



The frequency I666 kilocycles is used the most. The purpose of the radio is to maintain continuous communication between mining companies at Goldfields and Stony Rapids and the outside. The radio is also used for weather reports for aircraft flying or about to take flight, and also for any other beneficial reasons. The call letters for this radio are X L B -56

Mr.Poisson has also made a reconnaissance trip to White Fish Lake, which is a part of his district. He travelled in the mission "cat", on that ever memorable voyage, we wrote about elsewhere on this paper.

Six men are out at work in hopes of building a winter road suitable for caterpillar or bombardier travel. The road beginning at La Loche will go as far north as Patterson Lake. It is hoped that this road will encourage trappers and fishermen to go to this new region for fur and fish. The road would then be used to transport supplies and these resources to and from this new region.



Each child in turn threw the line and every one had a "lucky bite" according to size and school merit.


All went home happy and well satisfied with the presents we owe to the kindness of those who know it is good totreceive but it
