Lawyer, residential-school student battle over legal fee

A native man in Manitoba who says he was sexually abused at a residential **Related** school is afraid he will be victimized again, this time by a lawyer who worked on his compensation claim.

Fred Brandon, 62, could be entitled to more than \$250,000 in compensation under the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement for sexual abuse he said he suffered at a residential school in the province more than 50 years ago.

After years of waiting for a hearing on the matter, he became impatient and fired his lawyer, the Regina-based Tony Merchant.

Under the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement, lawyers are supposed to receive a maximum of 15 per cent of any settlement awards under the independent assessment process, which will determine how

much — if any — compensation Brandon should receive.

But Brandon is worried he will have to pay more than that, after receiving notice that Merchant is claiming he should receive more than \$8,000 out of any settlement Brandon may receive, as payment for his firm's legal fees.

"There's nothing listed here on what they've done for me, or an itemized list of work they done. All it says here is the amount I owe them. I don't agree with that," he said.

"I shouldn't be victimized again."

Merchant told CBC News the money won't come out of Brandon's pocket, but rather out of his current lawyer's fees.

"It doesn't make any difference whatsoever to the client," he said.

But Brandon's case has alarmed national aboriginal leaders, who worry situations like these may challenge the guidelines and result in situations where former students who receive settlements pay more to lawyers than they thought they would.

The Assembly of First Nations has taken up Brandon's case; officials say they will take the matter to court if necessary.
