But as one person told me, she received her settlement but money means nothing. She didn't feel any better. Now she needs to spend her money on a good vacation as an important part of her healing journey.



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At the end of the day that is what it is all about. Money is only a tool you can use to buy things. It's the yardstick we use to measure happiness, but it can also be used to measure unhappiness. This settlement is a once-in-a-lifetime chance to do a lot of good for people that have endured a lifetime of pain, but if it isn't properly handled it will only mean more pain on top of what already exists.
