

"attain the enjoyment of His happiness in heaven."


In the silence of our eloquent wilderness this prayer is often repeated by all the missionaries for the souls they have come to serve and for the dear ones at home.

CONSERVATION CORNER

Now that old man winter has turned the deep-freeze on, and the fishermen are pulling their nets through holes in the frozen lakes, it is time to give some thought to the selling of these fish.

Commercial fishing in Saskatchewan is a million dollar business
and thousands of people make at
least part of their living from it.
The better the market is for these
fish, the better will be their
living. In the past few years
steps have been taken to make a
better market for fish. This has
been done through better laws, to
control the handling of fish, and
for making fish packing and filleting plants cleaner. More people
are now eating fish because the
fish they buy are better to eat.

But all this can be changed just by selling poor fish. The fisherman himself can either keep the market good, or let it get bad just by the fish he sells.

Fish should be treated, and handled, as <u>food</u>. They should be carefully dressed, the insides should be taken out and scraped with a spoon, and the gills should be taken out. Fish tubs should be washed and kept clean, and the fish should not be left on the ground where they will get dirty, and the dogs might chew them.

When fishing in summer, the fish should be kept cool, and out of the sun. They should be sold as soon as possible after they are caught. In winter they should be frozen, unless they are to be sold fresh. Even then if they are not picked up in a few days they should be frozen.

The main thing to remember when caring for fish, is that they are food for people, and should be kept clean, and free from spoilage. It is up to the fisherman to sell good fish if he wants more money for his fish.
