

TRIBUTE TO FATHER POCHAT


A gentle wind was blowing from the west. The cold brisk morning had arrived. Father Pochat was leaving us.

GRANDIN COLLEGE STUDENTS' COUNCIL



INITIATION




SWIMMING



LOUIS RIEL - HERO OR LUNATIC?

Louis Riel, known as a metis, was really mainly French with Indian and Irish ancestors. The question of whether he was a hero or a lunatic will be answered but first I would like to tell you about Louis Riel as a person. It appears he had quite a variety of characteristics.

Firstly, among the metis he held great prestige thus as a leader he was politically strong. Religiously, he was nearly obsessed as he changed his name to Louis David Riel for purely religious reasons and before he died he stated he had talked to angels. As a result of this, his priest announced him incapable of making the right decisions and accepted him back to the Catholic church from which he had been excommunicated.

Riel was youthful, idealistic and vigorous. He was politically minded and in public he proved articulate, intelligent and courageous. His own opinion of himself was that he saw himself as a prophet destined to lead the "new nation" to freedom. He thought he would divide the west among the Catholic nationalities of Europe and he would destroy England, Canada, Rome and the Pope. He foresaw far into the future. Thus, this was Riel, a political theorist and a revolutionary leader.

Riel was responsible for two rebellions, the first of which was in 1869. The territorial rights of the Hudson Bay Company were transferred to the Dominion of Canada. This created a great deal of uneasiness among the Metis as they feared that their land titles would be ignored and also the Metis saw in Confederation extinction of their own free wild way of life. They wanted their right to self-government safe-guarded. Because of this, Riel organized the Metis National Committee in order to prevent MacDougal, a new governor, from entering Fort Garry, now known as Winnipeg. They turned the governor back at the American frontier, then captured Fort Garry where a convention was held which passed a bill of rights.

Following this, Riel set up a provisional government, appointing himself as president. This government was attacked twice by the English speaking settlers of the vicinity and both times the settlers were defeated. This is when Riel made his first big mistake. He had Thomas Scott, an Orangeman from Ontario, executed. Racial and religious animosity flamed up amongst Scott's fellowmen. As a result, English speaking Canada was now bitterly against Riel.

The Canadian government sent out Colonel Garnet to free Fort Garry from Riel and his followers. Riel knew he was outnumbered so he decamped from Fort Garry. This was the end of his first rebellion.

In 1873, he became a dominant member of Parliament but as he feared for his life he did not sit in the House. A year later he was expelled from the House but he got himself re-elected in the same year. Finally in 1875, Parliament outlawed Riel from his seat and exiled him for five years, making it illegal for him to participate in Politics in the House of Parliament.

From 1879 to 1884 he lived in Montana and in 1885 he returned to Canada. The Metis asked him to come back so that he could lead them to win redress for the wrongs that had been done to them. Thus began Louis Riel's second and final rebellion.

The Canadian Militia attacked his rebel government which was set up down river from Saskatoon at a place called Batoche. Riel's uprising was crushed after hard fighting and in May, 1885, he surrendered. He was placed on trial, his defense lawyer pleading insanity. Strangely enough, Riel, in his own address in court, stated that he was not insane. His trial dragged on and his sentence was suspended twice. Riel's trial became purely political eventually.

Riel was a Frenchman and because of this he became symbolic of the rapidly receding hopes for a French Canada, a bilingual Canada in the West. Naturally French Canada was of the opinion that Riel receive mercy from the courts. English speaking Canadians wanted revenge for Thomas Scott's death. Thus they felt Riel deserved to be hung. The opinion for execution was strongest, unfair as it was. Riel was really on trial for Scott's death rather than his charge for treason.

Sir John A. MacDonald realized that if he commuted Riel's sentence he would lose more seats in Ontario than he would gain in Quebec. MacDonald made the decision all of Riel's enemies had made long ago. Louis Riel was hung November 16th, 1885.

During his life he had been a hero to the Metis. He had been their sign of hope for the future and their security. To the French he represented a bilingual West and a French Canada. He had created a strong political force and because of his first rebellion, Manitoba became Canada's fifth province. He even managed to become a member of Parliament.

In his second rebellion he had reopened the question of the Canadian Northwest. Unfortunately, at this point, the whites had turned against him. When the Canadian Militia acted as a force against Riel's second rebellion and they defeated Riel, it gave Canada as a nation, heart. Many things had been going wrong for Canada but this victory brought about a feeling of confidence for her future.

As a result of his death, Canada's opinion became divided on the basis of racial antipathy and MacDonald lost his votes in Quebec. His death was the signal for a fierce outburst of Racialism in Quebec and Ontario which nearly managed to overthrow the Conservative Government.

In my opinion Louis Riel was a hero to his people. He was a hard working man with a great deal of energy, spirit and emotion. What he accomplished was certainly not that of a mad man. I cannot believe for one second that his people would follow the path of a lunatic.

In conclusion, I would like to say this. Whether he was a patriot or a scoundrel, sane or insane can be dismissed with the observation that there is a little of each in all men.

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
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
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
