M A R I A N Y E A R EDITORIAL

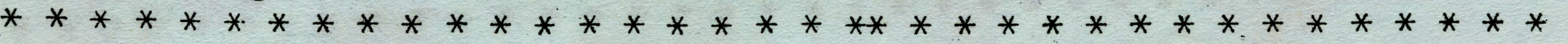

What are my impressions when first I read the title of this editorial? Are they impressions of satisfaction or of disappointment? Did I say: "Shucks! Marian Year, religion! Don't I go to Mass every morning and to Communion often? I even go to Benediction some nights. I say my beads, too, even though I say them distractedly at times. But so do the others. We are saying the Marian Year Prayer at nights. How does it go? - "Enraptured by the splendor." Surely we are doing enough."

Before going any further, dear students of Garnier High, let us, in our minds at least, look around at some reminders of the Marian Year that are about us. There is the statue on the rocks. "Brought der last year, Fodder," one of the youngsters said, "Used to be on de odder side." Why was it brought closer?

Now, go into the chapel. What are the full words written around the statue of Mary on the altar at the right? And what is the meaning of the words: "I am the Immaculate Conception"? If you

can answer these first two questions, try a third: "When was the 'Immaculate Conception' made an article of faith?"

Answer these three questions and you will have some idea of what the Marian Year should mean to you and why 1954 was chosen as the Marian Year. It was exactly one hundred years ago, 1854, when all Catholics became obliged to believe that God's own Mother, Mary, was without stain of original sin even from her conception.

For the few remaining days in this Marian Year of 1954, dear students, a few considerations should help to determine the action expected of us. First, if the Church is celebrating Mary's 100th Anniversary by special prayers and devotions to her, She is doing so for a grave reason. Satan and his powers of evil seem more prevalent in the world today

than they have been for a long time. We read about so many people being unbelievers, so much persecution behind the Iron Curtain.

Then reflect that in 1917 Mary predicted that Russia would "spread its errors throughout the world, provoking wars and persecution against the Church" unless her requests were granted. What were her requests? The consecration of the world to her Immaculate Heart and the Communion of Reparation on the first Saturday of the month. She asked for devotion to her Immaculate Heart. She asked for prayers. "Pray, pray very much, and make sacrifices for sinners", she told the three little children at Fatima, "for many souls go to hell because there is nobody to make sacrifices and to pray for them".

Should we not heed her warning, listen to her who is the Mother of our God, and Mother of us too? Not only should we say our rosary often and attentively and make these few remaining days of the Marian Year days of devotion and extra fervor, but we should make our whole lives Marian lives, lives modelled after our heavenly Mother's life, a life lived in close union with Her Son.

"O Mary Immaculate, pray for us."

DELMA COOPER (53) - is completing Grade 13 at Pembroke and intends to specialize in nursing.

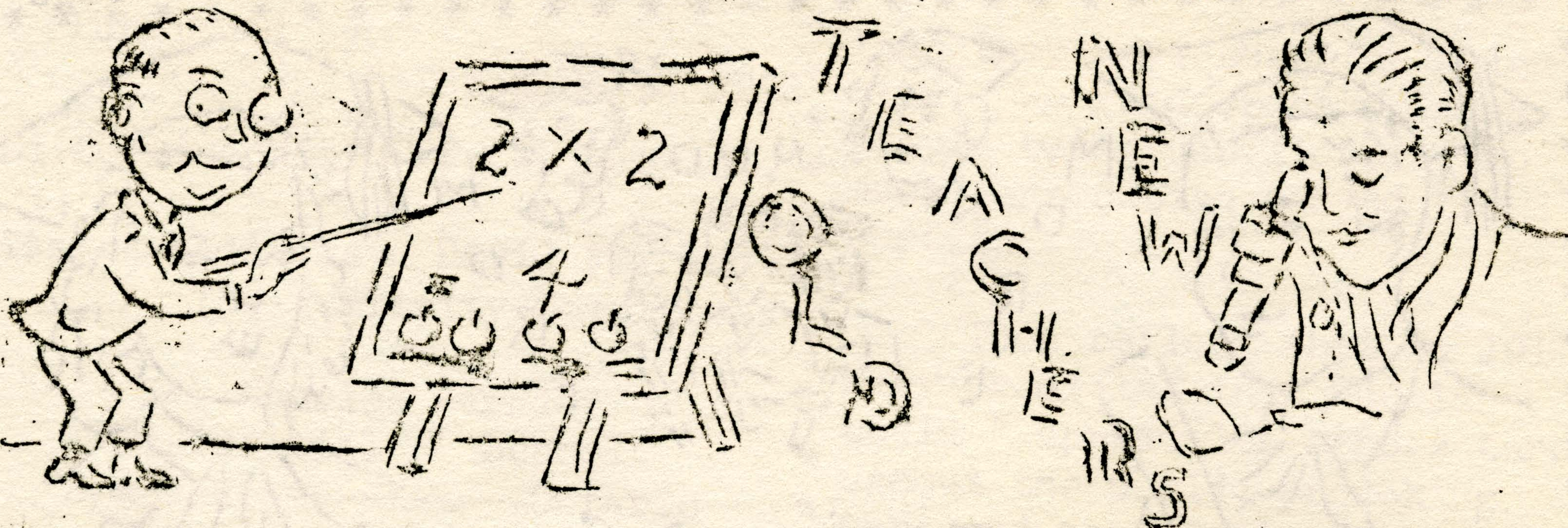
JOHN PELLETIER (53) - is at home helping his parents. John intended to enter St. John Military Academy but made his application too late.

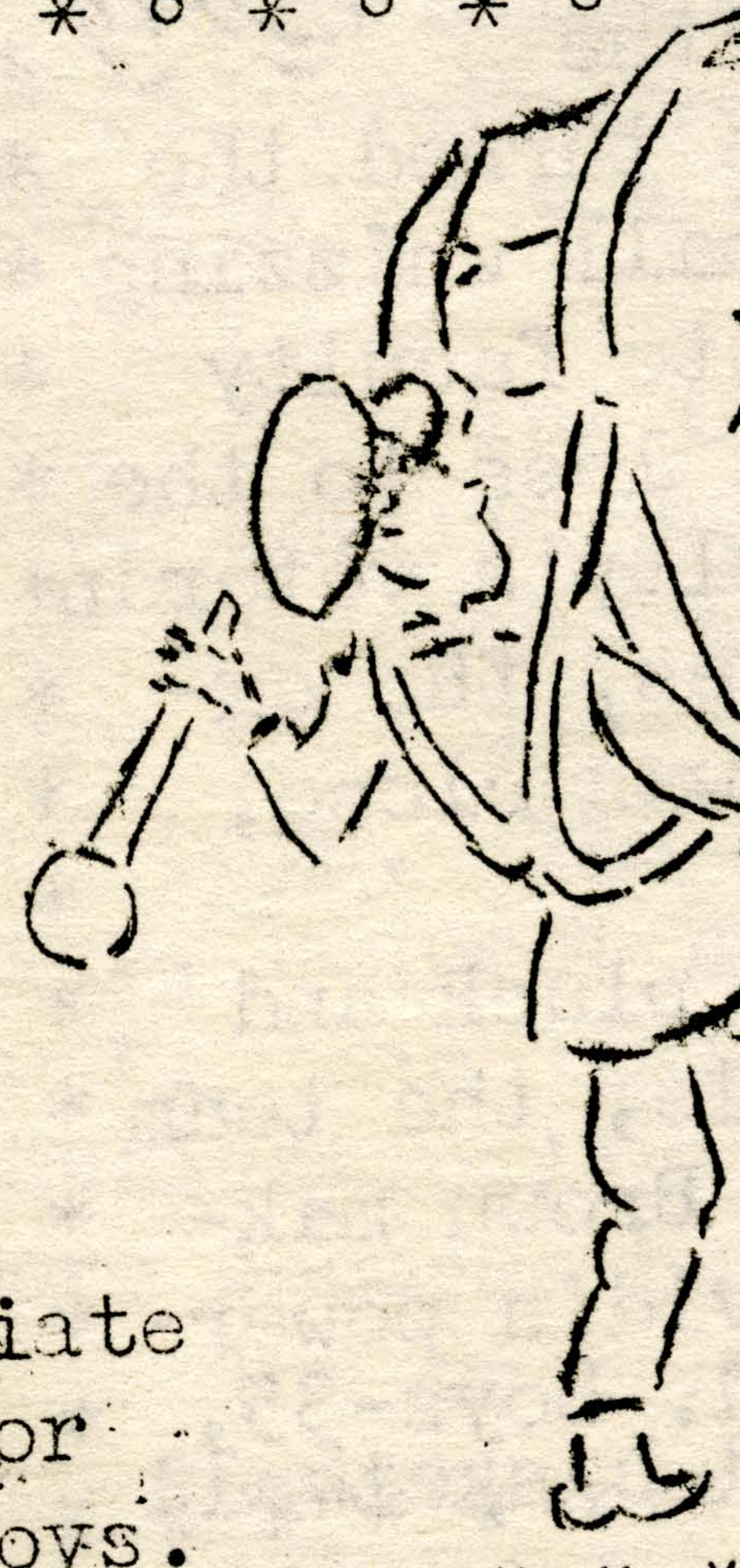

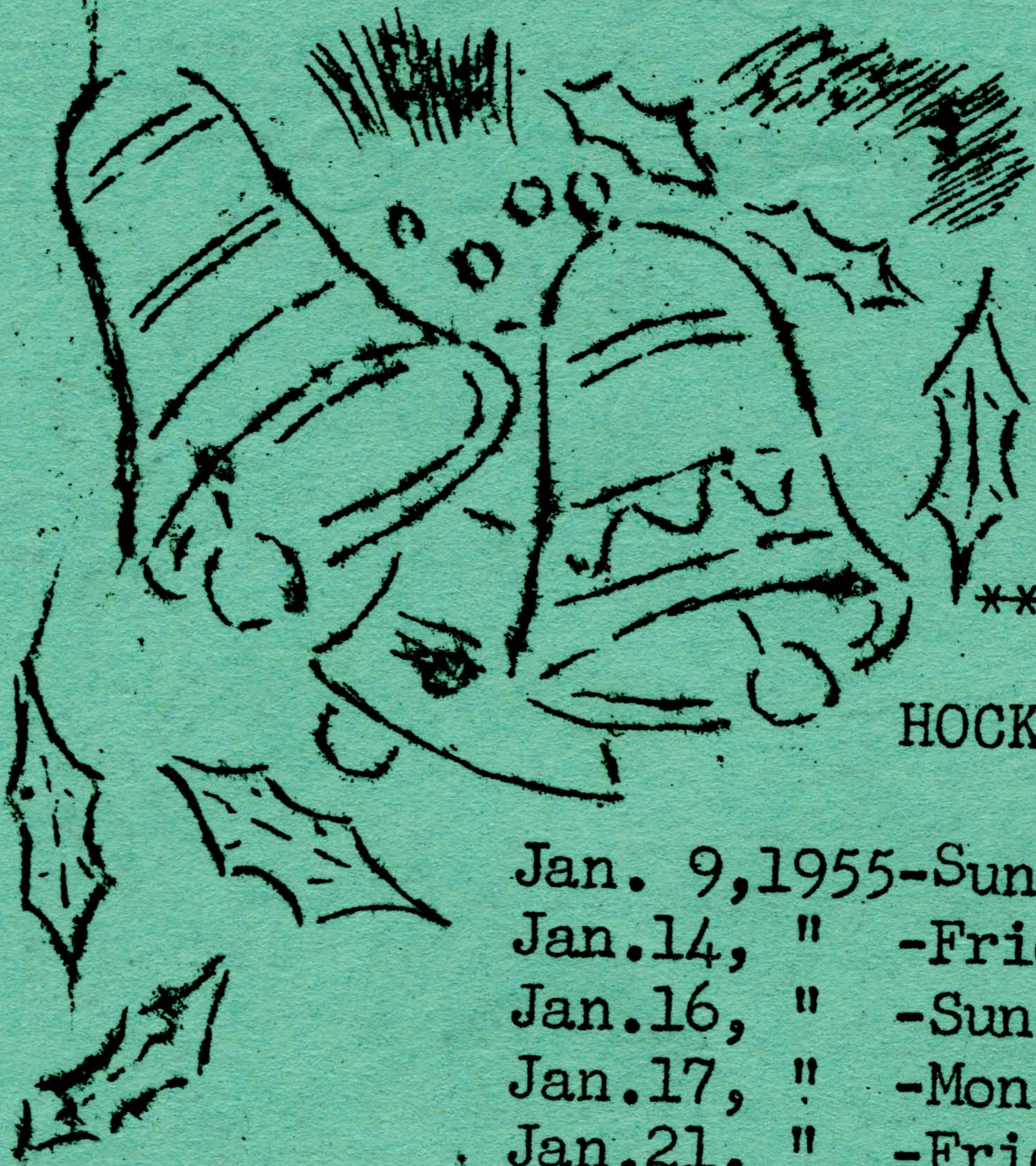
SOCIALS
