### Our "Diocesan" Journal.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.,

MY DEAR BRETHERN:—

According to the announcement made in the November issue, "The Algoma Missionary News" is about to change its character. From the 1st of January next it will no longer aim at reaching a wider circle of readers outside our own Diocesan limits. Although it will, of course, appreciate attention shown it in any quarter, and will gladly let its light shine wherever it is sought, its chief sphere will be home; and its main purpose, the edification of the Church within the Diocese.

The changes made in the periodical will be as slight as possible. Only such alterations in form, arrangement, and subject matter, as under the changed conditions seem desirable will be agreed upon. As far as is practicable the continuity of the publication will be preserved.

One change, however, is absolutely essential. The clergy and Church people of Algoma must take a warmer

and more active interest in the "News." The changes contemplated, though slight, will, it is thought, make the periodical more interesting to our own people. They will certainly make it more suitable for localization, as a Parish Magazine. And they will render it an important aid to Church life, and to that knowledge of Diocesan affairs which every intelligent Churchman ought to possess.

But though much should remain to be desired, and the Algoma Missionary News, in its new form and order, should fail to interest our people, or to answer in any way, their desires and expectations, it will still be their duty to support it. Only by a generous measure of support from clergy and people alike, can it be made what it ought to be. Only by the many combining to give support to the one Diocesan sheet, can it be made a powerful influence for good throughout our land. No good end is attained without self-sacrifice. Let clergy and people resolve that, though it cost them a little trouble and a few cents annually, our Diocesan sheet shall be in every Church home that can afford it,—yes in every Church home throughout the Diocese,—and the result will be a great drawing together and quickening of the dry bones of our Diocesan life. Parishes and Missions will begin to know something of one another, and to care somewhat about each other. Church people will come to know the extent of their Diocese, and the character of its institutions. The Church's corporate existence will be better realized; and a heavy blow will be dealt to that local, parochial or congregational spirit which is so unlovely in itself, and such a grievous hindrance to the progress of the Church.

I call upon you, one and all, therefore, to do your parts. Let it be thought a shame for any Algoma Church family not to take in the Algoma Missionary News. Take it yourselves. Talk it up among your friends and neighbours. Join your own local sheet, if you have one, to it. If you think it can be further improved, write and tell us how. Pay your subscriptions promptly. And send news for its columns.

Do all this, and abstain from aimless and unkind criticism, and we shall set out on this new stage of our journey with the brightest prospects of success.

### BIBLE SOCIETY CENTENARY.

BIBLE SUNDAY, MARCH 6th,  
1904.

*The following letter was sent by the Archbishop of Canterbury to the Secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society.*

Lambeth Palace, S. E.,

July 6th, 1903.

MY DEAR SIR:—

I write on behalf of the Archbishop of York and myself to tell you that we have, in conjunction with most of the Bishops of the two Provinces, considered the suggestion made by the British and Foreign Bible Society that Sunday, March 6th, 1904 (the Third Sunday in Lent), should be everywhere observed as a day for special commemoration of the blessings conferred upon the world by the free circulation of the Holy Scriptures in the vernacular languages.

We have pleasure in informing you that the Bishops are willing to do their best to promote this end, and to take opportunity in the several Dioceses of England and Wales, to recommend to the clergy and people this special use of the Sunday in question. We cannot forget that in the Church of England we have every year, on the Second Sunday in Advent, a day on which we are specially bidden to thank God for these blessings and to pray for wisdom to use them rightly. We appreciate, however, the significance of the fact that the First Sunday in March will next year be observed in this way throughout the English-speaking world by thousands of Christian people who do not belong to the Church of England, and we rejoice in the opportunity of joining with them in thankfulness to Almighty God for blessings which are happily common to us all.

### Diocesan Notes.

May your Christmas be a happy one.

Rev. T. J. Hay has arrived at Bruce Mines, of which Mission the Bishop has given him charge.

The Bishop is still in need of a good man to fill the vacancy at Port Carl-  
ing.

Mr. Bates, the lay missionary recently at Bruce Mines, has gone to fill a gap in Muskoka.

Excellent results are apparent at Cutler from the labours of Rev. F. H. Hincks. Indeed in the near future a

little church at this point may be erected.

The Bishop desires to acknowledge with thanks, the gift of a number of books from Algoma's English Association to be added to the Diocesan Library.

Mr. A. A. Mahaffy, recently elected a member of the Provincial Legislature, is known in the Diocese as one of the lay members of the Standing Committee.

The Rev. G. Wilfred Balfour, of Sherbrooke, Quebec, has been appointed to the vacant parish of Huntsville. He is expected to commence his duties there early in the new year.

The Rev. E. J. Harper, of Fort William, who has been laid aside for a while by an attack of typhoid fever, has recovered and is now again taking duty.

It is gratifying to be able to say that Mrs. Hay, wife of Rev. T. J. Hay, who has been so ill lately, has sufficiently recovered to be able to join her husband at Bruce Mines.

The lists of the house-to-house subscriptions to our Mission Fund from Dufferin Bridge Mission are not complete. This is to be regretted. The response has been magnificent. No less a sum than fifty dollars was sent from the Mission. Rev. J. Waring and his people are to be heartily congratulated on so good a showing.

In the midst of our items of Diocesan interest we note the resignation of Dr. Courtney, the Bishop of Nova Scotia. He was always the friend of this missionary diocese, and we owe him thanks. Affliction in his family has at last compelled him to leave Canada. His going from us is to be deplored. It is a distinct loss to the Canadian Church.

We are sorry only to be able to report slow progress towards recovery of Mr. Major, who was invalided eighteen months ago. He is now at Battle Creek Sanitarium, in the state of Michigan, U.S.A. He has met with friends who are helping him to remain there a little longer that he may continue to receive the benefits of special treatment.

The Bishop will hold an ordination of the Fourth Sunday in Advent in the Church of St. Mark, Emsdale, of which the Rev. A. H. Allman, recently appointed Rural Dean of Parry Sound is the incumbent. It is expected that Mr. Behrends, of Burk's Falls, will be ordained deacon and Rev. J. Waring, of the Mission of Dufferin Bridge, be raised to the priesthood.

The Rev. C. E. Bishop, of Thessalon, has been stretching out into the country. He recently held a service in a house at Kirkwood. One worshipper, a woman who has lived for a long time beyond the limits the Church has hitherto reached, said to the missionary: Well, doesn't it seem good to hear the Church's service again.' There are not a few such. Oh, that we could reach them.

### The Apportionment.

The letter printed below has been sent to every parish and mission in the Diocese. That it may be as widely read as possible, we give it a place in our columns:—

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.  
Nov. 18th, 1903.

MY DEAR BRETHERN:

At the beginning of the present year the Missionary Society laid upon our Diocese of Algoma the responsibility of raising the sum of \$1,700 for missionary purposes. And the proper conduct of the work in our various mission fields absolutely depends upon the different Dioceses of Canada raising the apportionments allotted to them. It is my earnest hope that, at the end of the year, Algoma may be found to have done her duty.

The apportionments assigned to your field of labor is \$ . . . It may be already paid. If so, all is well. If not, I beg you to see that it is in our Treasurer's hands by the middle of next month, that he may have time to make up his accounts and to transmit the money to the Secretary of the Society before December 31st.

As the Epiphany and Ascensiontide offerings, made in response to the two annual appeals, go to the same fund as the apportionment they also should be sent to the Treasurer by the same date.

I feel certain you have already given your earnest attention to this important business. I desire simply to make sure that the offerings of the diocese are forwarded in due time to the General Treasurer that so the grants may be duly provided for and our credit made good.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.  
Nov. 18th, 1903.

MY DEAR FRIENDS:—

As in the past two years I ask our Sunday School Children throughout the Diocese to give a Special Offering at Christmas towards the support of their Indian brothers and sisters in the Shingwauk and Wawanosh Homes. And for this purpose I hope they will try and save a little money in Advent.

The Homes are very needy just now. In fact it has been almost a question whether we could keep them open unless help came. And it would be a sad thing to turn out the poor boys and girls after beginning to train them.

They are not only learning to read and write, and to do the work of a trade, such as carpentering or farming, but they are learning to know and serve the Lord Jesus Christ. And it is our duty to help them. It is a blessed thing for white children, who have every blessing to help them. I hope you will do what you can.

The money, after being presented to God in the offertory that His blessing may be sought upon it, should be sent to H. Plummer, Esq., Treasurer of Algoma, Sault Ste. Marie.

### W. A. Column.

This month we are able to give our readers some extracts from a paper on "Our Diocese," written by the Diocesan Secretary of the W. A., Mrs. S. Ironsides. It was prepared for the Conference held at Richard's Landing and has since been read at the other conferences in the eastern and western ends of the diocese.

#### ALGOMA.

The Woman's Auxiliary is, to put it briefly, a body of women pledged to missionary work—to assist Missionary Dioceses, and Mission Stations, and to help to send the Gospel to those who have it not. Providence has placed us in a missionary diocese, and He, who bade His disciples "Preach the Gospel to all mankind, beginning at Jerusalem," also bids us in helping that glorious work, to begin in Algoma.

#### QUESTIONS.

Well, how much do you know about Algoma? We cannot properly help a cause without a knowledge of its needs, its resources, its circumstances. We all know that Algoma, as far as regards our Church, is poor, we know that the diocese is very large; that she is heavily weighted with debt; that the workers within her borders are few. But just how poor is she? what exactly is her extent? How much is the debt? How does it happen there is any debt at all? What is the precise number of those who labour amongst us in Holy things?

#### SIZE

The Diocese of Algoma is larger than the whole of England. It was formed from part of the Diocese of Toronto, and a portion of what is now the Diocese of Ottawa. Its total area is 70,000 square miles. It is composed of five Deaneries,—Algoma, Nipissing, Thunder Bay, Muskoka and Parry Sound,—and contains seven self-supporting parishes and thirty-three mission centres.

#### BISHOP FAUQUIER.

Its first Bishop, elected by the Provincial Synod on the setting apart of the Diocese in 1873, after the refusal of Rev. J. P. (now Bishop) Dumoulin, was Archdeacon Fauquier, of Huntingford, in Huron Diocese. Those of us who remember Bishop Fauquier will always prize his memory as that of a true saint and veritable Father in God to his people. He died suddenly at the residence of his niece, Mrs. Arnoldi, in Toronto, in the early winter of 1881, and, the following spring his remains and those of Mrs. Fauquier, whose death preceded that of the Bishop by only a few weeks, were brought to Sault Ste. Marie, and interred in the pretty little cemetery belonging to the Shingwauk Home.

#### BISHOP SULLIVAN.

Dr. Sullivan, the gifted rector of St. George's, Montreal, succeeded to the Diocese as its second Bishop, in 1882. There were certain people at the time, and there have been others since, who have not scrupled to say that the splendid talents of Bishop Sullivan were thrown away on poor Algoma, that a lesser man could do the work here. God did not so judge, neither did the Bishop himself. For many years he bore the burden and laboured amongst us, until, worn out by the long financial struggle, his health broke down. He resigned his episcopate in 1896, to become rector of St. James' Cathedral, Toronto.

#### BISHOP THORNELOE.

Our present beloved Bishop, Dr. Thorneloe, was consecrated on the Feast of the Epiphany, 1897, and his efforts on behalf of the Diocese have been unremitting ever since. Algoma has already cost the Church the lives of two eminent and valued men as Bishops. It is largely in the hands of his own people to give strength, assistance and encouragement to our third Bishop. We cannot take on ourselves any part of his arduous and anxious duty, but we can give him help in many ways. Unselfishness in our own parishes, loving interest in all the others, the true spirit of fellowship breathed in the words of our W. A. Diocesan motto, "One Body in Christ." The putting forth every effort to supply the funds he is in need of to carry on the work. It is no light or easy matter to be Bishop of Algoma. We have, certainly done much for ourselves, and are annually doing more. Who shall say how very much more still, we might accomplish?

#### D. M. FUND

We hear often of the Diocesan Mission Fund. What is it? What is its amount? In reality we have no stated Mission Fund, as such. It has to be made up of odds and ends, sometimes more, generally less, wherever the Bishop can get it. The two great English Societies,—that for the propagation of the Gospel, and the Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge—have given largely in the past, The English Algoma Society is most generous to us; also we owe much to the Church Colonial and Continental Society. The W. A. in the Eastern Dioceses never forget Algoma. Individual subscriptions are sent; the Church in other parts of Canada helps us. No doubt we shall receive aid from the Missionary Society. Offertories are made in our own churches for this fund, and annual house-to-house collections in our parishes and missions. In these various and precarious ways, the Diocesan Mission Fund is got together. But it fluctuates, it varies. The Bishop knows not at the beginning of each quarter how he is to pay the salaries which should not fluctuate,

should not vary. Algoma clergymen can only look for small stipends.

#### ENCOURAGE

It is all very well to say that a clergyman should give up all for Christ and His work. But Christ can be served in richer Dioceses. Work awaits where wives and families can be better provided for. And so, the fact of a man electing to work in Algoma stamps him, at the outset, as one devoted, self-sacrificing and hard-working. Let us remember these things. Let us strain every nerve to supply our beloved Bishop with funds wherewith to appoint others to lessen the labor of those already in our midst.

#### A CONTRIBUTION.

The whole W. A. in the Diocese has generously responded to the vote asked for by your Board of Management as to the adoption of a pledge to provide the salary of an additional Catechist, to take up work in hitherto new ground. Your Diocesan officers considered the matter carefully before proposing it to the Branches. They felt that each Branch, as shown by this year's returns, had made great efforts; that many of them were obliged to give almost all they raised to their own parish or mission. But it was believed that the ready will to make this additional effort would not be wanting, and fully has this expectation been realized. The Board thanks the Branches most heartily and affectionately for their promised co-operation. Though many an effort may be needed, many a self-sacrifice be necessary, in order to raise this extra money, we shall feel that we are privileged, indeed, in being allowed by God to do this for His sake. These people to whom you are asked to send a Catechist are not heathen, but Church-people—new settlers accustomed to Christian Sundays, the preaching of God's Holy Word, in whose ears still linger the sound of the church bells calling them to worship in their old homes.

#### A QUESTION ANSWERED.

Your Secretary has often received the enquiry from the Branches: "What is the Bishop Sullivan Memorial Sustentation Fund?" This fund is, to put it plainly, a sum which is being raised of which the interest is to provide an annual income towards the support of our Diocese. You must often have heard the story. How the two great English societies informed the Bishop that their large annual grants to Algoma would decrease annually, until, at the expiration of five years they would be altogether withdrawn. Considering the future necessities of the Diocese when deprived of their aid, the Societies made an offer that if Algoma would raise the sum of \$40,000 by a given time they would make up the amount to \$50,000 to provide a fund towards the sustentation or support of the Diocese.

When completed and available this fund cannot do more than make up one-half of the loss of income consequent upon the withdrawal of the English Societies' support.

LAUS DEO

Great efforts have been made by ourselves,—gifts have been generously bestowed by others. You remember how noble the aid given in the Epiphany offering, last year, by the whole W. A., inspired by the devotion of Mrs. Broughall, of Toronto. The sum required is now raised, all but three thousand dollars, which, a few weeks ago, were still needed. The period of time allotted for its gathering together expired last month, but the Societies, in recognition of the great effort made by our Bishop, have granted a further extension of time. What a work it has been! When we look back and remember the doubts, the fears, the almost overwhelming anxiety which possessed those of us who really cared about it,—the constant, urgent prayer, the self-denial involved. And now, it is nearly over—the fight almost won—the task all but achieved! Truly, God has been with us through it all, and our hearts are full of thankfulness.

TO-DAY'S LIVING.

The question has been asked: "Why, if this Sustentation Fund must be amassed in a certain specified time, are we asked to contribute to other Diocesan expenses? Should not all our efforts be concentrated to this one end?" Let our Bishop's own words supply the answer. "When a man is making provision for the future, he still cannot neglect the expense of daily food." The Diocese must live, the work must go on while we strive to raise this great extra sum. And besides the current expenses there is still the large debt.


