

We are now at the Eve of the . New Year, and Beauval Village has a skating rink of its own. No longer do you see children running to the river to clear a bit of ice for skating; no longer do you see others sneaking to the Indian School to risk a few minutes be proud of yourselves; you are not of skating while the inmates are busy. Today small boys and girls, as well as older ones, and even grown-ups can enjoy the thrill of skating right at home.

How did it all happen? We needed a leader, and he is now here after many long years of patient waiting. This dynamic organizer is Mr. Larry Landry. He got in touch with Mr. Neilly, D.N.R. from Ile a la Crosse, called a meeting and before we could realize it, we had a skating rink. And believe me, the people of Beauval deserve congratulations for their splendid spirit of co-operation.

A BINGO was soon organized and the outstanding sum of \$263.00 was raised to meet some of the expenses. Three weeks later, an Amateur Hour with basket social brought in another

outstanding sum of \$251.00. To this let us add a SHOW which brought in \$40.00 and some voluntary contributions, all of which gave the grand total of \$634.00. So you see that the word CO-OPERATION has a place of honor here. When one realizes that the settlement has a population of 500, one admires the family spirit which is found at Beauval.

The government, through their Recreational Program, gave us a grant of \$500.00, so we now face a one thousand dollar project. Is that not co-operation?

We are all aware that it will cost more than that amount to complete the project, but we are not worried for we know that we can always count on everyone in the community.

A BIG THANK YOU goes to everyone in the village, to our Pastor, Rev. Father Doyon, to the sisters, to the teachers, and to all those who have helped in one way or another, in getting the whole thing "popped up." 
