



With further reference to your letter No. 36-0-1 dated September 5th.

Things have come right along in connection with the formation of the new Scout Troop in your school at Spanish and we are today in receipt of an application for Troop Charter.

The application is signed by Rev. Father Belanger, S.J., as Principal of the school, but in order to show the approval of your department I would be very glad to have you endorse the application which I am enclosing herewith. As this is a school Troop rather than a community Troop, there will be no Troop Committee in the ordinary sense and we will also forego the payment of registration fees as we do in the case of other schools under Government control.

When we receive the charter application back from you the document will be issued and sent to Spanish and registration certificates will be made out for the Scoutmaster and boys.

Could I have a few minutes of your time ~~and when~~ ^{in which} to give you a sort of résumé of Boy Scout Work in our school up to date, and also to give you a brief outline about plans for the future?

The first nine boys which started in the movement are in good shape as far as the tests in Scout Work are concerned. They have had a good deal of fun and have a good understanding of Boy Scout ideals. The uniforms which you so graciously sent, were indeed a great boost and contributed greatly to create the fine spirit which is now in the troop. The results so far, are far ahead of our fondest hopes.

We are now training our recruits. Most of them are ready for the initial test. There are 29 of them. This will raise the number in the troop to 37 which is 5 more than Scout Headquarters advises. But the boys were so anxious to join that it was very difficult to draw the line at 32 and still be fair to the boys who wanted to join. However there will no doubt be some who will in time, not try to live up to the Scout Law so they will have to drop out, so that in the end the troop will consist of the regulation number of Scouts.

I am enclosing an application for registration for the new boys and also a list of a few things we need. Could you please send these on to the Provincial Headquarters, Boy Scout Association, 330 Bay St.

Toronto.


Our work during the winter will be mostly indoor work with a lot of drill on the qualifications for the Second Class Badge. We also expect that the Scouts will stage some kind of demonstration at the Christmas Entertainment in the school. In the spring we hope to ~~work~~^{namely} on a project, ~~mainly~~...a Scout Garden. If our plans are successful we shall have about half an acre of good garden land. My fellow teacher who will direct it, is an old and experienced farmer ^{and} gardener and we are looking forward to an A-1...Garden.

So you see Mr Ferrier, the boys have made a creditable showing so far and if our plans for the year can be carried out we shall be able to show not only results of character building which are more or less intangible, but material results as well.

Trusting that you will attend to our needs at your earliest convenience.

I have your letter of the 2nd instant, with enclosures, concerning boy scout work at the Spanish Indian Residential School. The Department wishes to congratulate you on the success which is rewarding your efforts. I believe it will be in order, in future, for you to deal direct with the Provincial and Dominion Headquarters of the Boy Scouts Association. I understand that applications for registration of scouts go to Toronto. Requisitions for all boy scout equipment, with the exception of the badges, is made to Dominion Headquarters, Ottawa. The buttonhole badges are secured from the Provincial Headquarters. You may inform either Provincial or Dominion Headquarters that the Department will accept responsibility for the expenses and that they should send you the account, in duplicate. You will then certify to it and forward it to me for payment.

You will perhaps recall my telling you that our Boy Scouts were planning to plant a garden this year. I am to have it on a competitive basis and as part of the scout work.

It won't be long now before the ground is ready and we will be needing tools and seeds. Could the department supply us with these? Here is the list of our needs.

1. Planter box Cultivator & spade (with fertilizer attachment if possible)

2 doz holes

1 doz rakes

1/2 a dozen sprinkling cans - 3 gal. capacity

1/2 ton fertilizer - suitable for light black soil (muck)

2 doz wide-tined digging forks

2 doz Planting trowels

1 lb. Giant sugar beet

1 lb. Swede Giant turnip

2 lb Early gem oxheart carrots

1 oz Early white plum celery

1 oz Improved Antwerp long cabbage

4 lb Hollow crown parsnips

1/2 lb. Cardinal Globe beet (table)

1 lb Golden Sunshine corn

4 lb Early Fortune Cucumber

2 lbs Dwarf telephone beans

2 lbs Dwarf white wax beans

1 lb English broad beans

1 lb Large Vossflay Salsify

$\frac{1}{4}$ lb Improved Victoria Spinach




Sir:



Dear Sir:

The Boy Scout Troop in our school now has thirty-six Scouts. Only nine of these have uniforms. Most of the others will have passed their second class tests soon and should have their uniforms when they do. Although you did tell me to order direct from the Scout Supply Depot, yet this order will be a rather heavy one so I thought that it would be better to have your approval before I did so. If the department sees the way clear to supply these uniforms, which I hope to do, I shall be pleased to send details re sizes etc.

Boy Scout work has taken well here and the results so far have surpassed our fondest hopes. Those who have been away from

the school for several months, or coming back, notice the difference in the boys and attribute it to Scouting.

The meetings themselves have improved. They are well conducted by the boys themselves.

We have just organized our Court of Honor. It has not had an opportunity to do any work yet but its future looks promising.

I could tell of many incidents to show that Scouting here has so far been a success. However I will not weary you with any more details or take up any more of your time.

I sincerely hope that the department will continue to give the movement the splendid support which it has given in the past.

Finally advise concerning uniforms as soon as possible.
