

But we will find a more meaningful happiness. The truth is that happiness in the sense of total gratification is not a state to which man can aspire. It is for the birds but not for us.






Etudions ensemble les responsabilités et les vertus réclamées par la noble mais exigeante tâche de l'instituteur ou de l'institutrice.

### HOW THE SCHOOL BOARD FUNCTIONS.

Yesterday, our teacher, sister G. Michaud invited a very interesting person to our room. Mr. Van de Walle came to talk on the function of the School Board in the Sturgeon School Division. I will write a summary of what he said.

The Sturgeon School Division consists of fourteen centers, six small ones and eight large ones of which Legal is the largest.

The trustee for our rural area is Mr. C. Clément and our Legal village school is ably represented by Mr. Walter Van de Walle. Other members of the school board are: Mr. Jenkins as chairman, Mr. Flynn as secretary, Mr Borle and Mr. Wilson. These members have many duties such as dealing with teachers' salaries and providing bus transportation for pupils. A new board member is elected every year and serves for three years.

The four main aspects of good education are: moral, intellectual, social and spiritual. To educate one child it costs four hundred dollars a year. Half of the expences are paid by the tax payment the rest by the government.


## OUR CORRESPONDENCE
