TYPHOID FEVER EPIDEMIC,

Following an outbreak of typhoid fever among the Indian children attending the Bishop Herden Memorial Residential School, operated by The Church of England Mission, at Moose Factory, Ontario, the undersigned was requested by the Division of Indian Health Services to conduct a sanitary survey of the area and to assist the Medical Officer in determining, if possible, the cause of the outbreak and to recommend remedial measures in order to prevent a recurrence of such outbreaks.

Moose Factory Island is located in the estuary of the Moose River some twelve miles from James Bay and two miles south of Moosonee, the end of rail. The Island is roughly oval in shape and has an area of 1,133.3 acres. It is fairly level, about 22 feet in elevation above mean sea level and covered with second growth, spruce, poplar, birch and willow.

The settled and inhabited area of the Island is situated along the southwest side, the chief buildings comprising the Anglican School, small hospital, Anglican Church, R.C.M.P. Detachment, Hudson's Bay Company Trading Post, Roman Catholic Church and some seventy-six (76) Indian dwellings. The resident white population is thirty-six (36) in addition to three hundred and eighty-four (384) Indians, which are variable in number as they come and go.

Attention was first given to making a careful investigation of the water supply and sewerage systems of the Anglican Mission, followed by a survey of the general sanitary conditions prevailing on this Island. In this connection it is desired to point out that general matters of sanitation on the Island would properly come under the supervision of the Health Department of the Province of Ontario, in which it is located. The environmental conditions directly affecting the health and welfare of the Indians could be considered a Federal responsibility.

HISTORY OF TYPHOID FEVER EPIDEMIC

The story of the development and progress of the epidemic, as recounted by the Medical Officer, may be briefly stated as follows: In August and September, a Mr. Tinney, employed by the School, became ill and was hospitalized at Cochrane. On September 20th, a resident pupil, Peter -----, became ill followed later by one of the girls on September 29th. Three (3) more girls became ill on October 1st. A short time later, the Archdeacon and Superintendent of the School, Mr. G.H. Cook, was sent to hospital at South Porcupine, being diagnosed and later confirmed on October 6th as suffering from typhoid fever. The previous cases were also confirmed as typhoid.

On this date certain prophylactic measures were put into effect by the Medical Officer. All drinking water on the Island was ordered to be boiled and excreta from the known typhoid patients was disinfected and buried in disposal pits. Since that time one girl and two boys became ill with typhoid. No further cases have developed within the outside incubation period of thirty (30) days so that the preventive measures adopted have apparently been successful in stopping the progress of the epidemic.

In summary then, there are ten (10) patients hospitalized with typhoid, five (5) Indian girls, three (3) Indian boys, at the Mission, Mr. Tinney and Mr. Cook at other hospitals.

The Anglican Mission School has a staff of thirteen (13) with fifty-eight (58) resident pupils and twenty-five (25) day pupils. Following the outbreak of typhoid the day pupils were not allowed to attend school.
