Because these poor people did not care at the beginning to lead an honest life, and finally they woke up in the bottom of the ditch. The other day my little Tiger was looking through the window to see what was going on in the street. There came two men who were not walking very straight. Their face, their clothes and their hair were a good indication that they had been throwing their honour with their bottle in the snow behind them. And that poor little cat was looking at them in such a funny way, as if he thought that they were visitors from the outer space, Mars or the Moon, because, according to him, men he saw on earth do not walk like that.

Now, my dear Children, when you meet some people like those two, do not humiliate them; have pity on them, pray for them in the bottom of your heart and ask God and His Blessed Mother to protect you and help you to lead an honest, good and honourable life.


