



ST. AUGUSTINE'S MISSION — WHITEFISH FALLS

ONE of the most interesting pieces of Church work in the Diocese is the Mission of Whitefish Falls, which is situated near the North Channel, which separates the Manitoulin Island from the mainland; and on the highway which, after crossing La Cloche Island, leads to the ferry for Little Current, one of the principal towns on the Manitoulin.

The Mission is unique in the Diocese, because, in addition to a beautiful church and comfortable vicarage, there is a school owned and carried on by the Church, in which the children of the neighbourhood, both white and Indian, are given a good general education as well as being taught the Faith of Christ.

Just when the Gospel came to this region we do not know, for there are no records. But near the present Mission there stand the ruins of an old Hudson's Bay Company's post, called Fort La Cloche. One hundred years ago it was a busy centre for the fur trader. Today only the old chimneys stand, with here and there a lilac tree and some old rose bushes. This old fort occupied one of the most beautiful places in Ontario. Even in its present state of ruin it is beautiful, the old deserted paths and mouldering docks being silent memories of days gone by. Here there is an old Indian graveyard, where at least one of the Company's Factors and his wife lie sleeping. We believe it was a rule of the Company that where there was no church the Factor should read the service of the Church of England on Sundays; certainly this good custom was followed in many of the Company's posts. And so perhaps the first Prayer Book services held here were of this character.

Near at hand is McGregor Bay, a beautiful sheet of water dotted with islands. It is named in memory of a lonely white man who

lived there many years ago. Tradition has it that this man was, by a cruel trick of fate, left there by a trading vessel. The older Indians say that for years he waited the return of a ship from Scotland, but he waited in vain. At last he grew old and died here in the wilderness; and his Indian friends granted him a grave in their little burial ground. The grave to-day is surrounded by a mouldering picket fence, and out of the grave there grows a large and beautiful white birch tree, a tree that is now quite old. After his many years of longing for his native land, may he have found "a better country, that is an heavenly".

The first building erected for worship in the mission was at Birch Island. It is still used by the Indians, though nearly falling down. However, the missionary always feels it a privilege and pleasure to go there to celebrate the Holy Communion. The floor is always white, through much scrubbing with lye. In the winter a roaring fire in a huge box stove cheers him after a long cold drive. And the eager faces of the little Indian congregation well repay him for any hardship experienced in the journey. Alas, we have only a few people there now.

The Mission at Whitefish Falls really began in 1916, when on the 13th October, under the direction of His Grace Archbishop Thorne-loe, the Rev. S. H. Ferris of Garden River opened a mission school for the white and Indian children in the neighbourhood. All worked hard to overcome many difficulties. The Chief, the late John Kezhogobiness—familiarly known as "Big John"—who had been untiring in his endeavours to have the school established, vacated his own house to make a school and a home for the teacher, Mr. Duncan Bell. Here the children were taught on week days, and here the people gathered together for worship on Sundays. All went well for a time, but not for long, for the school was soon destroyed by fire. Again the people were without church or school. The old Chief tramped through the woods that winter from one lumber camp to another, trying to raise money to rebuild the school. At times cheering news came to him from the Archbishop that various gifts of money had been received for the work. By the autumn of 1918 a small school house had been erected, which is still in use, though now become quite inadequate.

Mr. Bell, Mr. A. M. Newby, and Mr. L. F. Hardyman in turn lived and worked in this little building, and well and truly laid the foundations of the Mission. In October, 1929, the first resident priest came to live in the Mission. This was the Rev. A. W. Stump, who is still carrying on the work, assisted by his wife, who is a trained and well qualified, as well as most devoted, teacher. Soon a new cement block church was built, with the dedication "St. Augustine of Canterbury", and this was consecrated on the 9th October, 1931. The building of this church was a great undertaking and a venture of faith, which could never have been accomplished unless help from outside had been received. The church has been a source of inspiration in the dreary lives of the settlers and

the Indians. The life of the community centres round it, and it is truly a home in the midst.

In 1931 there was built a house for the missionary; but, alas, this is not yet paid for, owing to the difficult years through which the country has been passing. The building of the house was necessary in order to enlarge the school. The old living quarters were added to the class room; and so for a time an increased number of children could be accommodated.

However, the time has again arrived when something must be done for the school. At present it can only accommodate thirty pupils, and there are about forty-five. These are divided into twelve grades, beginning with the Primer and going through to the second year of High School. The fact that not one of the pupils has yet failed in the Entrance examination speaks wonderfully for the teaching given by the missionary and his wife. Some of the children now have to be taught in the basement of the church; but this is of course unsatisfactory, and is only a temporary makeshift pending the enlargement of the school. Outside help is urgently needed for this latter work if the school is to be retained by the Church to carry on its splendid work.

The little Mission stands alone on the shore of Lake Huron. The nearest doctor is twenty miles away. The nearest other school is the same distance. Thus, St. Augustine's is truly a home to the people of this large area. Here the children receive their education, here the flock are fed with the Bread of Life, here the sick are helped back to health, and those who are walking in the way of life are encouraged to be faithful unto the end. Some day, perhaps, the land around will be more settled, perhaps some industrial plant will take advantage of the abundant water power. So we want to keep the school, to have it enlarged, and to have another assistant teacher. It would mean everything to the boys of this school if some young man, missionary at heart, would come and take up this work.

I have audited the Balance Sheet of the Diocese of Algoma dated the 31st December 1934 as attached hereto.

I have obtained all the information and explanations I have required.

The securities in charge of the Treasurer, amounting to \$42,427.22, kept in a safety deposit box in the Canadian Bank of Commerce, have been verified and found correct.

The statements on file from the Royal Trust Company, together with the certificates of Messrs. Riddell, Stead, Graham and Hutchison of Toronto, Auditors, verifying the same, have been checked, and the books of the Treasurer are in accordance therewith.

The balance of the H. H. Wills Bequest retained in England, \$10,426.30, is represented by securities which, I understand, are in the custody of Mr. G. S. Stow, one of the Trustees of the fund.

In my opinion such Balance Sheet is properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the state of the affairs of the Diocese, according to the best of my information and the explanations given me, and as shown by the books of the Diocese.

Marie Rotary Club, of which the Archdeacon has been a valuable member, testified to its esteem in a similar way. He will be greatly missed in the See City, but all friends join in wishing him a happy and successful ministry in Fort William.

“A TRIENNIUM OF JOYFUL SERVICE”

THIS is the title of the report of the Council for Social Service of the Church of England to the 16th General Synod held in 1934 which has just been published and is available for distribution. The colour is a lovely shade of blue and the cover design is most attractive. It contains as a frontispiece an excellent picture of Canon C. W. Vernon, late General Secretary of the Council for Social Service. The report includes an account of the three years of the various activities of the Council, the work of the Executive Committee, and the financial report of the Treasurer.

It deals with the welfare work at the Council's office, efforts for the relief of sufferers in the prairie districts who have suffered from drought and grasshoppers, and for those trekking into the North to discover fresh fields where drought is unknown. There are a number of illustrations showing the activities in Unemployment Relief Camps supplied by Church of England workers. Pictures of the work being done in the “Left Behind” country by the Cowley Fathers and the nursing Sisters of St. Margaret near Bracebridge add much interest, especially to us in Algoma. The work of the Church Army, Woman's Auxiliary, Summer Schools, the welfare of prisoners in Ontario, Chaplaincy work, etc., all have their place in this interesting pamphlet.

The report closes with an appeal for increased and increasing aid by prayer, study, almsgiving and work in its efforts to build the King's Highway in the hearts and lives of the people of Canada.

GARSON MINE

As an example of the way some of our smaller missions are struggling to maintain the work in these difficult days, the following extract from a letter from one of the Wardens of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Garson Mine, is of interest.

“The year 1934 started with our finances in very poor condition. So low were our funds that we were not able to guarantee our minister's salary as was customary, but decided to carry on as long as possible. Thanks to the united efforts of the congregation, we have been able to meet all our obligations, and to finish the year with a reasonable balance on hand with which to start 1935. Special mention must be made of the efforts of one of our members, Mrs. Wilson, for her idea and hard work in putting on a play, which realized nearly \$30.00. The young people also raised about \$20.00. Our Harvest Festival was a great success, the church being full to overflowing. The offerings amounted to \$36.00. We were privileged to have the Rev. P. F. Bull, Rector of Sudbury, to preach the sermon, and he was accompanied by part of the choir of his church. What started as a very dark year financially, turned out to be a successful one.”
