

Your friends can help you, but they cannot do your work for you They can encourage and counsel, but the toil is up to you.








Is what you are doing today going to help you reach your goal?





The grade ten class are the students who have successfully completed the first step in their high school education.


They can continue building relationships with the people they met last year and begin friendships with the new arrivals. Most of the grade ten's were here last year.



The grade nine students are building the foundation of knowledge and friendships they need to reach their goals.





The dorm supervisors would spend many hours listening to or talking with us. They helped us realize more about ourselves and others.
















OSPREY NEST & DIAMOND WILLOW






Weekends

Sports is where one learns to develop the physical bodies to their full potential. The students are challenged to strengthen their endurance levels as well as to demonstrate leadership.




