However, the trip back did not prove so delightful. After the girl had been well tucked into the sled, Father and Jean Marie had to run behind all the way back.

In spite of the fatigue of the night, Father was in the chapel the next morning to say Mass.

When the news came out about Father's mercy trip to West La Loche, every one couldn't help but to admire once more the great devotedness and endurance at all times of our missionary priests.

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


