October 26.


On the feast of the apostles Simon and Jude, a successor to Pius XII was elected. The new Pope chose the name of John XXIII.

FISHING SEASON



Mr. Philip Wolverine from Patuanak spent three weeks here visiting with his friends.


Four teachers from Ile a la Crosse literally dropped down and




