Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief John Beaucage is greatly concerned with the directio Indian Residential Schools Truth and Reconciliation Commission — especially the situation that resignation of Commission Chair, Justice Harry S. LaForme.

Grand Council Chief Beaucage is primarily concerned with the feelings and concerns of the res school survivors.

"I am disappointed that Justice LaForme has tendered his resignation. I am hoping that it will interpreted by the survivors of Residential Schools as a sign that their plight is denigrated in a Grand Council Chief Beaucage.

"Above all the Truth and Reconciliation Commission is about healing, not about who is sitting of the room," he said.

During October, Justice LaForme resigned as Commission Chair of the Indian Residential S Truth and Reconciliation Commission, citing an "incurable problem" that may lead to ultim the Commission.

Beaucage is calling for dismissal of the remaining commissioners, Jane Brewin Morley and Cla Dumont-Smith with a full review and reconstitution of the Commission.

"With Justice LaForme's resignation, I can say without a doubt, that First Nations have lost continuous the Commission as it is presently constituted. Clearly, the remaining commissioners are responsthese turn of events and need to be replaced," said Beaucage.

In his letter to the Hon. Chuck Strahl, the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Developmer stated: "The two commissioners are unprepared to accept that the structure of the Commission that the TRC's course is to be charted and its objectives are to be shaped ultimately through the and leadership of its Chair."

"These questions need to be addressed immediately and First Nations must play an instrumen review of the Commission's mandate and the selection of the new commissioners," said Beauca

Justice LaForme is a judge with the Ontario Court of Appeal. He is also Anishinabek, and a cit Mississaugas of New Credit.

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
