





We are glad to bring to the attention of our readers the following Hospitalization Plan sent to us by G. W. Myers, Executive Director Saskatchewan Hospital Services Plan.

HOSFITALIZATION FLAN GOES NORTH

The Saskatchewan Hospital Services Plan has been extended to the Northern areas of the province (L.I. D.A) on a voluntary basis, effective January 1, 1948. Registration and payment of hospitalization tax began on September 1. Every permanent resident of these areas is eligible.

The annual tax, the same as under the compulsory plan, is \$5 per person with a maximum of \$30 for a family

regardless of size.

In order to be eligible for benefits from January 1, persons must register and pay their tax by November 30, next. Any family owing \$20 or more and finding it difficult to pay the full tax by that date may pay in two installments—a minimum of \$15 now and the balance by May 31.

Note that all of the required part payment on family tax must be made before any member of the family can receive benefits.

Only one card will be issued to a ly. This will be made out in the name of the taxpayer, listing all dependents as beneficiaries.

Following are the benefits for persons who join the Plan, provided in-patient (bed) care is needed:

1. Public-Ward Accommodation with General Nursing Care. (Patient pays extra cost, of p private or semi-private ward or

special nurse.)
2. Use of Operating and Case Rooms.

- 3. Surgical Dressings and Casts. 4. Most Drugs and Medicines in General Use. These include standard vitamins and most glandular or endocrine extracts. (Some of the more recent, expensive drugs, vitamin compounds and blo d or plasma for transfusion are not included among benefits.)
- 5. Ansesthetic Agents (drug only) 6, X-Ray and Laboratory Examinations, X-Ray and Radium Treat-ments; Physiotherapy.

NOTE: Doctors' bills are NOT paid by the Hospital Services Plan: nor does the Plan cover out-patient services (services given to a person not occupying a bed.)

Saskatchewan beneficiaries are entitled to benefits when admitted as in-patients to an approved hospital in any other province or country,

with these limitations--that payment for any of the above-mentioned services is made up to an average maximum of \$4 a day and for a period not exceeding 60 days during any year. Any o'erges above this are borne by patients.

Newborn infants are entitled to free hospitalization during the remainder of the year for which the

mother's tax has been paid.

Join now and share in the hospitalization benefits.

Tax should be paid to the local field officer of the Department of Natural Resources.
