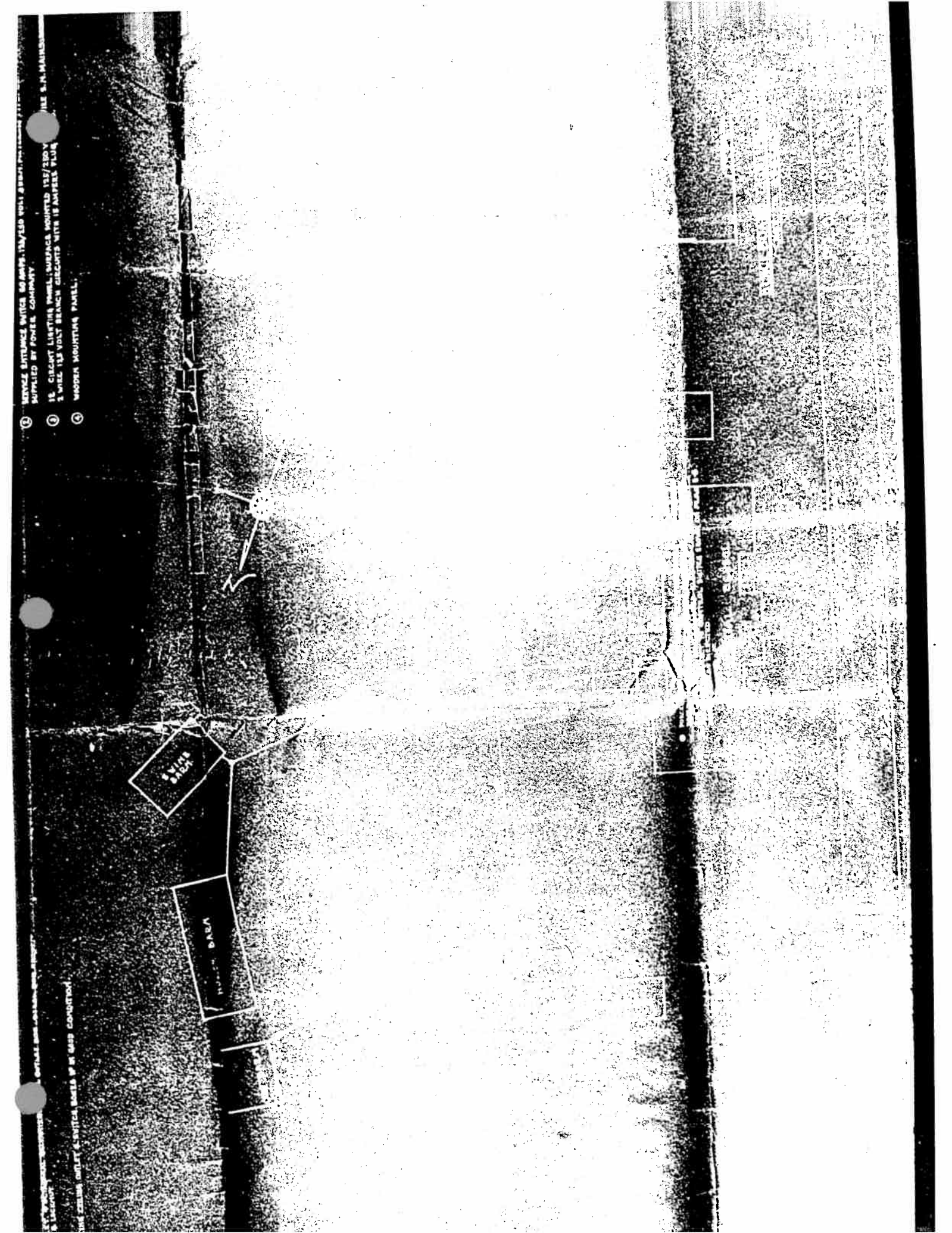

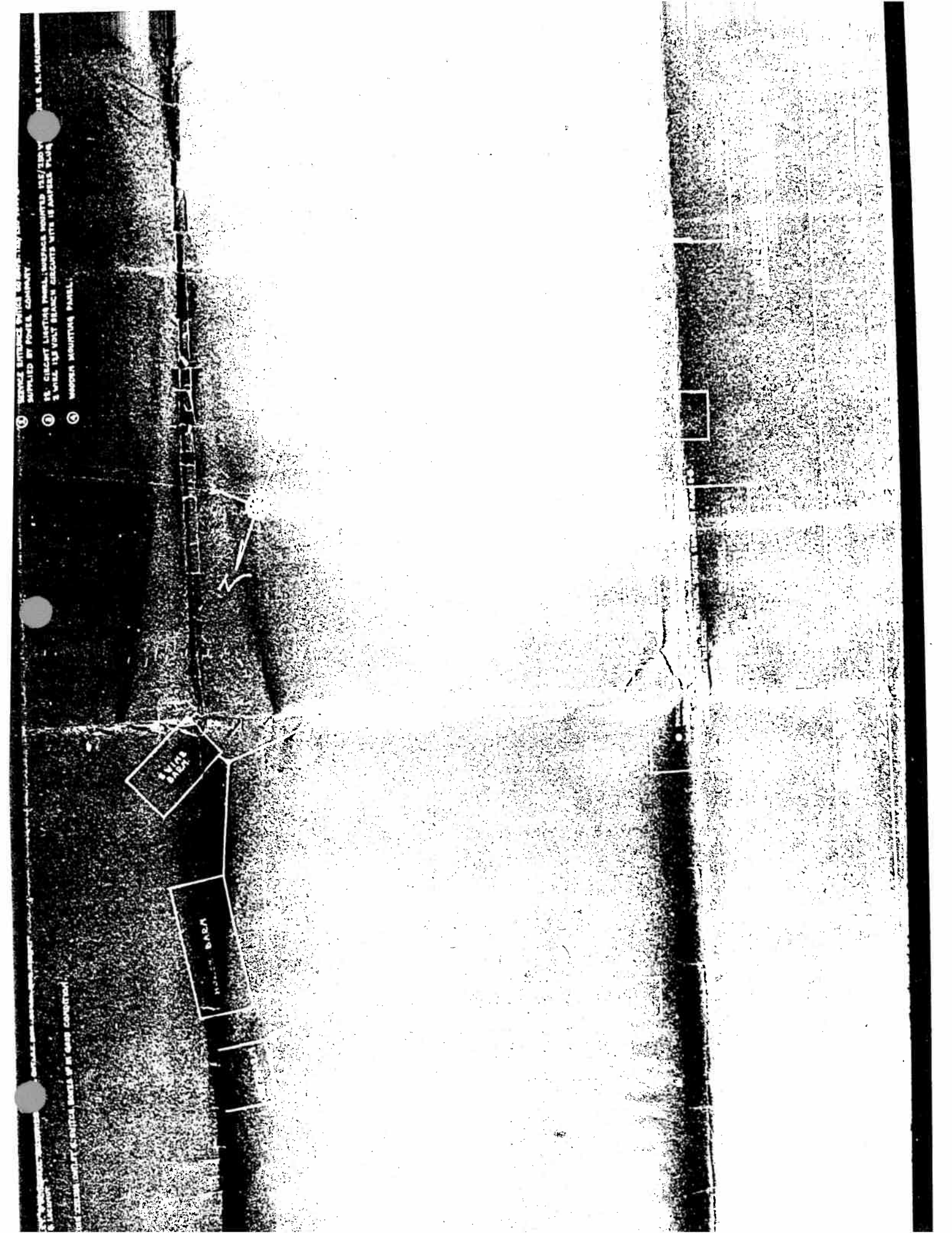


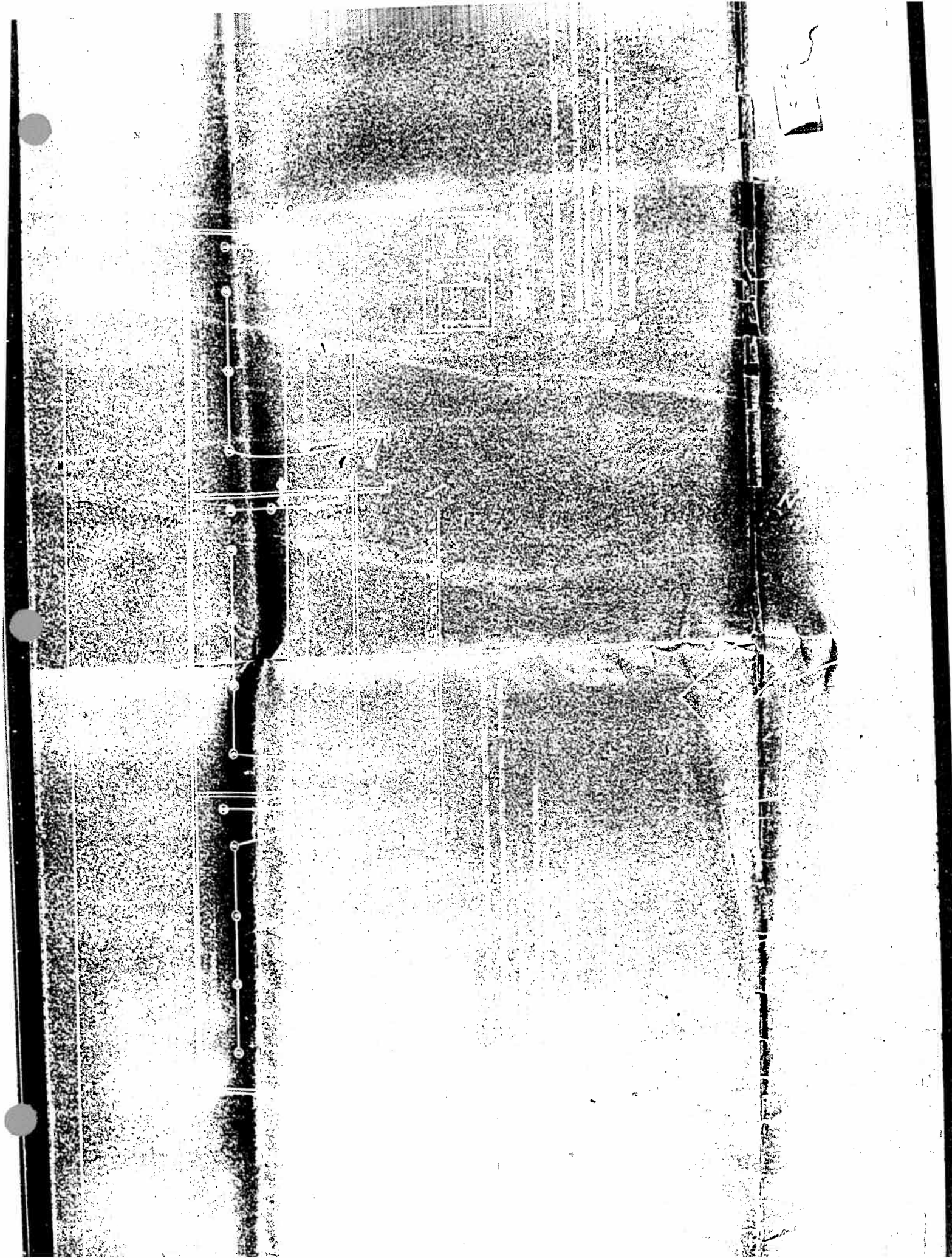

Memorandum:

COLONEL NEARY.

Inspection of Mohawk Institute.

I visited this school accompanied by Superintendent Randle. We were to meet the Principal in the afternoon but as he had not arrived yet we took a glance through the school while waiting.

The new classroom block is quite an improvement over the former classroom. I am satisfied that this will contribute greatly to the efficiency of the education at this institute provided the proper type of teacher is secured.

My first impresssion especially when going through the dormitories and the playroom was a sense of depression. It is the old story of noticing children wandering without any purpose whatsoever during their free time. This can have a very baneful effect on their character and on their immediate conduct.

Two of the dormitories are rather badly served by two dormer windows and a fire escape door. I believe, these dormitories handle as many pupils as wisdom will allow. There has been a question of double decker beds in some of the dormitories. We have placed some of these beds in some schools and have been satisfied with them, where the supervision is adequate. Where the supervision is somewhat lax, probably due to the lack of personnel, I would be reluctant to recommend this type of bedding. It might be wise to attempt a trial period before going all out for this system. There is a great deal of space lost in the middle of this school. This is due, I



believe to the fact that the Principal would be reluctant to have dormitories above his own living quarters. I think it would be wise to have other quarters for the Principal and to use the school to full advantage. There would be adequate space for bathroom facilities for the boys and girls dormitories if use were made of this space.

I would recommend that Mr. Buck be asked to have this surveyed to ascertain the cost of making these changes. I do not see any possibility with the present set-up of improving the toilet facilities in the dormitories. The present system has nothing in it that is recommendable especially in the boys dormitory. The toilet is open and very close to the beds. This should be eliminated and it could be done by a re-arrangement of the beds. Any change, however, would be of a temporary nature and would not rectify the faults that exist in the set-up. As mentioned above, a thorough survey should be made by the Engineering Branch.

Mr. Randle is expected to make a report also on this condition and also to secure prices for temporary changes that would seem imperative.

In the appropriation for the fiscal year 1949-50, we have provided an amount of \$6,000.00 for repairs and alterations at the above school.

In order to provide adequate accommodation for the authorized pupilage at this school, it is necessary to renovate and provide more space in the dormitory on the top floor of the building.

There is considerable unused space between the two present dormitories located on the top floor, and our officials feel that if this space was renovated it would solve our problem.

We are anxious to have this work carried out during the holiday period (July and August) this year, and I would appreciate it if you would arrange to have one of your officials visit the Mohawk Residential School at an early date with a view to ascertaining exactly what work is necessary. He should then prepare a plan and specification with which we could ask for tenders.

Under separate cover, I am forwarding to your Architect a plan of the Mohawk Residential School.



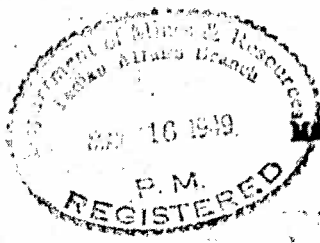

My dear Colonel:

In reply to your letter of May 11, 1949.

- (1) Number of cows milking... May 12/49.. 23.
- (2) Number of Gallons of milk ... May 12/49.. 966 lbs. produced daily.
- (3) Milk supplied to school... May 12/49 .. 375 lbs.
- (4) Number of gallons sold... No milk sold... During Month of April sold 448.9 lbs of butter fat.

One gallon of milk weighs roughly 10 lbs.

The custom at the Institute has been to use skim milk at the school. Besides the skim milk there is sent to the Institute 2 qts. of cream and 6 qts. of milk each day. Six qts. of milk is supplied to the families employed by Institute but living out.

I do hope that these figures will help to clarify the situation. Once again may I say with all sincerity that we do need very badly a milk cooler or some method of controlling the bacterial count. The health authorities will not permit us to use ice off the river. City water which has a temperature of roughly 70 degrees in the Summer is useless.

Your letters 466-5 (E.1) of the 20th and 25th instant are acknowledged re the above and though your letter of the 20th was not quite clear, it was assumed your reference to a tender for labour was with regard to the top floor alterations and your letter of the 25th means us to disregard this, in view of the Examination by the Lands and Development Services Branch.

As you state, we have the paint on hand for the exterior painting and it is assumed the tender of Robert Styres to do the work for \$1100.00 which was accepted last year, is still good.

Mr. Styres is prepared to start as soon as the children go on holidays, which is felt wiser, as with ladders and paint supplies around, with the children there, they could get up to a good deal of mischief.

With regard to moving the former Chapel Building at the Army Camp, which Mr. Zimmerman requires for additional staff quarters, Mr. Rispin says he would have to charge \$1000.00 for the operation.

Rispin states the building will, owing to its length and shape, have to be cut and moved in two sections and maybe three. You will realize, that the time taken in movement from point to point is not the expensive part of such operations, it is the time taken to cut, jack up, brace up open ends and get ready for movement, followed by the time taken to lower the portions on their new site, line them up and repair roof where cut.

Consequently, the price quoted is reasonable, somewhat higher than previously, but wages and other costs have moved up since the quotations of two years ago.

Rispin can only move it and place it for the \$1000.00 stated, he cannot take the time to finish it off for occupation, as he states he has too much private work ahead to do so, which he has neglected somewhat for two years, moving our many buildings.

It is suggested, therefore, that you approve of his offer, so he can proceed at once as he is almost through with the hospital and Council buildings, then this office will submit a further recommendation concerning what is necessary and the costs of making it into two apartments, so we can get the work done ready for occupation in September.

May we also receive the authority to go ahead on the Domestic Science Building, so we can get it in operating order now, rather than wait to the summer holidays when so much other school work is done.

You have already approved of the the installing of kitchen cabinets, etc., at a cost of \$496.08, but there is the siding, painting and building of partitions.

We have the insul brick siding on hand, but it will cost about \$60.00 to have it put on by an Indian carpenter.

While we did not reline the floors of the other army buildings used as schools, in this case, in view of the nature it is to be used for, it is felt a new floor should be placed in to give a first rate appearance and some cupboards, also a partition around the kitchen part.

Labour and material for this will cost approximately \$400.00. The cost of paint and labour for painting will cost approximately \$200.00.

If the work painting, siding and carpentering can now be authorized, please send an accountable cheque for \$300.00, then it will be possible to proceed at once and we can employ workmen who will then carry on with other school repairs after the holidays commence.

My dear Colonel:

You will find enclosed descriptions of milk cooler units. There is no doubt in my mind about the wisdom and necessity of such a unit.

Mr. Hawarth and I feel that the portable unit is the most desirable. If ever for one reason or another one wishes to move the unit it would not be necessary to build another tank. The cost of building a tank is rather considerable and tricky. There is an inside layer of cement, cork and another layer of cement. The portable units have insulated tops. The Victor or the Champion would be most acceptable. The Wood machine is very well known but more costly. Many farmers around Brantford are using these machine and in fact if one sends to a dairy they are compulsory.

The Champion unit costs 275.00 as I told you in Toronto. There would be the extra cost of building the tank. We can build a tank but I question whether it will be as satisfactory as the ready made.

Memorandum

Re: Electrical work - Mohawk
Institute, Brantford, Ont.

You are advised that our electrical engineer visited the Mohawk Institute on September 29th last to inspect electrical work which is now being carried out and with the exception of the installation required in the attic storage space, which is to be converted into additional dormitory areas, it is approximately ninety per cent (90%) complete.

The Contract price for carrying out the electrical work let to the J.H. Turvey Electric Company of Brantford is in the amount of \$5,331.00, and we recommend that the Indian Affairs Branch pay the Contractor the value of his work done to date, which amounts to \$4,790.90.

Changes to our plans, requested by the Indian Affairs Branch to suit specific applications of certain areas, involved re-arrangement of the distribution system and type of lighting, and extra electrical work was required which was authorized on the job by our electrical engineer. The cost of this extra work amounted to \$975.87, which, along with the Contractor's price for wiring new dormitory space, will be treated as extra work to be paid from funds made available by the Indian Affairs Branch. The Contractor will submit his claim for the balance of the Contract price, plus the value of the extra work mentioned above, for payment after final inspection is made upon completion of the work.

Plans are now in the process of preparation for the alteration of the attic storage space into dormitory areas and will be forwarded to the Indian Affairs Branch in the near future.

We are writing the J.H. Turvey Electric Company advising them to present a Progress Estimate in triplicate to Col. E.P. Randle, Indian Superintendent at Brantford, for payment of ninety per cent (90%) of their Contract price.
