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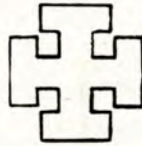

Annual Meeting

One of the most successful and inspiring annual meetings of the W. A. ever held in Algoma took place in North Bay on the 9th, 10th and 11th of June. About one hundred delegates and officers were present, and the keenest interest was taken in the addresses, reports and discussions.

The meetings opened on Tuesday, June 9th, with a celebration of Holy Communion in St. John's Church, His Grace the Archbishop being the celebrant, assisted by the Rector, the Rev. Gilbert Oliver. The Archbishop preached from the text, St. John 12:3, "The house was filled with the odour of the ointment." It was an impressive presentation of the ideals of service, as illustrated in the character of Martha, and of devotion and sacrifice, in that of Mary. There were 105 communicants at this service. The Annual Thankoffering, amounting to \$272.79 was presented.

Before the opening of the business session in the afternoon in the Parish Hall, the Archbishop conducted a short memorial service for the late Mrs. Roberta E. Tilton of Ottawa, the founder of the W. A., who was called to Higher Service on the 29th of May.

An address of welcome was given by Mrs. Morton, President of St. John's Branch, North Bay; and Mrs. G. H. Coe of Fort William replied. Greetings were read from the President and Secretaries of the Dominion Board, from the various Diocesan Boards, from Mrs. Lucas for Mackenzie River, Mrs. Reid, our former Diocesan President, and Mrs. Patterson-Hall, former Dominion President.

The President, Mrs. A. Elliot, then delivered her address, which was a splendid setting forth of the high ideals of the Auxiliary; dealing also with the forward step about to be taken in this Diocese in common with the Auxiliary throughout the Dominion in increasing the membership and efficiency of the organization. The address was deeply appreciated by those present, and later was ordered to be printed in pamphlet form for distribution among the branches in the Diocese.

An address was then given by the Archbishop, who took as his theme the idea of Leadership. He stressed the necessity of training ourselves so that when the call comes for leaders we may be ready to obey. But to be good leaders, we must be good followers.

In the evening the Girls and Junior meeting was held. Reports were given by the Secretaries. Sketches and recitations were given by the Girls and Juniors of North Bay, which were enjoyed. Miss Burgess, Dominion Secretary of the Children's Department, gave an address to the children, illustrated by stories

from the mission field, which was enjoyed by the grownups as well. After the meeting refreshments were served by the girls.

Wednesday morning was taken up with reports of diocesan officers, all of which showed successful work and progress. At midday all repaired to the church where prayers were said by the Rev. Canon Piercy of Sturgeon Falls, who also gave an address on Churchmanship and the Prayer Book.

In the afternoon reports of officers were continued, after which Miss Burgess addressed the meeting. She spoke of the work being done by the Children's Department, and how the children are helping the Seniors. The Children's Department aims to implant in the young the missionary spirit, to develop missionary habits, to lead in after years to missionary service. It aims to give every child an opportunity to help in the great work of extending Christ's Kingdom. Miss Burgess received an expression of sincere thanks for her address.

At four o'clock the delegates, officers and hostesses were entertained to a drive and tea at the summer home of Mrs. Beamish of North Bay.

On Thursday morning there were more reports. At noon prayers were said in the church, and an address given by the Rev. C. C. Simpson of Coniston. He spoke on the vision, the call, and the response. "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Here am I, send me."

The report of our Indian branch at Missanabie was read separately. The account of its work was wonderful, and heartily appreciated by all.

In response to appeals from the Archbishop, several balances at the disposal of the Annual Meeting were voted. The Dorcas balance of \$72.55 was assigned to the purchase of a portable Communion set for use in the Nipigon region, and desk and altar books for St. James' Church, Oliver, now being rebuilt after being destroyed by fire last winter. The Thankoffering, \$272.79, was to be devoted to the rebuilding of Emmanuel Church, Richards Landing, and St. James' Church, Oliver. The Life Members' fees, \$100.00, were voted towards the erection of a boat house at Port MacDiarmid, to protect the mission boat being purchased for the work on Lake Nipigon; and the Extra-Cent-a-Day fund, together with other small sums totalling \$110.00, were voted towards the building of a small mission house at the same place. The Junior balance of \$45.00 was voted to the Dominion Dorcas Secretary for Christmas gifts. \$200.00 from the Emergency Fund went to Dominion Board appeals,—\$125.00 General and \$75.00 Dorcas.

The opening of the Question Box brought forth answers to a number of interesting and important questions. Resolutions of thanks were passed to all who had helped to make the meeting a success. Mrs. MacColl, on behalf of the Pro-Cathedral Branch, extended an invitation to hold the next Annual Meeting at Sault Ste. Marie, which was accepted.

An address by the Rev. Gilbert Oliver brought the meeting to a close. He urged his hearers to take back with them to their various parishes and missions the inspiration they had received at that meeting, which had been marked by a spirit of fellowship, cooperation, and service.

AT THE PRO-CATHEDRAL

On Sunday, June 21st, the 1600th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea was observed at the Pro-Cathedral. The addresses and hymns were in keeping with the occasion. The description of the Council and its great achievement in the promulgation of the Nicene Creed was most interestingly put before a large congregation at the morning service by His Grace the Archbishop.

St. Peter's Day, June 29th, was a happy day in the Pro-Cathedral parish. At the 10 a.m. celebration, the Archbishop was celebrant; and prayers of gratitude were offered up for his fifty-first anniversary of Ordination to the sacred ministry of the Church.

In the evening a Confirmation service was held, when seven adults received the laying on of hands. The Archbishop spoke most beautifully on our religion and duty to God as our "reasonable service."

St. Luke's Boy Scouts recently held a Troop Display in the Parish Hall. It was a success in every way, and the proceeds amounted to nearly \$40.00. A great feature of the evening was the initiation of His Grace the Archbishop as an Honorary First Class Scout. His Grace belongs to the Wolf Patrol, of which the Patrol Leader is Arthur Ross.

On the last Sunday in June the Troop had a parade to church, and made a fine appearance. At the invitation of the Rector the Sea Cadets of the city were also present in their smart uniforms. This splendid young manhood of the city, filling the front pews, listened to a most helpful sermon from the Archbishop on the text, "Be strong in the Lord."

—"Church Bells"

We offer our congratulations to the Rev. C. W. Balfour, Rector of the Pro-Cathedral, upon the attainment of the degree of Master of Arts. The degree was conferred at the Convocation of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, held on the 18th June.

At a Convocation held at Trinity College, Toronto on the 6th June, (the last function to be held in the historic old building), the degree of Bachelor of Divinity was conferred upon the Rev. F. W. Colloton. The degree was conferred in absentia.

A NEW MISSION

Port MacDiarmid is a small fishing village on the southeast shore of Lake Nipigon, forty-five miles northeast of Nipigon village, on the Canadian Northern Railway, bounded on the north south and east by high bush-covered hills, while to the west stretches Lake Nipigon, 60 miles broad and 100 miles long. The village has a population from May to September of 200 or more people, including fishermen, their wives and families, and many students from the Toronto colleges doing research work, also many holiday makers.

Two miles north is a large saw mill, employing at present from 150 to 200 men in summer, and 60 men in winter, with prospects of development and work for 25 years. Soon accommodation for families will be provided, and many will be brought in.

Four miles south is the well-known holiday and tourist camp of the C. N. Railway, Orient Bay, where large numbers of people come every summer and fall for fishing and big game hunting. Forty miles north is a promising gold mining centre, on the Onaman River, while on the opposite shore is a large lumber camp and the Sull Bay Indian Reserve.

In the winter many Indians come to MacDiarmid with furs; so that all the year round it is a busy place.

This district has formerly been included in the Nipigon Mission, but owing to the vastness of the territory it has been very inadequately worked. The Archbishop and the Executive Committee have now decided to make Port MacDiarmid a permanent mission centre. This is a wise and timely decision, for the Roman Catholics have been making inroads among our Indians on this lake for some time, and the missionary at Nipigon has had his hands too full with places along the line of railway to be able to do justice to the northern part of this district.

In addition to all this, many men are employed on the Hydro development work at Cameron Falls and on Lake Nipigon. About 500 men are employed on this work, and many have their families with them. At present Mr. R. C. Warder has been placed at Port MacDiarmid with a tent. This is only a temporary measure; the Archbishop hopes to have another man to send in soon.

The immediate necessities for this mission are a simple mission house which will serve as a shelter for the missionary, and also at present for services; a boat for the lake work, able to stand rough weather, and possessing sleeping accommodation, and a boat house. The money for the boat has been generously provided by the congregation of St. Mary's Church, Stafford, England. To the Rector and people of this Church we owe a deep debt of gratitude.

May we commend this new venture to the prayerful consideration and support of our people.

ST. AMBROSE CHURCH, BAYSVILLE, CONSECRATED

For the second time within twenty-five years the Church people of Baysville have had an opportunity of witnessing and participating in the beautiful service of the consecration of their church.

The first occasion was on the 26th day of May, 1901, when the Bishop consecrated the beautiful church which he had opened on the 12th of February, 1899. The first service held in that church was an early celebration of Holy Communion, which was attended by some 29 communicants,—a remarkable number, considering weather conditions, for the thermometer was standing at 54 degrees below zero, and for twenty-one days the temperature had not risen above zero, day or night. The eleven o'clock service was fully choral, a congregation of 127 being present, with 35 communicants. The choir numbered 25. The evening service was crowded. The Bishop preached on both occasions, and these opening services are talked of even now. At the time the first church was opened there was a debt upon it of some \$450, which the W. A. paid off in a little over two years.

For twenty years the church stood, beloved by its regular congregation and the summer visitors, when it was destroyed by a fire of very mysterious origin on the 2nd of September, 1919. On the following day the old public school building was purchased; but as it needed repairs the services of the Sunday following were held in the town hall. A beginning was at once made to collect funds for a new church. The work was commenced in April 1921, and the opening services were held on the 29th June, 1923. At that time a debt of \$500 remained on the church, but this has been paid off through the devoted efforts of the W. A., and the generosity of the friends of the Church among the summer visitors, to whom a debt of gratitude is due for the success of the work.

The consecration of the second church took place on the 17th May, 1925. The day began with a nearly celebration of the Holy Communion at which Ven. Archdeacon Gillmor was celebrant. His Grace the Archbishop, the Archdeacon, and the Incumbent, the Rev. Canon Hazlehurst, took part in the consecration service. The Archbishop and clergy were met at the door of the church by the Wardens, where the petition was read by Mr. R. A. Ellis; after which the procession entered the church. The instrument of donation was read by Canon Hazlehurst, and the sentence of consecration by the Archdeacon. The Archbishop preached from the text, "My house shall be called the house of prayer." The service was well attended and there was a goodly number of communicants. Since the consecration of the first church in 1901 many of the older members of the congregation have passed beyond our sight; but we felt that they were with us at the second consecration,

especially at the celebration of the Holy Mysteries. The congregation is much smaller to-day than twenty-four years ago, many families having left this part of the country.

At the evening service His Grace confirmed three persons, a young man and his wife, and a young girl. His sermon was based on the words, "Grow in grace"; and was in a sense a sequel to the morning sermon. Then he had dealt with the material building, which had been set apart and given to the service of God. Now he spoke of the newly confirmed as being in a similar manner set apart and given to God's service as living temples.

ST. JOHN'S FOX POINT

On Monday morning the Archbishop, the Archdeacon and Canon Hazlehurst proceeded by boat up the Lake of Bays to the beautiful little church of St. John, Fox Point. (The term "Fox Point" in this connection is really a misnomer. Fox Point itself is some distance away, though the post office known as Fox Point is near, which tends to give its name to the Church. The real location of the church is Church Bay).

The occasion of the visit was the dedication of a beautiful memorial window placed in the church by Mr. C. J. C. Crump, a licensed lay reader of that church, in memory of his wife, Mary Crump, who was organist of the church since its erection some thirty years since, and a most devoted attendant and worker. The Archbishop spoke fittingly on the occasion, referring to the appropriateness of the subjects of the two panels composing the memorial, "Faith" and "St. Cecilia".

Following the dedication, Morning Prayer was read, followed by a celebration of Holy Communion, at which twenty-three (mostly young men) communicated.

After the service the Archbishop, the Archdeacon, and others of the company were entertained at lunch by Mrs. Cunnington of Port Cunnington. Mr. Cunnington is one of the Churchwardens of St. John's and one of its most faithful attendants, always on duty.

From this point the Archdeacon left us to take duty at Huntsville, temporarily without a Rector. After a visit to Bigwin Island, where they were courteously shown over the splendid summer hotel, "Bigwin Inn," the Archbishop and party returned to Baysville. The following morning, Rogation Tuesday, His Grace celebrated in St. Ambrose Church, after which he left for Sault Ste. Marie via Bracebridge and Bala.

We regret to learn that the Rev. C. B. Harris, who for some time has been in charge of St. Peter's, Sault Ste. Marie, and Holy Trinity, Tarentorus, is about to leave the Diocese. Mr. Harris has been appointed to the charge of one of the mission churches of Niagara Falls, N.Y., and leaves his present charge the end of July. We wish him all success and happiness in his new sphere of labour.

THE LAYMEN'S COMMITTEE

MANITOULIN ISLAND

The campaign for the promotion of knowledge of the activities of the Church of England and of our privileges within and responsibilities to her, inaugurated by the National Laymen's Committee, has taken form and commenced its work in our Diocese of Algoma through the local Committee of the central portion of the Diocese at Sault Ste. Marie.

Five members of the local Committee. Messrs. J. B. Way, A. Elliot, L. Chapman, E. V. McMillan and W. J. Thompson, motored to Cutler on May 23rd, thence by Steamer to Manitoulin.

Messrs. Way and McMillan went to Little Current where they were very kindly received and entertained by Mrs. B. H. Turner and Mr. Grant Turner.

Sunday morning they were motored to Manitowaning by Mr. Montizambert, Warden of Holy Trinity, and addressed the congregation of St. Paul's, the oldest church in these parts, Rev. H. E. Pelletier affording every assistance. Much interest was shown in the proposed effort and Mr. W. B. Hilston was elected Chairman, and Mr. James Sim, Secretary of a local committee.

Sheguiandah was visited in the afternoon where Mr. J. Selwyn Rhodes, Lay Reader, is in charge of the Mission of St. Peter, and the Indian Church of St. Andrew. Messrs Murray and Lewis, Wardens of St. Peter's were called upon but unfortunately they were not at home.

In the evening the Committee spoke to a good number in Holy Trinity Church at Little Current, and much interest was displayed. Mr. Humphrey May was elected Chairman, and Mr. Lynn Sims, Secretary of the local Committee. The Rev. W. C. Dunn afforded every assistance in arranging for a successful meeting.

Messrs. Elliot, Chapman and Thompson went to Gore Bay, on the good steamer "Winona", where they were received by Rev. W. T. Swainson and Messrs. F. W. Major, Smyth, Burt, and others of All Saints' Vestry.

A splendid banquet was served at 8 o'clock by the Woman's Auxiliary in the commodious rooms of the Parsonage. This getting together of the men, where the personal touch exists, was a very happy suggestion. It was a very enjoyable affair and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. Mr. F. W. Major, the genial Police Magistrate at Gore Bay, acted as Chairman in his usual happy manner. Notwithstanding the very inclement weather, 30 Churchmen sat down to the sumptuous spread. Among those present were Rev. W. T. Swainson, F. W. Major, F. C. Smyth, Fred Shields, M. McQuarrie, W. H. Dinsmore, Howard Hall, Howard Dinsmore, Merritt Jennings, W. J. Scanlon, W. J. Shields, John Newman, Alf. Lourie, Alex. Burns, Mayor Kinney, J. H. Burt, J. A. Shields and A. E. Graham, all of Gore Bay; Rev. Edwin Weeks, Wm.

Clark, Wm. Priddle, E. T. Crouchman, G. H. Trick of Silverwater, and Albert Kent of Gordon.

Among the speakers were, Messrs. Smythe, Clarke and Dinsmore.

The visitors, Messrs. Elliot, Chapman and Thompson were very enthusiastically received and gave interesting addresses, which were listened to with the closest attention. After singing "God save the King", the function dissolved about 11 p.m.

On Sunday morning, Messrs. Chapman and Elliot were motored out to Silverwater by the kindness of Mr. Smythe where they addressed the congregation of St. Peter's, Rev. E. Weeks taking the service.

In company with Mr. Major, Mr. Thompson motored out to Kagawong and addressed the congregation during the afternoon meeting, the Rev. W. T. Swainson taking the service.

The three visitors returned to Gore Bay for the evening meeting, when Mr. Chapman and Mr. Thompson addressed the congregation of All Saints' on their privileges in and responsibilities to the Church of their fathers. The people were very much interested and paid the closest attention to the appeals of the two Speakers, who spoke with great earnestness and in the most convincing manner told of the Church's world-wide work.

At Gore Bay and Kagawong, Committees were formed for the purpose of assisting and keeping in touch with the National Laymen's Committee movement. Mr. F. C. Smythe is Chairman, and Mr. F. W. Major, Secretary of the Gore Bay Committee. Mr. Wm. Prestage is Chairman, and Wm. Boyd, Secretary of the Kagawong Committee.

The Speakers express the greatest satisfaction and pleasure at the reception given them by the Churchmen of the Grand Manitoulin. The greatest hospitality and kindest attention so generously extended will not soon be forgotten.

THESSALON AND BRUCE MINES

Mr. Edgar T. Read, a member of the Sault Ste. Marie committee of the Laymen's Mission, addressed the congregation of the Church of the Redeemer, Thessalon on Sunday morning, June 7th. The service was conducted by the Incumbent, the Rev. John Tate. A good congregation was present, but owing to the intense heat it was not possible to hold a prolonged meeting at the close of the service. Some of the congregation, however, remained, and Mr. C. H. Rothera was appointed chairman of the local committee, with Mrs. Mencka as Secretary.

In the afternoon Mr. Read motored to Bruce Mines and in the evening read the lessons and addressed the congregation in St. George's Church. Here also extremely oppressive weather conditions interfered somewhat with the success of the visit, but the

missionary, the Rev. P. B. De Lom undertook to call a meeting of the men later, when Mr. Read will go down, and form a local organization.

On Sunday morning, June 21st, Mr. Read delivered the laymen's message in St. Saviour's Church, Desbarats, where a very good congregation had assembled. A meeting was held after the service, but the appointment of local officers was deferred. In the afternoon Mr. De Lom and Mr. Read motored to a small settlement between Desbarats and Bruce Mines, where a service was held in a farm house. The people were much interested in hearing of the movement, which is everywhere awakening a new appreciation of the layman's privileges and responsibilities.

ST. JOSEPH'S ISLAND

Messrs. T. J. Foster, E. W. Shell and A. P. Farrington visited St. Joseph's Island on Sunday, June 21st, in the interests of the Laymen's Movement. At the morning service at St. John's, Hilton Beach, conducted by the Rev. Richard Haines, Mr. Farrington addressed the congregation. Mr. Shell spoke in the afternoon at Holy Trinity Church, Jocelyn; and Mr. T. J. Foster in the evening at Richards' Landing. Special music was provided by three members of the Pro-Cathedral choir who accompanied the speakers. The work on the Island was of a preliminary nature, the organization of local committees being left over until the fall.

ST. PETER'S, SAULT STE. MARIE

Messrs. R. C. Vincent and T. J. Foster visited St. Peter's on the 12th July when Mr. Vincent spoke at the evening service on the aims of the Laymen's Movement. Organization here was deferred.

DRUMHEAD SERVICE AT BRACEBRIDGE

An interesting service was held Sunday afternoon, May 31st, when members of the Bracebridge platoons of "D" Company of the Northern Pioneers and the Boy Scouts joined in a Church parade to Memorial Park, where they were addressed by Rev. F. G. Sherring, M.C., chaplain of the regiment. The Citizens' Band was present, and with members of the choirs of the town assisted in the service of praise. Among the large congregation present were a number of returned men.

The service followed the order laid down for use during the war, and included the General Confession and the Apostles' Creed. The hymns were "All hail the power of Jesus' Name," "Rock of Ages," and "Blest be the tie that binds."

Capt. Sherring's address was based on the text, "Fear God, honour the King," (1 Peter 2:17).

The service closed with the National Anthem, after which a selection, including the airs of well known hymns, was played by the band.

IN MEMORIAM

THE REV. R. S. FERGUSON

The death of The Rev. R. S. Ferguson, L.Th., of Holland Landing, Diocese of Toronto, took place recently in the Toronto General Hospital after a short illness. The funeral service took place in St. James' Church, Gravenhurst, on Saturday, June 13th, being conducted by the Rev. Canon Allman, assisted by the Rev. D. G. Atkinson of Washago, and the Rev. J. B. Lindsell.

The deceased clergyman was born in Ireland, but came to Canada with his parents in his boyhood days. For years he was a member of St. Paul's Church, Uffington, and a worker in the Sunday School. He also taught in the Uffington Public School. In due course he entered Trinity College, Toronto, and during his vacations worked as a lay missionary in Algoma Diocese. He was ordained by the Bishop of Toronto, and served in the Missions of Washago and Holland Landing. Wherever known he was beloved, and many friends join with his relatives in mourning his early death.

ALBERT THOMAS DARBY

A sad accident occurred at the Smelter at Coniston, on May 19th, when Albert Thomas Darby, an electrician, was instantly killed. He was people's Warden of All Saints' Church, a most faithful worshipper and communicant, a teacher in the Sunday School and a general favourite in the town. The funeral service was held in All Saints' Church on Ascension Day. It was conducted by the Rev. C. C. Simpson, and attended by members of the Masonic and Orange Lodges. Interment was made at Barton Cemetery, Hamilton.

The deceased was a native of Derby, England; and served in the British Navy during the Great War. He was married only two years ago. The sincere sympathy of many friends is with his widow in her bereavement.

CONSECRATION OF BISHOP OF NIAGARA

On St. John the Baptist's Day, June 24th, the Very Rev. D. T. Owen, D.D., Dean of Niagara, was consecrated in Christ Church Cathedral, Hamilton, as fourth Bishop of Niagara. His Grace the Archbishop of Algoma, Metropolitan of Ontario, was the consecrating Bishop, and was assisted in the laying on of hands by the Bishops of Huron, Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal. The preacher was the Rt. Rev. J. C. Cooper, D.D., Bishop of Ottawa, who chose as his text, 11 Cor. 4:6, "For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of God in the face of Jesus Christ." The Rev. Canon Piercy and the Rev. C. W. Balfour acted as chaplains to the Archbishop.
