

On Saturday, Bebruary 14, Reverend Father M.Landry, Principal of the Indian Residential School took his hockey team to the great Meadow Lake carnival. Although a telegram had invited our boys from 13 to 15 years of age to play a game with the Meadow Lake boys, all were surprised to realize that the Meadow Lake players outdid thom in size and age for the most part. The goal-keeper was 17 years old and five or six of the other players had already reached " sweet sixteen." Our team, on the other hand, had but one player aged sixteen; the others

were less than 15; two of them were only 12. No wonder they shook in their boots as they got ready in the cloak-room , for the big game.

Our players, under the expert direction of their coach, Reverend Brother Belanger, ... bravely accepted to meet their outstanding opponents; it was then that the whole crowd witnessed an unprecedented event. The Beauval fans won the victory with a score of 2-1; this does not, however, indicate their superiority. Forty minutes of the 60-minute game was played in the zone of the opponents.
