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Father's Message

The school year at La Loche started on September 1st. The next day, Mr. Waugh, our administrator visited us. A serious problem was discussed with him.

The people of La Loche live mostly out of trapping, and as fur is getting quite scarce, a lot of them have to go North for a living. It is quite inconvenient that the men go alone and leave their family here. So it has been decided that we "will close the eyes" upon those who bring their family far North. We feel sorry that the children cannot attend school, but it seems that we cannot help it.

For these children and those of other villages as West La Loche, Garson Lake, Island Lake, a boarding school here would solve the problem but it is a project, which is not easy to realize. Nevertheless, we hope that some time in the future, it will become a reality.

The child whose Dad has his trapline at about a day's distance is not justified in staying in the bush. In such a case, men alone can go trapping and it is possible for the children to attend school. Parents who have the opportunity of having their children educated should not miss it, even if they have to make sacrifices for that. Their children will be thankful to them later on when they will be able to use what they have learned in school.

You, children, remember that it is your advantage to attend school, and it is your duty to behave and do the work you are asked to. Be good children, loyal to God, your neighbors and yourselves, obedient to your teachers when in school, and to your parents when at home. Man is dependent on God and His representatives. A child following only his own will is doing wrong and will never be happy, even in this world. In school you are taught how to be good christians and citizens. So may this school year, for all of you, not be a failure, but make you attain this goal.

NEW CHURCH AT LA LOCHE

The first visit of a missionary to La Loche was made in 1845 by Father Thibault. There was no village then. People spent winter in the bush where game and fur were easily found; in spring, traders would come and meet the H.B.C.'s barges in order to exchange their furs for merchandise. The people from the North come also for the same purpose. La Loche was the meeting place then. A portage of a dozen miles across which transportations had to be carried gave origin to the name of the place: Portage La Loche. This Northern route was the only one until 1885, but La Biche Lake prevailed afterwards.

Little by little, the Chipewyans

built log houses, Around 1870, it was heard of two small villages, one on the East side and the other on the the West. In the Province of Quebec competitions often arise when a site for a church has to be chosen. The same thing happened at La Loche when it was decided that the first church be built. Now one of the Fathers thought he had found a solution. At about the same distance between the two villages, the land stretched in a long wide point. It was eventually the chosen spot for the new chapel built in 1887, At first every one seemed to be pleased, but this satisfaction didn't last. Father came twice from Ile-ala-Crosse to preach a mission, but

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in the following visits, he went to to the two villages, said mass in a private house, and then the chapel was abandoned. This was the first

chapel.

In 1893 after a great many discussions as to the site of the church it was decided that two churches would be built. The people from the East side started immediately squaring logs while the people from the West didn't do anything; so the building in the East was opened on September 1894. This was the second church.

In 1895 La Loche became residence. Father Penard who had been going on missions there for five years became a resident priest and remained until 1917, if we except a three

year stage at Ile-a-la-Crosse.

In 1918 the growing population called for a larger church (70x30). Father Ducharme was then the Directo tor of the mission. The following year he had 500 logs and other pieces ready. In 1920 the Chipewyans, under Father Ducharme's direction, raised up the framework; in 1922 Brother Nicolas came to try his skill as a carpenter, and on Trinity Sunday 1923 the new church

was inaugurated, the third one at La Loche.

In 1951, on a pastoral visit of Bishop Lajeunesse, the subject of construction was again brought about. The present church with its log base was not very solid. On certain windy days it wasn't wven safe to remain within its walls, in spite. of the strong supports fastened to it on either side. Besides, the heating was a problem in very cold days, and on feast days it had become too small. Consequently the construction of a new church 80x36 with 14x10 transepts, a 6x24 porch and a 14x24 sacristy was proposed. The mission sawmill would supply the necessary lumber. As for other materiels we were to rely on our benefactors' generosity. His Excellency approved the project. In the winter of 1952 the brothers and a f few helpers spent the greatest part of their time in cutting lumber. On May 7, 1953 when Brother Boisvert arrived, all the necessary boards and planks were on hand, and immediately the building of the church got under way.

The three brothers and seven to eight men with saw and hammer in

hand seemed to work under pressure so much so that in two months, a "ton" of nails had been driven in. It goes to say that it is solid, and that it will stand all kinds of weather. The basement is now equip with a furnace. Brick sidings cover the exterior walls while Tentest will be used for the interior. The blue asphalt-covered roof gives a good appearance to the building. (Opinions differ on that point however). But all agree that the highpointing steeple is lovely. It is covered with aluminum and can be seen from far by moonlight as well as by daylight. In short we have a beautiful church. On July26, feast of St. Ann, the first mass was celebrated in thanksgiving to Providence for having given us the means of erecting this temple. We also prayed for the intentions of all those who have helped in any way to the achievement of that great project. A good number of our people received Holy Communion on that occasion.

Thus the fourth church is built at La Loche. The interior is not completed yet, but it is already suitable. We hope to see it finished by the end of winter. We are confident rhat Brother Boisvert with the help of the Brothers here will continue what he has so well begun.
