands, bless this stone, for the foundation of this house to be erected to the Glory of thy Holy Name, and grant that they who shall faithfully offer to Thee of their substance for the furtherance of this pious work, may be preserved in body and soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then the Person who lays the Stone shall say.

In the faith of Jesus Christ, we lay this foundation stone, in the name of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Bishop, or Priest.

Here let true faith, the fear of God, and brotherly love, ever remain; this place is dedicated to prayer, and to the praise of our most holy Saviour Jesus Christ, who ever liveth and reigneth with the Father and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

Here a Hymn may be sung.

Let us pray.

O God, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy, sanctify and build up these walls to thy honor and glory. Let the light of thy holy presence ever shine upon them. And may thy Holy Church, built upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner-stone, fitly framed together, and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, grow unto an Holy Temple in the Lord. Amen.

# FORM OF SERVICE WHICH MAY BE USED AT THE INDUCTION OF MINISTERS TO THEIR CURES.

The Congregation being assembled in the Church, the Bishop or some Priest authorized by him shall say:

"Brethren, we are here assembled together to induct the Reverend [A. B.] as Rector (or Incumbent or Missionary) of this Parish; he having been already instituted by the Bishop to the cure of souls."

The Minister to be inducted shall here read aloud the declaration of assent enjoined by Canon Second of this Province, signed by himself.

The Mandate of Induction shall then be read, and one of the persons to whom it has been addressed shall say:—

"In the name and on the behalf of this Parish, and in obedience to the Mandate of the Lord Bishop of this Diocese, we do now induct you into the real, actual and corporal possession of the Incumbency of the said Parish, and of all the rights, privileges and emoluments thereto pertaining.

And in token thereof, we give into your hands the keys of this Church."

(N. B The above is intended to apply to Rectories; but in the case of Missions or Parishes not legally constituted, it shall suffice to produce Letters of Institution or a Licence from the Bishop, which shall be read: and one of the Church-Wardens shall then present the keys to the Minister:)

Minister.—I receive these keys of this House of God at your hands, as the pledges of my Induction and of your

reception of me as your appointed Minister. And I on my part do promise by God's help to be a faithful shepherd over you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

The Bishop, or the Priest acting on his behalf, shall then present to the person inducted, the Bible and Book of Common Prayer, saying,

Receive these books and let them be the rule of thy conduct in dispensing God's Holy Word, in leading the devotions of the people, in administering the Sacraments of Christ, and in exercising the discipline of the Church. And be thou in all things a pattern to the flock committed to thy care.

The Service for the Day shall then be said with the Proper Psalms, &c, hereinafter appointed:—

PROPER PSALMS: -122, 132, 133.

1st Lesson: - Ezekiel, chapter xxxiii. to end of verse 9.

2nd Lesson: -St. Luke, chapter x. to end of verse 16.

COLLECT FOR THE DAY:—O Eternal God, the giver of all good gifts, who of thy Divine Providence hast appointed divers Orders in thy Church, give thy grace, we beseech thee, to this thy servant to whom the charge of this Parish (or Mission) is committed, and so replenish him with the truth of thy doctrine, and endue him with innocency of life, that he may faithfully serve before thee to the Glory of thy great name and the benefit of thy Holy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

O holy Jesus, who hast purchased to thyself an universal Church, and hast promised to be with thy Ministers to the end of the world, be graciously pleased to bless the ministry of thy servant who is now appointed to offer the sacrifices of prayer and praise to thee, and to administer thy Holy Sacraments in this thy House. Grant that he may be clothed with righteousness, and that thy Word, spoken by his mouth, may have such success that it may never be spoken in vain; and may the words of his mouth and the meditations of his heart be always acceptable in thy sight, O Lord our strength and our Redeemer. Amen.

O God, the Holy Ghost, Sanctifier of the Faithful, visit, we pray thee, this Congregation with thy love and favour. Enlighten their minds more and more with the light of the everlasting Gospel. Graft in their hearts the love of thy name; increase in them true religion; nourish them with all goodness; and of thy great mercy keep them in the same, O blessed Spirit, whom with the Father and the Son

together, we worship and glorify as one God, blessed for evermore. Amen.

The COLLECT in the Communion Service is to be the Collect for St. Simon and St. Jude's Day.

Epistle for the Day: -1 Thess. 2nd chapter to end of verse 13.

GOSPEL FOR THE DAY: -St. John, chapter x to verse 19.

A Sermon may be preached by the Minister now inducted, or by some other Clergyman.

After the celebration of the Holy Communion immediately before the Benediction, the inducted Minister, kneeling at the Lord's Table, shall say;

O Most glorious Lord God, I acknowledge that I am unworthy to serve under thy roof; yet be graciously pleased to accept the dedication of myself to thy service in this Parish or Mission and to prosper all my undertakings. Fill me with a holy fear of thy Divine Majesty, and with a deep sense of my own unworthiness; that approaching thy Sanctuary with lowliness and devotion, with clean hands and a pure heart, I may always perform a service acceptable to thee: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Enable me, O Lord Jesus Christ both by my life and doctrine to set forth thy glory and rightly and duly to administer thy Holy Sacraments. And to all thy people give thy heavenly grace: and especially to those who are here placed under my Ministry, that, with meek heart and due reverence, they may hear and receive thy Holy Word, and that they, and all who profess and call themselves Christians, may hold the faith in unity of spirit, in the bond of peace, and in righteousness of life, and may be numbered with thy Saints in glory everlasting. Amen.

The Minister inducted, shall, if the Bishop be not present, pronounce the Benediction.

## MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor read the following Message:

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has passed the following Resolution, and asks the Concurrence of the Lower House in the same.

A. MONTREAL. Sept. 17, 1877.

Inasmuch as liberty is given by Canon XII for any Clergyman in this Province to use a shortened form of morning

and evening prayer on ordinary days;

Resolved that similar permissive modifications in the Order of the Public Services of the Church shall be considered to extend also to Sundays and Holydays, when the Clergyman shall deem it desirable either from the peculiar condition of his congregation, or from the laborious nature of his ministrations. Such liberty however shall not be used without the written sanction and approval of the Bishop in every several case.

## CANON OF THE CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP.

Moved by Chief Justice Allen, seconded by Mr. C. J. BRYDGES,

That it be referred to a Committee to examine the Canon as passed, and to report whether there is any inconsistency in phraseology or conflict between the several provisions thereof (not affecting any matter of substance); and that they report thereon forthwith to the Synod.-Lost.

Moved by Rev. Professor Roe, seconded by Mr. S. Bethune. That the Canon as amended be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Hemming, seconded by Mr. VANKOUGHNET,

That the said Canon be not now adopted but be referred back to the Committee in order that the following clause be added to the said Canon in the last clause thereof; "nothing in this Canon contained shall be held to compel a Bishop to take part in the consecration of a Bishop elect, contrary to the dictates of his conscience."

The Prolocutor ruled this motion out of order.

Several further amendments having been offered, Judge KINGSMILL moved the previous question which having been decided in the affirmative;

The Prolocutor put the motion that the Canon as amended be now adopted and it was Carried.

THE AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE IV of the Constitution sent down by the House of Bishops was then taken up, viz:

That Article IV of the Constitution be amended by striking out the words—

1. "On the second Wednesday in September, and,"

That the following be adopted as a rule of order:

2. "The Synod shall meet on the last Wednesday of September in every third year."

Moved by Mr. Strachan Bethune, seconded by The Rev-R. W. Norman.

That the amendment to Article IV of the constitution proposed by The House of Bishops be not concurred in, on the ground that it is undesirable to fix the date of meeting of the Synod at a period later than that fixed by the constitution.—Carried.

#### SOLEMNIZATION OF MARRIAGES

The following resolution sent down by the House of Bishops was then submitted to the House for their concurrence;

No Clergyman of this Ecclesiastical Province shall knowingly solemnize a marriage forbidden by the 99th Canon of the year A.D. 1603, which is as follows: "No person shall marry within the Degrees prohibited by the laws of God, and expressed in a table set forth by authority in the year of our Lord God 1563."

Moved by Mr. R. T. Walkem, seconded by Judge Kings-Mill,

That the resolution of the House of Bishops with reference to marriages be referred to a Committee.

Moved in amendment by Mr. VANKNOUGHNET, seconded by Mr. Blair,

That the resolution sent down by the House of Bishops be concurred in.—Carried.

The main motion was accordingly lost.

MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a message to the President of the House of Bishops conveying the above resolution.

Moved by Mr. S. Bethune, seconded by Mr. Justice Ritchie,

That the Report of the Committee on articles 1 and 5, be adopted, (see page 36 of this Journal).—Carried.

SUBSCRIPTIONS AND OATHS OF THE CLERGY.

Moved by Rev. Henry Roe, seconded by Mr. J. R. Campbell, That the Report of the Committee on the subscriptions and oaths of the clergy (see page 26 of this Journal) be adopted.

—Carried.

MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a message to the President of the House of Bishops conveying the concurrence of the Lower House in the canon upon the oaths and subscriptions of the clergy with certain amendments, in the following terms: "The Lower House concurs in the Canon from the House of Bishops upon the Oaths and Subscriptions of the Clergy, with the additions to Section 2 of the words, "as required by Canon II of the Canons of this Ecclesiastical Province;" and with the proviso that such Declaration of Assent be immediately after those words inserted at full length.

Moved by Rev. R. W. Norman, seconded by the Dean of Niagara,

That the report of the Committee as to the age for admission to the Diaconate be adopted.—(See pp. 23 to 25 of this Journal.)

The hour of 6 o'clock having arrived,

The PROLOCUTOR pronounced the Benediction, and the House adjourned.

# SIXTH DAY.

MONTREAL, 18th Sept., 1877.

# MORNING SESSION.

The Lower House met at 10 o'clock after Morning Prayer in the Cathedral and was opened with prayer by the Prolocutor.

READING &C., OF MINUTES.

The Minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

NOTICES OF MOTION.

Four Notices of Motion were read and handed to the Secretaries.

### BISHOP OF ALGOMA.

In accordance with the appointment made by His Lordship's request on the previous day, the Lord Bishop of Algoma entered the House at this point for the purpose of presenting his report of the state of his Missionary Diocese. (For Report see Appendix.) His Lordship was received by the House, standing.

After presenting his report, which had been printed and circulated amongst the members of the House, His Lordship dwelt at some length upon the very discouraging obstacles which stood in the way of clergymen who might be disposed to enter the field of his missionary District from other Dioceses of this Ecclesiastical Province. He earnestly urged in particular that they should not be required to forfeit their claim upon the Widows and Orphans' Fund and upon the Commutation Fund of the several Dioceses.

Without desiring to press any particular course, His Lordship suggested that the House might deem it right and proper to appoint a Committee to consider the propriety of the Provincial Synod making representations to the authorities of the several Dioceses upon the two obstacles to which he had referred. He also suggested to the Clerical and Lay Delegates from each Diocese that they might with great advantage use their influence in securing for any clergymen

who might at any time remove to his Missionary Diocese the continuance of their privileges in connection with the widows' and orphans' fund and the Clergy Trust Fund. He further represented that the period had now expired within which the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel had held out the offer of £1000 Sterling towards the endowment of the See of Algoma on condition that the sum of \$20,000 was raised in Canada.

He added that there was pressing need for the services of at least four Travelling Missionaries in his Diocese in order that the hands of the Lay Readers might be duly strengthened and the Sacraments regularly administered. He also informed the House that a grant towards the support of two travelling Missionaries had been generously made by the S. P. G. who had hitherto declined to extend any grant towards the support of Missionaries in his Diocese on the ground that the Canadian Church had assumed the responsibility for and care of the Missionary Diocese which they had called into existence.

Moved by Mr. Harman, seconded by Rev. R. W. Norman, That this House has listened with the deepest interest to the address of the Bishop of Algoma and has perused with like attention his statement presented to the Synod, and directs the appointment of a Committee to prepare a Report to be communicated to the several Diocesan Synods commending to their hearty consideration the important matters thus introduced to the attention and support of all true members of the Church in this Province, and especially recommending the carrying out of the endowment of the See which was originally proposed, and suggesting a well considered plan for raising the amount required.—Carried.

The Report of the Committee on the admission of men to the Diaconate at the age of 21 years was then taken up.— (See pp. 23-25 of this Journal.)

MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor read the following Message:

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House concurs in the adoption of the Canon on oaths and subscriptions as amended by the Lower House.

A. MONTREAL.

Sept. 18th, 1877.

Moved by Rev. R. W. Norman, seconded by Dean of Niagara,

That the Report of the Committee as to the age for admission to the Diaconate be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Canon Preston, seconded by Rev. Isaac Brock,

That the Report of the Committee on the Canon for the admission of Candidates for the order of Deacon, at the age of 21 years, be not now adopted, but that said Report be referred back to the Committee with instruction to insert a clause to the effect that when any candidate shall have given indubitable proof of distinguished learning, knowledge of Holy Scripture and Church History, peculiar fitness, and other qualifiations necessary for the discharge of the duties of the office of a Deacon, any Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province may admit such person qualified as aforesaid, to the order of Deacons, subject to the restrictions set forth in the Resolution sent down by the House of Bishops and to any other conditions which the Bishop who shall admit such person as aforesaid, may deem meet and expedient.—Lost.

The main motion was then put and Carried.

## MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a Message to the President of the Upper House informing them that the Lower House had withheld its concurrence from the Resolution sent down last session with reference to the ordination of Deacons at the age of 21 years.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Mr. BRYDGES presented and read the following Report:— The Committee appointed to confer with a Committee of the House of Bishops upon the Canon for the trial of a Bishop, beg to report that they have gone carefully through all the amendments proposed in the said Canon, and have agreed to recommend that it be passed in the following form as agreed upon by the Committees of both houses.

### CANON IV.

#### OF THE TRIAL OF A BISHOP.

As amended by the Joint Committee of the two Houses.

Offences for which a Bishop may be tried.

I. Any Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province may be tried if charged with any of the following offences.

(1.) Crime or immorality.

(2.) Advisedly holding and teaching, whether publicly or privately, any doctrine contrary to that held by the Canadian Branch of the Church of England.

(3.) Wilful violation of the constitution or canons of the

Provincial Synod.

(4.) Wilful violation of the constitution or canons of his

Synod

II. No charge against a Bishop shall be made except in writing, and it shall be signed either by a Bishop of this Church or of one in communion therewith not under suspension, deprivation or degradation; or by seven male communicants of this Church in good standing of whom at least three shall be priests.

# Action on Rumors.

III. Whenever a Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province shall have reason to believe that there are in circulation rumors, reports or charges affecting his moral or religious character, he may if he please acting in conformity with the written advice and consent of any two of his brother Bishops demand of the Metropolitan or if the Metropolitan be the Bishop affected by such rumor, then of the Bishop Senior by consecration to convene a Board of Inquiry in the mode hereinafter set forth.

IV. Accusers may choose a lay advocate in preparing proofs and charges, etc., or they may prepare such charges themselves and in either case the grounds of accusation must be set forth with reasonable certainty of time place and circum-

stance.

# Charges, to whom to be delivered.

V. Charges prepared in either of the modes mentioned shall be delivered to the Metropolitan if he be not the accused; if he be the accused, the charges shall be delivered to the Bishop Senior by consecration.

VI. Accusers must give security for costs in the sum of

one thousand dollars.

# Board of Inquiry, how constituted.

VII. The House of Bishops at each meeting of the Provincial Synod shall appoint a Board of preliminary enquiry not exceeding nine persons, the majority of whom shall form a quorum who shall act as such until the next meeting of the Synod, provided always that no person who has joined in making the charge shall act upon the Board.

# Notice to members.

VIII. The Metropolitan or Senior Bishop as the case may be shall on receipt of such charges give notice thereof to said Board and direct them severally to attend at the time and place designated by him and organize the Board, and it shall be the duty of each member so notified to attend. The place of meeting must be within the Diocese of the accused.

The Metropolitan or Senior Bishop shall send at the same time a copy of the charges to each member of the Board.

IX. The sittings of the Board shall be private.

X. All evidence shall be taken down in writing and signed by the witnesses. Two witnesses shall be necessary to the proof of any charge, and the Bishop charged, and the person making the charge may respectively give evidence before the Board.

### Presentment.

XI. If the majority of the Board present shall be of opinion that there are sufficient grounds to put the accused Bishop upon his trial they shall direct the Chairman to prepare a presentment to be signed by such of the Board as agree thereto.

XII. The chairman shall transmit to the Metropolitan or Senior Bishop from whom their charges were received, the presentment thus signed together with the evidence on which it is based; and the said Bishop shall send to the accused Bishop a copy of the same.

XIII. If a majority of the board present shall be of opinion that there is not sufficient ground to put the accused Bishop on his trial, they shall report thereon in

writing to the Metropolitan or senior Bishop, and in such case the charges together with the certificate of the Metropolitan or Senior Bishop by consecration of the refusal of the board to make a presentment shall be prepared in duplicate; one to be sent to the secretary of the Provincial Synod to be deposited amongst the Archives of the Synod and the other to the secretaries of the Diocesan Synod of the diocese where the Bishop has been so charged: no proceedings to be had thereafter by way of presentment on such charges.

# Limitations of Time.

XIV. No presentment shall be made in any case unless the alleged offence shall have been committed within two years next before the day on which the charges were delivered to the Metropolitan or Senior Bishop by consecration except the charge be of such a nature that it would subject the accused to indictment before the civil courts.

### Trial.

XV. When a presentment shall have been made by the board of Inquiry or the majority thereof, it shall be the duty of the Bishops receiving it to make arrangements for the trial of the accused.

XVI. The Court shall be formed of the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province, the majority of whom excluding the accuser if he be a Bishop and the accused, must be present. And the rules of evidence to be followed on the trial shall be those of the Civil Courts of the Province within which the trial takes place; provided always that the accusers and accused may respectively give evidence.

XVII. The Bishop to whom the presentment is made shall summon all the Bishops of the Province other than the accuser and accused to attend at an appointed time and place and it shall be the duty of every Bishop so summoned to attend unless he be excused for reasonable cause to be

approved by the Metropolitan.

He shall also summon the accused Bishop by written notice to be sent by mail addressed to his usual or last place of residence in his diocese to appear and answer at the time and place so appointed and shall also give notice to the complainants requiring them to attend at the said time and place to substantiate their charges.

XVIII. The time appointed for trial shall be within two calendar months from the day on which the summons was mailed and the place shall be within the diocese of the

accused Bishop.

XIX. The Bishops shall appoint a legal assessor at the time of trial but such assessor shall not vote in any case whatever.

XX. If the accused refuse or neglect to appear then the court shall proceed exparte to pronounce him in contumacy and after hearing the evidence adduced pronounce judgment in the case.

XXI. The accused and the accusers may appear by counsel.

XXII. The decision of the Court on all the charges shall be reduced to writing and signed by a majority of those members of the Court by whom the case has been heard.

XXIII. The Sentence of the Court if the accused be found guilty shall be either admonition, suspension for a definite

period, deprivation or degradation.

XXÍV. The judgment of the Court shall be communicated to every Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province, to the Provincial Synod and to the Synod of the Diocese of the accused Bishop, and the said Synods shall forthwith proceed to enter and record such judgment.

A full record of the proceedings of every such trial shall

be kept by the House of Bishops.

# AFTERNOON SESSION.

Moved by Mr. Strachan Bethune, seconded by Judge Kingsmill,

That the Resolution of the House of Bishops, on the subject of Canon XII be concurred in, and that said Canon be now amended, by adding thereto the following clause:—

The permission hereby granted to use the shortened form of Morning and Evening Prayer specified in the Schedule of this Canon is hereby extended to Sundays and Holydays, when the clergyman shall deem it desirable, either from the peculiar condition of his congregation or from the laborious nature of his ministrations. Such liberty, however, shall not be used without the written sanction and approval of the Bishop.

And that the House of Bishops be asked to concur in this amendment.—Carried.

## MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a Message to the President of the Upper House, conveying the above resolution.

By permission of the House it was moved by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Rev. Dr. Hill,

That a Committee be appointed to confer with the House of Bishops as to the business that may be deemed urgent and to be disposed of this session and as to the probable time of adjournment of the Synod.—Carried.

The Prolocutor named the Committee as follows:

Mr. Brydges, Dr. Henderson, Rev. R W. Norman, Rev. Dr. Hill.

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that this House has adopted the Canon on "the Consecration of a Bishop" as amended by the Lower House, with certain further amendments: and begs the concurrence of the Lower House in the same.

Sept. 18th, 1877.

Amendments to Canon on Consecration of Bishops.

Clause 1, line 5, for "its "-substitute "such."

Clause 5, line 5, after "place of meeting," add "it shall be the duty of every Bishop so summoned to attend, unless he be excused for reasonable cause, to be approved by the Metropolitan."

Clause 10, in line 4, omit words "to take part in the con-

secration of such person."

Clause 11, section 6, for "holds and teaches" substitute "teaches or holds,"

Clause 12, after "consecration or" add "if already a Bishop previous to his."

At end, add "in the Form prescribed by Canon II."

Clause 13 to be struck out.

Clause 14 to be numbered 13. After "the Metropolitan," in line 9 add "instead of proceeding to the consecration."

Clause 15 to be numbered 14.

Clause 16 to be numbered 15 and to read as follows, "In case there shall be no Metropolitan, or in case he shall be incapable of performing the duty in this Canon assigned to the Metropolitan; this duty shall be performed by the Senior Bishop of the Province; and in case of his absence or incapacity, by the next in seniority and so forth."

Clause 17 to be numbered 16.

Moved by Rev. R. W. Norman, seconded by Rev. Dr. Jones,

That the amendments of the Bishops to the Canon for the Consecration of a Bishop be concurred in.—Carried.

MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a Message to the House of Bishops conveying the concurrence of the Lower House in the Canon on the Consecration of a Bishop as amended by the House of Bishops.

REMOVAL OF RECTORS OF PARISHES.

Moved by Rev. Canon Townshend, seconded by Mr. E. B. Chandler,

Whereas under existing usage or law affecting the tenure of office by clergymen duly instituted as rectors of parishes, great detriment to the interests of the Church and to the spiritual welfare of its members has occurred, owing to the want of some power or authority by which such rectors may be removed or their appointments cancelled in cases when, from any cause, the work and progress of the Church are retarded by their presence; therefore resolved, that a Committee be appointed to examine the subject, with the view of suggesting for the consideration of this Synod some remedy by which so serious an evil may be rectified.

Moved in amendment by Rev. W. S. GRAY, seconded by Mr. Blair, that the motion of Canon Townshend be laid on the table.—Lost.

That the Report of the Committee on Lay Readers be amended by striking out the word "should" in the 9th line of the 4th paragraph, and inserting instead thereof the word "may."—Lost.

The main motion was then put and Carried.

MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a message conveying the above resolution to the President of the House of Bishops and asking the concurrence of the Upper House therein.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Mr. Brydges reported on behalf of the Committee to confer with the House of Bishops, that their Lordships were desirous that the question with reference to Lay Readers, and the Canon for the trial of a Bishop, be disposed of during the present Session,—that the Synod adjourn at 12 o'clock, tomorrow,—and that any matters not then disposed of be carried over to the next Session, as unfinished business.

The report was adopted.

Moved by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Rev. C. Forest,

That the consideration of the Canon for the trial of a Bishop be made the first order of the day for to-morrow morning.— Carried.

Moved by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Mr. S. BETHUNE,

That the Treasurer's accounts be adopted, and that each Diocese, except Algoma, be requested to pay to the Treasurer the sum of \$125 to meet the expenses of the Provincial Synod.—Carried.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean Osler, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay,

That this Provincial Synod recognizes the duty and obligation of giving more attention than has hitherto been given to Foreign Missions, and that to carry into effect this Resolution, a Committee be appointed.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Ketchum, seconded by the Dean of Niagara,

That the Report of the Delegates from this Synod to the Church of the United States in October 1874, be received and printed in the Journal of the Synod.—Carried.

POWER OF DEANS, ARCHDEACONS, RURAL DEANS & CANONS.

Moved by the Rev. J. Langtry, seconded by Rev. G. G. Roberts.

That their Lordships the Bishops be respectfully requested to appoint a Committee to confer with a Committee of this House, and report upon the functions, powers and duties of Deans, Archdeacons, Rural Deans and Canons.—Carried.

MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a message to the President of the Upper House, conveying the above resolution.

The Canon of the Trial of a Bishop as amended by a Joint Committee of the two Houses, was then taken up.

Clause 1 and its sub-sections were adopted.

Clauses 2, 3, 4, and 5, were adopted.

Clause 6 was amended to read as follows,—

Accusers must give security to the accused in a bond with sufficient sureties to be approved by the Registrar of the Court of Appeal of the Metropolitan in the penal sum of one thousand dollars, conditioned to secure the accused for his costs in case he be acquitted on the charge, or the charges be not proceeded with."

Clause 7 was adopted, after the words "all being comunicants of this Church," had been introduced after the words

"nine persons."

Clause 8 was adopted after the words "and also to the accused" had been added at the end, and the word "to" inserted before "organize"—

Clauses 9, 10, 11, 12, were adopted.

Clause 13 was adopted after the word "senior" before "Bishop" had been removed and inserted after "Bishop"—and the word "and" after presentment had been struck out and the word "secretary or" introduced before "secretaries" and the word "shall" substituted for the word "to" after "no proceedings."—

Clause 14 was adopted, after the word "senior," had been placed after the word "Bishop," and the word "criminal," substituted for "Civil" before "Courts."

Clauses 15 and 16 were adopted.

Clause 17 was adopted after the words "or by the Bishop senior by Consecration" had been introduced after the word "Metropolitan," at the end of first sentence, and the words "within two weeks," had been inserted before "summon," and the words "within two weeks from the receipt of the presentment" had been introduced after the words "by mail," and the words "the like" inserted before "notice."

Clause 18 was adopted after the word "two," before calendar, had been changed to "three," and the words "and not less than one month" had been inserted after the words

"Calendar months."

Clauses, 19, 20, 21 and 22 were adopted.

Clause 23 was adopted after the words "deprivation or degradation from office" had been struck out and the following inserted in their place, "deposition or removal from Office in the said Church and in the case of deposition or removal from Office with a cessation of all rights to the temporalities of the See."

Clause 24 was adopted.

The Canon as thus amended was adopted and ordered to be sent to the House of Bishops with a request for their concurrence.

MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS.

The Prolocutor sent a message to the President of the Upper House conveying the Canon as amended, and asking their concurrence.

That the House of Bishops be requested, through the Metropolitan, to represent to His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury the earnest desire of this Provincial Synod that, before the assembly of the Lambeth Conference next year, steps be taken to cause a Day of Humiliation and Fasting to be observed throughout the Anglican Church, to pray to Almighty God to pardon and heal the divisions of Christendom.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Canon Dart, seconded by Rev. Isaac Brock,

That the cordial thanks of the Delegates are tendered to the citizens of Montreal for the hospitality and kindness they received at their hands, and to the Rev. Canon Evans for the trouble he has taken in making arrangements.—Carried.

The amendments in the Report of Committee on Lay Readers (See page 82 of this Journal) sent down by the House of Bishops, were then taken up.

The first amendment was adopted.

The second amendment was not adopted.

Moved by Rev. H. Holland, seconded by the Dean of Niagara,

That the Upper House be informed that the Lower House has not concurred in the second amendment of the Report, for the reason that, if adopted, the clause would defeat the object of the report inasmuch as no clergyman would apply for the appointment of a lay reader whom he had not the power of also removing.

Moved in amendment by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Dr. HENDERSON,

That a Committee be appointed to ascertain whether the amendment proposed by Canon Dart, is acceptable to the House of Bishops.—Carried.

The Prolocutor named the Committee as follows:-

The Committee proceeded at once to confer with the Upper House.

On their return,

Mr. Brydges reported that the House of Bishops adhered to their Resolution. He further stated that the Bishops assured the Committee that any reason which a Clergyman will give for the removal of the Licence of a Lay Reader, will always be carefully considered by the Bishop.

Moved by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Rev. Canon DART,

That the objections of the House of Bishops about withdrawing the Licence of Lay Readers, be concurred in.— Lost.

Moved by Rev. R. W. Norman, seconded by Rev. Dr. Jarvis,

That the amendment of the House of Bishops with reference to the Report on Lay Readers stand over till the next session of the Provincial Synod, and be then reconsidered by this House.—Carried.

The Minutes of the Day were then read and approved.

### PROROGATION OF THE SYNOD.

A Messenger from the Upper House having announced that the Metropolitan was ready to prorogue the Synod, in the Synod Hall, His Lordship attended by the other Bishops, was received by the members of the Lower House standing.

The PRESIDENT then promulgated the Schedule of the business done during the Session and declared the Synod prorogued.

The doxology was then sung and the Metropolitan pronounced the Benediction.

  - 7. The Adoption of a Canon on the Oaths and Subscriptions of the Clergy.
  - 8. The Adoption of a Resolution concerning the Table of Kindred and Affinity.
    - 9. The Adoption of an Amendment of Canon IV.
    - 10. The Adoption of an Amendment of Canon XII.
  - 11. The Adoption of an Amendment of Article 28 of the Constitution.
  - 12. The concurrence of both Houses in the appointment of St. Andrew's Day, or any following day as a Day of Intercession for Missions.

# APPENDIX.

# REPORT

OF THE

# MISSIONARY BISHOP OF ALGOMA.

To The Most Reverend the Lord Bishop of Montreal, Metropolitan, and the House of Bishops in Synod Assembled:

My Lord,—In presenting my Report, as required by Canon XI. of the Provincial Synod, I would first acknowledge with heartfelt gratitude the protection which a merciful Providence has exercised over me during the period that has elapsed since my last report was presented.

In my continuous journeyings by land and water, I have not only been most wonderfully preserved from any serious accident, such as travellers, in a new country like that in which my lot has been cast, usually meet with; but I have also enjoyed such a measure of health, as to be able to attend to my duties, and in almost every instance to keep my appointments. This great mercy vouchsafed, during a period of three years, surely calls for grateful acknowledgment.

As to the object of a report such as this is, that information may be given to the Provincial Synod concerning the state and condition of the Church in my Missionary District, this object will, it seems to me, be best secured by drawing a comparative statement between its present position and that in which I found it, on first taking charge in September, 1873.

# AS REGARDS THE NUMBER OF CLERGYMEN.

1.—On taking charge of the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, I found seven Clergymen laboring within its limits, of whom four were in priest's orders, and three deacons. There are now nine, seven priests and two deacons. Of these, five are ministering in the

Muskoka and Parry Sound Free Grant Districts, one at the Sault Ste. Marie and one at Prince Arthur's Landing, whilst the other two, aided by paid school teachers and catechists, are laboring amongst the Indians on the Great Manitoulin, and at Garden River.

#### LAY READERS.

II.—In addition to this little staff, I have no less than sixteen Lay Helpers, who, without any remuneration from the Diocesan Fund, are holding service every Lord's Day for congregations averaging from twenty to forty souls, thus fostering the Church where she must otherwise die out, and forming the *nuclei* of what will, I trust, at no very distant day, prove to be her strongholds.

### CHURCHES AND CHURCH BUILDINGS.

III.—Whereas at the time of my appointment, there were only nine Churches, of which four were in a very unfinished state, and more or less encumbered with debt, I am able now to report eleven churches, complete and entirely free of debt; and no less than six church buildings finished and paid for, with four more in course of erection, on sites which have been secured to the Church,—which, when the several congregations worshipping therein are in a sition to put up buildings more deserving the name of churches, will answer for Sunday school, lecturing and other purposes connected with the Church's work and interests.

In a new country like Algoma, it is, in my opinion, very important to have places wherein to conduct Divine service, even by Lay agency; and I have, therefore, encouraged our members to put up buildings, though ever so lowly, which shall be kept separate from all common and profane uses, where they may meet together for the express purpose of worshipping their God and Saviour, and so doing, teach, as well as practise a lesson in reverence and sacred awe, which cannot well be taught in any other way. In this work, which I trust, under the Divine blessing, may prove an effectual preparing of the fallow ground for earnest workers, who shall come to help, or follow after me, I have been greatly aided by the noble Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, with grants of £10 stg. and upwards, towards such buildings, on the condition that the expenditure of the same shall complete or, at least, make them fit for holding service in. These conditional grants have stimulated and encouraged our members to give their time and labor (money they have not), to put up their Church buildings, which, to use the words of a brother Missionary Bishop of the Sister Church in the United States, "bear silent, but most eloquent testimony against the religious communism of the age."

### SEE-HOUSE AND PARSONAGES.

IV.—The commodious and substantially built See House, for which a lady in England has so liberally provided the whole funds, is so far complete as to be fit for occupation; and its use has added very materially to my comfort during that portion of each year, when not being engaged in raising the funds necessary for the support of my clergy and the carrying on of my work, I am able to reside within the limits of my Diocese. The See House, which is built of red and white sandstone, is beautifully situated near the Ste. Marie River, on a site of three-and-a half acres, donated to the Diocese by Wemyss Simpson, Esq. And whereas there was not at the time of my appointment a single parsonage in the Diocese, there are now four of which three have been built on sites deeded to the Church, whilst the fourth is in the hands of Trustees.

#### INDIAN MISSIONS.

V.—As regards the interests of the red man, these have been attended to, as they were, previous to the setting off of this missionary diocese, but owing to want of funds and proper persons to engage in the work, no increase of missions among them can be reported

I am thankful, however, to be able to bear my testimony to the successful development of the Shingwauk and Wawanosh Industrial Homes for Indian boys and girls, under the able management of the Rev. E. F. Wilson.

The Shingwauk Home is now in thorough working order, with an attendance of forty boys, which might be largely increased, as there is accommodation for seventy and there are boys waiting to be received, if only the funds necessary for their maintenance, clothing, &c., were forthcoming.

The Wawanosh Home for girls, which is to be under the charge and direction of a committee of ladies, is growing

into existence under very favorable auspices, and it is hoped that a portion of the new building will be ready to receive the Lady Superintendent, who is in readiness to begin her work with ten girls early in October next. I look upon these institutions as most important and valuable instrumentalities for ameliorating the condition of the Indians in these parts; since, if it be for the advantange of the red men that they should give up the roaming habits of their forefathers and acquire the habits of industry which are peculiar to civilized life, this can only be effected by training up the children and forming their habits of life,— by teaching them and instructing them, ere other habits are formed, in useful trades and agricultural pursuits, and gradually weaning them from their wild and idle ways.

Amongst other objects contemplated in the Shingwauk Home is the training and educating promising Indian youths as missionaries and teachers, as it is thought that they, when properly prepared, will be able to live with their red brethren, and work more effectually amongst them, both for evangelization and civilization, than white men can be expected to do. At the present time there is one very interesting and intelligent young Indian, 21 years of age, who is being prepared for this work, whilst two others have expressed a wish to devote themselves to the work of teaching.

These are the objects which the Rev. E. F. Wilson has in view, and is, under the Divine blessing, accomplishing; and I rejoice to know that it is in the missionary diocese of Algoma that this truly missionary work, which is so eminently a work of faith, is being carried on with very encouraging prospects of success.

With reference to the evangelization of the Indians in the Lake Superior District, many of whom, to our shame as a Missionary Church, be it said, are still in pagan darkness, without any settled homes, but roaming continually from place to place, as the means of obtaining food present themselves, it seems to me that the only effectual method of reaching them must be through a native pastorate, who may be sent to live with them, and among them, following them as they move from one camping ground to another, and gradually instilling those religious truths and principles of civilized Christian life, which will, it is to be

hoped, after a time, exercise a wholesome influence over them, and gradually affect their whole manner of living.

It is, however, to the two institutions, already referred to, that I look, under the Divine blessing, for the effectual carrying on of the great work that still remains to be done for the Master in this portion of His vineyard; and I would earnestly appeal to the members, the Church, and indeed to all Canadians, irrespective of creed or opinion, to help on the same with alms and prayers, seeing that all owe a heavy debt to the red man, of whose fine country we have taken possession; and should feel bound to put him in the way of obtaining an honest living in a land which no longer affords him his natural means of support.

#### FINANCES.

VI.—Whilst it may, I think, be said that something has under God's blessing been done towards supplying the spiritual necessities of our members, and also that some material progress has been attained, I would remind your Lordship and the Provincial Synod, and the Church at large through you, that much, very much more still remains to be done for the Missionary Diocese of Algoma. It must be borne in mind that it will be an increasing work, and will require continually increasing aid and support from those who have been instrumental in setting it off as a missionary district, since the members of the Church residing within its limits are, for the most part, struggling under the difficulties which invariably attend the early settlement of a new country, and but little able to support the ministrations of religion amongst themselves. Whilst thankfully acknowledging the measure of support given to my diocese by the members of the Church throughout this Ecclesiastical Province, and the kindly welcome extended to myself, both by Clergy and Laity, as I have gone from place to place to obtain it, I must at the same time refer to the very unsatisfactory, because so very precarious position of our means of support, and most respectfully request that steps may be taken to improve it, so that I may be relieved from the anxiety consequent upon the painful uncertainty which, at present, exists with reference to the support of my little staff of co-workers, who look to me for the punctual payment of their stipends.

It certainly surprised me to learn, as I did shortly after being called, by the Provincial Synod, to my new sphere

of duty, that not only had no provision been made for carrying on mission work in the Missionary Diocese, which had so lately been set apart, but that it was to be my business to collect whatever funds might be required for that purpose. I would now ask, whether this is still to continue; and whether the collecting of funds from without for carrying on of work within his Diocese is still to be the chief business of the Missionary Bishop of Algoma. For myself, I am ready, as in the past, so for the future, if needs be, "to spend and be spent" in this or any other work that may conduce to the interests of the Church in my Diocese; but I would suggest that if some definite amount could be guaranteed, either by the Provincial Synod or by the Synods of each of the eight organised Dioceses which constitute the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, for mission work in Algoma, the position of your Missionary Diocese would be better assured; and its Bishop would be relieved of a load of anxious care, which would leave him proportionably free to attend more entirely to the weightier and daily increasing duties of his office.

Whether this can be best effected by the formation of a Board of Foreign Missions in connection with this ecclesiastical Province, acting through and under control of the Provincial Synod; or by a specific grant from each Diocese, or in some other way, such, for instance, as by appointing a paid collector, whose duty it shall be periodically to canvass the whole Ecclesiastical Province, I leave it with your Lordship and the Provincial Synod to

decide.

Appended is a statement of all moneys received for missionary purposes in Algoma since my last report was rendered in September, 1877.

#### ENGLISH SOCIETIES.

VII.—I desire here, whilst upon the subject of finance, gratefully to acknowledge the liberal aid given by the Colonial and Continental Church Society; it having granted the sum of £270 sterling per annum since the formation of the Diocese, towards the support of three missionaries, and a catechist to the Indians.

Also the kind and liberal response made by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, to all my applications both for money grants to aid in building churches and also

for grants of books.

I would also state that The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts has, in answer to an application made in April last, kindly made a grant of £100 sterling for the year ending December 31st, 1878, to "help to

pay the salaries of two missionaries."

Before concluding this somewhat lengthy report I must beg respectfully to repeat the request made in my last report, in behalf of Clergymen coming to us from other Dioceses, that some arrangement may be made to secure to them, on certain conditions, the privilege of retaining their claim upon the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and also the Surplus Commutation Fund of the Diocese in which they may have been laboring previous to entering the Missionary Diocese of Algoma.

It must doubtless prove a very serious hindrance to any Clergyman who may feel inclined to enter this mission field to find that in addition to "enduring hardness" such as he might escape whilst remaining in more settled and civilized parts, he must at the very outset forego privileges which are secured to him so long as he remains in an

organized diocese.

If the Church in Canada, as represented by the Provincial Synod, was in earnest to do the Master's work when setting off the Mission Diocese of Algoma, it ought to provide against penalties such as now exist, since they tend materially to check and discourage the very first promptings in the hearts of clergymen who may be willing to enter and labor in this her legitimate mission field.

Surely it is not too much to ask that the Synods of several dioceses, which took part in setting off the Diocese of Algoma, should allow those of their Clergy who may be ready and willing to labor therein for the good of souls, to retain their claim upon the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, in behalf of which they may have labored for many years, by paying the annual subscription, which would have been required of them, if they had remained within its limits, foregoing all other conditions in favor of the infant diocese, which they have been instrumental in bringing into existence.

Then as regards the surplus Commutation Fund, it cannot, taking a catholic view of the question, be thought too much to ask that a clergyman leaving any other diocese for that of Algoma should be recognized as still laboring for the diocese to which he formerly belonged, and be held

entitled to the same privilege	and claim upon	the surplus

# LEGISLATURE OF THE PROVINCE OF CANADA.

19-20 Vict., Chap. 141.

An Act to enable Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in Canada to meet in Synod.

Proclaimed May 28th, 1857.

WHEREAS doubts exist whether members of the United Church of England and Ireland in this Province have the power of regulating the affairs of their Church, in matters relating to discipline, and necessary to order and good government, and it is just that such doubts should be removed, in order that they may be permitted to exercise the same rights of self-government that are enjoyed by other religious communities; Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows:

I. The Bishops, Clergy and Laity, Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in this Province, may meet in their several Dioceses, which are now, or may be hereafter constituted in this Province, and in such manner and by such proceedings as they shall adopt, frame constitutions and make regulations for enforcing discipline in the Church, for the appointment, deposition, deprivation, or removal, of any person bearing office therein, of whatever order or degree, any rights of the Crown to the contrary notwithstanding, and for the convenient and orderly management of the property, affairs, and interests of the Church in matters relating to and affecting only the said Church, and the officers and members thereof, and not in any manner interfering with the rights, privileges,

or interests of other religious communities, or of any person or persons not being a member or members of the said United Church of England and Ireland; provided always, that such constitutions and regulations shall apply only to the Diocese or Dioceses adopting the same.

II. The Bishops, Clergy and Laity, members of the United Church of England and Ireland in this Province, may meet in General Assembly within this Province, by such representatives as shall be determined and declared by them in their several Dioceses; and in such General Assembly frame a constitution and regulations for the general management and good government of the said Church in this Province, provided always, that nothing in this act contained shall authorize the imposition of any rate or tax upon any person or persons whomsoever. whether belonging to the said Church or not, or the infliction of any punishment, fine or penalty, upon any person other than his suspension or removal from an office in the said Church, or exclusion from the meetings or proceedings of the Diocesan or General Synods; and provided also, that nothing in the said constitution or regulations, or any of them, shall be contrary to any law or statute now or hereafter in force in this Province.

# 22 Vict., Chap. 139.

An Act to explain and amend the Act intituled:

"An Act to enable the Members of the United
Church of England and Ireland in Canada to
meet in Synod."

Assented to August 16th, 1858.

WHEREAS doubts exist whether in the Act passed in the Session held in the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled: "An Act to enable the Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in Canada, to meet in Synod," sufficient provision is made for the representation of the Laity of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Synods by the said Act authorized to be held, and it is expedient that such doubts should be removed: Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows:—

I. For all the purposes of the aforesaid Act, the Laity shall meet by representation; and until it shall be otherwise determined by the Synod in each Diocese, one or more delegates (not exceeding three in any case,) may be elected at the annual Easter meetings in each parish, mission or cure within the Diocese, or in cases where there may be more than one congregation in any parish, mission, or cure, then in each such congregation, or at meetings to be specially called for the purpose by each Clergyman having a separate cure of souls, and all laymen within such parish, mission, or cure, or belonging to such congregation, of the full age of twenty-one years, who shall declare themselves in writing at such meetings to be members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and to belong to no other religious denomination, shall have the right of voting at such election. Each delegate shall receive from the Chairman of the meeting a certificate of his election, which he shall produce when called upon so to do, at the Synod; and the first meeting of such Synod shall be called by the Bishop of the Diocese at such time and place as he shall think fit : provided always, that no business shall be transacted by the Synod of any Diocese unless at least one fourth of the Clergy of such Diocese shall be present, and at least one fourth of the Congregations within the same be represented by at least one delegate.

II. All proceedings heretofore had in any Diocese under the aforesaid Act, which have been conformable to the provisions of this Act, shall be held to be valid, as if the same had taken place after the passing of this Act.

## DECLARATION.

We, the Bishops of the United Church of England and Ireland within the Province of Canada, together with the Delegates from the Clergy and Laity of the Diocesan Synods, now assembled in the first Provincial Synod under Royal and constitutional authority, and intending, under God's blessing and guidance, to consider and determine upon such matters as shall appear necessary for the welfare of the Church in this Province, desire to express our most humble and hearty thanks to Almighty God, that it has pleased him in his Providence to set over us a Metropolitan, and thus to enable us, as in the ancient days, to assemble as one body, under the direction of his Holy Spirit, whose aid we now invoke, in the name of his only begotten Son, for the consolidation and advancement of his Kingdom in this Province.

Before entering on the business for which we are at present assembled, we desire publicly to declare the principles upon which we propose to proceed.

We desire the Church in this Province to continue, as it has been, an integral portion of the United Church of England and Ireland.

As members of that Church, we recognize the true Canon of Holy Scripture as set forth by that Church, on the testimony of the Primitive Catholic Church, to be the rule and standard of Faith: we acknowledge the book of Common Prayer and Sacraments, together with the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, to be a true and faithful declaration of the doctrines contained in Holy Scripture; we maintain the form of Church government by Bishops, Priests and

Deacons, as Scriptural and Apostolical; and we declare our firm and unanimous resolution, in dependence on Divine aid, to preserve those doctrines and that form of government, and to transmit them to our posterity.

In particular we maintain the ancient doctrine of our Church, that the Queen is rightfully possessed of the chief government and supremacy over all persons within her dominions, whether ecclesiastical or civil, as set forth in the 37th of the Articles of Religion: and we desire that such supremacy should continue unimpaired.

It is our earnest desire and determination to confine our deliberations to matters of discipline, to the temporalities of the Church, and to such regulations of order, or modes of operation as may tend to her efficiency and extension: and we desire no control or authority over any but those who are or shall be members of the same Church.

We conceive that the following, or such like objects may fitly come under our consideration, and lead to action on our part:

- 1. To form a Constitution for this Synod, and to regulate the time and place of the meetings, and the order and manner of its proceedings.
- 2. To provide for the proper exercise of Ecclesiastical Discipline, in regard to both Clergy and Laity, by modifying and enacting Canons, and by establishing and ordering a Court of Appeal.
- 3. To provide, with consent of the Crown, (when needed) fit regulations for the Appointment of Bishops, Priests and Deacons, in accordance with the Canons of the Universal Church.
- 4. To provide, with the consent of the Crown, for the division of the Province into new Dioceses, as occasion may require.

- 5. To procure from the Colonial Legislature any Laws or modifications of laws, which the circumstances of the Church may require.
- 6. To promote the further consolidation and united action of the whole of the Dioceses of British North America.

Proceeding upon these principles, which, as we humbly thank God, were, under His good guidance, first among the Colonial Churches, publicly set forth amongst ourselves, and have been sustained by the acceptance of our brethren through a large part of the Colonial Dominions of our beloved Queen, we firmly rely and depend upon His continued blessing and guidance; and we humbly pray that He, who is the God of unity and peace, may ever be with us, and so chasten our affections, purify our motives, and guide our judgment, that we may be enabled to contribute to the efficiency, concord and stability of the Church in this land.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

- 1. The Provincial Synod shall consist of the Bishops of the United Church of England and Ireland, having Sees within the Province of Canada, or executing by due authority the Episcopate as assistant or Missionary Bishops therein, and of Delegates chosen from the Clergy and from the Laity.
- 2. The Bishops shall deliberate in one House, and the Delegates from the Clergy and the Laity in another: and each House shall hold its sittings either in public or in private, at its own discretion.
- 3. The Clerical and Lay Delegates shall consist of twelve of each Order from each Diocese.

- 4. The Synod shall meet on the second Wednesday of September in every third year, or oftener, at the discretion of the Metropolitan; or on the requisition of any two Bishops, or of the Bishop and half the Delegates of each order in any Diocese.
- 5. In a Vacancy of the Metropolitan See, a meeting may be called at the appointed period, or on either of the above requisitions, by the Senior Bishop of the Church in Canada.
- 6. A Quorum of the Synod shall consist of not less than a majority of the Bishops and not less than one fourth of the members of each Order of the Lower House.
- 7. The Metropolitan or some Bishop appointed by him, shall be the President of the Upper House; and in the vacancy of the See or in the event of the inability, from any cause, of the Metropolitan to appoint a Bishop as President the House of Bishops shall elect one of their own number to preside.—[As amended 1877.]
- 8. The Lower House shall be presided over by their Prolocutor, to be chosen *viva voce* on motion of any member of the House.
- 9. Each House shall appoint a Secretary or Secretaries, who shall keep regular accounts of all proceedings in their own House, shall preserve memorials and other documents under the direction of the President and Prolocutor, shall attest all Public Acts of the Synod, and deliver over all records and documents to their successors. The printed Journal of each Session, certified by the signatures of the Prolocutor and the two Secretaries of the Lower House, to a statement attached to one or more copies declaring the number of pages in the said Journal and the number of words corrected, with the words so corrected shall be held to be the true and authentic Record of the Proceedings of each Session.—[As amended 1877.]

- 10. The Expenses of the Synod shall be provided for, and its financial concerns managed by a Committee of the Lower House, after a manner to be approved by both Houses.
- 11. Each House shall establish its own order of proceeding and Rules of order, and may publish such of its proceedings as may appear advisable.
- 12. The Upper House shall propose to the Lower any Business they may desire to have treated of or decided; and it shall be incumbent on the Lower House to take up and dispose of such business immediately after the subject under consideration shall have been disposed of for the time being, provided always that it shall be the duty of the Prolocutor to read to the House the message immediately on its receipt, and the House may by its vote, without discussion, decide on proceeding to its consideration at once.—[As amended 1877.]
- 13. The Upper House may direct the Lower to appoint a Committee to report to the Upper on any subject on which they may desire the judgment of the Lower, or to appoint their portion of a joint committee; or may summon the Lower to a conference.
- 14. Messages from the Upper House shall be delivered by an officer of the Upper to the Secretary of the Lower, by whom they shall be communicated to the Prolocutor, who shall communicate them to the House.
- 15. The Lower House may present to the Upper any matter which they conceive to be a grievance or to require amendment even when they have no proposition to make on the same; and the Upper House shall thereupon place it in order for consideration, with a view of providing a remedy; and shall, before the conclusion of the session, declare to the Lower House the result.

- 16. The Prolocutor shall have the right of admission personally or by Committee to the Upper House, to communicate the desire or decisions of his House; and in such case he shall ascertain by message when he or the Committee can conveniently be received in the Upper House, and act accordingly.
- 17. It shall be competent to the Lower House to request a Joint Committee or Conference on any special object, beyond those submitted to it by the Upper House, or to propose for discussion any specific measure; to which request an answershall be given; but it shall be at the option of the Upper House to accede to their request or not.
- 18. When either House shall desire a Conference with the other, or a Joint Committee, the reason for either shall be agreed to by the House desiring it, and communicated in writing to the other; the Prolocutor personally or by committee in either case proceeding to the Upper House either to deliver or to receive such reasons.
- 19. When either House shall have come to a Decision upon any subject in which the other House is concerned, it shall communicate its decision to the other.
- 20. If the Lower House should not concur in a Decision of the Upper, they shall, in stating their non-concurrence, state their reason; and may either propose an amendment, or request the Upper House to suggest an amendment to meet their reason or request a conference.
- 21. If the Upper House should not concur in a resolution or decision of the Lower House, they may, in stating their non-concurrence, either state their reasons or not; and may either propose an amendment or request the Lower House to prepare an amendment, or appoint a conference, to which the Lower House shall always give attention.
- 22 The Conference may be either by deputation from both Houses, or by deputation from the Lower House, or by

open conference, as the Upper House may think fit; and the place shall be appointed by the President.

- 23. No proposition shall be considered as sanctioned by the Provincial Synod, until it has received the separate sanction of both Houses, which shall be declared by the President in writing.
- 24. Committees, whether of either House, or of the two Houses, may hold their meetings either during recesses in the session, or during the prorogation of the Synod.
- 25. No Alteration of the Constitution or Canons shall come into operation until it has been confirmed at a second session of the Provincial Synod.
- 26. Each Meeting of the Synod shall be preceded or commenced by Morning Prayer and a Sermon, if so ordered by the Metropolitan, and on the first day of such meeting the Holy Communion shall be administered.
- 27. The business of each day shall be commenced by prayer for the Divine guidance and blessing, according to a form authorized by the House of Bishops.
- 28. The election of the Clerical and Lay Delegates shall be certified under the hand and seal of the Bishop of the Diocese which they represent, or, in the absence of the Bishop, the Chairman of the Synod; and such certificate shall be final and conclusive: which Certificate shall be forwarded by the Secretaries of the Diocesan Synod to the Secretaries of the Lower House of the Provincial Synod within fourteen days after said election.

# PERMANENT ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS, AS ADOPTED BY BOTH HOUSES.

1. The Provincial Synod shall meet at the place of deliberation (notice being previously given by the Metropolitan or his deputy, of the time and place of meeting), the Bishops attired in their proper robes, and the Clergy in their gowns, cassocks, bands and hoods; and shall proceed in procession to the Cathedral for Divine service, on which occasion the Holy Communion shall always be administered. The Litany shall be said by the junior Bishop; the preacher shall be appointed by the Metropolitan, and special prayer shall be made for the Synod. The collection shall be applied to the current expenses of the Synod, unless otherwise ordered by the Metropolitan.

- 2. At an appointed hour after Divine service the Members of the Synod shall re-assemble at the place of deliberation, where, after the President has taken his seat, he shall inform the Lower House with regard to their place of meeting, and direct them to elect their Prolocutor.
- 3. When the Prolocutor has been elected, he shall be conducted to the Upper House by the Chairman, accompanied at discretion by any members of the Lower House, and his election announced to the President.
- 4. The President shall then state to him the business which the Upper House desire to engage the attention of the Lower House, specifying, when necessary, the order in which they desire it to be taken up.
- 5. On his return, the Prolocutor shall first nominate his own deputy (in case of his absence) and then introduce to the House the business on which the Upper House desire them to engage themselves.
- 6. On every day of meeting after the first, the Synod shall meet at 9 a.m., and shall proceed at once, before any business is announced, to Morning Prayers at the Cathedral, or the place appointed, and after Prayers proceed to Business.
- 7. Before the conclusion of the session, the President, with the consent of the House of Bishops, shall issue a Schedule, declaring the state in which each matter of Business now

stands which has been brought before the Upper House, and promulgate it to the Lower House; reserving all unfinished Business to the next Session, and Proroguing the Synod.

8. The Prolocutor, on receiving the schedule of prorogation, shall, at the first opportunity, communicate it to his House, which shall not prolong its sittings beyond that day.

# ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE LOWER HOUSE.

- 1. After Prayer, the Clerical and Lay Secretaries shall call the roll of their respective orders.
- 2. The election of the new Secretaries shall be made by the Clergy and Laity respectively. A Treasurer and two Auditors shall also be appointed, all of whom shall hold their offices until their successors shall be appointed.
  - 3. After this the Order of Business shall be as follows :-
    - (1) Reading, correcting and approving the Minutes of previous meeting.
    - (2) Appointing Committees.
    - (3) Presenting, reading and referring Memorials or Petitions.
    - (4) Presenting Reports of Committees, of Treasurer, or Auditors.
    - (5) Giving Notices of Motion.
    - (6) Taking up Unfinished Business.
    - (7) Consideration of Motions.
    - (8) Orders of the Day.
    - (9) Before the final adjournment of the Synod, reading correcting and approving the Minutes of the last day's Proceedings.

## RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. The Lower House shall meet on the day and at the hour and place appointed by the Metropolitan or President, unless otherwise ordered by the House, and on each succeeding day at ten o'clock; and the mid-day adjournment shall be from one o'clock to half-past two p.m.; and the business, except the work of Committees, shall conclude at six p.m., at which hour the House shall proceed to the Cathedral for Evensong. The Clergy shall appear in gowns and bands. When the Prolocutor has taken the Chair, every member shall sit uncovered.
- 2. The Prolocutor shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House, to be decided without debate; and when called upon to decide a point of order, he shall state the rule applicable to the case, without argument or comment.
- 3. When any member wishes to speak, he shall rise and address the Chair.
- 4. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Prolocutor shall name the party first to speak.
- 5. A member called to order while speaking shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.
- 6. No motion or amendment shall be considered as before the House, unless seconded and reduced to writing.
- 7. No member, save the mover of a resolution, who, as mover, is entitled to reply, shall speak more than once, except by permission of the House.
- 8. A member may rise to explain, if permitted by the Chair.
- 9. No original motion, except motions of course, shall be received without notice, except by permission of the House.
- 10. When a resolution has been moved and seconded, any Member may require the previous question to be put

whether the motion so made shall be put or not, and that question shall be decided without debate.

- 11. When a motion has been read to the House by the Prolocutor, it cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the House.
- 12. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received by the Chair, unless to amend it or postpone it, or to lay it on the table, or for adjournment, or for the previous question, and no more than one amendment to a proposed amendment of a question shall be in order.
  - 13. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order.
- 14. Motions to adjourn or to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.
- 15. A motion to suspend a Rule of Order shall take precedence of all other motions, and shall be decided without debate; and no Rule of Order shall be suspended, except upon the vote of two-thirds of the Members present.
- 16. A Member, if not interrupting a speaker, may require any motion in discussion to be read for his information, at any time during the debate.
- 17. When amendments are made to any motion, the amendments and the original motion shall be put in order the reverse of that in which they were brought forward.
- 18. When a question is finally put by the Prolocutor, either an original motion or an amendment, no further debate shall be allowed; the Prolocutor first declaring that the question is finally put.
- 19. When the Prolocutor is putting a question, no Member shall rise from his seat; and every Member present, when a question is put, shall be required to vote on the same, unless excused by the House.
- 20. In voting, those who vote in the affirmative shall first rise, and then those who vote in the negative; and in case of an equality of votes the question shall be decided by

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the casting vote of the Prolocutor, who may also vote on the motion.

- 21. When required by two Clerical and two Lay Delegates, the vote of the House upon any question may be taken by orders voting separately; and in that case a majority of both orders shall be necessary to an affirmative vote.
- 22. On a division, the names of those who vote for or against a question shall be recorded in the Minutes, if required by three Members.
- 23. A question being once determined shall not again be drawn into discussion in the same Session, without the unanimous consent of the House.
- 24. Committees shall not be appointed without notice, excepting Standing Committees, Committees of the Prolocutor to the Upper House and Committees of course, such as those which follow upon the adoption of a resolution, which requires a Committee.
- 25. When a separate Committee of this House has been named, whose function is deliberative, the Prolocutor shall direct what number of its members do form a quorum, unless the quorum be fixed by the resolution under which the Committee is appointed.
- 26. When a Committee is appointed, the Mover of the resolution asking for the Committee shall be the Chairman of the Committee, or when a resolution is referred to a Committee, the Mover of the resolution shall be Chairman, unless the Committee has already been organized.
- 27. Reports of Committees shall be in writing, signed by the Chairman, and shall be received in course, but a motion may be made for re-committal.
- 28. Motions with reference to Reports from Committees shall take precedence of other motions on the paper.

29. Whenever it shall happen that members appointed on Committees are not re-elected to the Provincial Synod, the Prolocutor may appoint others from the same diocese or dioceses to fill their place; and in order thereto a copy of the certified lists of clerical and lay delegates sent to the Secretaries shall be sent by them to the Prolocutor.

30. It shall be the duty of the Secretaries to arrange a list of all unfinished business, and all notices of motions sent to them by members to be brought before the Provincial Synod, according to the order in which they are received; and, under the direction of the Metropolitan, to cause a printed copy of the same to be sent to every member of the Synod twenty-one days before its meeting; which business and notices shall stand first on the order of the day.

31. A Standing Committee of one Clerical and one Lay Delegate from each Diocese shall be appointed on the first day of the meeting of the Synod, and such Committee shall arrange for each day the order of precedence of the several motions, of which notice has been given, and have them printed.

32. In any unprovided case resort shall be had to the Rules of Order of the House of Commons in Canada for guidance.

33. No Canon shall be enacted unless the same has been transmitted by the Secretaries of the Lower House to the Members of the Provincial Synod at least one month before the meeting of the Synod, or unless the same has been left over as unfinished business, and printed in the journal of the previous Session.

## CANON I.

# CANON OF THE ELECTION OF THE METROPOLI-TAN BISHOP.

- 1. From and after the day on which the See of Montreal shall next become vacant, the Bishop of Montreal shall not, by virtue merely of his office as such, be the Metropolitan of this Ecclesiastical Province.
- 2. After the expiration of three months, and not later than the expiration of six months after the next and every subsequent avoidance of the Metropolitical See. Bishops of the said Province shall meet under the presidency of the senior Bishop, or in case of his inability to act, under the presidency of the Bishop next in order of seniority, and it shall, be his duty to summon them to that end, at some place within the Ecclesiastical Province, by giving at least six weeks notice of the time and place of meeting, and elect one of their number to be president of the House of Bishops, and the Bishop so elected shall thereupon ipso facto be the Metropolitan Bishop, and shall have, possess and exercise all the rights, powers, privileges and prerogatives which the Metropolitan Bishop in the said Province now has, possesses and exercises, or may or can have, possess and exercise, any law, usage or custom of the said Province to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding.
- 3. The See of the said Bishop so elected as aforesaid, shall be the Metropolitical See of the said Province, but the City of Montreal shall be as it presently is, the place of the Meeting of the Provincial Synod of the said Province.
- 4. Until the election of the said Metropolitan Bishop, the said senior Bishop shall, after each such avoidance aforesaid of the Metropolitical See, be vested with all the rights, powers, privileges, and prerogatives of Metropolitan Bishop aforesaid.

- 5. All rules, regulations, canons or other provisions of law of the said Province inconsistent with the foregoing provisions, shall be and the same are hereby repealed.
- 6. In such election of the Metropolitan Bishop, it shall be necessary that a majority of all the Bishops of the Dioceses in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada concur either by actual vote at the meeting called for such election or else in writing under their hand and seal.

## CANON II.

# OF SUBMISSION OF CLERGY TO THE CANONS OF THE PROVINCIAL AND DIOCESAN SYNODS.

No Bishop within this Province shall hereafter grant his licence to any Clergyman to the cure of souls until such clergyman has first subscribed and declared his submission to the Canons of the Provincial Synod, and of the Synod of the Diocese of such Bishop, in the following form:

I. (A. B.) do willingly subscribe to and declare that I assent to and abide by the Canons which have been, or shall be, from time to time passed by the Provincial Synod, or the Synod of the Diocese of————

# CANON III.

## ON THE POWERS OF THE METROPOLITAN.

- 1. The Metropolitan shall have precedence of all the other Bishops of the Canadian Dioceses, and the said other Bishops shall be his Suffragans.
- 2. The Metropolitan shall preside over the House of Bishops, and shall convene the Provincial Synod and be the President thereof.
- 3. Upon a memorial signed by two thirds of the Clerical and Lay Members of any Diocesan Synod, certified to be such by the Clerical and Lay Secretaries of such Diocesan Synod, requesting the Metropolitan Bishop to exercise visitatorial power in such Diocese, the said Metropolitan

Bishop shall have full power and authority to visit such Diocese, and the Bishop thereof, and during such visitation to inhibit the exercise of all or of such parts of the ordinary jurisdiction of such Bishop, as to him the Metropolitan Bishop shall seem expedient, and during the time of such visitation to exercise by himself, or his commissaries, such powers, functions, and jurisdiction in and over the said Discesse as the Bishop thereof might have exercised, if he had not been inhibited from exercising the same.

## CANON IV.

# OF THE TRIAL OF A BISHOP.

Offences for which a Bishop may be tried.

- 1. (A) Crime or immorality.
- 2. Advisedly holding and teaching, whether publicly or privately, any doctrine contrary to that held by the Canadian Branch of the United Church of England and Ireland.
- 3. Wilful violation of the constitution or canons of the Provincial Synod.
- 4. Wilful violation of the constitution or canons of the Diocese to which he belongs.
- 1. (B) All charges against a Bishop shall be made in writing, and shall be signed by seven male communicants in good standing, of whom three at least shall be Priests.

## Action on Rumors.

2. Whenever a Bishop of this Chnrch shall have reason to believe that there are in circulation rumors, reports or charges affecting his moral or religious character, he may, if he please, if acting in conformity with the written advice and consent of any two of his brother Bishops, demand of the Metropolitan, or if the Metropolitan be the Bishop affected by such rumour, then of the Bishop senior by consecration, to convene a Board of Inquiry in the mode hereinafter set forth.

3. Accusers may choose a lay advocate in preparing proofs and charges, &c., or they may prepare such charges themselves, and in either case the grounds of accusation must be set forth with reasonable certainty of time, place, and circumstance.

Charges to whom to be delivered.

4. Charges prepared in either of the modes mentioned shall be delivered to the Metropolitan, if he be not the accused; if he be the accused, the charges shall be delivered to the Bishop senior by consecration

5. Accusers must give security for costs, in the sum of one

thousand dollars.

Board of Inquiry how constituted.

6. The Metropolitan or senior Bishop, as the case may be, shall appoint the Deans, Archdeacons, and Chancellors of the different Dioceses of the Province as a Board of preliminary inquiry, the majority of whom shall form a quorum.

# Notice to Members.

- 7. The Metropolitan or senior Bishop, as the case may be, shall give notice thereof to said Board, and direct them to attend at the time and place designated by him, and organize the Board; and it shall be the duty of each member so notified to attend. The place of meeting must be within the Diocese of the accused. The Metropolitan or Senior Bishop shall send at the same time a copy of the charges to the senior dignitary of the Board.
  - 8. The Sittings of the Board shall be private.
- 9. The Rules of evidence adopted by the Board shall be those of the Civil Courts of this Province; but two witnesses shall be necessary to the proof of any charge.

## Presentment.

10. If the majority of the Board present shall be of opinion that there are sufficient grounds to put the accused Bishop

upon his trial, they shall direct the Chairman to prepare a presentment, to be signed by such of the Board as agree thereto.

11. The Chairman shall transmit to the Bishop from whom they received the charges, the presentment thus signed; and the Bishop shall send to the accused Bishop a copy of the same.

12. If a majority of the Board present shall be of opinion that there is not sufficient ground to put the accused Bishop on his trial, in such case the charges, together with the certificate of the Metropolitan, or senior Bishop by consecration, of its refusal to make a presentment, shall be prepared in duplicate, one to be sent to the Secretary of the Provincial Synod, to be deposited amongst the archives of the Synod, and the other to the Members of the Diocesan Synod of the Diocese where the Bishop has been so charged. No proceedings to be had thereafter by way of presentment on such charges, except upon affidavits of two male communicants of the Church, of good standing, of their discovery of new testimony as to the facts charged, and setting forth what such testimony is, which affidavits shall be transmitted to the Chairman of the Court of Inquiry, who shall decide whether they afford ground for a second investigation and in case he decides that such second investigation is necessary, he shall notify the Metropolitan or senior Bishop by consecration, as the case may be, who shall direct an inquiry as hereinbefore ordered; and if he decides it to be unnecessary, he shall notify the same to the Metropolitan, or senior Bishop by consecration, as the case may be.

Limitations of Time.

13. No presentment shall be made in any case unless the alleged offence shall have been committed within two years next before the day on which the charges were delivered to the Metropolitan, or senior Bishop by consecration,

except the charge be of such a nature that it would subject the accused to indictment before the civil courts.

## Trial.

- 14. When a presentment shall have been made by the Board of Inquiry, or the majority thereof, it shall be the duty of the Bishop forthwith to give to the accused written notice to attend at the place appointed for the trial.
- 15. The Court shall be formed of the Bishops of the Province, the majority of whom must be present, excluding the accuser, if he be a Bishop, and the accused.
- 16. The Bishop to whom the presentment was made shall communicate to every Bishop that he is to attend as a member of the Court; he shall also appoint the time and place for the assembling of the Court; the time shall be within two calendar months of date of such notice, and the place shall be within the Diocese of the accused Bishop. The Bishop to whom the presentment has been made shall inform the accused Bishop, by written notice to be left at his usual place of residence, of the time and place appointed for the meeting, and summon him then and there to appear and answer.
- 17. The Bishop shall appoint a legal assessor at the time of trial.
- 18. If the accused refuse or neglect to appear, then the Court shall proceed ex parte to pronounce him in contumacy, and pronounce judgment in the case.
- 19. Accused may have counsel the number of which is to be regulated by the Court.
- 20. The decision of the Court on all the charges shall be reduced to writing, and signed by those who assent to it, who must form a majority of the Court.
- 21. Sentence of the Court, if the accused be found guilty, shall be either admonition, suspension for a definite period, deprivation or degradation.

- 22. The judgment of the Court to be communicated to every Ecclesiastical authority within this Province, to the Provincial Synod, and to the Synod of the Diocese of the accused Bishop; and such Diocesan Synod shall forthwith proceed to enter and record such judgment. A full record of its proceedings shall be kept by every Court.
- 23. The assessors of the Court shall have no vote in any case whatever.
- 24. A charge for erroneous doctrine may be made against any Bishop of this Church or by any other Bishop in communion with this Church, not under suspension, deprivation, or degradation.
- 25. In case of a charge of erroneous doctrine made by a Bishop as aforesaid, if the Bishop accused be afterwards put upon his trial, the Court shall be composed of all the Bishops except the accuser and accused; three Bishops must be present, and the consent of the majority shall be necessary to a conviction.

## CANON V.

# COURT OF APPEAL OF THE METROPOLITAN.

#### HOW CONSTITUTED.

The House of Bishops, presided over by the Metropolitan, or President of the Upper House, or Senior Bishop in their absence, with two or more assessors to be from time to time nominated by the said House of Bishops, shall be the Court of Appeal from the judgment of any Diocesan Court.

Three Bishops shall constitute a quorum of the Court of Appeal, and the decision of the majority of the Bishops sitting in Appeal shall bind, and in the event of an equality of votes the decision of the Court appealed from shall stand affirmed.

The Bishop of any Diocese, who has given any judgment either alone or in any Diocesan Court in, or is a party to, any case, shall not sit in Appeal in such case.

#### OFFICERS OF THE COURT.

There shall be a Registrar of the Court of Appeal, and such other officers as the Court may deem necessary, to be appointed from time to time by the Metropolitan.

#### WHEN APPEAL SHALL LIE.

An Appeal shall lie to the Court of Appeal, in all cases adjudged by any Diocesan Court, on behalf of any party to the case or proceeding in the Diocesan Court.

There shall be no appeal for any error or defect in form in any proceeding or judgment in a Diocesan Court.

An Appeal shall lie to the Court of Appeal from the judgment or decision of the Bishop of any Diocese.

#### PROCEEDINGS OF THE COURT.

The Court of Appeal may sit in any Diocese, at such times and places as the Court shall, from time to time, order and direct.

The Appellant shall give notice of Appeal to the Respondent and the Bishop of the Diocese in the Court of which the judgment appealed from is given, within one calendar month after such judgment.

The Appellant shall give to the Respondent, within two calendar months after such judgment is given, a bond with sufficient securities, to be approved by the Registrar of the Court of Appeal, in the sum of \$400, to secure the Respondent for the costs of appeal, in case the appeal is dismissed.

Every Appeal shall be prosecuted to a hearing by the Appellant within one year after such judgment is given, if the Court of Appeal shall not so sit, then at the first sitting of the Court of Appeal after such year shall have expired.

The Appellant shall, within three calendar months after such judgment, bring into the Court of Appeal and file with the Registrar thereof, a transcript of all the proceedings and judgments appealed from, certified to be correct by the Registrar of the Diocesan Court, or the Bishop of the Diocese whose judgment is appealed against.

If any of the proceedings in the next preceding four sections are not taken within the times respectively limited therefor, the Appeal shall be considered dismissed, and the judgment appealed from shall stand.

The Appellant shall give the Respondent one calendar month's notice in writing of the hearing of the Appeal.

The Court of Appeal shall make such rules and orders as to the forms of procedure and practice, fees and costs, as such Court shall from time to time deem necessary.

## CANON VI.

# OF MINISTERING IN PARISHES.

- 1. No Clergyman shall absent himself from his charge, for more than four weeks at a time, without the written consent of the Bishop, or, in his absence, of his Commissary.
- 2. No person shall be permitted to celebrate Divine Service or perform any office of the Church, permanently or occasionally, except he shall have been Episcopally and Canonically ordained, and it shall be the duty of the Incumbent, or, in his absence, of the Church-wardens, to demand proof of such ordination and of the good standing of the Clergyman before permitting him to officiate.

No person shall perform the office of Lay Reader except he shall hold the Bishop's license.

This Canon shall not apply to the students of any Theological College, so as to prevent them from reading the Lessons in the College Chapel, or to Laymen occasionally officiating, when there is a necessity for it.

- 3. No Clergyman shall officiate in any Mission or Parish, either as substitute for the Incumbent or as his assistant, for more than one month, without the written license of the Bishop, and no person who has availed himself of this implied permission shall be allowed to officiate again in the same Mission or Parish within a period of three months, unless he obtain the license of the Bishop or the Bishop's commissary.
- 4. No Bishop of one Diocese shall perform any Episcopal functions in another without the sanction of the Bishop thereof, save in the case provided for by the Canon relating to the powers of the Metropolitan, nor shall any Bishop perform any such functions in any vacant Diocese except by instruction from the Metropolitan; or, in case of the voidance of his Diocese, from the Senior Bishop of the Province.

## CANON VII. OF LETTERS TESTIMONIAL.

When a Priest or Deacon in good standing is desirous of leaving a Diocese, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to give him, on his request, the usual "Letters Testimonial," but the Clergyman receiving the same shall continue subject to the Episcopal Jurisdiction of the Bishop till the Letters Testimonial shall have been presented according to their address, and accepted by the Bishop to whose Diocese the Clergyman wishes to be transferred; provided always that if they be not presented within three months after their date, they may be considered as void by the authority whence they proceeded, and shall be void unless they be presented within six months.

### CANON VIII.

### OF EPISCOPAL RESIGNATIONS.

If a Bishop shall desire to resign his Diocese, he shall give in his resignation to the Metropolitan, in writing, or (if he be himself Metropolitan) to the Bishop senior by Consecration: but such resignation shall not be accepted unless a majority of the House of Bishops consent.

## CANON IX.

### OF THE SUBDIVISION OF DIOCESES.

The House of Bishops shall have the power of subdividing existing Dioceses, or of forming a new Diocese out of portions of existing Dioceses which may be contiguous, with the concurrence, or upon the application, of the Synod or Synods of the Dioceses affected, and it shall be the duty of such Synod or Synods to consider, without delay, any proposal for the subdivision of a Diocese which may emanate from the House of Bishops.

## CANON X.

# OF THE OFFICIATING OF STRANGE CLERGYMEN IN A DIOCESE.

When a Bishop is aware that a clergyman not of his Diocese is officiating or about to officiate in his Diocese, and when the said Bishop shall have good reason to believe that doubts exist regarding the clergyman's orthodoxy, canonical ordination, or good morals, then the Bishop may inhibit him from officiating within his Diocese, by a writing addressed to him, and to the clergy. And any clergyman, after the receipt of the Bishop's inhibition, permitting such inhibited person to perform any clerical function in his Church, or Mission Chapel, shall be proceeded against by the Bishop for breach of Canonical obedience.

## CANON XI.

## OF MISSIONARY BISHOPS.

I. The Provincial Synod may elect a suitable Priest to be a Missionary Bishop over a district not within any organized Diocese or over a District which includes within the new Territory a part or parts of one or more existing Dioceses, and when the House of Bishops shall be satisfied that adequate provision has been made for the support of a Missionary Bishop, the Metropolitan or presiding Bishop may convene the Provincial Synod for the purpose of electing such Missionary Bishop, by the joint action of the Upper and Lower House, which election shall be conducted in the following manner:- The House of Bishops shall present to the Lower House one or more names for election by ballot, and if none of these names shall be accepted by the Lower House further names shall be presented by the Upper House until it shall signify that it has no other name to present. All names presented to the Lower House shall be before it for election until an election shall have been made. A majority of votes, Clerical and Lay, shall be necessary to an election.

- 2. In case a Missionary Bishop shall be appointed in the manner hereinbefore mentioned over a District which includes or consists of a part or parts of one or more existing Dioceses, the Missionary Bishop shall exercise no jurisdiction over any such part or parts of such other Diocese or Dioceses, until the Synod or Synods of the Diocese or Dioceses affected shall have consented to his so doing, and it shall be the duty of such Synod or Synods to consider without delay any such proposal.
- 3. The Bishop elected, as aforesaid, shall exercise his Episcopal functions in such Missionary District in conformity with the Constitution and Canons of this Province, so

far as they can be made applicable to the condition of his District.

- 4. Every Missionary Bishop shall be entitled to a seat in the House of Bishops, and shall report to the Metropolitan, for the information of the Provincial Synod, at every meeting of the Synod, concerning the state and condition of the Church in his Missionary District.
- 5. In the event of a vacancy occurring in any Missionary Diocese, the Provincial Synod shall be summoned, within six months, to elect another Missionary Bishop; provided the regular meeting of the Provincial Synod shall not take place within twelve months after such vacancy, in which case the election shall be postponed until such regular meeting, and in the meantime, the duties of the late Bishop shall devolve, so far as they can be discharged by him, on a Commissary, whom it shall be the duty of every Missionary Bishop to appoint on his consecration, and from time to time, as the office shall become vacant.
- 6. Nothing contained in the first clause of this Canon shall prevent the election of a Missionary Bishop at this Session of the Synod, or at any adjourned session of the same.
- 7. Any Diocese of the Province may, if it desires so to do, separate and set apart any portion of its Territory as a District suitable for the establishment therein of a Missionary Bishopric, and such Territory so set apart may become a Missionary Diocese and a Bishop be appointed thereto in accordance with the foregoing Canon.

## CANON XII.

FOR ALTERING THE ORDER OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE OF THE CHURCH IN CERTAIN CASES.

Whereas the Convocations of Canterbury and York did introduce certain modifications into the order of the Public Service of the Church; and whereas the Imperial Parliament did by Act 35 and 36 Vic., Cap. 35, sanction and authorize the same as amendments to the Act of Uniformity; and whereas it is expedient to extend such modifications to this Ecclesiastical Province:—

Be it, therefore, enacted, as follows:

Use of shortened Form of Morning and Evening Prayer.

The shortened Order for Morning Prayer, or for Evening Prayer, specified in the schedule of this Canon, may, on any day except Sunday, Christmas Day, Circumcision, Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and Ascension Day, be used in lieu of the Order for Morning or for Evening Prayer respectively prescribed by the Book of Common Prayer.

Special Service for Special Occasions.

Upon any special occasion approved by the Ordinary there may be used in any Cathedral or Church a special form of service approved by the Ordinary, so that there be not introduced into such service anything, except anthems or hymns, which does not form part of the Holy Scriptures or Book of Common Prayer.

Additional Service on Sundays and Holy-days.

An additional form of service, varied from any form prescribed by the Book of Common Prayer, may be used at any hour, on any Sunday or Holy-day, in any Cathedral or Church in which there are duly read, said, or sung as required by law, on such Sunday or Holy-day, at some other hour or hours, the Order for Morning Prayer, the Litany, such part of the Order for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion as is required to be read on Sundays or Holy-days if there be no Communion, and the Order for Evening Prayer, so that there be not introduced into such additional service any portion of the Order

for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion, or any thing except anthems or hymns, which does not form part of the Holy Scriptures or Book of Common Prayer, and so that such form of service and the mode in which it is used is, for the time being, approved by the Ordinary.

# Separation of Services.

Whereas doubts have arisen as to whether the following forms of service, that is to say: The Order for Morning Prayer, the Litany, and the Order for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion, may be used as separate services, and it is expedient to remove such doubts; Be it, therefore, enacted and declared that any of such forms of service may be used together, or in varying order as separate services, or that the Litany may be said after the third Collect in the Order for Evening Prayer, either in lieu of or in addition to the use of the Litany in the Order for Morning Prayer, and any of the said forms of service may be used with or without the preaching of a sermon or lecture, or the reading of a homily.

Preaching a Sermon without Previous Service.

Whereas doubts have arisen as to whether a sermon or lecture may be preached without the common prayers and services appointed by the Book of Common Prayer for the time of day being previously read, and it is expedient to remove such doubts; Be it, therefore, enacted and declared that a sermon or lecture may be preached without the common prayers or services appointed by the Book of Common Prayer being read before it is preached, so that such sermon or lecture be preceded by any service authorized by this Canon, or by the Bidding Prayer, or by a collect taken from the Book of Common Prayer, with or without the Lord's Prayer.

### Schedule.

Note.—The Minister using the Shortened Order for Morning Prayer or for Evening Prayer in this Schedule may, in his discretion, add in its proper place any exhortation, prayer, canticle, hymn, psalm, or lesson contained in the Order for Morning Prayer or for Evening Prayer in the Book of Common Prayer, and omitted, or authorized to be omitted, from such shortened order.

SHORTENED FORM OF SERVICE FOR MORNING PRAYER, DAILY THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, EXCEPT SUNDAY, CHRISTMAS DAY, CIRCUMCISION, EPIPHANY, ASH WEDNESDAY, GOOD FRIDAY AND ASCENSION DAY.

At the beginning of Morning Prayer the Minister shall read with a loud voice one or more of these sentences of the scriptures that follow:

"When the wicked man," &c.

A General Confession to be said of the whole Congregation after the Minister, all Kneeling:

"Almighty and Most Merciful Father," &c.

The Absolution or Remission of Sins, to be pronounced by the Priest alone, Standing, the People still Kneeling: "Almighty God, the Father," &c.

The People shall answer here, and at the end of all other prayers, "Amen."

Then the Minister shall Kneel and say the Lord's Prayer with an audible voice; the People also Kneeling and repeating it with him:

"Our Father which art in Heaven," &c.

Then likewise he shall say:

"O Lord, open Thou our lips," &c.

Here all Standing up, the Priest shall say :

"Glory be to the Father," &c.

Then shall follow the Psalms appointed. And at the end of every Psalm throughout the year, and likewise at the end of the Benedicite, Benedictus, Magnificat and Nunc-Diwittis, shall be repeated:

"Glory be to the Father," &c.

Then shall be read distinctly, with an audible voice, either the First Lesson taken out of the Old Testament as is appointed in the Calendar, or the Second Lesson taken out of the New Testament, except there be a Proper Lesson assigned for that day, in which case the Proper Lesson shall be read, and if there are two Proper Lessons, each shall be read in its proper place; he that readeth so Standing and turning himself as he may best be heard by all such as are present.

Note—That before every Lesson the Minister shall say: "Here Beginneth" (such a chapter or such a verse of such a Chapter, of such a Book.)

After every Lesson.

"Here endeth" the Lesson, or the First or the Second Lesson.

And after the Lesson, shall be said or sung in English the following:

Either the Hymn called "Te Deum Laudamus,"

"We praise Thee, O God," &c.;

Or this Canticle,

Benedicite, omnia opera,

"O all ye works of the Lord," &c.;

Or the Hymn following (except when that shall happen to be read in the Lesson for the day, or for the Gospel on Saint John the Baptist's Day):

Benedictus, St. Luke 1, v. 68.

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel," &c.;

Or this Psalm, Jubilate Deo.

"O be joyful in the Lord all ye lands," &c.

Then shall be sung or said the Apostles' Creed by the Minister and the People Standing, except only on such days as the Creed of St. Athanasius is appointed to be read. After that, the people all devoutly Kneeling, the Minister shall pronounce with a loud voice.

"The Lord be with you."

Answer. "And with Thy spirit."

Minister: —"Let us pray."

Then the Priest shall say:

"O Lord, shew thy mercy upon us," &c.

Then shall follow three Collects. The first of the Day, which shall be the same that is appointed at the Communion: the second for Peace: the third for Grace to live well: and the two last collects shall never alter, but daily be said at Morning Prayer throughout all the year, as followeth, all kneeling.

The second Collect, for Peace: "O God, who art the author of peace," &c.

The third Collect, for Grace:

"O Lord, our heavenly Father," &c Here may follow an Anthem or Hymn:

Then these two prayers following: A Prayer of Saint Chrysostom.

"Almighty God, who hast given us grace," &c. 2 Corinthians, xiii.:

"The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ," &c.
Here endeth the Shorts red Order of Morning Prayer.

THE SHORTENED ORDER FOR EVENING PRAYER DAILY THROUGH-OUT THE YEAR, EXCEPT ON SUNDAY, CHRISTMAS DAY, CIRCUMCISION, ELIPHANY, ASH WEDNESDAY, GOOD FRIDAY AND ASCENSION DAY.

At the beginning of the Evening Prayer the Minister

shall read with a loud voice some one or more of these sentences of the Scr p'ures that follow.

"When the wicked man," &c.

A General Confession to be said by the whole Congregation after the Minister, all Kneeling.

"Almighty and most merciful Father," &c.

The Absolution or Remission of sins, to be pronounced by the Priest alone Standing; the people still Kneeling.

"Almighty God, the Father," &c.

Then the Minister shall Kneel and say the Lord's Prayer, the People also Kneeling and repeating it with him.

"Our Father, which art in heaven," &c.

Then likewise he shall say:

"O Lord, open Thou our lips."

Here all Standing up, the Priest shall say: "Glory be to the Father," &c.

Then shall be said or sung one or more of the Psalms in order as they be appointed. Then either a Lesson of the Old Testament, as it is appointed, or a Lesson of the New Testament, as it is appointed, except there is a Proper Lesson assigned for that day, in which case the Proper Lesson shall be read, and if there are two Proper Lessons, each shall be read in its proper place; and after the Lesson or between the first and second Lessons, shall be said or sung in English one of the following:

Either the Magnificat, or the Song of the Blessed Virgin Mary, in English, as follows:

Magnificat. St. Luke 1.;

"My soul doth magnify the Lord," &c.

Or else this Psalm (except it be on the nineteenth day of the month, when it is read in the ordinary course of the Psalms)

Cantot. Domino, Psalm xcviii:

" O Sing unto the Lord a new song," &c.

Or Nunc Dimitt's (or the Song of Simeon) as followeth: "Lord now lettest thou Thy servant," &c.

Or else this Psalm (except it be on the twelfth day of the month.)

Deus misereatur. Psalm lavii:

"God be merciful unto us and bless us," &c.

Then shall be said or sung the Apostles' Creed, by the Minister and People Standing:

"I believe in God the Father Almighty," &c.

And after that, the People devoutly Kneeling, the Minister shall pronounce with a loud voice:

"The Lord be with you."

Answer .- " And with thy Spirit."

Minister .- " Let us pray."

Then the Priest, Standing up shall say:

"O Lord, shew thy mercy upon us," &c.

Then shall follow three Collects. The first of the D vy; the second for Peace; the third for aid against all Perils, as hereafter followeth; which two last Collects shall be daily said at Evening Prayer, without alteration.

The second Collect at Evening Prayer:

"O Ged, from whom all holy desires," &c.

The third Collect, for aid against all perils:

"Lighten our darkness," &c.

Here may follow an Anthem or Hymn.

A Prayer of St. Chrysostom.

"Almighty God, who hast given us grace," &c. 2 Corinthians, xiii.

"The grace of Our Lord Jesus Christ," &c.
Here endeth the Shortened Order of Evening Prayer.

## CANON XIII.

# OF ALTERATIONS OR ADDITIONS IN PRAYER BOOK AND VERSION OF SCRIPTURES.

No alteration or addition shall be made in the Book of Common Prayer and Administration of the Sacraments and other Rites and Ceremonies of the Church, the Articles of Religion, or the Form and Manner of making, ordaining and consecrating Bishops, Priests and Deacons, or the Version of the Scriptures authorized to be read in Churches, unless the same shall be enacted at one session of the Provincial Synod and confirmed at another session of the same; provided that the confirmation be approved by two-thirds of the House of Bishops and two thirds of each order of the Lower House.

Nevertheless, any alteration in or addition made to the Prayer Book or Articles by the Church of England in her convocations, and authorized by Parliament, may be accepted for use in this Ecclesiastical Province by the Provincial Synod at one session only, without the necessity for further confirmation.

## CANON XIV.

# OF THE OATHS AND SUBSCRIPTION OF THE CLERGY.

Every person about to be ordained Priest or Deacon shall, before ordination, in the presence of the Bishop by whom he is to be ordained, and every person about to be licensed to any Curacy, or to be instituted to any benefice, shall, before obtaining such license or being so instituted, make and subcribe the following declarations and take the following oaths:

- 1. The "Declaration of Assent" so called:
- "I, (A.B.,) do solemnly make the following declaration: I assent to the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion and to

the Book of Common Prayer, and of the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons; I believe the doctrine of the Church of England as therein set forth to be agreeable to the Word of God, and in Public Prayers and administration of the Sacraments I will use the Form in the said Book prescribed, and none other, except so far as shall be ordered by lawful authority."

- 2. The declaration of Submission to the Canons of the Provincial and Diocesan Synods as required by Canon II of the Canons of this Ecclesiastical Province in the following terms:
- "I, (A. B.,) do willingly subscribe to and declare that I assent to and abide by the Canons which have been, or shall be, from time to time, passed by the Provincial Synod, or the Synod of the Diocese of......."
  - 3. The Oath of Allegiance:
- "I. (A. B.,) do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Victoria, her heirs and successors, according to law. So help me God."
  - 4. The Oath of Canonical Obedience.
- "I, (A. B.,) do swear that I will pay true and Canonical obedience to the Lord Bishop of ........ and his successors in all legal and honest commands. So help me God....."

[No oathshall be administered during the service for the ordering of Deacons, or during the service for the ordering of Priests, or during the service for the consecration of Bishops.]

Before institution to any \(\Gamma\) enefice, the persons to be instituted shall also subscribe the following "Declaration against Simony."

"I, (A. B.,) solemnly declare that I have not made by myself or by any other person any payment, contract, or promise of any kind whatsoever which, to the best of my

knowledge or belief, is simoniacal touching or concerning the obtaining the preferment of (.....), nor will I at any time hereafter perform or satisfy in whole or in part any such kind of payment, contract or promise made by any other without my knowledge or consent."

### CANON XV.

## OF THE CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP.

- 1. Whenever an election is made by any Diocesan Synod within the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada of a person to fill the office of Bishop, the chairman, or in the case of his death, incapacity, absence, or refusal, the clerical secretary of the said Synod shall transmit a certificate of such election to the Metropolitan, within seven days after the election.
  - 2. Such certificate shall be in the following form :-

Signed, on behalf of the Synod,

..... Chairman.
.... Secretary or
.... Secretaries

- 3. On the receipt of this Certificate, the Metropolitan shall, within seven days, send formal notice of such election to all the Bishops within his Ecclesiastical Province.
- 4. Should any of the said Bishops desire to object to the consecration of the person so elected, on the ground of canonical disability, as hereinafter defined, he shall make the objection in writing, delivered to the Metropolitan

within fourteen days from the date of said notification to him of such election, setting forth the special grounds of his objection.

- 5. On the receipt of such objection in writing by the Metropolitan, or in case the Metropolitan himself object to such consecration, he shall summon the House of Bishops to meet within one month, to consider such objection, giving not less than fourteen days' notice of the time and place of meeting; it shall be the duty of every Bishop so summoned to attend unless he be excused for reasonable cause to be approved by the Metropolitan; and the Metropolitan shall send by post a true copy of such objections to the person so elected, at least twenty-one days previous to the meeting referred to in this section, and shall also notify him of the time and place of meeting.
- 6. The House of Bishops, having heard the person so elected, or having given him every reasonable facility for appearing before them in person, or by counsel, or by proxy, if he be so minded, as well as the Diocesan Synod by its representative duty appointed, if the said Diocesan Synod shall express its desire to be so heard; and, having heard the reasons in support of the said objection, shall decide as to its validity or otherwise, and their decision, with the reasons therefor, shall be communicated in writing without delay to the person so elected, and to the secretary of the Synod which elected him.
- 7. Thereupon if the majority of the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province determine that the objection is canonical and has been sustained, the Synod of the Diocese aforesaid shall proceed to the election of another person to fill the office of Bishop.
- 8. Should no such objection be made within the period specified, or after objection made, should the same not be

sustained by the majority of the Bishops as aforesaid, the Metropolitan shall, with all convenient speed, proceed to the consecration of the said person so elected, and to that end shall summon two or more of the Bishops of this Ecclesiastical Province to assist him in such consecration; and it shall be the duty of such bishops to attend at such time and place as he, the Metropolitan, shall appoint, and to assist in the consecration of the said person elected.

- 9. Before proceeding to consecrate, the Metropolitan shall cause to be read publicly in the church, where the consecration is held, a duly attested certificate of the election of said person to the office of Bishop, and that no Canonical impediment to his consecration exists, which shall thereupon be given in for record.
- 10. No Bishop who shall have made any Canonical objection as aforesaid, or who shall have voted in favour of such objection, shall be required to take part in such consecration, and if the Metropolitan shall have made such objection, the Senior Bishop of the Ecclesiastical Province, not having so objected or so voted, shall perform the duties of the Metropolitan referred to in section 8 of this Canon.
- 11. The following objections shall be considered canonical and none others:—
  - 1. That the person elected is not fully thirty years of age.
- 2. That he is not a Priest in Holy Orders of the Church of England, or of some Branch of the Church in full communion therewith.
  - 3. That he is deficient in learning.
- 4. That he has either directly or indirectly secured, or attempted to secure, the office by any improper means.
- 5. That he is guilty of any other crime or immorality.
- 6. That he teaches or holds, or has within five years previous to the date of his election, taught or held anything

contrary to the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England.

- 12. The Bishop elect, shall, previous to his consecration, or if already a Bishop previous to his installation subscribe a declaration of submission to the canons of the Provincial Synod in the form prescribed by Canon II.
- 13. If a person shall be elected bishop of a vacant diocese who has been previously consecrated bishop of the Church of England or of any branch of the Church in full communion therewith, the said election shall be notified to the Metropolitan as hereinbefore provided, and the Metropolitan shall proceed, as in the case of the election of a person in Priests' Orders, except that when no canonical objection has been received within the period limited for entering such objections, or when such objections shall have been heard and rejected by the House of Bishops, the Metropolitan instead of proceeding to the consecration shall issue a certificate to the bishop so elected, and to the secretaries of the electing Synod, that there is no canonical impediment to the installation of the said Bishop.
- 14. In all cases when the Bishop elected has been duly consecrated, or a certificate has been furnished by the Metropolitan, as before provided, the said Metropolitan shall, either by himself or by some person duly commissioned to act on his behalf, formally instal the said Bishop elect, inducting him into the actual possession of his See.
- 15. In case there shall be no Metropolitan or in case he shall be incapable of performing the duy in this Canon assigned to the Metropolitan, this duty shall be performed by the Senior Bishop of the Province and in case of his absence or incapacity by the next in seniority and so forth.
- 16. A majority of the Bishops of this Ecclesiastical Province shall constitute a quorum for the hearing of objections to the consecration of a person elected to the office of Bishop.

#### MISSIONARY DIOCESE OF ALGOMA.

The missionary diocese of Algoma was formed in the year 1873, when, on the 28th of October, the Ven. F. D. Fauquier, Archdeacon of Brant, was consecrated the first missionary bishop. The diocese extends over a tract of 800 miles in extent, embracing the north shore of Lake Superior and the country about the Georgian Bay and the Muskoka Lakes. There are at present eight clergymen and five laymen laboring in the field.

Being a purely missionary diocese, we are dependent almost entirely on extraneous aid for the support of our missions. In each of the older dioceses we have now a Secretary Treasurer working voluntarily on our behalf, through whom our wants are made known and contributions are remitted to us.

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# UNFINISHED BUSINESS STANDING OVER FOR TENTH SESSION.

Mr. VANKOUGHNET:

Gives notice that he will move That Article 7 of the Constitution be amended by inserting after the words "from any cause" the words, "or on failure."

The Rev. W. S. DARLING:

That this Synod shall hereafter hold its triennial meetings in the month of October.

Moved by Rev. Canon Dart, seconded by Rev. Professor Roe:

That a Committee be appointed to consider the advisability of amending the Constitution of the Synod, by an alteration of section 21 in the Rules of Order, to enable members of the Lower House to vote (upon demand) by dioceses, as in the General Convention of the Church in the United States.

Judge Kingsmill:

To amend Section No. 3 of the Constitution, so as to provide that the Clerical and Lay Delegates shall consist of at least six Delegates of each order from each Diocese—and in those Dioceses having more than 72 Clergymen, one additional Delegate from each order for every 12 Clergymen in excess of 72.

Judge Kingsmill:

To provide for the meeting of the Provincial Synod alternately at Montreal, Halifax, Toronto, St. John and London.

MR. FENNINGS TAYLOR.

That at the commencement of each Session of the Provincial Synod, a Standing Committee be appointed, to which shall be referred for consideration and report all motions having for their object the alteration or the amendment of the Canons, or any other alteration in the Constitution.

MR. W. C. SILVER:

That the House of Bishops be requested to appoint a Committee to act with a Committee of this House, to be appointed by the Prolocutor, on the relative rights and duties of Bishops, Rectors and Church Wardens in this Ecclesiastical Province, to report at next regular session of this Synod.
