JOURNAL OF SYNOD

TWENTY-FIRST SESSION, JUNE 22, 1915.

 $\rm At~7~a.m.$ Holy Communion was celebrated in the Cathedral by His Lordship the Bishop, assisted by Rev. Lenox I. Smith.

At 9.15 a.m. the Committee, composed of the Lay Secretary, Messrs. Chas. Macnab and J. C. Bradley, met in the Lauder Hall to receive and examine the Certificates of the Lay Representatives.

Matins was said by Rev. W. H. Stiles, the first lesson being read by Rev. Mark Malbert and the second lesson by the Rev. W. S. Blyth, B.A., B.D.

At 10 a.m. His Lordship, Bishop Roper, took the chair and asked the Clerical Secretary to open the meeting with Prayer.

ROLL CALL AND QUORUM

The Roll of the Clerical Delegates was called by the Clerical Secretary, and the Lay Secretary called the Roll of the Lay Delegates by Parishes. His Lordship announced a quorum of each order.

AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE REPORT

Mr. J. M. Courtney, C.M.G., read the Report of the Audit and Accounts Committee and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. Canon Kittson.—Carried. (See appendix A).

APPOINTMENT OF OFFICERS

His Lordship announced that he had appointed Mr. J. F. Orde, K.C., as Chancellor, and Mr. John Bishop, K.C., as Registrar, both permanently; and Dr. A. A. Weagant, Lay Secretary, until the next meeting of the Executive.

Moved by Mr. J. M. Courtney, C.M.G., seconded by Mr. John Bishop, K.C.: That Mr. F. H. Gisborne, K.C., I.S.O., be Assistant Lay Secretary.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. J. M. Courtney, C.M.G., seconded by Rev. J. Osborne: That Lt.-Col. Eliot be Diocesan Treasurer.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. J. M. Snowdon, seconded by Mr. Frederick Hayter: That Rev. J. H. Dixon be the official reporter of Synod.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. A. W. Mackay, seconded by Mr. Frederick Hayter: That the election of the Executive Committee be held by ballot at noon on Wednesday, June 23rd, with the other elections.—Carried.

OPENING BUSINESS

Moved by the Chancellor, seconded by the Clerical Secretary: That the minutes of the last day of the last Session of Synod as printed at pages 21 to the Synod Journal of 1914 be confirmed.—Carried.

Regrets for absence from Synod were received from Rev. R. M. Fairbairn, of Beachburg. Rev. Canon Elliott and Rev. G. Bousfield gave reasons for the absence of their Lay Delegates.

His Lordship the Bishop preferred to give no charge at this meeting of the Synod.

On motion of Rev. Canon Elliott and Rev. C. O. Carson: Revs. A. W. Mackay and J. M. Snowdon were requested to prepare a message of adection and respect to be sent to Archbishop Hamilton.—Carried.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: SUMMARY REPORT.

The Summary Report of the Executive Committee was read by the Clerical Secretary, who moved its reception, to be followed by its adoption at a later stage. (See Appendix C).

Moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Whalley: That the action of the Executive Committee at its meeting on the 15th December, 1914, whereby it was resolved that the transportation expenses of the Clerical Delegates to the last Provincial Synod, and to future meetings of the Provincial Synod, be paid out of the Provincial Synod Fund of this Diocese, be confirmed.—Carried.

NEW CANON ON PATRONAGE.

25. Patronage. Moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Rev. A. W. Mackay: 'The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa hereby enacts as follows:—

"That Canon 25, on the Patronage of Rectories, (by reason of the resignation of the Right Reverend Charles Hamilton, as Bishop of this Diocese, being no longer in force), be and the same is hereby repealed, and that the following Canon on Patronage be adopted:

"XXV. Patronage: (1) Whilst this Canon remains in force, the appointment to all Rectories, Incumbencies, and Missions within this Diocese shall be vested in the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. This Canon shall remain in force until the first meeting of the Synod of this Diocese held in the year 1916, and shall then cease to have any further operation."—Carried unanimously.

His Lordship called attention to the fact that the new Canon became immediately operative.

CANONS ON VOLUNTARY FUNDS.

Revs. J. M. Snowdon and W. H. Stiles moved the adoption of the following new Canon on Voluntary Funds, which had been approved by the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, and transmitted to Synod for enactment:—"The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa enacts as follows:—(1) That Section 4 of the Canon to amend Canons XVI, XVII and XVIII, passed and confirmed at the Sessions of 1904 and 1905, be repealed. (2) That Section 2 of Canon XII be and is hereby repealed. (3) That Canon VIII be amended by adding the following Section immediately after Section 3 thereof: 3a. Subject

to such resolutions or orders as may from time to time be made by the Synod, the Executive Committee shall have all necessary powers for collecting the money required for the several funds of the Diocese and for other duly authorized purposes, including the power to prescribe the time when and the manner in which such money shall be raised in the several parishes and missions."

At this stage of the discussion Messrs. Orde and Whalley moved that the Synod resolve itself into "Committee of the whole." After some discussion in Committee of the whole the Chancellor moved an adjournment from 12.45 to 2.30 p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION, JUNE 22ND, 1915.

The Committee of the whole arose and reported progress.

On meeting after adjournment, on suggestion of His Lordship the Bishop, the pending motions re "Amended Canon on Voluntary Fundswere withdrawn and the whole subject was referred back to the Executive Committee for further consideration, on motion of Rev. J. M. Snowdon and Mr. G. C. Smith. This was carried both in Committee of the whole and in the Synod itself.

Revs. A. W. Mackay and J. M. Snowdon reported a resolution of affection and respect to be sent to Archbishop Hamilton.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean Anderson, seconded Rev. J. M. Snowdon: That when this Synod adjourns this afternoon it stands adjourned until 10 a.m. tomorrow, Wednesday, in order that the Clergy and Lay Delegates may have an opportunity of being present here this evening at 8 o'clock when Miss Evans of St. Christopher's College, London, demonstrates the working of a modern Sunday School.—Carried.

REPORTS OF REGISTRAR AND RURAL DEANS.

The Report of the Registrar was read by the Clerical Secretary, who moved its reception. (See Append'x D).

His Lordship presented to the Diocese a set of new books similar to those devised by Archbishop Sweatman, which he thought might well be adopted and used by this Synod.

On Motion of Revs. Whalley and Waterman, the Report of the Rural Deans was taken as read and to be printed in the Synod Journal. (See Appendix E).

Rural Dean Whalley reported that the Board of Rural Deans is reviving the Missionary Deputations of former years. There will be about 15 groups of Parishes to be visited by the Clergy, as described on a list to be posted up for information. (See Appendix V).

On request of Rev. Rural Dean Saddington, the Rules of Order were suspended, Rev. W. C. Gemmell, of Japan, was asked to take a seat on the floor of the

GENERAL REPORT OF TREASURER.

The Treasurer gave his general Report on the Diocesan Funds as they are to be printed in the Synod Journal, and moved its adoption, which was carried, with the proviso that the different items may be discussed as they arise. (See Appendix B).

On motion of Messrs. Gisborne and Whalley, the Synod expressed its sincere appreciation of the way in which the funds have been handled.

ASSESSMENT FUND.

Moved by the Chancellor, seconded by the Treasurer, and Resolved: That the Assessments on the Parishes for Synod expenses be the same for 1915 as for 1914; and that their future revision be referred to the Investment Committee for consideration, and report to the next meeting of the Executive. The list of Parochial Assessments is to be published in the 1915 and succeeding Journals (See Appendix H).

On motion of Rev. J.M. Snowdon and Mr. J.M. Courtney, the item of \$121.50, for printing 3,000 Mission Fund Reports, was ordered to be removed from the Assessment Fund Account, and charged one-half to Diocesan Mission Fund, and one-half to M.S.C.C., and similarly for future years.

DIOCESAN MISSION FUND.

Moved by Rev. A. W. Mackay: That the Financial Report on the Diocesan Mission Fund be adopted. Deferred to a later stage.

CLASSIFICATION COMMITTEE.

Chairman Mackay read the whole report, which was then discussed clause by clause and adopted as a whole. An amendment by Revs. Macmorine and Whalley, that Antrim be placed in Class III, was lost on a division. See Appendix G).

MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA.

Rev. J. M. Snowdon read the Report and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. Canon Kittson.—Carried. (See Appendix K).

Moved by Rev. J. F. Gorman, seconded by Canon Elliott: That a vote of thanks be tendered Rev. J. M. Snowdon for the very excellent Report which he has presented on behalf of the work of the M.S.C.C.—Carried.

EPISCOPAL ENDOWMENT AND AUGMENTATION FUNDS.

Moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Rev. A. G. Smith: That the resolution of the Executive Committee directing the payment out of the Episcopal Endowment Fund Income, accumulated since the 18th of October, 1914, of \$1,500.00 to His Grace Archbishop Hamilton, by way of stipend for his services as Acting Bishop since that date, and the payment of \$500.00 to our present

Bishop, on account of his removal from Victoria to Ottawa, and the transfer of the balance of such income to the Episcopal Endowment Fund of the Diocese, be confirmed.—Carried.

Moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Mr. G. A. Stiles: That the Executive Committee take up forthwith the matter of completing, at as early a date as possible, the Episcopal Augmentation Fund of the Diocese, by the realization of an additional sum of about \$4,000.00; so that with the present Episcopal Endowment Fund the total Capital of the Episcopal Endowment may reach \$100,000.00 and thereby release the income from the Episcopal Augmentation Fund for the Bishop of the Diocese.—Carried.

CLERGY TRUST FUND.

Moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Rev. A. W. Mackay: That the action of the Executive Committee in adding the names of Revs. J. M. Snowdon, W. H. Stiles and J. F. Gorman as annuitants to the Clergy Trust Fund be confirmed.—Carried.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

At the Executive Committee of December 15th, 1914, it was resolved, on motion of Mr. G. A. Stiles and Rev. J. Fisher: "That we recommend the Synod, (A) to rescind the Standing Order of Synod at page 99 of the Journal of 1914, passed in 1903, page 40, regarding church collections for Widows and Orphans; and (B), to amend the Canon so as to provide a grant from the W. and O. Fund of \$150 to the widows or children of every Clergyman, immediately upon his decease."

Moved by Mr. G. A. Stiles, seconded by Rev. W. P. Garrett: That the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa hereby enacts as follows:—

That the following be added as Sub Sec. 1a to Sec. 15 of Canon XVI on The Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

1a. For the widow, or if there be no widow, for the child or children, the sum of One hundred and fifty dollars immediately upon the decease of a Clergyman. —Carried unanimously.

Moved by the Treasurer, seconded by Rev. J. M. Snowdon: That the balance at credit of Widows' and Orphans' Fund Income be transferred to Capital.—Carried.

The Synod adjourned at 6.10 p.m. to meet again at 10 a.m. Wednesday, June $23\mathrm{rd}$.

SECOND DAY-WEDNESDAY, JUNE 23RD, 1915.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in the Cathedral by his Lordship the Bishop, at 7 a.m., and Matins was said at 9.15 a.m., by Rev. W. H. Stiles.

Synod resumed its business in the Lauder Hall at 10 a.m., and was opened with Prayer by the Clerical Secretary.

The minutes of the first day's session were read and confirmed.

REPORTS ON DECEASED MEMBERS.

Rev. Rural Dean E. A. Anderson read the report of the Sub-Committee on Deceased Members, and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. G. C. Smith.—Adopted unanimously by a standing vote.—(See Appendix L.)

Moved by Rev. J. F. Gorman, seconded by Rev. Canon Elliot, that Whereas in the good Providence of God, the late Henry Pollard, Canon of Christ Church Cathedral, and Rector of the Parish of St. John the Evangelist of this city, was permitted to exercise a long and faithful ministry, extending over a period of fifty-six years; and whereas, by his deep piety, simplicity of life, and gentle courtesy, he won the respect and esteem of all who had the privilege of knowing him; and whereas his long ministry was marked by the fullest recognition of its solemn obligations, and a conscientious and dignified performance of the same; therefore be it resolved, that we, the Clergy and Laity in Synod assembled, render thanks to Almighty God for the inspiring example left to us by this faithful Minister of Jesus Christ, and that, moreover, the respectful sympathy of this Synod be conveyed to Mrs. Pollard in her deep sorrow.—Adopted unanimously.

Moved by Rev. J. F. Gorman, seconded by Rev. Canon Elliott, that Whereas the late John Travers Lewis, M.A., D.C.L., K.C., was appointed the first Chancellor of the Diocese of Ottawa, and held that office up to the time of his decease, devoting to the performance of the important duties thereof, a brilliant mind and a loyal and devoted attachment to the best interests of the Church; and whereas the deceased was also prominent in the Councils of the Church, snatching from a busy life, sufficient time to take his part in the deliberations of the Diocesan, Provincial and General Synods: therefore be it resolved, that this Synod place on record its appreciation of the faithful service rendered to the Church by so distinguished a son, and that it gratefully renders thanks to God for the example of earnest and unwavering devotion to the Church's welfare which his life affords. Be it further resolved, that the deep sympathy of this Synod be extended to Mrs. Lewis and family, and that an assurance of our prayers be conveyed to them that God, who doeth all things well, may comfort and support them in their bereavement.—Adopted unanimously.

MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Rev. Dr. Gould, the General Secretary of the Missionary Society, addressed the Synod from 11.10 to 11.40, on the general work of the M.S.C.C., both in Canada and in the foreign fields.

TESTIMONIAL TO ARCHBISHOP HAMILEON.

Rev. T. J. Stiles, by permission, read a Report from the Sub-committee on the Testimonial to Archbishop Hamilton, and hoped for liberal contributions to the Fund.

Moved by Mr. G. A. Stiles, seconded by Rev. A. W. Mackay: That the Executive Committee at its first autumn meeting be requested to present to Archbishop Hamilton the Address prepared by the Committee in charge of the matter.—Carried unanimously.

ELECTIONS FOR GENERAL AND PROVINCIAL SYNODS AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Moved by Mr. G. A. Stiles, seconded by Rev. J. M. Snowdon. That the following amendments to the Canons, respecting the change in the fiscal year, passed at last session of Synod, and by the Executive Committee be and the same are hereby confirmed and enacted.

The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa enacts as follows:-

That Sec. 7 of Canon X, (Audit and Accounts Committee), be amended by striking out the words "30th day of April," and substituting therefor "31st day of December." That Section 5 of Canon XI, (Assessment Fund), be amended by striking out the words "30th day of April," and substituting therefor "31st day of December." That Section 2 of Canon XII (Diocesan Mission Fund), be amended by striking out the word "April," and substituting therefor "December." That Section 5 of Canon XVI (Widows' and Orphans' Fund) be amended by substituting "November" for "January" in the 3rd and 8th lines thereof: That Sec. 2 of Canon XXIV (State of the Church) be amended by substituting "December" for "April" in the 3rd line thereof; and by striking out the words "25th day of April" and substituting therefor the words "31st day of December;" and by substituting "January" for "May" in the last line thereof. That Section 4 of Canon XXIII be amended by striking out the words "in May" in the last line thereof. That Section 5 of Canon XXIII be amended by striking out the words "12th day of May," and by substituting therefor the words "1st day of March." That any provision in any Canon or in any Standing Order of the Synod inconsistent with the change of the fiscal year hereby enacted, shall be repealed; and that where a time for performing any act is fixed with respect to the fiscal year, a new date shall be substituted therefor, corresponding as nearly as may be with the fiscal year prescribed by this Canon.—Carried unanimously.

Moved by Revs. J. M. Snowdon and Rural Dean Anderson: That it be an instruction to the Executive Committee to send official notice to every Clergyman, Church Warden and Lay Delegate notifying them of the change in the fiscal year of the Diocese, and calling attention to the several matters affected by this change.—Carried.

FISCAL YEAR OF PARISHES.

AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE.

Mr. J. M. Courtney, C.M.G., read the following report of the Audit and Accounts Committee, which was referred by the Executive Committee to the Synod of June 22nd, 1915.

The undersigned members of the Audit and Accounts Committee beg to report that they have had presented to them the several accounts and memoranda relating to the funds of the Diocese under the control of the Treasurer.

The undersigned examined the several mortgages as detailed in the account books, they had also submitted to them the certificate from The Royal Trust Company relating to the debentures held by the Head Office of the Trust Company on behalf of the Synod. They also received a certificate from the Manager of the Imperial Bank at Ottawa, showing the balances at the credit of the several accounts; both these certificates correspond with the Ledger of the Synod. The balances of the several accounts in the Ledger agree with those in the balance sheet. Again the undersigned have to note that the accounts were ready for audit within a week after the close of the business year of the Diocese, thanks to the care of the Treasurer and the officers of the Royal Trust Company. The arrears of interest in the mortgages are somewhat increased over arrears at this time last year, but reductions are steadily being made, and as all the items are good, and are well looked after, realization will be made ere long.

(APPENDIX C).

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

As prescribed by Canon VIII, Sec. 2, the Executive Committee met immediately after the closing of Synod, on June 17th, 1914, at 10.00 p.m. The following officers and Committees were re-elected: Clerical Secretary, Rev. W. H. Stiles; Lay Secretary, Mr. J. F. Orde, K.C.; Auditor, Mr. Frederick Hayter; Audit and Accounts Committee, Rev. Canon Kittson, Mr. J. M. Courtney, Mr. W. H. Rowley; Investment Committee, the Chancellor, the Registrar, the Lay Secretary, the Treasurer, Mr. F. A. Heney, Mr. W. H. Rowley, Dr. Chas. Morse.

The Executive Committee met on Sept. 8th, 1914, with His Grace the Archbishop in the chair. The vestry of St. Mark's Church, Pakenham, was permitted to sell the old rectory, subject to the Chancellor's approval. Authority was given "to sell to the C. P. R., that portion of the Perth Rectory Glebe heretofore leased to the Railway Co. by lease dated June 30th, 1889, for the price of \$1,200.00 and \$40.00 current rent," subject to compliance with the Canons, and to the approval of the Chancellor.

The Executive Committee met on Dec. 15th, 1914, with Chancellor Lewis in the chair. The documents connected with the sale of the old Rectory at Pakenham have been prepared, and await signature by the incoming Diocesan. Resolved, That the transportation expenses of the Clerical Delegates to the last Provincial Synod, and to future meetings of the Provincial Synod, be paid out of the Provincial Synod Fund of this Diocese.

The Executive Committee met on March 16th, 1915, with Rev. A. W. Mackay in the chair. Permission was given to rent the Mission House at Mattawa for a short time, the income to be accounted for to the Treasurer. Mr. F. W. Avery was elected a member of the Audit and Accounts Committee, to succeed the late Mr. W. H. Rowley.

Attention was called to the fact that the Missionary Deputations of previous years had been discontinued; and that the Board of Rural Deans had not met for over a year. In the matter of a testimonial to the retiring Archbishop, the same sub-committee was continued, with Rev. T. J. Stiles as convenor.

The Executive Committee met on June 1st, 1915, with His Lordship Bishop Roper in the chair. His Lordship announced the following appointments:—Chancellor, J. F. Orde, Esq., K.C.; Lay Secretary, Dr. A. A. Weagant; Assistant Lay Secretary, F. H. Gisborne, Esq., K.C. Mr. Andrew Haydon, the Lay Delegate for Petawawa, was appointed to take the place of the late W. H. Rowley, J.P., on the Executive and Investment Committees. Rev. Forster Bliss was requested to continue his reports on Statistics. Revs. Elliott, Gorman and Whalley, and Mr. Chas. Macnab were appointed a Committee on Deceased Members, with special instructions to prepare a resolution concerning the late Chancellor. Rev. T. J. Stiles reported that the Committee on a testimonial to Archbishop Hamilton, had arranged for a "Bishop Hamilton Exhibition," to be

placed in trust, whose income would go to a student to be approved by the Bishop, at any University; the Committee has \$600.00 in hand, and hopes to reach the amount of \$1,000.00. Resolved: "That the resolution of the Executive Committee held on the 8th Sept., 1914, authorizing the Parish of St. Mark's Church, Pakenham, to sell the old rectory, be and the same is hereby confirmed; and that the Bishop be and is hereby authorized, upon the approval of the Chancellor, to execute the conveyance thereof."

AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE.

Mr. J. M. Courtney, C.M.G., read the report of the Audit and Accounts Committee, which was referred by the Executive Committee to the Synod of June 22nd, 1915.

APPORTIONMENTS FOR EXTRA-PAROCHIAL PURPOSES.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, the Auditor read a tentative scheme of apportionments for Extra-Parochial Purposes, of a form similar to that shown at pages 140 to 142 of the Journal of 1914. The new figures are an approximation to 25 per cent. of the average intra-parochial expenditure for the last four years, with modifications where plainly expedient. The new scheme was adopted without alteration, and will be shown in full in the Journal for 1915, and on forms issued separately. An explanation will be sent to each clergyman of the calculation for his own Parish.

ASSESSMENT FUND.

Resolved: That the assessments on the Parishes for Synod expenses be the same for 1915 as for 1914; and that their future revision be referred to the Investment Committee for consideration, and report to the September Executive. The list of Parochial Assessments is to be published in the 1915 and succeeding Journals.

On motion of Rev. J. M. Snowdon and Mr. Courtney, the item of \$121.50, for printing 3,000 Mission Fund Reports, was ordered to be removed from the Assessment Fund Account, and charged one-half to Diocesan Mission Fund, and one-half to M.S.C.C.,—and similarly for future years.

CLERGY SUPERANNUATION.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, Ven. Archdeacon Bogert was placed on the Clergy Superannuation Fund from May 1st, 1914, at \$200.00 a year.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, notice was given by Rev. A. W. Mackay and Mr. Gisborne, of a motion to amend the Canon on Clergy Superannuation, so as to raise the present allowance of \$200.00 a year to \$400.00; and to remove the restriction on those who are also receiving an allowance from the Clergy Trust Fund. This motion is to have an early place on the Agenda Paper of the March Session.

At the Executive Committee of March 16th, 1915, it was moved by Rev. A. W. Mackay and Mr. F. H. Gisborne, and resolved: "That clause 4 of the

Clergy Superannuation Canon be amended by changing the words "Two Hundred Pollars" to "Four Hundred Dollars" per annum, and that all the words following them be struck out." To be reported to next Synod.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, the question of the eligibility of a Bishop or a teaching-clergyman to the benefits of the Superannuation, and Widows' and Orphans' Fund, was referred to the Chancellor for his decision. The balance of \$362.18 was transferred from Income to Capital Account.

CLERGY TRUST FUND.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, Rev. J. M. Snowdon was placed on the list of annuitants from the Clergy Trust Fund, to succeed the late Canon Phillips, dating from July 1st, 1914.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, two vacancies were reported on this Fund, namely, the late Canon Pollard, and the late Rev. Wm. Fleming. His Lordship the Bishop certified that Rev. W. H. Stiles and Rev. J. F. Gorman are next in order. Moved by Mr. Orde and Rev. A. W. Mackay, and resolved, that Rev. W. H. Stiles and Rev. J. F. Gorman be placed on the list of annuitants at \$400.00, to be paid in accordance with the provisions of the Canon.

COLLEGIATE NIGHT SCHOOL.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, Rural Dean Anderson reported that Mr. T. N. Lewis had carried on a class up to June, 1914, and that the money lasted till that time; Mr. Freeman has also been studying with Mr. Anderson, and is almost ready to go to Lennoxville; Mr. Finch hopes to go to the same University.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, Rural Dean Anderson reported that Mr. Lewis' class up to June, 1914, had exhausted all the funds available. Mr. Freeman is still reading with Mr. Anderson for matriculation into Lennoxville next June.

CONSOLIDATION OF CANONS.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, Revs. Kittson and Snowdon and Mr. Gisborne were requested to have the Consolidated Canons printed as soon as possible.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, Rev. Canon Kittson reported that the volume of Consolidated Canons is waiting only for the confirmation of a few new items by the Synod of June, 1915. The Executive Committee instructed that the Consolidation, as it stands at present, be printed and issued as an Interim Volume, and placed first on the Agenda Paper, at the next quarterly meeting of the Executive.

At the Executive Committee of March 15th, 1915, Rev. Canon Kittson reported the distribution of the Interim issue of the Revised Canons. This is still subject to corrections and alterations, and to new legislation at next Synod, especially the Canon on Patronage.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, the following resolution was passed, to be transferred to the Synod for completion:—"Be it enacted by the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, that the Canons of this Diocese, as revised and printed by the Special Sub-Committee appointed to revise the Canons, be confirmed and enacted as the Canons of this Diocese."

DIOCESAN AUGMENTATION FUND.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, it was resolved, on motion of Rev. A. W. Mackay and Mr. W. H. Rowley: "That \$7,000.00 of the balance in hand of the Diocesan Augmentation Fund be divided among the various Augmentation Funds (Capital) according to the proportion formerly adopted, (see Journal of 1914, page 50), namely: Episcopal Endowment 11 per cent., Sustentation Fund 10 per cent., Divinity Students' Fund 17 per cent., Clergy Superannuation 26 per cent., Widows' and Orphans' Fund 36 per cent."

DIOCESAN MISSION FUND.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, as a result of changes in the personnel of this Committee after last election, the Classification Committee was re-constituted as follows: Rev. A. W. Mackay, Rev. T. J. Stiles, Rev. R. B. Waterman, Messrs. Gisborne, Heney and Macnab.

DIOCESAN MISSION FUND-CLASSIFICATION COMMITTEE.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, Rev. A. W. Mackay presented the report of the Classification Committee, which was adopted with a few minor alterations. Ottawa East and Vankleek Hill are to be notified that their grants will probably be reduced next year.

DIVINITY STUDENTS' FUND.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, six students recommended by the Archbishop were accepted, namely, Messrs. Bruce, Edwards, Fawcett, Freeman, Tennant and Watson, on their depositing with the Clerical Secretary their medical certificates, and bonds as approved by the Chancellor.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, it was resolved: That no payment shall be made for any student under the Divinity Students' Fund, until the Treasurer is furnished with a certificate from the Chancellor that the preliminary requirements of the Canon have been complied with. Mr. C. G. Wintle is temporarily off the list of beneficiaries. Prof. Boyle has recommended very highly, Mr. Kingston, a student now at Trinity. Resolved that authority be given to secure Mr. Kingston for this Diocese. The former Divinity Students' Fund Sub-Committee (Revs. Bogert, Pollard and Hanington), was re-constructed as follows: Ven. Archdeacon Bogert, Rural Dean Anderson, and the Clerical Secretary.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, Rev. Mr. Snowdon reported that this Diocese is unable at present to secure the services of Mr. Kingston, who is remaining at Trinity College for a post-graduate course in Divinity. No resolution is necessary to preserve Mr. Fawcett's standing on the list of Divinity

Students, during his absence at the war. The balance of \$3,256.15 was transferred from Income to Capital Account. A question from the Archbishop, "Will the Synod pay travelling-expenses of Ordinands from England," was left over for Bishop Roper's consideration.

DIVINITY STUDENTS' FUND: OBLIGATIONS NOT FULFILLED.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, His Grace described two cases of leave-of-absence granted by him to persons who had obtained assistance from the Divinity Students' Fund, namely, one who is now a Curate at Enfield, England, and one who is a head-master at Waterloo, P.Q. These gentlemen are unwilling to return and fulfil their obligations. The Chancellor will write concerning enforcement of the bonds, if the Clerical Secretary refers the correspondence to him. His Grace stated that these leaves-of-absence were not given under the Canon, and that no similar permission will be given in the future.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, it was arranged that letters be written to Messrs. Butterfield and Critchley, asking for refunds of grants to them.

At the Executive Committee of March 16th, 1915, the Secretary stated that Messrs. Wells and Lasalle had refunded \$200.00, and \$305.47 respectively. A letter was read from Mr. Butterfield, complaining that he had not been accepted for Ordination; but that he had been asked to take a Diocesan examination on work similiar to that on which he had already passed, although this was not (he claimed) in the original agreement. He stated that he would return to the Diocese after the war. After explanation by Rev. A. W. Mackay, it was decided to leave this matter for further discussion and action.

DUPLEX ENVELOPE SYSTEM: CANVASS BY CLERICAL SECRETARY.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, the report of the Committee on the Duplex Envelope System was adopted. This report contained the two following resolutions:—(1) "That the Duplex Envelope Canvass by the Clerical Secretary, continue for the current year; and that his additional stipend of \$700.00 continue also while the work is going on." (2) "That the help of Laymen in Parishes be sought as much as possible, in accordance with the general theory of the Duplex Envelope System." Rev. W. H. Stiles canvassed 19 parishes in the past year, and has about 24 more to visit.

DUPLEX ENVELOPE SYSTEM: PAROCHIAL HALF.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, following the discussion on the financial system in Lanark, the general question of the division of the parochial half of the Duplex Envelopes, between stipend and other expenses, was referred to the Committee on the Duplex Envelope System. (Not yet taken up by Committee).

At the Executive Committee of March 16th, 1915, it was resolved: "That question of paying all or part of the income of the Episcopal Endowment

Fund which has accumulated since Oct. 18th, 1914, to the Archbishop in respect of his Episcopal services since that date, be referred to the Investment Committee for consideration, and report at the next meeting of the Executive."

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, after discussion of the accumulated income of the Episcopal Fund between Oct. 18th, 1914, and May 27th, 1915, it was resolved (on motion of Messrs. Courtney and Gisborne, to make the following division:—\$1,500.00 to His Grace Archbishop Hamilton, in respect of his services as Acting Bishop since Oct. 18th, 1914; \$500.00 to His Lordship Bishop Roper, on account of his removal-expenses from Victoria, B.C.; and the balance to the Episcopal Augmentation Fund of the Diocese of Ottawa. This motion was put by the Temporary Chairman, in the absence of Bishop Roper, and was carried unanimously. The matter of transferring the balance of the "Episcopal Augmentation Fund" to the credit of the "Episcopal Endowment Fund" was referred to the Investment Committee, with instructions to report thereon at the coming meeting of Synod.

FISCAL YEAR OF DIOCESE: CONFIRMATION OF CHANGE TO DECEMBER 31st.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, it was moved by the Treasurer, seconded by Mr. Frederick Hayter, and resolved: "That the motion on page 20 of the Synod Journal of 1914, concerning the Diocesan Fiscal Year, be passed by this Executive."

FISCAL YEAR OF PARISHES.

Moved by Messrs. Gisborne and Weagant, and resolved: "That the proposed amendment to-Canon XXX on page 19 of the Synod Journal of 1914, with respect to the Parochial Fiscal Year, be passed by this Executive Committee."

LANARK MISSION: INSUFFICIENT CLERICAL STIPEND.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, the Clerical Secretary described the financial situation in Lanark, and thought that the incumbent is not getting a sufficient share of the recent increase of the parochial revenue. Referred to the Classification Committee, to consider and report at the next meeting of the Executive.

(Note.—This has not yet been specially reported on by the Classification Committee).

MATTAWA: PROPOSED DIVISION OF PARISH.

At the Executive Committee of March 16th, 1915, a letter was read from His Grace Archbishop Hamilton, stating that Rev. H. B. Moore has been unable to extend his ministrations beyond South Alice and Chalk River. Mattawa and other northern stations have had no services. With two Clergy, every station could have services fortnightly. Mr. Moore is willing to have his grant reduced, to cover South Alice and Chalk River alone. Resolved: "That the business regarding the Mission of Mattawa be referred to the Classification Committee."

At the Classification Committee of May 31st, 1915, a sum of \$1,500.00 was proposed to be placed in the Bishop's hands to provide for division and re-adjustment of difficult Missions, of which Mattawa, Madawaska and Douglas are

examples. This action was confirmed by the Executive Committee of the following day.

MATTAWA MISSION: PETAWAWA PORTION.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, it was resolved: "That such portion of the Tennant Settlement Fund, and of the Petawawa Mission House Fund, as may be necessary, be paid over to the Rector and Churchwardens, in accordance with the terms of their letter, asking for such funds, to repair Chalk River Church, and build a Rectory at South Alice, all in the Mission of Petawawa, subject to the approval of the Chancellor."

MISSIONARY LITERATURE SUB-COMMITTEE.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, Mr. Hayter reported that the collection of recent Missionary Books, obtained from the M. S. C. C. Fund, is accessible in his office in the Canadian Building, at the east end of Slater Street, and has been freely used by the Clergy and others, though sales have not been numerous. Several new volumes have lately been added. These books will be on view at Lauder Hall during Synod week.

MISSIONARY SOCIETY COMMITTEE.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, Rev. J. M. Snowdon presented the annual report of the Missionary Society Committee of the Diocese of Ottawa, for the information of Synod, which had been approved on the previous day by the Missionary Society Committee. This was taken by the Executive Committee "as read," and was ordered to be laid before Synod, for publication in the Journal of 1915.

Rev. J. M. Snowdon also read a report of the recent meeting of the Missionary Society Committee of this Diocese, which was adopted by the Executive Committee.

PATRONAGE: NEW CANON.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, it was moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Rev. A. W. Mackay, and resolved: "That Canon XXV, on the Patronage of Rectories, (by reason of the resignation of the Right Reverend Charles Hamilton, as Bishop of this Diocese, being no longer in force), be and the same is hereby repealed, and that the following Canon on Patronage be adopted."

"XXV. Patronage: (1) Whilst this Canon remains in force, the appointment to all Rectories, Incumbencies, and Missions within this Diocese shall be vested in the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. This Canon shall remain in force until the first meeting of the Synod of this Diocese held in the year 1916, and shall then cease to have any further operation."

RECORDS OF THE DIOCESE.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, it was resolved that all for safe-keeping.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, it was resolved that a Sub-Committee be appointed by the Chairman (i.e. the Chancellor), to report to the Executive Committee upon the question of the Records of the Diocese, and the keeping thereof in the future. The Chancellor asked that the naming of the members of this Sub-Committee be deferred for the present.

SEE HOUSE FUND.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, Revs. Gorman and Quartermaine presented a resolution leading up to the purchase of a residence for the incoming Bishop, after ascertaining His Lordship's wishes. Mr. W. H. Rowley, J.P., offered the use of the house owned by him near the Cathedral, at a rate about equal to the taxes thereon. In consequence of the very generous proposal of Mr. Rowley, the motion of Revs. Gorman and Quartermaine was withdrawn.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, it was resolved: "That the income derived from the capital of the See House Fund be paid hereafter to the Bishop, towards payment of the rental of his episcopal residence."

SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, in the absence of Chairman Kittson, Rev. J. M. Snowdon read the report of the Sunday School Association Management Committee, and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Anderson.—Carried in the Executive Committee, with one dissenting vote, as also previously in the Sunday School Committee.

VOLUNTARY FUNDS: NEW CANON.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, it was moved by Revs. J. M. Snowdon and W. H. Stiles, and resolved: "That the following new Canon on Voluntary Funds be approved by the Executive Committee, and transmitted to Synod for enactment:—"

The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa enacts as follows:

- That Section 4 of the Canon to amend Canons XVI, XVII and XVIII, passed and confirmed at the Sessions of 1904 and 1905 be repealed.
- 2. That Section 1 of Canon XII be and is hereby repealed.
- 3. That Canon VII be amended by adding the following Section immediately after Section 3 thereof:—
 - "3a. Subject to such resolutions or orders as may from time to time be made by the Synod, the Executive Committee shall have all necessary powers for collecting the money required for the several funds of the Diocese and for other duly authorized purposes, including the power to prescribe the time when and the manner in which such money shall be raised in the several parishes and missions."

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND: PROPOSED CHANGES.

At the Executive Committee of December 15th, 1914, it was resolved, on motion of Mr. G. A. Stiles and Rev. J. Fisher: "That we recommend the Synod, (A) to rescind the Standing Order of Synod at page 99 of the Journal of 1914, passed in 1903, page 40, regarding church collections for Widows and Orphans; and (B), to amend the Canon so as to provide a grant from the W. and O. Fund of \$150 to the widows or children of every Clergyman, immediately upon his decease."

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, the balance of \$1,438.00 was transferred from Income to Capital Account.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND: ARREARS DUE BY CLERGY.

At the Executive Committee of September 8th, 1914, a letter was read from Rev. A. G. Smith of Port Elmsley, claiming that he is over-assessed for W. and O. Fund. A sub-committee, of Rev. J. F. Gorman and Messrs. Gisborne and Hayter, was appointed to consider and report upon all cases in which Clergy are in arrears to the W. and O. Fund.

At the Executive Committee of December 15th, 1914, the report of this sub-committee was referred back to it, with instructions to make a full report in each individual case at the next meeting of the Executive, including the question whether a Bishop is eligible to contribute.

At the Executive Committee of March 16th, 1915, it was ordered that all arrears before coming into the Diocese be paid by instalments as at present arranged, namely: Rev. G. S. Anderson, \$8.56; Rev. A. E. Ferguson, \$15.00; Rev. S. D. Hague, \$25.50; Rev. W. MacMorine, \$42.50; Rev. J. L. Coles, \$105.00; Rev. A. G. Smith, \$100.00; Rev. F. H. Wimberley, \$45.00. The question of the eligibility of a Bishop and of any teaching-staff was left over until the arrival of Bishop Roper.

ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR SYNOD, TO BE APPROVED BY EXECUTIVE.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, Mr. Frederick Hayter, the Auditor, called attention to the Proposed Order of Business for Synod, and asked that it be approved, with authority to the compilers to make minor improvements, if found expedient.

Moved by Revs. J. M. Snowdon and Geo. Bousfield, and resolved: "That the arranging of the Order of Business for the Synod be left to a Committee consisting of the Chancellor, the Clerical Secretary, and Auditor Hayter."

The Lay Secretary spoke in commendation of the Agenda Paper under which the business of this meeting of the Executive had been transacted, and offered the thanks of the Committee to the compilers, namely, the Clerical Secretary and the Auditor.

Moved by Mr. F. Hayter and Rev. J. M. Snowdon: "That the Committee appointed to prepare the Agenda Paper for Synod do have authority to complete it by incorporating the report of the proceedings of to-day, June 1st, 1915."—Carried.

(APPENDIX E.) REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RURAL DEANS.

Deanery of Arnprior-Rev. A. H. Whalley, Rural Dean.

Amprior.

The parish has had a prosperous year. The contributions to the various patriotic funds have been liberal, amounting to over \$500.00.

The Mission of Antrim should pay a larger stipend to its faithful and energetic priest, otherwise the state of the mission is good.

Douglas.

This Mission is vacant.

Fitzroy Harbour.

A new system of lighting by gasoline has been installed in St. George's Church, it is proving satisfactory and cost \$165.00. At Torbolton a new stone church costing \$6,000 is being built. The old wooden church has been moved to the back of the lot and will be used for worship until the new one is completed, which, according to the contract, will be on October 1st.

Huntley.

The Rector reports as follows: The population of the parish remains about the same. The offerings of the people for all purposes during the year amounted to \$3,141.25. The amount of money raised for outside objects was \$1,335.75, which included an offering of \$330.00 made on Thanksgiving Day, for the Patriotic Fund. The Chancel of St. James' Church, Carp, is in the hands of workmen at present. A basement has been excavated and a furnace installed. The church is also being painted and the grounds around the building have been improved. The services in the three churches are well attended and the average number of communicants is good. Ninety-two persons were present at the Holy Eucharist, on Ascension Day. The Rector has been over twelve years in this parish. March.

The Envelope System introduced last July is working well. The Rectory was repaired last year by putting in new windows, pointing the walls, etc. The old organ in St. John's Church has been replaced by a better instrument. The congregations are good in the three churches.

Pakenham.

The Reverend R. Turley is doing a faithful and successful work in this parish.

Renfrew.

The following resolution was carried unanimously at the Easter Vestry Meeting of the congregation of St. Paul's Church, Renfrew, on April 13th, 1915.

"That the hearty thanks of this congregation be tendered to the Executive Committee of the Diocese of Ottawa, for the grant that has been made to the parish of Renfrew, since its formation, from the Mission Fund of the Diocese."

"We are now, by motion of the Vestry, prepared to make the allowance of \$800.00 per annum for Clerical Stipend, and desire to place this parish on a self-supporting basis, so that we trust no further assistance may be needed from the Mission Fund, and that a copy of this motion be forwarded to the Executive Committee."

The Rector and congregation are to be congratulated.

Deanery of Carleton—Rev. E. A. Johnston, M.A., Rural Dean.

Ashton.

We can report a good and prosperous year for the Parish of Ashton. One pleasing feature is that tenders have been called for the building of a new church, the work to begin as soon as possible.

Bell's Corners.

The Rectory has been repaired during the year, and the Rector reports it now comfortable and habitable in winter.

Manotick.

The statistics show this Parish to be in a flourishing condition. The removal of the Rector, Rev. A. F. C. Whalley, to Kingston, is regarded as a severe loss to the Parish and the Diocese.

Metcalfe.

A porch for basement entrance was built at Metcalfe, and an Altar desk donated at Greelev.

North Gower.

The Clerical Secretary canvassed this Parish with good results for objects in Parish. A new matting for St. John's was purchased.

Richmond.

The Rector reports the following improvements:-

At St. John's a granolithic walk from road to church built; Rectory painted outside, and new galvanized roof put on. Stanley's Corners Church has been much improved by an extension to chancel and vestry. The following memorials were given: Eight windows, handsome oak lectern, Bishop's chair, Chancel chair, oak Chancel railing, brass Alms dish and offertory plates, two brass vases and two cruets.

Russell.

The Duplex Envelope system was introduced into this Mission during the year, and as a result all apportionments were met.

DEANERY OF LANARK-Rev. Chas. Saddington, Rural Dean.

During the past year the work of the Church in the Deanery has gone on in a quiet, earnest way. The Parishes and Missions are all filled. A cordial welcome is extended to the Rev. C. C. Phillips, who took charge of the Lanark Mission, after his Ordination last summer, and also to the Rev. Robt. Jefferson, who was appointed to the Mission of Montague last Fall. We wish them every success and blessing in their work for God and His Church.

Clayton and Innisville.

The Duplex Envelope was adopted in this Parish during the past year, and the new plan is working well. Increased amounts are now given both for parochial purposes and also for outside objects. The new Church of St. John, erected under the guidance of the previous Rector, the Rev. R. Turley, will, it is hoped, be consecrated this summer.

Lanark.

Improvements were made in the Church property. A new furnace was placed in the Rectory and the latter is now connected with the outside world by telephone. The Duplex Envelope was introduced during the past year and more generous giving is the result.

Montague.

St. Bede's Church has been re-shingled, the work being done by the men and the Incumbent. A new cement sidewalk has also been built. A beautiful gray marble font was presented to Christ Church by the Ladies' Guild.

Perth.

Two beautiful memorial stained glass windows have been placed in St. James' Church; one in memory of different members of the Matheson family, and the other in memory of the other faithful departed of the Parish, and especially of one of the late Rectors, the Rev. R. L. Stephenson.

Three brass tablets have also been erected in the Church in memory of former devout and loyal members of the congregation.

The Laymen of the Parish have lately started a campaign for increasing the Parochial income and improving the finances of the Parish. They have been very successful and have, so far, made an addition of over \$1,200.00 per annum to the general fund of the Parish. Their efforts show what can be done by earnest business-like means.

Over \$1,000.00 has been spent in improving the Rectory during the past year Smith's Falls.

Smith's Falls is one of the towns which has been seriously affected by the war, but in spite of the depression the Parish is stronger numerically, financially and spiritually than last year. The offerings were larger and the number of Communicants greater than before. The debt was reduced by \$550.00. A house has been rented in the East end of the town, where week-day services are conducted and a Sunday School is held. This is the beginning of what is hoped will develope into a strong Mission and eventually, may be, another Parish.

DEANERY OF OTTAWA-Rev. E. A. Anderson, Rural Dean.

The Deanery of Ottawa regretfully bids farewell to Archbishop Hamilton as our Diocesan, but rejoices that His Grace will still be resident amongst us and that his faithful interest will be still available for the help of the Church. May his late years be as happy and peaceful as his earlier have been helpful and useful to the Church he so much loves.

The anxiety of the election has given place to congratulation in the manner of the election and the man elected.

Ottawa and the surrounding districts are growing and will grow still more rapidly. This expansion puts a strain upon the poorer parishes to supply adequate equipment to carry on the work of a modern parish. Larger and better buildings are often most needed in parishes least able to provide them. Organization and enthusiasm are required by which the strong and able may help the weak. The strength of the whole Church should be applied to meet this need, as it is applied to the Diocesan Mission Fund to meet the need of Clerical support.

Death has been busy in the Deanery. Canon Pollard, of St. John's, has been an Institution in Ottawa for some forty years. John Travers Lewis, the Chaucellor of the Diocese since it was formed, courtcous and capable, has passed before we had begun to think of him as of more than middle age. The sudden passing of William H. Rowley from Parish and Committee and Synod, in the midst of his strength, shocked us all. John R. Armstrong, reliable, faithful, constant, has finished a life of quiet, helpful work.

The work goes on under our new Bishop; we face it hopefully. Many signs of growth are evident.

St. Matthew's is forging steadily ahead—increased members, offering and Communicants. The church is to be enlarged once more. St. Luke's greatly needs increased accommodation at once and sees no immediate solution of the difficulty. This is a case where the whole church should recognize its opportunity and responsibility.

Westboro is feeling the same need owing to rapid growth in population. The Church Extension Committee should be resuscitated.

Much good work has been done in the Parishes, and much greater and better work will be done in future.

The Rev. R. H. Steacy has been absent with the First Contingent as Chaplain. The Rev. W. H. Bayley is also on leave and is reported to be at the Front as Chaplain.

DEANERY OF PEMBROKE-Rev. R. J. Torrens, Rural Dean.

Beachburg.

Forester's Falls was separated from this Mission in October, and attached to Cobden.

The event of the year was the departure of the Rev. W. H. Prior after five years faithful service, during which the steady growth of Church life in the Mission has been marked. Fortunately there has been no interregnum to cause any setback, and the Rev. R. M. Fairbairn, who succeeds him, finds everything in good order.

Cobden.

The Women's Guild, assisted by the Girls' Auxillary, have provided white and green hangings for St. Paul's Church, thus completing the set of colours. The Guild has also about \$50.00 in hand towards the purchase of a new Lectern.

Combermere.

The returns from this Mission show a remarkable increase in expenditure for outside objects, amounting to over \$100.00, a percentage increase of 175%.

The exterior of the Parsonage has been painted, and a new chimney built-Eganville.

The new church, free of debt, was consecrated by the Archbishop, on June 2nd, 1914.

The Rector reports: "The Parish is in good condition financially, and the attendance at all the services is good." The following figures for St. John's attest the latter statement:—

Madawaska.

The Vestries at Whitney and Tramore have been organized with duly appointed officers. The Sunday School has been revived at Killaloe, and a primary department added at Madawaska. Sixty candidates are under preparation for Confirmation, most of whom were brought up outside the Church.

The Building Fund of the Church of the Ascension, Killaloe, has risen from \$59.00 last June to \$500.00, including \$200.00 from the S. P. C. K., and \$100.00 promised by our delegate to Synod.

A fine organ from an unknown friend in Ottawa, was received for St. John's, Tramore, where alterations are being made, and the usual Church furniture put in place. A beautiful Prayer Book was given by Miss C. Boland to the Church of the Ascension.

The services at Whitney and Tramore are much improved by the introduction of the use of Chants, and the exclusive use of Church hymns.

The Duplex Envelope has been introduced with the usual good results, as the financial statistics show. There has been a notable increase in contributions for outside objects, \$99.55 as against \$6.83 last year.

Until this year no satisfactory financial report has been received from this Mission since 1907.

Mattawa.

South Alice, now joined to this Mission, is enjoying the unprecedented luxury of a resident priest, in the person of the Rev. H. B. Moore. Since his appointment last Advent he has been doing good work here, and also at Chalk River. These two congregations were successfully canvassed by the Clerical Secretary at the end of April, with a view to their being constituted as a separate Mission. As it now is, the Mission of Mattawa is untenable, but if this division can be accomplished, our weakest salient may become a fort.

A new steel shingle roof has been placed on All Saints, Petawawa, at a cost of \$187.75. A grant of \$130.00 from the Petawawa Mission House Fund was made by the Synod last June, and the balance was raised locally by the energy of Mr. V. O. Boyle, of Trinity College, who was in charge of this Mission last Summer.

Rev. H. B. Moore reports: At St. George's, Alice, the Churchyard has been improved. A new wire fence and gates have been put up. The Church has been presented with a new Altar, Credence Table, and Lectern, and Red and White Lectern hangings.

Pembroke.

The Rector, relieved of all responsibility for South Alice, has been enabled to devote his whole attention to this important Parish, and though he has nothing special to report, the returns indicate that the year has been one of quiet, steady work.

Stafford.

The Duplex Envelope System, introduced on June 1st, 1914, is working well in all three congregations.

External repairs, costing \$200.00, have been carried out on the Rectory.

A new furnace has been installed in St. Patrick's, at a cost of \$190.00.

Mr Henry Buttle has presented a handsome Pulpit, Lectern. and Prayer Desk, all in quartered oak, to St. Patrick's Church.

The Building Fund of St. Thomas', Rankin, has been raised to \$2,100.00 by a new canvass.

Women's Guilds have been started in St. Thomas' and St. Patrick's Congregations.

RURAL DEANERY OF PRESCOTT AND RUSSELL.

Bear Brook.

Notwithstanding the large givings to the several funds of the war, this parish has sustained its usual Extra-Parochial offerings, and has reduced the debt on the Rectory by \$400.00. The Church's work is progressing satisfactorily. Hawkesbury.

Under Rev. T. Bailey this Parish is shewing every evidence of sound energy and growth. However, the gradual and determined increase in the French population is making itself felt here, as indeed it does in all the five Parishes of this Deanery. This menace (we can call it nothing else) is met by members of the Church with courage and determination; still the very attractive prices for farms, offered to English speaking people, is encouraging many of our people to remove.

Navan.

All Parochial and extra Parochial offerings are being splendidly maintained in this new self-supporting Parish. All the apportionments are being more than fully met and everyone in the Parish is pleased with the working of the Duplex envelopes. The Rector, Mr. Wright, reports the gift of a bell to the Church in Cumberland, from His Lordship the Bishop of New Westminster, who was at one time Incumbent of this Parish. This Parish is in a most excellent condition. Plantaganet.

Mr. Hutson is doing faithful work in this extensive Mission. The congregations of Plantagenet and Alfred have lost two valuable members in the death of Mr. T. Vanbridger and in the removal of Mr. Langrell to another Parish.

Vankleek Hill.

A canvass was made of this Parish by the Clerical Secretary, for the introduction of the Duplex envelopes, with very gratifying results.

All the activities of this Parish are in a healthy and progressive condition under Mr. Postlethwaite's able administration.

Deanery of Stormont-Rev. Chas. O. Carson, M.A., Rural Dean.

The reports handed to the Rural Dean from the several Parishes, show the work of the Church in this Deanery as being carried on in an active and vigorous manner.

Although we have to report a loss, by removal, of 147 families in the past six years from this Deanery, yet we can show an increase in population, in Communicants and in the number of services.

Unfortunately two important Missions are vacant, viz. Glengarry, which has been without a Priest for more than a year, and Newington, whose Rector, Rev. C. R. Palmer, has been appointed assistant in St. John's, Ottawa.,

During the year seven congregations of the Deanery have been canvassed, two by the Rev. W. H. Stiles and five by the Rural Dean, with satisfactory results on the whole.

Aultsville.

Although this Parish has lost two families there is an increase in population and also a marked increase in contributions to the various funds of the Church, and particularly to the support of the Rector.

Cornwall, Trinity Church.

The Rev. Wm. Netten, M.A., seems to have succeeded in maintaining the record of his predecessor in showing an increase in all the statistical columns. There is but one exception, (Baptisms) and the inference is that the Rev. T. J. Stiles baptized all the children in the Parish before his removal. We are pleased to record that in addition to the very large amount spent last year on the improvement of property, a further sum of over \$500.00 has been expended this year for the same purpose and the debt considerably reduced.

Cornwall, Church of the Good Shepherd.

No returns have been received.

Rev. S. Gower Poole, who has been ailing for some time past, has gone to the sea shore for his health, and we look for his speedy recovery.

Crysler.

The Rural Dean canvassed this Parish in April, to make up for some loss in stipend, occasioned by the removal of some families. The returns show an increase in the number of Communicants and in the amount of money raised for parochial and extra-parochial objects, though the stipend has not come up to the mark.

By the will of the late Miss M. Johnstone, the cemetery benefits to the extent of \$500.00. Miss Johnstone also left a good sum to augment the stipend of the clergyman.

Through the earnest labours of the ladies of St. John's Church, a cement sidewalk, leading from the front street to the church, has been constructed. A parochial Guild, with an initial membership of ten, has been organized. We are pleased to note an increase in insurance on both the Church and Rectory.

Glengarry.

This Parish was canvassed by the Rural Dean in September last, securing a list for \$558.00. The Parish has been vacant for over one year and no returns have been received.

Iroquois.

Since last year's report, the Rural Dean made a canvass of this Parish, increasing the stipend list from \$377.00 to \$554.00, and we are pleased to report that the people have paid the Rector more than they promised, which is remarkable. The other columns of the returns show substantial increases in almost every particular, and things are prospering.

Morrisburg.

Rev. W. H. Stiles, Clerical Secretary, made a canvass of this Parish in October, for the Duplex Envelope, and although the amounts subscribed were not sufficient to cover the apportionments, the actual figures from the Treasurer's books show increases over the previous year.

Since last report, Mr. E. C. Whitney, of Ottawa, has expended \$3000.00 in repairs on the Whitney Memorial Church, at Riverside. This Church now has the distinction of being the only church in the Diocese having a solid copper roof. Mr Whitney has been sparing of neither pains nor means in making this beautiful little Church a lasting memorial to his and Mrs. Whitney's parents.

Mountain.

Very little change is noticeable in this Parish since last year's report. Slight increases appear in the number of families, population, communicants, and also in stipend.

Newington.

Although this mission has been without a Priest since the promotion of Mr. Palmer, to Ottawa, the services have been regularly carried on by Mr. Corrie Bender, (Lay Reader). The number of families, population and communicants has been kept up, while the amount of money raised for all purposes actually exceeds that of the previous year.

Wales.

This is a Parish which changes little from year to year, and with the exception of a slight change in families things are much the same as last year. We are pleased to see the services kept up in Mille Roches, and also that Mr. Fisher has started a Sunday School in that village, with 30 pupils and 2 teachers.

Winchester

The Rev. R. H. Archer is successfully carrying on the work of the Church in this weak Mission, as he has ever done in the past.

The Church population, communicants, Sunday School pupils and stipend, all show increases, though the families remain the same. A debt of \$100.00 has been paid and an extra \$500.00 added to the insurance on the Church at Chesterville. Since last report the Rural Dean canvassed the congregation at Winchester, increasing the stipend list.

The Annual Chapter Meeting of the Deanery was held at Chesterville, on May 4th and 5th, at which Rev. R. H. Archer was unanimously chosen as the next Rural Dean. At this Chapter meeting a "Quiet Day" was conducted by the Rev. H. M. Little, Rector of the Church of the Advent, Montreal, and all who were privileged to take part in these services have gone back to work deeply impressed with the responsibilities of our work, and encouraged to do even greater work for God and His Church.

Your Committee recommends that the sum of fifteen hundred dollars be placed at the disposal of the Bishop of the Diocese to be used for the re-arrangement of the Missions of Mattawa, Madawaska, Douglas, and any others which may be considered advisable; also any additional sum from the Mission Fund which the Bishop may require for extending and maintaining the work of the Church, provided that such money shall only be used for the stipends of Missionaries or Lay Readers.

It is also re-affirmed from our report of last year that in accordance with the resolution of the Executive Committee, approved by the Synod, no grant shall be paid to any Mission where the Clerical Secretary is refused the opportunity of making a canvass for the introduction of the Duplex Envelope System.

It is also recommended that the Church Wardens of the Mission of Ottawa East be notified by the Clerical Secretary that the grant of two hundred dollars will be discontinued after April 30th, 1916, also the Church Wardens of the Mission of Vankleek Hill, that the grant will be reduced to one hundred dollars after April 30th, 1916.

(Appendix Ga). UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE.

Annual Report of the University of Trinity College to the Synods of the Several Dioceses in the Province of Ontario for the Year 1914-1915.

In Canada, as in the Mother Land, the past year has been for the Universities and Colleges a time of severe stress and strain by reason of the War.

Trinity College is no exception to the general rule. Even before the reopening in September, there were many enlistments and the number has steadily increased.

While we rejoice that so many of our graduates and undergraduates are offering themselves for the defence of the Empire, the situation thus created has, of course, interfered very seriously with the ordinary work of the College.

The enlistment of Alumni, past and present, of Trinity College for active service numbers over ninety. Of the students remaining in College and not enlisting for active service, a very large percentage was enrolled in the Officers' Training Corps.

At the Annual Graduating Dinner on 29th April, to which the graduates of all the "Fives" and of 1890 were bidden, we invited all of our soldiers who were still in Toronto to join us, when we bade them Godspeed. Dr. Goggin, Chairman of Convocation, spoke on behalf of the College, and his stirring and heartfelt words will long be remembered.

Prior to the War, one German citizen had been appointed as a Lecturer on the Staff of the College; but shortly afterwards his resignation was procured, and he went to the United States.

Two members of the Staff were on the Lusitania when she was sunk by a German torpedo, but in the good providence of God they were saved from the sea.

The plans for the new College Building are practically completed; and our Architects are now preparing the specifications. We had expected to let contracts this year, but the War has introduced an element of such uncertainty that we can only report progress to date, without venturing to forecast what we may do in the next few months.

The Plans are very beautiful and have been greatly admired. A striking resemblance to the original building is one feature that has proved very pleasing to many of the graduates.

In anticipation of the coming removal from the historic site, the Corporation has published a Portfolio of Views of Trinity College, to serve as a memento of the well-loved buildings and picturesque grounds. The Portfolio, which contains thirty plates of the finest photogravure work, is sold for \$3.00. Besides views of the grounds and buildings, the Portfolio contains portraits of Bishop Strachan, of the four pre-federation Chancellors, and of the four Provosts; photographic reproductions of all the oil paintings in Convocation Hall; and two plates of Bishops who are graduates of Trinity, one of these being a group of six Bishops of the Canadian Church, and the other a group of six Bishops of the Church in the United States. The whole Portfolio is a beautiful and costly work of art. The letter-press gives a short historical sketch of the University. The edition is limited to one thousand copies, and members of the Church wishing to have copies reserved for them should write to the Provost. If the supply is insufficient, preference will be given to Trinity graduates.

In connection with the 75th Anniversity of the Diocese of Toronto, a special Convocation was held on 18th November, when the degree of Doctor of Divinity honoris causa, was conferred on the Venerable Henry John Cody, M.A., D.D., LL.D., Archdeacon of York, and on the Reverend Edward Cartwright Cayley, M.A., Rural Dean of Toronto, who were invited to receive the degree as being outstanding priests of the Diocese and representatives, respectively, of the two historic schools of thought in the Church of England.

At the same Convocation, Dr. J. A. Worrell, K.C., D.C.L., Chancellor of the Diocese of Toronto, was formally installed in office as Chancellor of the University.

For many blessings during one of the most troubled years in the history of our country, we offer devout thanks to Almighty God, praying that through the coming year also we may be sustained by His grace and do His will.

REPORT OF THE M.S.C.C. COMMITTEE, FOR THE YEAR 1914.

The general policy of the Board of Management in the past has been to reduce the amounts asked for the maintenance of our work in the Foreign Field, and in the North West, to such a total as it was thought there was a reasonable prospect of the Church contributing. At the October meeting in 1913 a different policy was adopted, and it was decided to make no such reduction, but to place before the Church the total of the requests for assistance, in the hope that our people, unquestionably financially able, would be also willing to contribute a sum sufficient to meet these needs, and so enable the Bishops, both in the Canadian West and in the Foreign Field, to make a substantial advance in their work. The adoption of this policy meant an increase in the total apportionment, from \$155,436.00 in 1913 to \$190,901.00 for the year 1914, and in our own Diocese an increase from \$10,241.00 to \$12,596.00, and a corresponding increase in every parish.

The Deanery of Ottawa contributed its apportionment in full. Outside the City there was no substantial increase. The returns by Deaneries are as follows:—

If the above mentioned parishes can pay in full, others are equally competent. And the same applies to the Diocese. The Diocese of Niagara was appertioned \$12,853.00 and paid \$13,263.07.

"The Diocese of Niagara", says the General Treasurer, "is clearly the banner diocese for this year, and is also particularly to be commended for having made its payments with sympathetic punctuality at the end of each quarter, instead of delaying remittances to the end of the year, thereby saving the Society a considerable amount of interest, as well as enabling it to meet its obligations with greater facility."

The Diocese of Quebec was asked for \$10,455.00 and gave \$10,287.02.

At the meeting of the Board of Management in October last, it was decided to return to the former basis of apportionment, and put before the Church the minimum required to meet our financial responsibilities.

Of this amount the Diocese of Ottawa was asked to contribute \$10,842.00 At the October meeting of this Committee, however, it was decided to recommend to Synod that there could be no reduction in the amount apportioned to this Diocese, but that we should this year make an earnest endeavour to reach the apportionment of 1914.

The apportionments for the several parishes are based on a percentage of the amount expended by each parish on its own maintenance. The list of apportionments is appended herewith. In connection with this matter of apportionments, it may not be amiss to quote a paragraph from the last report of the General Secretary, which shows what the Church of England in Canada is doing in the work of Foreign Missions as contrasted with other religious bodies.

- 1 In money: The Methodists in Canada expended last year for Foreign Missions \$261,759.75. The Presbyterians in Canada expended last year for Foreign Missions \$269,504.75. The Anglicans in Canada expended last year for Foreign Missions \$91,422.00.
- ² In Agents: The Foreign Staff of the Methodists in Canada: Men and wives number 183. The Foreign Staff of the Presbyterians in Canada: Men and wives number 181. The Foreign Staff of the Anglicans in Canada: Men and wives number 35."

WORK AMONG THE JEWS.

On behalf of work among the Jews in Canada, the Diocese was asked to contribute the sum of \$500. The amount received was \$241.27. The returns for Contribute the sum of \$500. for Good Friday of this year, so far as received, amounted to \$417.21.

As has already been announced in the Good Friday Circular, the Committee has engaged the Rev. Mark Malbert, formerly Curate in a London Church. Mr. Malbert is a converted Jew. He comes exceedingly well recommended, both by his late Vicar and by the Bishop of London. He has already engaged a Hall on Rideau Street, where he has meetings for the Jews every Sunday afternoon, and is busy getting into touch with them in their own homes. For the maintenance of this work we are given a grant of \$2,000.00 by the Board of Management. This grant however, is liable to reduction if the good Friday offerings are inadequate to meet the needs of the Jewish Missions in Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto and Hamilton. The total amount asked for in 1914 was \$10,794.00. The amount received was \$10,469.00. The total amount asked for 1915, as I have already indicated, is \$13,068.00.

The Committee earnestly asks for Mr. Malbert the confidence and sympathy of the Church people throughout the Diocese.

Your Committee would call attention to the fact that in some Dioceses the M.S.C.C. Secretaries are asked to attend a series of Deanery Conferences throughout the Diocese for the discussion of Missionary subjects. For this purpose these meetings are arranged so far as possible on consecutive days. Your Committee would earnestly recommend the holding of such conferences in this Diocese.

A substantial addition has been made to the Missionary Library, kept in the office of the Secretary, Mr. Frederick Hayter. These books are available for the use of the Clergy of the Diocese.

Since the Synod of a year ago there have been the usual meetings of the Board of Management, one in Ottawa and the other in Fort William, in April last. All the delegates from this Diocese were present at the former, but it is much to be regretted that the Diocese was unrepresented at the latter. The Chairman of this Committee was able to be present at nine out of the eleven meetings of the Executive Committee.

At the October meeting of the Board of Management it was decided to ask the General Synod to make such changes in Canon II as would enable the Board to substitute, for the Epiphany and Ascensiontide appeals, bulletins to the Clergy for Homiletic use.

At this meeting a resolution was adopted to the effect that, "in view of the present crisis caused by the war, no new Mission workers should be sent to the Foreign Field, and that the strictest economy should be exercised in all the Society's expenditures."

At a more recent meeting in Fort William, a constitution was adopted for "The Church Camp Mission." This organization is responsible for work among the railway and canal construction camps. The total expenditure of this Society last year was \$9,928.71. The M.S.C.C. gives a grant of \$1,500, the balance comes from England. An interesting account of this work is found in the last M.S.C.C. annual report.

On more than one occasion discussions have taken place in Synod on the proportionate division of our income between the Canadian and the Foreign fields. This matter was reported on by the Committee on Policy at the October meeting of the Board of Management, but the report was referred back for further consideration. When the Committee met at Fort William the attendance was so small that the consideration of this subject was further postponed. It is, however, down for discussion at the September meeting, when it is hoped a recommendation will be made that will have the endorsation, not only of the Board of Management, but of the General Synod.

Attention is called to the Summer Schools for Missionary Study, to be held this month, at Lennoxville, Belleville and St. Catharines. It ought to be possible for every congregation to send at least one delegate.

In conclusion your Committee desires once again to emphasize the fact that the creation and development of the Missionary Spirit is the first and most pressing duty of every Christian. This is emphatically true of those who are set apart as leaders in the Christian Church. The Saviour has laid it upon us as a special charge to make known throughout the world the good news of God's love. We in the Church of England are forced to admit that there is great room for improvement in the zeal we have shown for the carrying out of this parting command of the Savicur. Considering our resources and our far reaching opportunities, we have to confess that we have made no adequate exertion to "preach the Gospel to every creature." We are at variance amongst ourselves as to how the work should be done, and consequently the work is left in a great measure undone. Some persons frame excuses to themselves why they should ignore the work altogether, because they do not approve some detail in method. But surely this is a strange line of argument for a Christian. "I will do no good at all, because I cannot do all the good I would." If we refuse to co-operate in Missionary effort until we can secure the appointment of a Missionary organization that will in every detail comply with our ideas of what is right and wise and expedient, assuredly we will wait for ever. There may be, and there are, allowable differences of opinion in the Church of Christ, but there are no differences which warrant a loyal Churchman sitting still and doing nothing because he cannot have things his own way. Rather let us for the work's sake co-operate as heartily as possible, and at the same time work earnestly for the improvement of what we think is weak and defective, and seek to infuse into our Missionary, as into all our Church organizations, more of obedience to constituted authority, and less of the spirit of independent action, more evangelical truth and more apostolical order too.

DECEASED MEMBERS.

The loss sustained by this Synod during the past year, in the death of members, has been unusually serious. Your Committee have to note the removal of no less than seven, including some of the most eminent and active sons of the Church.

- 1. Canon Pollard.—Since the last meeting of the Synod, a notable and dignified member of the Diocese has gone to his reward. The late Henry Pollard was a Canon of Christ Church Cathedral, and Rector of St. John the Evangelist for some forty years. On coming to Canada in 1858, he was ordained Deacon by the Bishop of Fredericton, and was ordained Priest in the following year. He first held a curacy in New Brunswick, and was appointed rector of the parish of Maugerville and Burton, N.B., in 1861. In 1869 he was appointed Curate of Christ Church, Ottawa, and in 1871 was appointed Curate at the Bishop's Chapel. This Chapel afterwards became known as St. John's Church, to which he was appointed the first Rector, a position which he held up to the day of his death. He was one of the oldest priests in the Diocese, and possessed a commanding and dignified personality. He was devoted to the duties of his sacred calling, and his deep piety, simplicity of life and gentle courtesy won the respect and esteem of all who knew him.
- 2. J. T. Lewis.—After a brief illness, John Travers Lewis, M.A., D.C.L., K.C., was called to his rest. His death came as a distinct shock to the Diocese, as few were aware of the serious nature of his ailment. Mr. Lewis was appointed the first Chancellor of the newly formed Diocese of Ottawa, a position which he held with marked distinction. He was a man of brilliant gifts, which he used unsparingly in the interests of the Church and the Diocese. He was an earnest churchman, and was prominent in the Diocesan, Provincial and General Synods of the Church.
- 3. SIR J. P. WHITNEY.—Sir James Pliny Whitney, K.C.M.G., K.C., M.P.P., Late Premier of Ontario, served this Diocese for many years, and until his political

duties claimed his time, gave of his great ability and influence for the work and advancement of the Church. He took also a great and active interest in the welfare of his parish of Morrisburg.

- 4. WILLIAM HORSLEY ROWLEY, J.P., President of the E. B. Eddy Co., represented the Parish of Christ Church, Ottawa, in the Synod of Ontario before the division, and in this Synod since its formation until the date of his death. He was one of the most able, prominent and interested members of the Synod. He represented this Diocese in the Provincial and General Synods for many years. He was particularly interested in the building up of the Capital Funds of the Diocese and gave generously and continuously to further this object. The loss of his strong and masterful personality, his great business ability and his genuine interest in the progress and welfare of the Church, will be long felt.
- 5. The Rev. William Fleming, M.A., Trinity College, Toronto, was ordained in 1859, and spent a long and laborious ministry in the Diocese of Ontario, having successive charge of a number of parishes. He retired from the Incumbency of Ashton in 1896, when he was superannuated.
- 6. Mr. T. A. Van Bridger, represented the parish of Plantagenet in this Synod since 1899. He was always a keen and active worker in his parish, which will greatly miss him, and he was a very regular and interested member of the Synod.
- 7. Mr. John R. Armstrong, although not a member of the Synod at the time of his death, had represented St. John's, Ottawa, from 1897 until the amalgamation of the Parishes of Grace and St. John's. Of a retiring disposition, Mr. Armstrong never put himself forward, but his sound judgment and unfailing interest in the work of Parish and Diocese were always at the disposal of the Church.

DIVINITY STUDENTS' FUND: REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

At the Executive Committee of Sept. 8th, 1914, six students recommended by the Archbishop were accepted, namely, Messrs. Bruce, Edwards, Fawcett, Freeman, Tennant and Watson, on their depositing with the Clerical Secretary, their medical certificates, and bonds as approved by the Chancellor.

At the Executive Committee of Dec. 15th, 1914, it was resolved: That no payment shall be made for any student under the Divinity Students' Fund, unitly the Treasurer is furnished with a certificate from the Chancellor that the prelimin-

ary requirements of the Canon have been complied with. Mr. C. G. Wintle is temporarily off the list of beneficiaries. Prof. Boyle has recommended very highly, Mr. Kingston, a student now at Trinity. Resolved that authority be given to secure Mr. Kingston for this Diocese. The former Divinity Students' Fund Sub-Committee (Revs. Bogert, Pollard and Hanington), was re-constructed as follows: Ven. Archdeacon Bogert, Rural Dean Anderson, and the Clerical Secretary.

At the Executive Committee of June 1st, 1915, Rev. Mr. Snowdon reported that this Diocese is unable at present to secure the services of Mr. Kingston, who is remaining at Trinity College for a post-graduate course in Divinity. No resolution is necessary to preserve Mr. Fawcett's standing on the list of Divinity Students, during his absence at the war. The balance of \$3256.15 was transferred from Income to Capital Account. A question from the Archbishop, "Will the Synod pay travelling-expenses of Ordinands from England," was left over for Bishop Roper's consideration.

(APPENDIX P.)

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Executive Committee having requested me to prepare a report on the condition of the Church in the Diocese, as revealed by the returns of the Clergy, I submit the following information:—

Number of Families, 8,384; increase, 297. This increase is in the Deaneries of Arnprior, 26; Ottawa, 204; Pembroke, 93; Stormont, 1. Decrease of 27 in Carleton, Lanark and Prescott. The total Church population is 35,902, an increase of 1,282, yet still a discrepancy of 7,602 between the Diocesan figures and the census returns, the Government crediting the Church with a population of 43,504, and the Church crediting herself with a membership of only 35,902. In the previous Government census, 1902, the Diocese was reported to have 39,992 members, and at that time the Church confessed to a membership of 30,521, but knew nothing of the 9,471 who were known to the Government enumerators. What did the Church do then—what is the Church doing now—to find these wanderers? Our Lord would have us "Seek" until we should find; He would have us "Go out into the highways and compel them to come in." Seven thousand six hundred and two "Wandering Sheep"! He sought until He found when there was but "One."

Number of Communicants, 14,528. Last year, 14,305; increase, 223. The returns show 536 Communicants removed, lapsed, or deceased. Then they show 699 Confirmed, 297 new families, and 1,282 individuals. Yet the net gain in Communicants is only 223.

HOLY COMMUNION—Mid-Day Celebrations, 2,255; increase, 73. Early Celebrations, 2,158; increase, 430.

Sunday Services—8,822; increase, 164. Week-Day, 5,833; increase, 1,075. This is a remarkable increase. That in many parishes our people are meeting before God in His House for more frequent intercession, indicates a greater regard for Spiritual things, and a turning to the Church for help in their hour of need and trouble.

BAPTISMS-1,243; an increase of 130; 41 being adults.

CONFIRMED, 401. BURIALS, 572.

Sunday Schools.—The number returned is 110, which is four less than last year, but the number of pupils has increased from 6,791 to 7,250, and teachers and officers, from 639 to 686.

Finances.—There is a decrease of \$13,959 in money expended for purchase or erection of Church buildings; of \$1,431 in expenditures for Stipend from Parish; of \$4,337 in expenditure for other Parochial Objects; of \$1,266.00 in expenditure for Objects Outside Parish. By Deaneries, Amprior decreases in expenditure for Other Parochial Objects, and increases in all others; Carleton increases in all; Lanark decreases in Purchase of Property, Stipend, Other Parochial Objects, and increases in giving to Outside Objects; Ottawa decreases in all four objects; Pembroke increases in giving to Objects Outside Parish, but decreases in all others; Prescott and Russell increases in all, nearly doubling its contributions to Objects Outside Parish; Stormont decreases in expenditure on Church buildings, but increases in the other three. The total decrease is \$20,993.00. On buildings, the amount expended was \$20,993.00; on Stipend from Parish, \$61,480.00; on Other Parochial Objects, \$50,530.00; on Objects Outside Parish, \$33,674.00. The grand total raised by the Diocese for Parochial, Diocesan and Extra Diocesan Objects during the year, amounts to \$166,677.00, as compared with \$187,673.00 the previous year. The total value of all Church property is reported at \$1,204,103.00, in contrast with \$1,245,969 last year. 1 do not know what has become of the other property valued last year at \$41,866.00 The debt on the property of the Church, amounts to \$91,124.00; the insurance to \$579,625.00, as compared with \$568,475 previously reported.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION COMMITTEE, 1915.

It is with sincere regret that your Committee announces the death of Rev. Canon Downie, to whose suggestion we owe the existence of "Our Empire" and who for the past several years has devoted himself earnestly to the work of promoting its circulation in Canada. The subscription list for the present is in the hands of his son-in-law, Mr. R. A. Williams, 26 Kendal Avenue, Toronto, to whom all unpaid subscriptions should be forwarded. Your Committee would further

call attention to the excellent character of the paper, and urge upon every clergyman in the Diocese the importance of securing its circulation in his parish. So far the paper is not paying the cost of production, hence the necessity for a more general support if we desire its permanent continuance.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON SCHEMES.

On more than one occasion members of Synod have expressed dissatisfaction with the present lesson scheme for the following reasons:—

- 1. It contemplates the teaching of a double lesson (one from the Prayer Book and one from the Bible) in the short space of time allotted for teaching on Sunday afternoon.
- It necessitates the unending preparation and printing of new Lessons week by week instead of putting the lessons in some permanent form, whereby they can be used again and again.
- It shuts out the Canadian Sunday Schools from the possibility of making any use of the many excellent lessons now being produced by the Sunday School organizations of the Old Land.

With a view to remedying this, the following resolution was passed unanimously at the October meeting of the Sunday School Commission:

"Moved by Mr. R. H. Buchanan, seconded by Rev. J. M. Snowdon: "That it be an instruction to the Lesson Committee to communicate with the National Society, the Church of England Institute, and such other organizations publishing Sunday School Lessons as the Committee thinks wise, with a view to the adoption of a common lesson scheme." That was passed more than six months ago; up to the present the Committee has taken no action on this resolution.

SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTRUCTOR.

Last December information was received from Miss Higham, that it would be impossible for her to return to Canada for the present. Later on Mr. Hume Campbell, Principal of St. Christopher's training College, was asked to send out another trained teacher. He recommended Miss Evans. His recommendation was accepted and Miss Evans reached Ottawa about April 1st. Since that time she has conducted instruction classes in Ottawa, Toronto and Hamilton, and is now open for engagements in the towns and rural parts of this Diccese.

The following resolution was passed at the close of Miss Evans' addresses in Toronto:—

Moved by Archdeacon Ingles and seconded by Rev. E. G. Burges Browne: "That a hearty vote of thanks be extended to the Diocese of Ottawa for the kindness shown in making it possible for those in Toronto to have the benefit of Miss Evans' expert knowledge in a series of Practical Lectures on the Sunday School, given under the auspices of the Bishop Strachan School."

Mr. Browne, in forwarding this resolution, says: "Miss Evans has certainly been a great inspiration, which will show itself in definite readjustment in many of our schools. It has had the effect of starting many to think a bit, and a good big bit at that.

"I personally am most grateful for her presence and work in this City, for I think she has opened the eyes of many to the need of Sunday School reform."

Mr. Browne then goes on to request that the Synod of Ottawa should request the S. S. Commission to adopt an alternative scheme of lessons, based on the publications of the English organizations.

Your Committee is pleased to be able to report that sufficient funds are in hand or promised to defray the expenses involved in connection with Miss Evans' work, up to the month of September. In this connection we desire again to acknowledge our great indebtedness to Miss Ethel Hamilton, who has again been instrumental in raising the larger part of what was required.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMISSION OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA.

Memorandum of Preparation of Lesson Schemes.

In order to provide those who are interested in the Sunday School work of our Church with a clear and succinct statement of the working plans of the Lesson Committee of the Sunday School Commission, the following historical memorandum of the work of the Committee has been prepared:

- 1. At the Toronto meeting of the Sunday School Commission, held in April, 1912, the Lesson Committee, which then consisted of the members of the Commission from the Dioceses of Quebec and Montreal, recommended: (1) the adoption of a three years cycle of Scripture and Prayer Book Lessons, for use in Beginners' and Primary Departments for children under nine, with picture rolls and picture cards published by Thos. Nelson and Sons, and (2) a six year cycle of lessons for the Main School, including a six year course of Scripture Lessons, provision being made for special lessons for Advent, Christmas, Palm Sunday, Easter Day, Ascension Day and Trinity Sunday, together with a six year scheme of Prayer Book Lessons and a six year scheme of Memory Texts, illustrating the facts and truths of the Christian Year. These recommendations were adopted by the Commission. (See p. 12, Minutes of Toronto Meeting).
- 2. At a Montreal Meeting of the Sunday School Commission, held October 14th, 1912, the Lesson Committee reported on the work of the Main School Scheme, Daily Bible Readings and the Scheme for Beginners' and Primary

Department, and these recommendations were adopted by the Commission (See p. 12, Minutes of Montreal Meeting.)

- 3. At the Ottawa meeting, held April, 1913, the Lesson Committee reported the Lesson Scheme for the Beginners' and Primary Departments and the Lesson Scheme for the Main School with Daily Bible Readings for 1913-14, which were received and adopted.
- 4. At the Saskatoon Meeting of the Sunday School Commission, held October, 1913, there was no report presented by the Lesson Committee. In order to meet a number of objections which were raised in reference to the present Scheme of Lessons, the following resolution was adopted:

"That the Secretary be instructed to note the objections made by the members of the Commission regarding courses of study and refer these objections to the special committee on Lesson Schemes, it being understood that the objectors should furnish the Secretary with a written statement of their view." (See p. 13, Minutes of Saskatoon Meeting).

- 5. At the Toronto Meeting of the Sunday School Commission, held April 21st, 1914, the Lesson Committee presented a very full report dealing with the objections and representations which had been received concerning the Lesson Schemes of the Commission. After a very long discussion at a large meeting of the Commission of 39 members, representing 18 different dioceses, this report of the Lesson Committee was adopted as presented. At the suggestion of the Chairman of the Commission the Lesson Committee was enlarged by the addition of the representatives of the Diocese of Ottawa, together with President Powell and Mr. H. Mortimer. This enlarged Lesson Committee was directed to take into consideration the various representations presented in the discussions and to bring in a report at a future meeting of the Commission as to the best methods of meeting the wishes and needs of those who do not desire to use our present scheme. (See p. 12-14, Minutes of Toronto Meeting).
- 6. At the Ottawa meeting of the Sunday School Commission, held October 7th, 1914, at which there were 47 representatives present, from 20 different dioceses, the Lesson Committee submitted the following report of the result of its labours.

To the Members of the

Sunday School Commission:-

Your Committee begs leave to present the following report:

In August last a questionnaire bearing upon Sunday School Lesson Courses, was sent out to all the members of the Commission, as well as to a number of other Sunday School workers. Some 50 replies were received. At the meeting of the Committee held yesterday, at which 12 members were present, representing the Dioceses of Quebec, Ottawa, Montreal and Toronto, these replies were considered, and, as a result, the following principles, which were almost unanimously endorsed in the replies were agreed upon:—

- 1 That the child is the determining factor in the Sunday School, and that all other elements are to be regarded as means to be used for his religious nurture.
- 2. That we should emphasize the fact that the child is a developing organism, requiring food, atmosphere and exercise appropriate to the capacities, experiences, needs and interests at each stage of his development, and that, in harmony with this principle, the mind and memory of the child should be stored with the great facts and truths of our faith.
- 3. That the scheme of lessons for the Sunday Schools of the Church of England in Canada should be based upon the schemes issued by the great Sunday School organizations, while taking note also of the strong points of individual schemes.
- That there should be one Sunday School Lesson Scheme for the whole Church of England in Canada.

The present Primary Lesson Scheme which met with general approval in the replies received, was heartily and unanimously endorsed, and the following list of books of reference for teachers illustrating best methods for Beginners and Primary classes was recommended to be appended to the scheme:—

- (a) The Babies' Sunday Lesson, by Phyllis Dent, (S. S. Institute) or Talks and Stories for Beginners, by Miss Griffin, (N. S. D.)
- (b) The Church's Garden of Children, Ward and Dent, (S. S. Institute) or Kindergarten Lessons for the Sunday School, by Phyllis Dent.
- (c) New Methods in the Junior Sunday School, by Hetty Lee, (N. S. D.) or The Sunday School Kindergarten, by Hetty Lee, (N. S. D.)

It was further decided that the following list of text books be recommended for Junior Bible Classes in place of the present text books, namely:—

- (a) The Life of Christ, Vol. 1., Blakiston.
- (b) The Life of Christ, Vol. 11., Blakiston
- (c) The Story of Christ's First Missionaries, Penstone and Hughes.
- (d) The Builders of the Church and the Prayer Book, Rowton.
- (e) Church Study, Penstone.
- (f) Faith and Character, Misses Dent.

In reference to the Main School Scheme, it was decided to let the present cycle run its course, but that, in the meantime, the Chairman and the General Secretary, in consultation with the Lesson Committee, prepare a list of questions bearing upon the following four points relative to the Main School Scheme, with a view to determining the best course of action to be taken at the close of the present cycle, namely:—

each. The number of cycles required for the Main School and the length of

- (b) Whether each section of the cycle should be nine or ten months with supplementary work for the balance of the year, or whether it should be based upon the full year.
- (c) Whether we should have a double course, that is, Scripture and Prayer Book, or a single course combining both.
 - (d) The contents of the scheme.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

ELSON I. REXFORD, CHAIRMAN. R. A. HILTZ,

GENERAL SEC.

On motion the report was received and taken up for discussion clause by clause.

After a very full discussion of each section, the whole report, with the exception of the clause recommending text-books for Junior Bible Classes, was adopted.

It was also moved by Mr. R. H. Buchanan, seconded by Rev. J. M. Snowdon: "That it be an instruction to the Lesson Committee to communicate with the National Society, the Church of England S. S. Institute, and such other organizations publishing Sunday School Lessons as the Committee thinks wise, with a view to the adoption of a common lesson scheme."—Carried.

7. At the Fort William Meeting of the Sunday School Commission, held April 13th, 1915., the Lesson Committee submitted its report recommending: (1st) The Primary Scheme for 1915-16, which was adopted. (2nd) The Main School Scheme for 1915-16, together with the Daily Bible Readings, which was adopted, with the request to the Publishers of Lesson Helps, to provide a Junior as well as a Senior Treatment of the Prayer Book Lesson, and (3rd) results obtained from circulation of over 200 copies of Questionnaire No. 11, to members of Sunday School Commission and to selected workers from each diocese.

Of the 54 replies received a decided majority reported in favour of:

- (a) A uniform lesson for the Main School, with a Junior treatment and a Senior treatment in the Lesson Helps as at present.
- (b) A Lesson Scheme of 9 or 10 months with Supplemental Lessons for the remaining months.
- (c) Lesson Helps arranged and published according to our present plan, while opinions were about equally divided between a double lesson topic as provided by our present lesson scheme and a single lesson topic combining Bible and Prayer Book teaching.

The Lesson Committee was instructed by the Commission to obtain further information concerning the extent to which the present Lesson Helps were being used in our Church Sunday Schools, and as to how they were meeting the requirements of the teachers, before making any definite recommendation to the

Commission concerning modifications of the Main School Course. (This information is now being secured by the General Secretary).

The question of communicating with the Sunday School organizations in reference to the position of a common Lesson Scheme was discussed, but it was not considered wise to enter into any negotiations until the Lesson Committee had first ascertained the nature of the Lesson Courses desired by the Church in Canada.

- 1. From the foregoing statements it appears that the Lesson Committee appointed by the Sunday School Commission is a large and thoroughly representative body which has met regularly and given a great deal of time and attention to the important work entrusted to it.
- 2. That it has taken very systematic measures to get into touch with the opinions of the whole membership of the Sunday School Commission, and also of representative workers in each Diocese of the Canadian Church.
- 3. That its recommendations, which have been largely determined by the general consensus of opinion gathered in this way from representative Sunday School workers of the Church, have been strongly endorsed by the large and representative meetings of the Sunday School Commission.
- 4. The Lesson Committee has recommended for the use of Sunday School Teachers, in connection with each grade of the Primary Course, Lesson Helps published by Sunday School Organizations of the Mother Church. These recommendations have been adopted by the Commission, and similar recommendations for higher grades are under the consideration of the Commission
- 5. That while certain important principles have already been adopted by the Commission upon which the preparation of Lesson Schemes is to be conducted in the future, the Lesson Committee is instructed to continue its labours and enquiries in reference to some of the more difficult points connected with the preparation of Lesson schemes for the Main School and to report at a future meeting of the Commission.

REPORT OF MOUNTAIN MEMORIAL CANONRY COMMITTEE.

TO THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF OTTAWA:-

The Committee in charge of the Mountain Memorial Canonry property, situated in the Town of Cornwall, beg leave to report as follows:—

- 1. During the last year the Committee have concluded a lease for the larger part of the brick residence situated on this property, for a term of three years and three months, from the first day of February, 1915, at a yearly rental of four hundred and eighty dollars, to the American Consul, who has now been the lessee for some years.
 - 2. The smaller portion of the house remains rented at ten dollars per month.
 - 3. The vacant land has been rented to a tenant for a small sum, for pasturage,
- 4. During the year the mortgage interest has been paid and the principal sum reduced by two hundred and fifty dollars, and now amounts to thirteen hundred and fifty dollars.
 - A statement of receipts and expenses is appended hereto.

STANDING ORDERS OF SYNOD.

1896—P. 20.

 That the copy of the Coat of Arms enlarged by Lawrence G. Lambe, Esquire, be displayed at all meetings of the Synod.

1896-P. 45.

That the Chancellor and Registrar of this Diocese be ex-officio members of the Synod.

1897—P. 37.

3. That offerings in aid of the Divinity Students' Fund be made on Ash Wednesday in every Church and at every station in which services are held, and at week day services during Lent, when practicable.

1898-P. 27.

4. That the Chairman of each Committee be instructed to draw up and present an annual report to the Synod of the Diocese, but shall leave the report to the "May Meetings" on file in the Synod office.

1900-P. 21.

5. That the nomination of delegates to the General Synod may be made in writing and handed to the Bishop at any time during the meeting of Synod prior to 12 o'clock, noon, of the second day of the Synod or at whatever other time the elections may be held. That at 12 o'clock, or at such other time as the elections may be held, any nomination so received shall be announced by the Bishop and any further nominations called for in the usual manner. And that the names of all candidates be plainly written on a blackboard to be provided for the purpose, in full view of the Synod.

13. That the names and addresses of the Sunday School teachers of the Diocese be henceforth printed in the Journal.

"That the reports of the Treasurer, the Audit and Accounts Committee, the Mission Board, the General Trusts Fund Committee, the Finance Committee, the Education Committee and the Board of Rural Deans shall be printed and sent to the members of the Synod with the notice convening the Synod."

LAY READERS.

15. That a list of licensed Lay Readers in this Diocese, with their addresses, be printed in the Synod Journal, after the Clergy List.

16. That each year that a Canon is passed or amended, that such Canon be printed as passed or amended in an appendix to the Synod Journal.

AMENDMENTS TO CANONS IN 1913, CONFIRMED IN 1914. 1913—P. 18.

"That Canon II be amended by repealing Section 8 and substituting therefor the following:—

8. The Synod shall by standing order regulate the formalities to be observed in the making of Canons. When a Canon has been finally passed by the Synod it shall be engrossed in the Book of Canons, and signed by the Bishop and the Registrar, and the common seal of the Synod shall be affixed to it."—Adopted,

AMENDMENT TO CANON XXXVIII.

- That Sections 4, 5 and 6 of Canon XXXVIII, on Interpretation and Repeal of existing Canons, as passed by Synod at the Session of 1898 and confirmed at the Sessions of 1899, be repealed, and that the following be substituted therefor:—
- 4. No Canon shall hereafter be repealed or amended, and no new Canon of Synod shall be enacted, unless the resolution containing the proposed repeal or amendment, or the proposed new Canon, shall have been first considered at a regular meeting of Executive Committee, or at a special meeting thereof called for the purpose of considering such resolution, and shall have been duly passed at the next ensuing meeting of the Synod by the votes of not less than two-thirds of each Order present, and assented to by the Bishop. The proposed repeal, amendment or new Canon shall thereupon become effective without further confirmation by the Synod.—Carried.

AMENDMENT OF CANON XVI.

That Canon XVI on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund be amended by striking out the words "Two Hundred Dollars," and the figures "\$200.00" wherever they occur in Section 15 thereof, and by substituting therefor the words "Three Hundred Dollars."

ELECTION OF A BISHOP.

Minutes of a meeting of the Clergy and Lay Representatives of the Diocese of Ottawa for the election of a Bishop to succeed the Most Reverend Charles Hamilton, M.A., D.D., D.C.L., the Lord Archbishop of Ottawa, who resigned the See on the 18th day of October, A.D. 1914.

Ottawa, November 17th, 1914.

Pursuant to notice given by the Lord Bishop of Algoma, the Senior Bishop of the Ecclesiastical Province of Ontario, the Clergy and Lay Representatives of the parishes within the Diocese of Ottawa met in the City of Ottawa on Tuesday, the 17th day of November, A.D. 1914, for the purpose of proceeding with the election of a Bishop for the said Diocese to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of the Most Reverend Charles Hamilton, D.D., Lord Archbishop of the said Diocese.

DIVINE SERVICE.

Holy Communion was celebrated at Christ Church Cathedral at 10 o'clock a.m., the Lord Bishop of Algoma being the Celebrant, assisted by the Venerable Archdeacon Bogert, the Rev. Canon Read, the Rev. W. H. Stiles, Clerical Secretary of the Diocese, and the Rev. Lenox I. Smith, Rector of Christ Church Cathedral, Ottawa.

MORNING SESSION.

At 11 o'clock the Clergy and Lay Representatives met in the Lauder Memorial Hall, Ottawa, the Lord Bishop of Algoma being in the Chair.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Bishop of Algoma, after which the Lay Secretary of the Diocese read the following notice calling the meeting:

ILLNESS OF THE REV. CANON POLLARD.

The Rev. J. F. Gorman requested leave to convey to the meeting the regret at the inability to be present of the Rev. Canon Henry Pollard, one of the Rectors of St. John's Church, Ottawa, who was lying seriously ill, and his assurance to the meeting of his prayers for the successful issue of its deliberations.

It was moved by Canon Hanington, seconded by the Venerable Archdeacon Bogert: That the Clergy and Laity of the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa now assembled wish to express their deepest sympathy with Canon Pollard in the sickness which prevents his attending this meeting of Synod, and trust that he may be speedily restored to good health.—Carried by a Standing Vote.

Address By The Lord Bishop of Algoma.

The Lord Bishop of Algoma then delivered an address to the meeting upon the important duties devolving upon it.

In view of the reference in the address to the present war in which the Empire is engaged, on the suggestion of the Venerable Archdeacon Bogert, the meeting then arose and sang the National Anthem.

The Chancellor on behalf of the meeting expressed its appreciation for His Lordship's presence as the presiding Officer and for his address.

CREDENTIALS OF LAY DELEGATES.

The presiding Bishop then appointed Mr. J. F. Orde, K.C. (Lay Secretary), Mr. F. H. Gisborne, K.C., and the Rev. C. Saddington a Committee to examine the credentials of the Lay Delegates.

It was then moved by the Chancellor, seconded by the Venerable Archdeacon Bogert: That the Committee to examine the credentials of the Lay Representatives, appointed by His Lordship the presiding Bishop and composed of the Lay Secretary, Mr. F. H. Gisborne and the Rev. C. Saddington, be and the same is hereby confirmed, and that this Meeting do now adjourn until two o'clock p.m. for the purpose of enabling the Committee to examine the credentials and to report when this meeting reassembles.—Carried.

The Meeting then adjourned until two o'clock p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The meeting re-assembled at two o'clock in the afternoon, the Lord Bishop of Algoma in the Chair.

The Lord Bishop read a letter from the Rev. Canon Muckleston regretting that by reason of ill-health he would be unable to attend the Meeting.

RULES OF ORDER.

It was moved by Mr. J. F. Orde, K.C., seconded by the Rev. A. H. Whalley: That in so far as the same are applicable thereto and are consistent with the provisions of Canon XXIV of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, under which this meeting is held, the Order of Proceedings and the Rules of Order laid down for meetings of Synod by Canons III and IV of said Incorporated Synod shall apply to and govern the proceedings of this meeting.—Carried unanimously.

Instructions to The Scrutineers.

Before voting commences care shall be taken that the ballot boxes are empty.

As each clergyman or each parish votes, a mark shall be placed opposite his or its name on the list showing that such clergyman or parish has voted.

On retiring to count the votes, the number of votes cast shall be first ascertained. The votes of the clergy and of the parishes respectively for the several candidates having been counted, the scrutineers shall report to the Chairman as follows:

- (a) Number of Clergy (or parishes) who have voted.
- (b) Number of votes necessary for election.
- (c) The names in order of those who have received votes, together with the number of such votes, according to the number of votes received.
 - (d) Number of votes lost; and for what cause.

The Chairman will cause the Report of the Scrutineers to be read and will then declare to the meeting the result.

Upon reporting the Clerical Scrutineers shall deposit in an envelope all clerical votes cast and deliver it to the Secretaries of Synod, and the Lay Scrutineers shall replace the ballots in their several envelopes, and having deposited them in a larger one, shall deliver it to the Secretaries of Synod. All ballots shall be preserved by the Secretaries of Synod until after the election, when they shall be destroyed.

As the ballot showed that the Lord Bishop of Algoma had received the number of votes necessary for his election from both Orders, the meeting arose and sang the Doxology.

The Lord Bishop then addressed the Synod expressing his great appreciation of the action of the Synod in having elected him upon the First Ballot and asked that there might be an adjournment in order that he might consider the question of acceptance or refusal thereof.

It was then moved by the Chancellor, seconded by the Rev. A. W. Mackay: That the election of the Right Rev. Dr. Thorneloe, the Lord Bishop of Algoma, be declared unanimous.—Carried unanimously.

It was then moved by the Rev. R. B. Waterman, seconded by the Rev. A. H. Whalley: That the meeting do now adjourn until eight o'clock.—Carried.

EVENING SESSION.

The meeting reassembled at eight o'clock p.m., the Lord Bishop of Algoma in the Chair.

The Lord Bishop then addressed the meeting to the effect that after giving the matter of his election the most careful consideration he had concluded that his duty remained with the Diocese of Algoma, and that he must decline to accept the election.

The meeting thereupon arose and the motion was apparently carried unanimously and without objection, whereupon the Lord Bishop of Algoma said that he could not withstand the apparently unanimous desire that he should be elected the Bishop of this Diocese, and that he consequently felt himself obliged to say that he would accept.

The meeting thereupon arose and sang the Doxology.

A point of order was then raised as to whether or not, under the Canons of the Diocese, a Bishop could be elected in this manner, in view of the fact that the Bishop of Algoma had declined to accept his election on the first ballot, whereupon the Bishop ruled that having declined the election upon the first ballot: that ballot was no longer effective, and that the meeting must proceed to a second ballot.

SECOND BALLOT.

The second ballot was then cast and the meeting remained in session while the ballots were counted; and on the return of the scrutineers they reported the result as follows:

- (a) Number of Clergy (or parishes) who have voted.
- (b) Number of votes necessary for election.
- (c) The names in order of those who have received votes, together with the number of such votes according to the number of votes received.
 - (d) Number of votes lost; and for what cause.

The Chairman, will cause the Report of the Scrutineers to be read, and will then declare to the meeting the result.

Upon reporting, the Clerical Scrutineers shall deposit in an envelope all clerical votes cast and deliver it to the Secretaries of Synod; and the Lay Scrutineers shall replace the ballots in their several envelopes, and having deposited them in a larger one, shall deliver it to the Secretaries of Synod. All ballots shall be preserved by the Secretaries of Synod until after the election, and then shall be destroyed.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO EXAMINE THE CREDENTIALS OF THE LAY DELEGATES.

The Committee to examine the credentials of those Lay Delegates now present who were not present at the earlier meeting reported that they had examined the credentials of such Lay Delegates and that they were in order, and that there were no contested seats.

SCRUTINEERS.

It was then moved by Mr. J. F. Orde, K.C., seconded by the Rev. W. H. Stiles: That the following be appointed as Scrutineers for the Clerical and for the Lay votes respectively—

For the Clerical votes: Rev. T. J. Stiles, Rev. W. Netten, Mr. Ernest Fosbery and Mr. Geo. A. Stiles.

For the Lay vote: Rev. E. A. Anderson, Dr. Charles Morse, K.C., Mr. Frederick Hayter and Mr. F. A. Heney.—Carried.

FIRST BALLOT.

The first ballot was then east and the Synod remained in session while the Scrutineers examined the ballots.

As the ballot showed that the Right Reverend Dr. J. C. Roper, D.D., Lord Bishop of Columbia, had received the number of votes necessary for his election, the presiding Bishop then declared him elected.

It was then moved by the Rev. J. M. Snowdon, seconded by Dr. Charles Morse, K.C.: That the election be made unanimous.—Carried unanimously by a standing vote.

It was then moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Dr. Charles Morse, K.C.: That the Clerical and Lay Secretaries be instructed to communicate with the Bishop of Columbia by wire at once acquainting him with his election and seeking His Lordship's formal acceptance, and that meanwhile the Synod stand adjourned until eight o'clock this evening.—Carried.

EVENING SESSION.

The meeting reassembled at 8 o'clock p.m., the Lord Bishop of Algoma in the Chair.

The Lay Secretary then announced that the Clerical Secretary and he had despatched the following telegram to the Lord Bishop of Columbia.

Ottawa, February 23rd, 1915.

Right Rev. Dr. Roper, Lord Bishop of Columbia, Victoria, B.C.

"Clergy and Lay Delegates of Diocese of Ottawa, at very large and representative meeting, have elected Your Lordship Bishop of this Diocese on the first ballot by a vote of fifty out of sixty-seven clergy and of thirty-one parishes out of fifty-three parishes voting, which was immediately and enthusiastically made unanimous. Meeting adjourned until eight o'clock this Tuesday evening to await Your Lordship's answer by telegram addressed to Lay Secretary Orde, one fifty-five Maclaren Street, Ottawa. Synod unanimously and earnestly look for Your Lordship's acceptance."

That a telegram be sent to the Lord Bishop of Columbia informing His Lordship that the Diocese accepts the condition mentioned in his telegram, and advising him that a letter will be written to him explaining the present circumstances of the Diocese.—Carried.

At the suggestion of the Venerable Archdeacon Bogert the meeting then arose and sang the Doxology.

It was then moved by Mr. J. F. Orde, K.C., seconded by the Rev. W.M. H. Quartermaine: That the Chancellor, the Rev. Canon Kittson, the Rev. J. M. Snowdon, the Rev. A. W. Mackay and Mr. F. H. Gisborne, K.C., be a Com-

mittee to assist the Secretaries in the preparation of the proposed letter to the Lord Bishop of Columbia.—Carried.

THANKS TO THE BISHOP OF ALGOMA.

It was moved by the Rev. J. M. Snowdon, seconded by Mr. F. H. Gisborne, K.C.: That the Clerical and Lay Representatives assembled for the purpose of electing a Bishop desire to express to their Chairman, the Lord Bishop of Algoma, their deep appreciation of the sympathetic and able manner in which he has presided over their several sessions. They also desire to express their deep regret that circumstances prevented him from permanently presiding over the Diocese, but deeply respect the high motives by which he was actuated throughout, and congratulate the Diocese of Algoma in the continuance of his Episcopate there.—Carried by a standing vote.

The Lord Bishop of Algoma then replied to the foregoing resolution.

PRINTING OF MINUTES.

It was moved by the Rev. J. F. Gorman, seconded by the Rev. J. M Snowdon: That the minutes of this meeting be printed and distributed to the members of Synod before the next meeting of Synod.—Carried.

DEATH OF THE REVEREND WILLIAM FLEMING.

It was moved by the Rev. W. H. Stiles, seconded by the Rev. W. P. Garrett: That the members of Synod now assembled wish to express their deep sorrow at the death of the Rev. William Fleming, one of the oldest members in the Diocese, and their sympathy with Mrs. Fleming in her bereavement.—Carried by a standing vote.

On motion the meeting adjourned and the Lord Bishop of Algoma pronounced the Benediction.
