## "EDUCATION AND PROGRESS"

What is education? Many people have written about it and many more will probably write about this varied subject. I, as an Indian student, will try and put forth what I am "wise to" about education. The dictionary (Thorndike Barnhart) meaning for education is "the knowledge and abilities developed through teaching and training". I think we are educated for primarily three purposes.

Firstly, "Life is like licking honey from a thorn", as O.W. Holmes puts 1t. Without "knowing the ropes" in this fast-changing, complex world, we haven't got a chance. We must be prepared, after spending so many years in school to enter into a decent field of living. Right now, I just can't go out and make $\$ 6,000.00$ a year. It is quite obvious why I can't do this. Man does not live on knowledge alone but on knowledge and experience. Achievement is gained only by one per cent inspiration and ninty-nine per cent perspiration. A lot of practical-minded students leave school because they are in a hurry to start on their own. Those who lure away these normal half-scholars are grave Philanthropists. On the other hand, many students are not suited for college and are compelled to go on. Just remember, the best education is that which is best fitted to the needs of the individual concerned.

Secondly, education must fit us to be citizens of a democracy. No one is more interested in education than a dictator. He doesn't want people to be educated. He wants obedient tools-low browed, uniformed citizens. This is why education is the cheapest defence of a free nation. It is better to have lean peace than fat victory. The government spends much money on education, as can be seen right in our own school; yet in return the interest is all they receive because we keep the principal. Let us all cease being half-scholars and be better informed about the administration of our school, our reserve, and our country.

Thirdly, the object of education is the formation of a good character. Just think how exasperating it would be to have character with no education; they must go together. There is one dangerous trend of thought, especially among Indian students; some sincerely believe that schooling is a liability rather than an asset. This is a pestilence to our reserve. If we must have a weakness, let it be amiable. The Reserve wants people who are capable of thinking about their problems and who have high qualities of character and mind as well as of body. We even need education play basketball or to bowl properly.

The chief purpose of an education is to make a person take advantage of his opportunities. Yes, the government has a duty to educate us but we also have a duty to educate ourselves. Every young man or woman need not have a rock-bed foundation, which is impossible, but they must have certain qualifications to have a decent job. We can learn through many media, also by experience; however, "experience is a good school, but the fees are high". T.H. Huxley. Why not use all the books, pamphlets and newspapers lying around and educate ourselves. This is what we lack, especially the Indian women. Some use these readable materials for other purposes. Why waste your opportunities? Thousands in Europe and the Orient starve in order to buy one single book. It is an accepted fact that the more you are "in the know" about things, the better off and happler you are. Brains are like muscles, they both get flabby without use. So remember, you can bring water (education) to the horse (people) but what are you to do if the horse is not thirsty? The present Indian population should try and be one step ahead of their previous generation.

Education enables us to make decent livings, to be loyal citizens of, and assets to, our country, to build character, and to lead fuller, better lives,
