

FIRST CATHOLICS OF LAKE ST JOSEPH: (This article has been written for the Vigwam by one of our missionary Fathers who has spent many years on the Indian Missions of Canada.)

Since the early days of 1914 I had aften heard the Indians of Wepigen, guides of the surveyors and tour ists, speak of the numerous abandonned Indiane of Lake Scul and St Joseph. This news inspired me to visit them and findout if anything could be done for their souls. While travelling for my we missions I had to spend the night with the paster of Graham who told me what a Hudson Bay Co. Manager had said to him. This man, though a protestant, said that he wished a Catholic priest would visit them, as he felt cer-tain that a pricat could do some-

thing with these Indians. With Rev Fr Previncial's sanction I prepared for such a trip, buying a cance, a tent, and pre-visions for a month and a balf. I left Nipigen in the early part of July and get off the C.P.R. at Hudson, a few miles from Lake Seal. As the country was completely unknown to me I had to look a-bout for a guide. I succeeded in getting a half-breed, a good guide, as guides go, but one who seemed to have the defects of his kind, and whe, incidentally forget to see the priest when being married. Every one who knew this man pitied me as

his travelling companion.

We started Worth into the wilderness; two days were spent at Frenchman's Head, at the southern end of take Seul, and then with the help of a young Indian we made for Lake St Joseph (Osnaberg, Port. . H.B. Co.) about 145 miles farther on. The trouble on the journey was to conserve our provisions wisely; as it is very heavy to carry a great deal across portages we just took what was necessary for an absence of 2 weeks. Unfertunately the bucon and ham were no good, because we were Surfeited with it. I suggested that we economize on this, and my suggestion drew forth a tirade from my doughy guide, Patrick. As he sould speak French and English as well as Indian I proposed that he that he present his compliments in French in so that the young Indians with us would not be scandalized. He finished his speech by telling me that he would abandon us, but, alas, he had no canse to go back.

On the first day, in spite of a heavy contrary wind, we paddled about 40 or 45 males; I may" We", because I had to do it, though not used to this stroneous exercise. As soon as 1 lifted my paddle everything stopped -- nothing of this sort daunted me, because I kept in mind that those souls must be paid for ix by these hardships. Evening came, so ps pitched camp and tried to fish, but could not catch any, so we took a well deserved rest. The next day found us paddling under a secreting sun and crossing portages, infested with mosquitoes. When we reached the head of Lake St Joseph a burnt portage was our only place to camp and to spend the Sunday. As I did not want, for the sake of edification, to paddle on this day, I decided on a pause on our journey. My guides spent the entire day gambling their meagre wages. I said Mass under the tent, and tried to rest but this was impossible, owing to the heat and the swarms of mosquitees.

Burly Honday morning we were on the alert, for the end of our journey was close at hand. We get away at a good hour and about 5 in the afternoon we met some Indians, coming from Cat Lake about 100 miles to the North of Lake St Joseph. They asked my famous guide who was known to them all, who I might be as they had never seen a priest. "He is my priest", he replied in an autheritative voice. As this party was rather large, we decided to camp near them and have a chat with them before we reached the reserve, but I paid for my during when they naw my guides making "banak", that is Indian bread... This sight inspired them to ask for flour to be given in exchange for fish as they had not tasted any bread for a year. After supper I invited all these good Indians, all non-Catholics, to come and hear me. To my great edification every one came, holding a small white cotton bag centaining a Bible.

Next morning after hass we packed our equipment and betook ourselves to the canoe for the last lap of the jour ney. Shortly after this we reached the Reserve and I landed at the Chief's House where I met his Highness and ked permission to camp on the Reserve This request was readily granted. By guides left me alone, and hastened the H.B.Co store across the lake. (In the April issue the Wigwam will ve the missionary Pather's account of his sojourn in this far northern coat

About 7 of this number died; these had to be carried out and hastily burried with little or no ceremony. Fortunately the 2 Scholastics escaped the flue, although several of the Brothers were sick with it. Fr Gamache declares that that experience in his life is one that will never be forget-
