

THE SYNOD

**T**HE TWELFTH triennial session of the Algoma Diocesan Synod has been summoned to meet at Sault Ste. Marie, beginning with the evening of Whit Monday, June 6th, when the Synod Sermon will be delivered in the Pro-Cathedral by the Right Rev. George Craig Stewart, D.D., Bishop of Chicago. The Synod service, consisting of a choral celebration of Holy Communion without sermon, will be held the following morning, after which the Synod will meet in St. Luke's Parish Hall for business.

Apart from the regular business, the following special features are being arranged,—on Tuesday evening a laymen's banquet, on the following evening a reception at Bishophurst, and on Thursday evening a missionary meeting.

The convening circular is in preparation and will be ready shortly.

THE LENT ORDINATION

**O**N SUNDAY, March 13th, the Bishop of Algoma held an ordination at Sault Ste. Marie, at which Mr. Albert Baldwin and Mr. Lawrence Edward Cokayne Frith (Brother Lawrence Michael) were admitted to the diaconate, in the presence of a congregation which quite filled the Pro-Cathedral. The candidates were presented by the Very Rev. P. A. Paris, D.D., Dean of Algoma, the Litany was sung by the Rev. C. F. Hives, Principal of the Shingwauk School, and the Rev. L. I. Greene, Rector of the Church of St. John the Divine, North Bay, preached an earnest and impressive sermon on the text, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." The Gospel was read by Mr. Frith. At the close of the service the Bishop formally presented the newly ordained deacons with their Letters of Orders and licences.

Mr. Baldwin is a native of Newfoundland, and is a student of Bishop's University, Lennoxville, where he has one more year of study. He is at present assisting the Dean in the Pro-Cathedral parish, and also has charge of the mission work in the mining region along the Algoma Central Railway. Brother Frith is a novice of the Society of St. John the Evangelist at Bracebridge. He holds the degrees of B.A. and B.Sc. of the University of Manitoba.

The ordination was preceded by several days of preparation at Bishophurst, including a much-appreciated Quiet Day conducted by the Rev. L. I. Greene.

## CLERICAL CHANGES

**THE REV. R. M. TAYLOR**, F.R.G.S., has returned to England, having been offered a sphere of work in the Diocese of Derby, not far from his home. We regret his departure, and wish him every success and happiness in the Motherland. The Church of St. Francis of Assisi, Mindemoya, remains to us as an evidence of his zeal and ability. It is admired by very large numbers of visitors to the Manitoulin Island; and, more important, it is an inspiration to the people who worship there and who worked so earnestly for its erection. Mr. Taylor was in charge of the Provincial appeal for the Archbishop Thorneloe Memorial Fund, and on the postponement of the effort was set free to return to England, where the good wishes of many friends will follow him.

The Rev. R. C. Warder, S. Th., who has been for some years past in charge of the mission of Bala, has accepted an appointment as priest in charge of Holy Trinity Church, Melbourne, in the Diocese of Quebec, and leaves at the end of May to take up his new work. He will be greatly missed in Algoma, where he was ordained and where he has spent all his ministry. His many friends will wish him God-speed, and a happy and successful ministry in his new sphere of labour.

The Rev. W. R. Tindle is removing from Baysville to Bala about the 1st of June. Since coming to Baysville Mr. Tindle has done excellent work, and has endeared himself to the people of his mission.

We welcome back to active work in the Diocese the Rev. Canon Banks, L. Th., who has been for some time on leave owing to the illness of Mrs. Banks. We rejoice to know that she is well again. Canon Banks has been appointed to the charge of the mission of Baysville in Muskoka, and takes charge on the 1st of June.

## THE NEW ST. MARY'S, POWASSAN, OPENED

**A**T LONG LAST the new church, replacing the destroyed edifice dedicated to St. Mary, has been duly and formally opened for divine service.

On Sunday, January 9th, 1938, the doors opened three times to admit many who desired to see and worship in the new building on a new site. At the evening service the congregation overflowed the space allotted into the passage-way and the vestibule.

We had promised the Town Council that if we were permitted to purchase a portion of the Memorial Park from the town, we would erect a building upon it of which the town would not be ashamed. We believe we have fulfilled that promise. We appreciate the attitude of the Town Council and many of the Powassan citizens towards us during our trying time without a proper place of worship. Accordingly we were pleased to see so many townspeople of other communions present, that they might know just what our new edifice is like on the inside, and we assure them a welcome whenever they feel disposed to come and worship with us.

In addition to the organ accompaniment to the hymns by Miss Topps, we enjoyed the violin accompaniment by Mr. Howard Frederick. Mr. Lake rendered a solo, "Open the Gates of the Temple", in his usual soulful manner, with Mrs. Towsell at the organ.

It was indeed a pleasure to have a former esteemed incumbent, the Rev. Richard Haines of Haileybury, Rural Dean of Temiskaming, with us on this important occasion. He delivered two excellent and soul-stirring sermons at the morning and evening services. Mr. Haines expressed his surprise and delight over the beautiful new edifice, and complimented the minister and congregation upon their remarkable achievement.

A list of gifts to St. Mary's church by local and distant friends was read by the priest in charge, the Ven. Archdeacon Burt.

What more can be said than the words "Laus Deo"?

## SUDBURY

**A** MEMORIAL CHAPEL has been built in the Anglican cemetery at Sudbury. It is called "The Chapel of the Resurrection", and was opened for use on the 9th January.

The chapel serves a double purpose. It provides a vault where the bodies of the departed may remain while it is impossible or extremely difficult to dig graves and conduct funerals out of doors owing to the severity of the winters. It will also be used for services as soon as pews can be provided. The building will seat about 125 persons.

A Sunday School has already been started, and as it is in a district which is rapidly building up, and is at some distance from the parish church, this will meet a real need.

## NATIVITY PLAY AT ST. ALBAN'S, CAPREOL

ONCE MORE the festival of the Incarnation has come and gone, though its message is eternal. Once more "out of the mouths of babes and sucklings", this old but ever new devotion of the Nativity was shown forth as an instrument of Peace and Good Will in a war-racked world.

A Nativity Play by children was something new for us in Capreol, but from the very first the children entered into the spirit of the Shepherds and Wise Men. The congregation had its part too, because we try to make this an act of worship and not a mere performance.

The atmosphere of the church lent itself splendidly to the play. On each side of the altar stood Christmas trees, gaily lit. At the west end were two more, as a background for one of the most beautiful cribs I have ever seen. Of course it was made by our local genius, Dr. Niebel, and among other things contains rocks from here and there, carefully put in place, alongside rocks from Parry Sound. The sheep seem to have plenty of pasture, and yet not interfere with the royal approach of the Wise Men. The stable roof is beautifully thatched with holly, under which are coloured electric lights, while a star sheds its beam from above.

The congregation rises with the singing of "The First Nowell", and John the Baptist approaches the altar. The Baptist gives his message of "Repent", and promises the advent of One whose latchet he is unworthy to unloose. Our Lady is seen meditating in a corner. Gabriel approaches and salutes her. Meanwhile verses 3 and 4 of hymn 202 are sung. St. Joseph receives the order from Augustus to go to Bethlehem to be taxed. Our Lady and he set out. Round and round they go, looking for an inn, but thousands have received the same order. At last a kindly porter gives them a stable.

The first verse of the hymn, "While shepherds watched" is sung, and suddenly Gabriel leading a host of angels arrives; the shepherds prostrate themselves as Gabriel tells them to hurry to Bethlehem to see a great sight. The shepherds arrive, with the singing of one verse of "O Come all ye faithful", and behold with wonder Our Lady, St. Joseph and the Holy Child. They have hardly gone when three kings arrive with three treasures to be offered to the King of Kings. The congregation sing, kneeling, "Earth has many a noble city."

A procession from the altar down to the crib, back to the choir and once more around the church takes place, and the priest "lets them depart with the blessing."

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 THE ALGOMA ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN
 

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**A**T A MEETING of the Committee of the Provincial Synod in charge of the Algoma Endowment Campaign, held in Toronto on the 18th February, it was decided that the campaign should be postponed for the present outside the Diocese. This is a disappointment, as we had hoped that now at last this missionary diocese might receive the endowment which should have been provided for it when it was set apart over sixty years ago, and the lack of which has been a great hindrance to our work throughout our diocesan history. Other dioceses are also making appeals at the present time, however, and this fact has combined with business depression to prevent the success of the campaign just now.

It has been decided, however, to continue the appeal in the Diocese itself, and to raise as large a sum as possible as a memorial to our late beloved Archbishop.

The Rev. L. I. Greene, Rector of St. John's, North Bay, has kindly consented to act as organizer of the diocesan effort, and will be assisted by Mr. B. G. Gosse and all the Rural Deans each in his own deanery. It is confidently expected that each deanery will endeavour to do its share.

While the diocesan organization is only in its initial stage there has been received from the Diocese and from those formerly resident in Algoma, in cash and reliable promises, the sum of about \$7050. This is divided among the deaneries as follows: Algoma, \$149; Manitoulin, \$101; Thunder Bay, \$120; Nipissing, \$6,100; Temiskaming, \$65; Muskoka, \$540. The deanery of Muskoka is aiming at \$3,000, and the vestry of Huntsville has set a splendid example by undertaking to raise \$500. If Huntsville can do this, many larger places should be able to raise much greater sums.

We hope to show the Province that we ourselves are in earnest in this matter. The interest on the amount raised will help our very inadequate Algoma Mission Fund.

The Bishop asks the prayers and generous offerings of our people towards this end.

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**G**OOD WORK is being done among the young people in the little village of Murillo, the most westerly mission in the Diocese. The Rev. C. G. Peto reports steady growth in the Sunday School, 44 children being now on the roll. A pack of "Wolf Cubs" officially came into being recently at a solemn investiture held in the presence of the Commissioner of Scouting for the Thunder Bay District, and other dignitaries from the Lakehead. Seventeen boys were invested.

## THE S. S. J. E. MISSIONS

**T**HE FOLLOWING STATISTICS of the missions served by the Cowley Fathers in Muskoka, taken from their weekly bulletin, "The Sunshine Paper", are of interest.

The total population of the district served by the Society is 2286. The number of persons on the parish rolls is 1523, or 66% of the whole. Of these 538 have been confirmed. In 1937 there were 74 baptisms (34 adults and 40 children), and 47 persons were confirmed. The list of pupils in the Sunday School by Post has been carefully pruned, and only those who send in answers have been kept on. There are 312 pupils on the roll. Four of them won special distinction by gaining prizes in competition with all the Anglican Sunday Schools in Canada, namely: Evelyn Hawn, Matthiasville; Mable Sword, Beatrice; John Naismith, and Norma Hammond, Falkenburg. Several others obtained high standing in the annual examination.

There are 19 church buildings (not counting the Collegiate Church and the Sisters' Chapel), two halls and one parsonage. Services were held during the year in 33 places.

The sum raised by the missions was \$2137. This does not include money raised by the Guilds and Sewing Circles, which would bring it up to about \$3000. Of this amount \$842 was paid towards the support of the Fathers and Brothers, \$150 for general expenses, \$495 for building and repairs, and \$218 was sent away for missions and other extra-parochial objects. The envelope system was allowed to drop in many places during the depression, because of the extreme poverty of the people; but now it has been started again, and it is hoped that this will mean an increase in giving.

## MINNOW LAKE

**T**HE FIRST Anglican service at Minnow Lake (otherwise known as Black Lake) near Sudbury, was held on Sunday, January 2nd, at 11 a.m., when the Rev. Canon Simpson, assisted by Mr. James Thomson, a licensed lay reader, conducted Mattins. Seventeen people were present, and all seemed interested in the service. The service was held in a very comfortable school house which was well heated. Minnow Lake is growing quite rapidly, and there are quite a number of Church families there. The deed of a site for a church has been secured. The majority of the families belong to the Roman Catholic Church, but no service of their Church has yet been held. The Baptists, however, have been holding services for some months. It is proposed to have Mattins there every Sunday, with a celebration of Holy Communion twice a month, and catechizing of the children on the alternate Sundays.

The veterans of the Great War residing at and near Markstay, where Canon Simpson holds services, are organizing a branch of the Canadian Legion. They say they prefer Church of England services, and have asked the Canon to be their Chaplain.

The securities in charge of the Treasurer, amounting to \$40,672.22, kept in the safety deposit box in the Canadian Bank of Commerce, have been verified and found correct.

The statements on file from the Royal Trust Company, together with the certificate of Messrs. Riddell, Stead, Graham and Hutchison of Toronto, Auditors, verifying the same, have been received, and the books of the Treasurer are in accordance therewith.

The balance of the H. H. Wills Bequest retained in England, \$10,426.30, is represented by securities which, I understand, are in custody of Mr. G. S. Stow, one of the Trustees of the fund.

Subject to the above, in my opinion such Balance Sheet is properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the state of the affairs of the Diocese, according to the best of my information and the explanations given me, and as shown by the books of the Diocese.

## In Memoriam

WALTER S. G. BUNBURY, PRIEST

Walter Shirley Gibson Bunbury, Rector of La Tuque in the Diocese of Quebec, passed to his rest on the 12th January at the Montreal General Hospital, after a brief illness. He is affectionately remembered in Algoma, for he was for some years Rector of St. Luke's Pro-Cathedral, Sault Ste. Marie.

Mr. Bunbury was born in London, England, in 1873, a son of the late Rev. Shirley Bunbury. He was educated at St. Catherine's College, Cambridge, graduating in 1904. Ordained by the Bishop of



Southwell, he served for three years as curate at Heanor, Derbyshire.

In 1907 he came to Canada, and was appointed curate of St. Peter's, Sherbrooke, the church of which Archbishop Thorneloe was Rector before his consecration as Bishop of Algoma. In 1909 he became curate of the Cathedral of Quebec. In 1913 he was appointed Rector of Richmond, Quebec, but in the following year felt the call of Algoma, and came to us as Rector of the Pro-Cathedral, where he served for seven years. For a time he was Rural Dean of Algoma, a member of the Executive Committee of the Diocese, and Associate Editor of the "Algoma Missionary News".

In 1921 he returned to Richmond as Rector of St. Anne's Church. In 1925 he was appointed Rector of the important industrial town of La Tuque in Northern Quebec. Here and in a number of small outstations scattered along the railway line he continued the faithful and devoted work which has distinguished him all through his ministry.

While serving as curate at the Cathedral in Quebec, Mr. Bunbury married Miss Marjorie Stain, who, with their seven children, survives him. To them we offer our respectful sympathy.

The funeral service was held in the Cathedral, Quebec, and was conducted by the Dean, in the presence of the Bishop of Quebec and Bishop Williams.

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#### EUSTACE ALLIX VESEY, PRIEST

Another former incumbent of St. Luke's Pro-Cathedral passed away recently, in the person of the Rev. Eustace Allix Vesey, who had been living in retirement in Toronto for the past few years.

Mr. Vesey was ordained in Algoma in 1888 and 1889 by the late Bishop Sullivan. His first appointment was to Burk's Falls, 1889-90, and he served as priest in charge of the Pro-Cathedral from 1890 to 1894. Following his service in Algoma he was Rector in turn of Harriston and Georgetown in Niagara Diocese. Since 1907 he has been connected with the Diocese of Toronto.

The funeral service was held at St. Edmund's Church, of which Mr. Vesey had been Rector for a number of years. It was conducted by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Toronto and Primate of All Canada, assisted by the Rev. R. S. Tippet, Rector. The interment took place at Bracebridge.

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#### FANNY E. SUTTABY

On Wednesday, January 5th, Miss Fanny E. Suttaby passed away at her home in Gravenhurst, after a severe and painful illness of some months, bravely and patiently borne.

For more than thirty years Miss Suttaby was engaged in her chosen profession as a teacher, and most of that time was spent on the Public School staff in her home town. In this work she showed unusual ability, and was most successful in advancing her pupils. She was a devoted member of St. James's Church, Gravenhurst, a life member of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary, and for some years was Treasurer of St. James W. A. Her loss will be severely felt by the Church in Gravenhurst.

The funeral service on the 8th January was conducted by the Rev. E. F. Pinnington, and was largely attended by friends and sympathizers. She is survived by two brothers and five sisters, to whom the sincere sympathy of many friends is given.

## MAURICE JOHN GREAVES

On the 6th December, in the Plummer Memorial Hospital at Sault Ste. Marie, Maurice John Greaves, son of the Rev. Alfred and Mrs. Greaves of Blind River, passed to his rest after an illness of some months. He was twenty-five years of age.

He had chosen the teaching profession as his life work, with every promise of a successful career. For some time he had been in charge of the school at Murillo, where his father had formerly ministered; and while teaching was preparing himself for more advanced work as a student of Queen's University. He was a young man of sterling character, quiet and conscientious, and a faithful and devoted Churchman.

After a funeral service held at the Bishop Fauquier Memorial Chapel at Sault Ste. Marie, and conducted by the clergy of the See City, his body was laid to rest in the beautiful little Shingwauk cemetery, "in sure and certain hope of a glorious resurrection." The sincere sympathy of many friends goes out to his parents, his brother and sister.

## LULU MARGARET BOTTERELL

One who for twenty years laboured for the welfare of the children in the Shingwauk Home, and during that time influenced for good many hundreds of boys and girls of the Indian race, passed to her reward on the 9th February.

Miss Lulu Margaret Botterell was born in Aylmer, Quebec, and lived in Ottawa for some years, where she was employed as a stenographer in one of the Government Departments. Always deeply and actively interested in Church and missionary work she volunteered for service, and in 1914 was appointed Matron of the Shingwauk Home. During the years she held that position she fulfilled her duties with outstanding ability, and gave an example of devoted Christian service which has been an inspiration to many. She was greatly interested in the higher education of some of the brighter Indian children, and many of them owe an immense debt of gratitude for her sympathetic help and encouragement.

Towards the end of her twenty years of service she was deprived of the priceless gift of sight; and although she remained in active duty for some time after this affliction descended upon her, she was ultimately obliged to hand over to another the duties she so dearly loved and had always discharged so well. Since her retirement she has lived with her friend, Miss Davies, the teacher at the Garden River Indian School. To the affliction of blindness there was added in later years that of a lingering and painful illness, but never once was she known to complain, and never did her Christian fortitude show signs of giving way.

The funeral service was held at the beautiful Shingwauk Chapel which she had greatly loved. It was conducted by the Very Rev. Dean Paris, assisted by Canon Colloton, the Rev. J. D. Wall, Canon

Johnston and the Rev. A. P. Scott. The Rev. C. F. Hives, Principal of the Shingwauk School, gave an address, paying a touching tribute to the life and character of her who had been called to Higher Service. Two of her favourite hymns were sung,—the touching "O Love that will not let me go," written by one who shared her affliction of blindness, and "God Is Love". Her body rests in the beautiful little "God's Acre" close to the school where her life work had been accomplished. May she rest in peace.

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MARY ELIZABETH BRYAN

St. Thomas' Church, Bracebridge, has suffered a great loss in the death of Mrs. Bryan, a faithful member and devoted worker, who died on the 7th January in her seventy-fourth year.

She was untiring in her work for the Church, especially in the Woman's Auxiliary. She seemed to have the faculty of learning where she could be useful, and responding to every call. In recognition of her long and faithful work she was made a life member of the W. A. of the Diocese of Algoma. She was Treasurer of the Thankofferings of St. Thomas' branch for thirteen years.

The funeral service was held on Monday, January 10th. It was conducted by the Rector, the Rev. J. S. Smedley, and the Rev. Fr. Palmer, S.S.J.E. Fr. Palmer gave a feeling address in appreciation of Mrs. Bryan's character and devotion. The members of the W. A. attended in a body.

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MABEL PATTERSON

As a memorial of a short but beautiful life, and as an inspiration and challenge to the boys and girls of our Sunday Schools, we publish the following letter sent by Sister Marion, S.S.J.D., Superintendent of the Algoma Sunday School by Post, to all the members of her widespread organization some months ago. Plummer, where Mabel lived, is a settlement some miles north of Bruce Mines. Sister Marion wrote:

"God has called to His nearer Presence and into Higher Service one of our most promising members, Mabel Patterson of Plummer. I have been looking back over past records, and I find Mabel's name on ever Honour list since she won the first prize for her work in 1934, while Mr. Major was Superintendent.

"Soon after I took over the work, Mabel wrote and told me she wanted to be an Overseas Missionary when she was old enough; and with that object in view she was studying diligently, not only her Sunday School lessons, but to make herself proficient in any task she had to do. You will remember that she took Second Class Honours in the test set by the General Board of Religious Education last May, and she has won FULL MARKS for every set of papers since Christmas.

"Mabel was confirmed on St. Andrew's Day last year — it was such a suitable day for one who desired to become a missionary.

Early in March she was taken ill and had an operation from which she did not recover, although she lived about twelve hours, and we are thankful that her mother was with her when she received her last Communion. She was buried in her Confirmation dress.

"Let us all thank God for Mabel's life and for her example, and let us ask Him to inspire some other of our girls and boys to do what Mabel hoped to do, in giving her life entirely to God's service."

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#### ARTHUR POTTER NASMITH

On March 14th, Mr. Arthur Potter Nasmith died at Dundas, where he was living as the retired manager of the Royal Bank of Canada. In his earlier years Mr. Nasmith lived for some time in the Diocese of Algoma, where he was on the staff of the Imperial Bank of Canada in Sault Ste. Marie, being thence appointed as manager at New Liskeard and subsequently at Cobalt. He became Warden of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, New Liskeard, at Easter, 1906; and quite recently held the same office in St. James's Church, Dundas. He is survived by his widow (a sister of Mrs. C. A. Seager, wife of the Bishop of Huron) a son and a married daughter in England.

Doreen attends the Coniston Continuation School, and has shown herself a brilliant student.

To our congratulations we add our best wishes for many more successes in her academic career.
