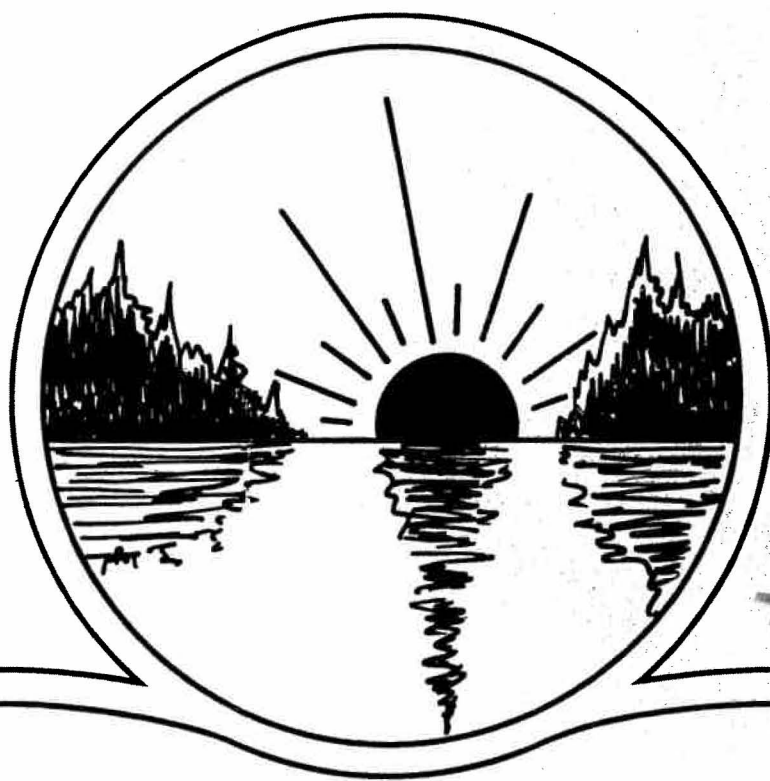

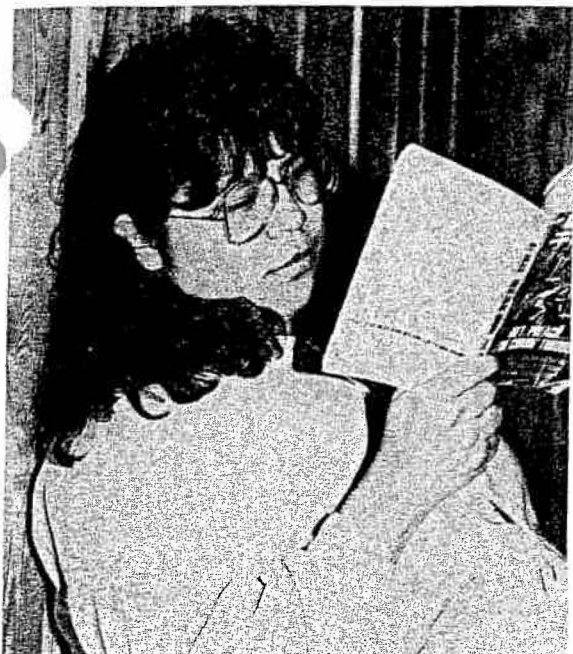

The grade ten class are the students who have successfully completed the first step in their high school education.

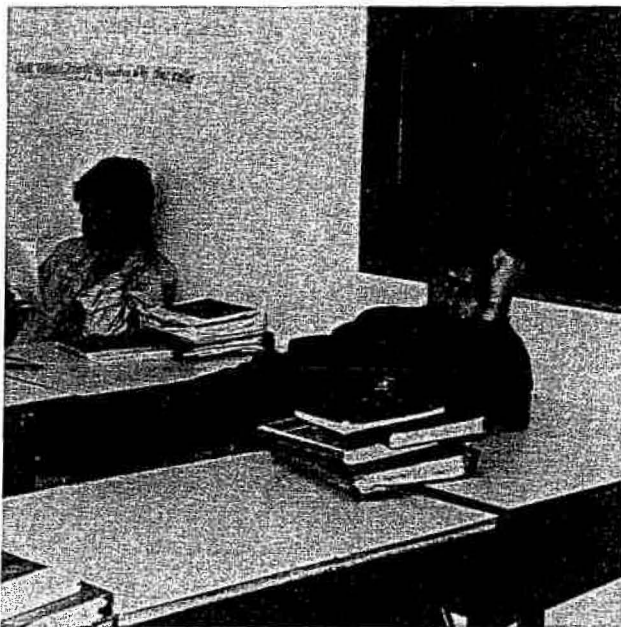
They can continue building relationships with the people they met last year and begin friendships with the new arrivals. Most of the grade ten's were here last year.

The grade nine students are the people who need the most help to reach their goals. They face the problem of homesickness, but they also enjoy making new friends.

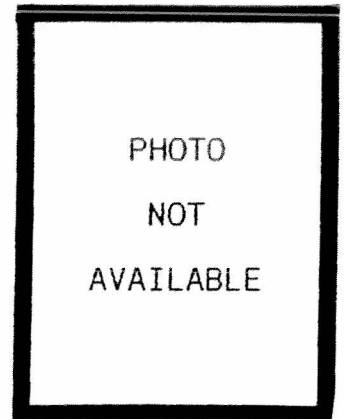
They work hard in their studies and in sports. Jeff and William enjoy participating in all types of sports and improving their skills.

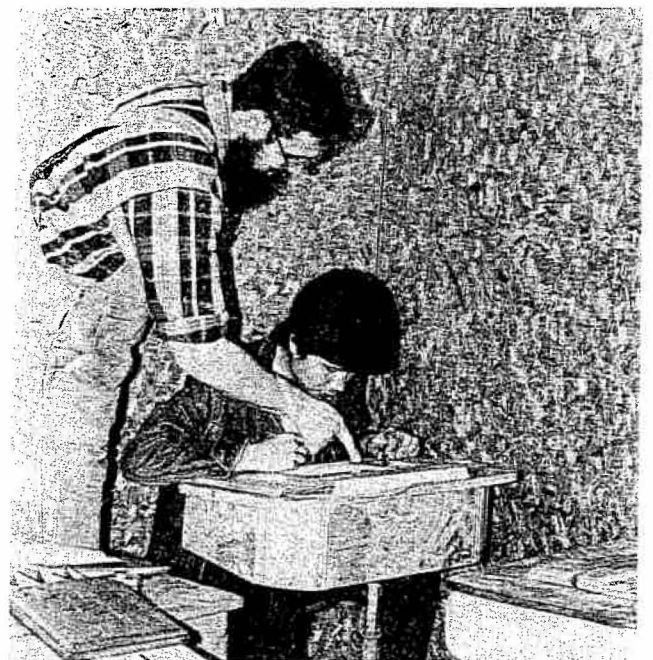

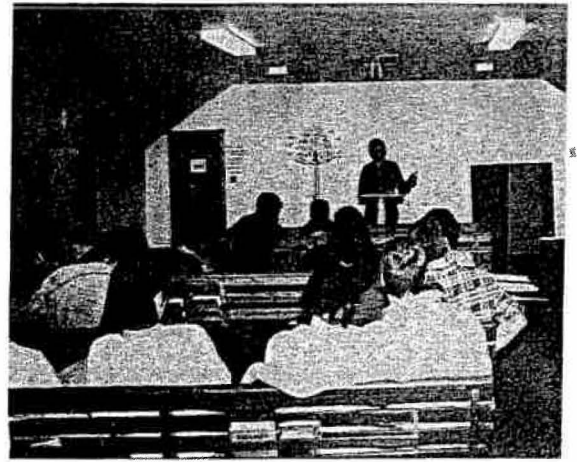

Follow the footprints and walk along with the students through their classes.



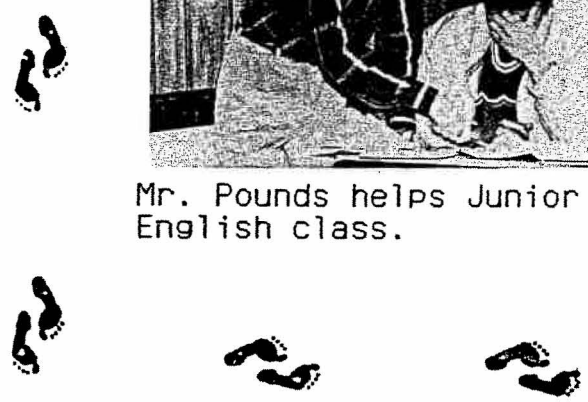

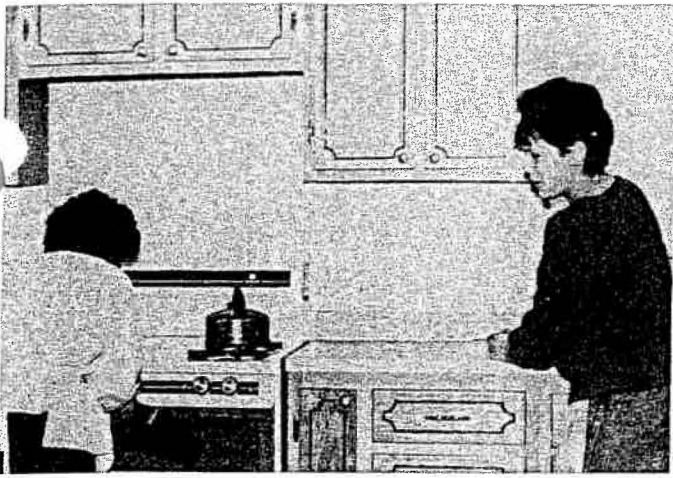

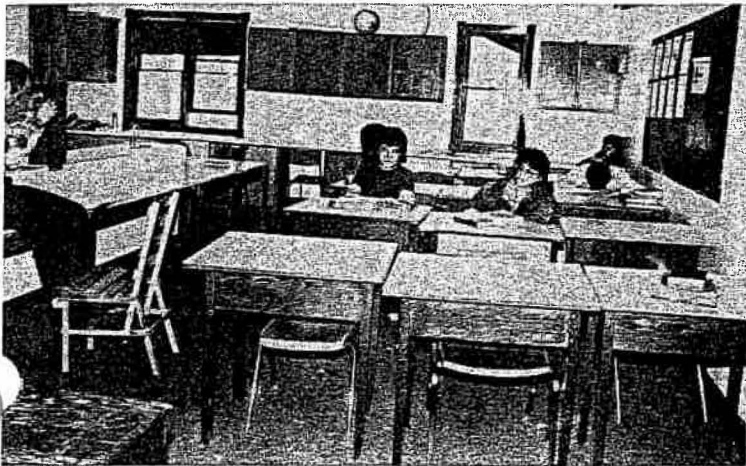

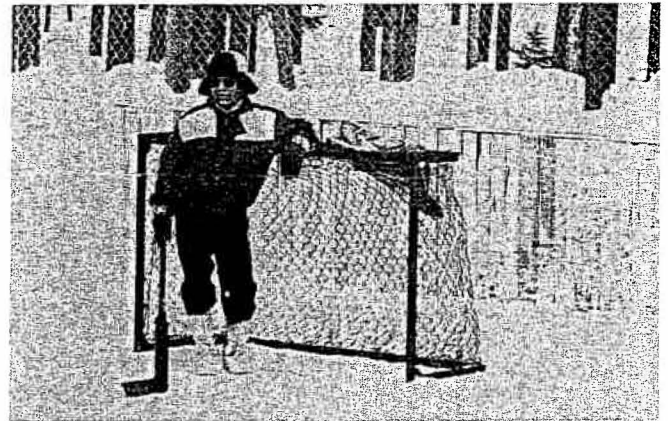
