





On November 20th, His Excellency, Bishop Dumouchel came to visit the classes. He urged us to work hard as we were two months late to start school and a great deal of


work lay ahead.

The first Teachers' Institute of the Meadow Lake and Battleford Agencies was held in the Fall of November 15, at Meadow Lake, Sask.

We from Beauval Indian Residential School started off bright and early on a drive of approximately 98 miles. After a two hour drive, we finally arrived at our destination; only to find that the meeting was well under way.

Two groups were formed. Those of the Intermediate group went their way to discuss the results of their Gates Tests, which had been given at the beginning of

the school year.

Miss enns, a well informed reading consultant from the University of Saskatchewan, led the Primary group into a discussion of the ways and means in teaching the youngsters how to begin to read. Many of the teachers took this opportunity to tresent their problems. It was the general feeling in the gr group, that Indian children beginning school were too shy to communicate in any form whatsoever. It was also felt that it was always a problem to initiate a beginner from his everyday experiences at home; to that, of regulated atmosphere of school activities. But, with the teacher's patience and whole-hearted interest in the matter the child will no doubt prosper. On the whole, the morning session with Miss Enns was a very worthwhile event.

The two groups adjourned at II:30 for the noon hour break.

Meeting resumed at I:00. At this period the two groups
changed rooms.We, the Primary teachers, were now under the guidance of a gentleman who thouroughly explained to us the procedures of testing in the primary level. After a most interesting discussion on the testing program our group was enthusiastically respited by a lively panel on the subject of teaching beginners to speak English. The group led by Reverend Cuthand brought to our attention an ideal set-up of a well prepared panel discussion. The talks each panelist gave was very instructive. I'm sure everyone present was more than pleased to jot down a few excellent ideas which were so colorfully presented to us. Questions and answers were exchanged at the end of the talks. It was a joy to have gained some knowledge from our experienced teacher panelists.

The meeting ended at 3:30. And so, on behalf of our teachers at Beauval I.R.S. I wish to extend our sincere thanks to the planning committee for a well spent afternoon at the Institute. I'm sure everyone enjoyed himself in more ways than one on that particular day aside from trading new cars and what not.

I also wish to take this opportunity to wish everyone, near and far, a Merry Christmas and a Prosperous New

Year.

On December 17th, the boys gave a very pleasant evening programme in honor of Sister Alvina Beaudet. The concert consisted of Christmas carols, a jig and a song accompained by a guitar. This year, we have three hockey leagues for the boys. The Senior league, the junior league and the Wee Wee league. Two teams compete in the Senior league while the two other leagues are composed of four teams each. The three leagues have a complete sched schedule of 48 games to be played this winter and interest is kept high by the keeping of the standings and the scoring race

in every league.

The new look this winter is provided by the coaches and presidents of the different leagues who are all playing for the Warriors. This is a great advantage for all. It provides the senior boys with an opportunity to lead boys and it takes the pressure off the supervisors. Thus, the boys play more often since the supervisor doesn't have to be there for every game. Another great advantage is that all the advices and hockey tips given to the Warriors during their regular practices are transmitted to the smaller boys by the Warriors themselves. By coaching the others, the members of our senior team see a lot of their own mistakes in the junior boys' games and they try to avaid them after.

The other surprise is the fact that all goalies are rather young boys. We feel that this system will ensure us of first class goalies for our big team in the future.

This winter the Beauval Warriors, pride of the school since many years, are suffering heavily from the loss of their former stars who left us for high school. In our two first games with Ile a la Crosse, we won and lost. We took the first game on our ice by the score of 6-2 but lost the second on the road 4-2 although we had complete advantage of the play during the whole game. We outshotted the Ile a la Crosse team by some fifty to six shots but we lost. The Ile a la Crosse goalie must be praised for this. This first Ile a la Crosse victory in years should mean interesting contests between the two teams for the entire winter.

However, since there is quite a difference of age and weight between our team and their, we are far from being ashamed. Depending on the games to be played after Christmas, we might have to limit our opponents age to sixteen since all our boys are fourteen & fifteen and quite a few are only twelve or eleven. We wouldn't like to do this but in the other hand, we feel that it is not fair for our boys to bring them somewhere else and play only our first line all the time. The purpose of these games is still to provide activities for the greatest number of boys and we intend to ice our three lines in the coming games even though we might have to play against Midget teams only.

We seem to be facing a very interesting season even though the shortage of hockey sticks provided by the Department may be felt in the coming weeks. Without a gymnasium, all our winter activities are on the ice and experience tells us that our winters

are quite long up here ...

We sang for the sick people of St. Joseph's hospital at Ile a la Crosse on Sunday December 15th. We previously sang at benediction the same day.

We provided entertainment on Sister Alvina Beaudet's Night with Christmas carols and other songs.

We gave a half-hour Christmas concert for the population of Buffalo Narrows at sdvancement Hall on Wednesday December 18th.

We recorded a half-hour program to be heard on C.K.S.A.

radio station Lloydminster on Christmas Day.

This could not have been achieved without the fine spirit of cooperation and team work found in Beauval this year. So, many sincere thanks to Father Principal a music lover, and to Sister Superior and Sister Blanche Lemire, Mr. George Bunz, Sister Alvina Beaudet and Sister Alice Carrier, our devoted musician, without forgetting the boys themselves who practice during their hours of recess.

It is to show us this direction that Jesus was born, many years ago, on a Silent and Holy Night....

For the first time in my life, I saw real garter snakes this summer. One was shot by a 22 on the head.




Our snakes up North are not poisonous; in fact, they are helpful as they eat insects that eat our gardens; however, i must admit they give us a creepy feeling even if they are




Reverend Father:
