SPANISH NEWS

The Scholastics who spent the summer with us were Fathers Barker, Cunningham, Bathurst and Devine. All regretted to see them depart as the vacation spirit was largely due to them. The boys had fifteen picnics during the summer, and garnered sixty seven baskets of blueberries. Fifty boys remained for the summer. Every Sunday afternoon during July and August the boys enjoyed a swim at Aird Island. Father McManus of Toronto gave the closed retreat at the convent; also the retreat to the ladies of St. Joseph's convent. Father James McGarry, newly ordained priest, spent a few days with us. He arrived on Aug. 22. Solemn High Mass at 10 O'clock; Father McGarry Celebrant; Father Superior Deacon; Father Dwyer Sub Deacon. At 7.30 P.M. a concert was given in his honour. Mr. P. Marion the second Prefect arrived a few weeks before the boys returned from their summer holidays. Class began on the 2nd of Sept. much to the relief of the prefects if not to the pupils. Brother O'Keefe, Mr. Wm. McGrath, and Mr. R. Surtees are the teachers for the coming year. After the early Mass Aug. 27th Fathers Cunningham and Dwyer, and Mr. G. Labelle set sail in the "Garnier" for Wickwemikong and Little Current to bring the boys of Manitoulin Island back to school. Father T. Dwyer is stationed at Wickwemikong this year; he is studying the Indian language. Father Flaherty returned to Spanish on route to Montreal. During the return journey from Wickwemikong the thirty five boys received a hair cut despite the rolling of the waves. Brother Manseau and his painters have been busy with their brushes in the dormitory and Infirmary. Brother Vandermere and a few boys have been confined to their beds for a few weeks, but are well on the way to recovery; due to the diligent care of Brother Manseau.

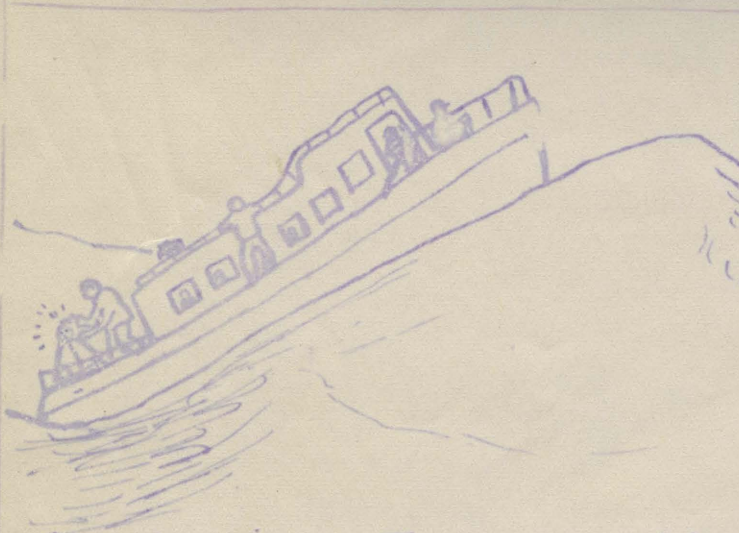

To Fathers Swenton,Boylan and McGarry we extend our heartfelt congratulations,and express the hope that many fruitful years await them in The Ministry.

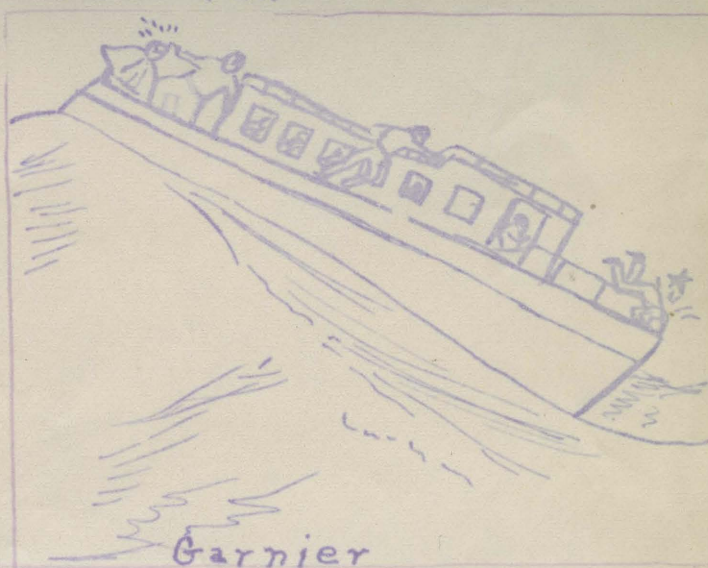

Operations on the Septic Tank

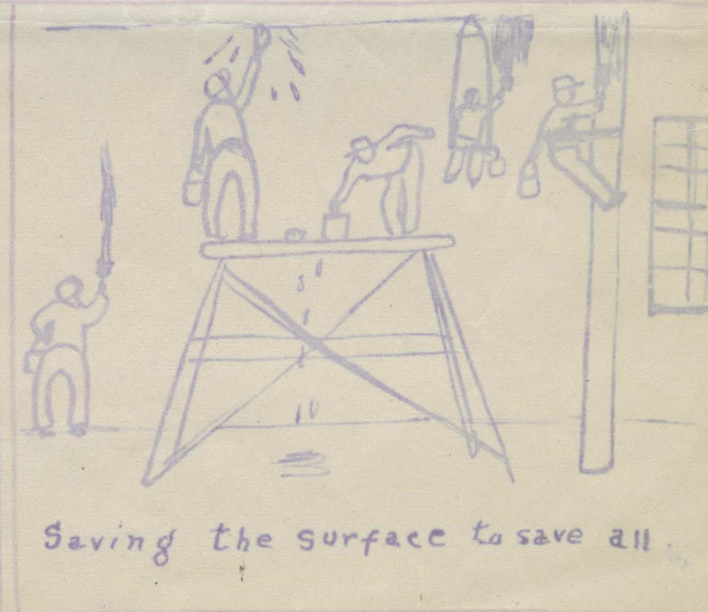
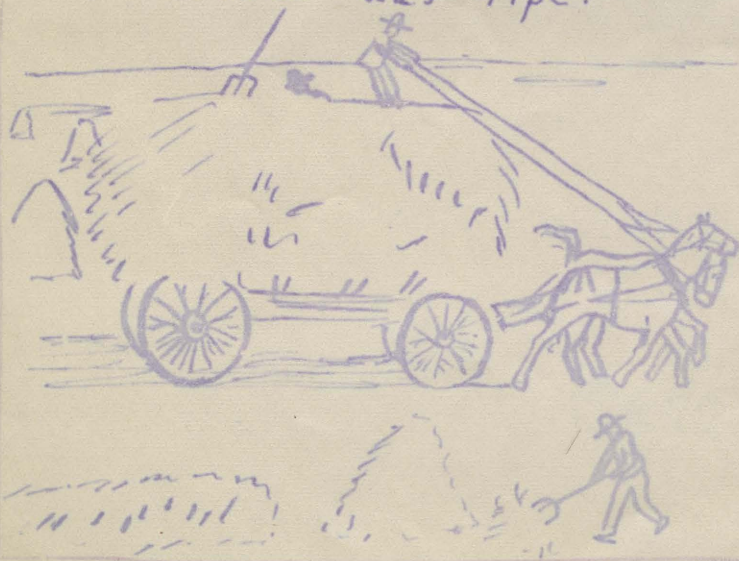

Reverend Father Provincial arrived on Oct. 24th for his annual visit.

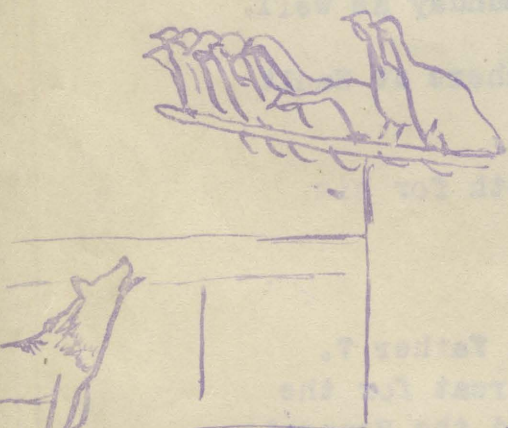

We are grateful indeed to The Mission Academy for sending us two Rugby footballs; also for the funny papers.

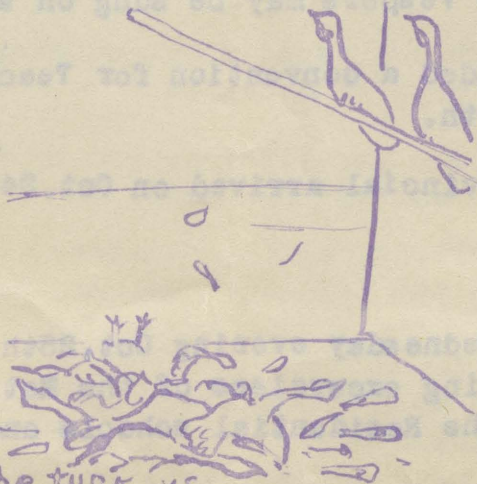
