Mrs. Monteith referred to news of the Royal Family, touching briefly on the visit last year of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip, and more recently, of the birth of Prince Andrew.

She told the delegates that at that time Mrs. F. H. Reid, secretary-treasurer of the Little Helpers, had sent good wishes to the new prince from the thousand of Little Helpers in the diocese.

Mrs. Monteith extended warm thanks to the combined auxiliaries in North Bay, St. John's, St. Brice's, and Christ Church, for their hospitality. She added it was most fitting that this year, the 75th anniversary of the founding of the WA, the diocesan conference should be held at the church to which the oldest branch in the diocese is located.

"The service of holy communion this morning gave us the opportunity to humbly thank God for His great blessing upon our work," the speaker continued. "We thank the Lord Archbishop and the members of the clergy for their assistance in our services."

## ARCHBISHOP'S LETTER

# Diocesan Extension Fund Is Reviewed

My dear People:

The regular quarterly meeting of the Executive Committee of the Diocese of Algoma, was held in Sault Ste. Marie on May 10th. Excellent reports were presented and the majority of the Committee were in attendance.

The highlight of the meeting was the discussion of the Archbishop Wright Church Extension Fund and the progress which has been made through the generosity of our Algoma family during the past three or four years. It was heart-warming to learn of the number of new churches, parish halls, and rectories, which have been erected to God's glory through the generosity of all the parishioners. Approximately \$370,000 has already been received in cash on the original pledge total of \$500,000.

The Executive Committee have in good faith authorized advances of \$566,000 in the conviction that all parishes will contribute one hundred per cent on their pledges. Accord-

ingly the Executive Committee are reluctant to authorize further loans until the diocese has consolidated its position. This means that congregations who are privileged to worship in their new churches are obligated to make regular payments on the loans to them from the Extension Fund, so that additional money will be available for further extension work. It also means that parishes who have made pledges are asked to redouble their efforts in fulfilling their original obligations to the Extension Fund. Thus the diocese will be relieved of the heavy cost of interest charges in carrying loans at the Bank.

It has been a romantic story of faith and generosity on the part of loyal members of the diocese, and we give thanks to God for the wonderful response. Our readers of the Algoma Anglican will be delighted to know that the contributions made to the Extension Fund have given opportunities for hundreds of families in new areas to worship in their own Anglican Church.

I therefore urge all clergy and laity of the diocese to make an intensive effort now and during this coming Autumn to join in the diocesan-wide crusade to fulfill the original pledges and to meet the spiritual opportunities which are still before us. We cannot and must not expand our diocesan responsibilities too far afield until such time as our financial obligations are fulfilled.

This letter may appear to contain much financial data but its contents are really sacramental in character. The magnificent response from the diocese towards this worthy objective is the outward and visible sign of the zeal and devotion of those faithful members of the Church who are Christ's followers.

May God richly bless you all and bring you to the realization of the immediate challenge before us at the present time.

# 'Need This Year Is Refugee Problem'

## Mary Rendell Guest Speaker At Conference

NORTH BAY — "The Woman's Auxiliary has kept alive and grown from small beginnings to what it is now because it has had God's blessing," Miss Mary Rendell, executive secretary of the Dominion Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, told approximately 175 delegates to the Diocesan Conference held in North Bay.

"What it is that God has sent the Church to do, we must help do it," she said. "Surely our program must reflect our purpose. If all the things we do when we come together do not reflect our purpose, then how are people to believe in us?" she asked. "Is our program a true reflection of our purpose?"

The WA must be a true part of church life, not just an isolated unit, she said. "Today, if we are to fulfill our place in the life of the Church, we have to be sure to be involved in church life."

Members of the WA cannot rely only on the statistics of membership and giving when they attempt to see if the WA is growing in the way it should, said Miss Rendell. The only way this can be gauged is by seeing "whether or not you seize the opportunities you get, and whether you see the needs as they come along and respond to them. The need this year is the refugee problem!" she said. "We should respond to this need as it comes and not just repeat what we did last year."

"In an anniversary year, we should stop and consider what the Auxiliary is," pointed out Miss Rendell. "We need to say what it is." The WA exists for the sake of its members in that it helps each one fulfill herself and her duty to God, she said. It also exists for the sake of others. "Our perspective has to include children of our own church, those people who are neighbors but not friends, and to the Indians, immigrants and all the world."

"The WA is not an auxiliary to the church, but of the church," Miss Rendell said. "We should be helpers and encouragers. It makes so much difference in many things."

ladies that they would begin Thursday's sessions with a quiet hour conducted by Archbishop Wright.

"This quiet hour will give us time to ponder our responsibilities as church women," she stated. "And to evaluate our attitudes to others around us. The presence of the archbishop and Mrs. Wright gives the members a chance to express their gratitude to them for their support and help."

The Dominion Board has introduced a plan to mark the 75th anniversary of the WA. A conference of Juniors' and Girls' secretaries will be held at Qu'Appelle, April 16, 1962, and from this conference will come the future pattern for leadership training.

Mrs. Monteith referred to the election of the new primate in September, 1959, extending good wishes to him from the diocesan WA and their constant loyalty.

"World Refugee Year is being observed this year," she continued. "We can't begin to believe the anguish of the refugees. Our primate has set up a special fund to help these people. It is our duty to do whatever we can to set these heart-breaking conditions right."

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## Church Must Be Brave Enough To Help Indians Integrate

NORTH BAY — "We should not attempt to integrate Indians into the rest of the population too quickly," Archdeacon Ahab Spence, Bishop's Commissary for the Diocese of Saskatchewan and a Cree Indian himself, told delegates to the 75th anniversary meeting of the Anglican Women's Auxiliary of St. John's Parish hall.

"Let's not go at integration too quickly," he said. "I do not think that human life is something that can be readjusted overnight — it must come from the heart."

### WORLD ISOLATION

The Indian today is more in the national conscience than at any time, said Father Spence. "I do not know if this is from a feeling of guilt or a result of Refugee Year, but people are looking for more information about the Indian."

The whole idea of the world is becoming smaller, he said, and the world isolation or reserva-

tion is beginning to be a symbol of the past.

"With the disappearance of small, isolated prairie towns, a sense of interdependence is growing, both in the communities and in the world."

Because of the impact of civilization on the reservations, there have been significant reactions, said Father Spence. At present in the reservations, "there is a sense of confusion and turmoil with all that is going on. The Indian child today is reaching a crucial stage. The next 10 years will be a challenging age for him."

Of the seven reservations in the Diocese of Saskatchewan, Father Spence believes that only one of these is even partially ready for integration. For this to take place, he said, laws are necessary, and regulations essential, but it has to go deeper than that.

The whole policy of the church must be brave enough, bold en-

ough, and able to change to help the Indian with the idea of readjusting, said Father Spence. "We are fortunate in having teachers of the Anglican faith on our reservations. We need these teachers — they can do so much to calm this storm of the advance of civilization."

"We have people on the reservations who are on the fringe of civilization," he said. "Since there is no work on the reservations, they go to the white communities to work. Try to look at it (integration) from this point of view," he urged delegates. "If an Indian decides to leave the reservation, he signs papers and is given the magnificent sum of \$50. He then cannot go back to the reservation, and is never too sure of his job in the white community. I am pleading with you not to try to do this too fast."

### TOO MUCH DISTINCTION

Although Indians are proud of their ancestry, there is a danger of making too much distinction between the Indian and the white, pointed out Father Spence. "Sometimes I feel we use this 'Indian' idea too strongly — we have Indian hospitals and Indian schools. We emphasize the 'Indian' too much."

Father Spence was introduced by Mrs. A. E. Minchin, of Powassan, and thanked by Mrs. F. Nock, of Sault Ste. Marie.

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# BENEDICT

Most of us have had our childhood thoughts and visions of angels; lovely fairy-like beings with golden hair, shimmering wings, and long white dresses, appearing in a blaze of glowing light. Perhaps we have dreamlike memories of hearing the fluttering of their wings, or of seeing the grass move softly as they pass by. But many of us have put the angels away in a box along with our dolls and teddy bears (though we may look back on them at times with something like home - sickness, and wish it had all been true).

Yet, we can't read the Bible without finding a great deal about angels, and, since we believe the Scriptures, we surely must accept the fact that there really are angels. But what are they like? How can our childhood belief become an adult belief? In this, as in all things, the Scriptures will teach us. We will learn to see angels as strong, glorious beings of indescribable beauty, whose lives are given to the worship of God and the service of Man.

The writings of the Old Testament Prophets, and the Book of Revelations, are full of word pictures of the worship of the angels in heaven, how they bless the Lord and praise Him and magnify Him. Here we can find inspiration for our own worship of Him. And in nearly all the books of the Bible we find stories

of angels being sent by God to help men, as messengers and "ministering spirits." We find them comforting, strengthening, prophesying, punishing, warning, encouraging, teaching, healing, guiding.

In Isaiah 6:3, we hear the angels crying "Holy, Holy, Holy, is the Lord of Hosts; the whole earth is full of His glory." In I Kings, 19 we see an angel bringing food and drink and strengthening words to Elijah in his time of trouble and despair. In Numbers 22 we find an angel showing concern for a little mistreated donkey. No praise can be too great and glorious, no service too humble, for these, most perfect Works of the Lord.

It is our privilege and duty to join with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven to laud and magnify His glorious Name. It is no less a duty, and no less a privilege, to join with them in the humblest service to our brothers and sisters and fellow - creatures.

God will show us, through the Scriptures, how impossible it is for us to kneel and say "Holy, Holy, Holy," with the angels, and at the same time to close our minds to the needs and troubles of His other children. ## Whitefish Falls Camp Ready For 50 Boys

WHITEFISH FALLS — The annual choir school and CBL Camp, which is held at St. Augustine's School each year, will take place from July 24 to 30th this year. The director of the school, Rev. M. P. Thomas, said recently that plans were going ahead very well. He hopes that all staff arrangements will be completed within the next couple of weeks, and that the application forms will be in the hands of those concerned early this month.

One thing which should be stressed is that only 50 applications can be accepted this year. It was found last time that it was impossible to accommodate more boys than this with any degree of comfort. Therefore it is to be hoped that the boys will send in their applications as soon as they are received.

So far, several of the staff appointments have been definitely settled. Rev. F. G. Roberts and Rev. R. H. Nixon have agreed to serve as house masters again. Unfortunately replacements will have to be made for the other two house masters, as Rev. L. R. A. Sutherland and David Johnston will be unable to attend. Three of the counsellors will also be returning — Winston Hardacre of Lively; Peter Wright of Sault Ste. Marie; and Tom Fulton of Sudbury. The remaining staff appointments will be announced as soon as they have been made.

This combined choir school and CBL Camp is designed to provide the boys with a week of balanced work and play. Great attention is given to the training of choristers.

Each day a period of CBL instruction is given, and also practical work is provided, so that the boys are able to pass some of their tests and badge requirements whilst attending the camp. The afternoons are devoted to sports activities, including swimming, baseball and various other inter-house competitions.

In the evenings, entertainment, prepared by the boys themselves, form the major portion of the program. It need hardly be added that worship is given its rightful place.

It would perhaps be more correct to say that instead of preaching, His Lordship engaged in a simple, but direct and forceful heart-to-heart talk to the congregation on the theme of World Refugees and stated that Canada should be doing much more in the matter of resettling these refugees and asked pointedly, "What is Canada afraid of?", "What is the Church afraid of?" and "What are individual Christians afraid of?" For God hath not given us a spirit of fear.

Rev. B. G. Gosse expressed the hope that this, although the first, would not be the last visit of His Lordship and issued a sincere invitation that on future return journeys from Toronto, he would consider North Bay and St. Brice's as "half-way house".

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
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

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# Thumbnail Sketches

Many readers of the Algoma Anglican have asked from time to time for stories and pictures of the clergymen in the Diocese of Algoma. While many of them do appear in the reports of regular events which appear here each month, they are merely names to the readers from outside their particular parish. Rev. Alfred Reimers of Nipigon has prepared a series of "thumbnail sketches" of the clergy for use in the Algoma Anglican. This month we are pleased to present the eighth of this series on The Ven Julian S. Smedley, St. John the Evangelist, Sault Ste. Marie:

The Ven. Julian S. Smedley is one of the native sons of our diocese, born on St. Joseph's Island in 1895. He finished his schooling in Toronto, receiving an L. Th. from Trinity College. Like many others, his career was interrupted by the First World War. From 1916 to 1919 he served overseas with the 58th Battalion, C.E.F.

Since ordination Mr. Smedley has served parishes in Port Carling, Bracebridge and Port Arthur, taking time out from 1942 to 1946 to serve as an army chaplain. Now he is rector of the parish of St. John the Evangelist, Sault Ste. Marie, and Archdeacon of Algoma.

Mr. Smedley's family consists of his wife, Mary (a former high school teacher), two daughters, Mary Louise and Margaret Jean (both married) and a son, Gordon Julian, who is studying at the University of Manitoba. (Margaret Jean is married to another priest of the diocese, the Rev. Fred Roberts of Blind River.)

## AMEN CORNER

Good Things in New Prayer Book  
By Canon Roland F. Palmer, SSJE

A favorite exclamation during services in the early Church was "Maran-atha." It means "The Lord comes" or "Come, Lord." In the Latin Church of the West this re-appears as "Dominus Vobiscum" "The Lord be with you" or "The Lord is with you." A blessing and a statement of fact.

The Church is the Body of Christ and so where two or three members of the Body are gathered in His Name there is Jesus in the midst, for He is the head of the Body. Unless Jesus is present our worship cannot be acceptable to the Father.

We use "The Lord be with you" twice in the renewed Communion Office. The first part of the Service is a ministry of God's Word. The second part is a ministry of the Sacrament. Near the beginning of each part we invoke the Lord's presence; first before the Collect, Epistle and Gospel and next before "Lift up your hearts." The priest wishes us the best of all blessings: "The Lord be with you," and we wish it back to him again.

Apart from the Lord, the reading of scripture can do us no good. Apart from the Lord, the Sacrament would be an empty formality. But with the Lord, Word and Sacrament spring into life. Jesus is the one who is really at the head of His Table. He uses the lips and hands of his minister the priest to proclaim his Message and to bless and break the bread and bless the Cup.

### THE GOSPEL AND RESPONSE

In the Holy Gospel the Church holds up before us our Lord Jesus. We watch him in his works of love. We listen to his words. God the Son took human nature upon him and was born into this world so that we might see and hear just what God is like. In the reading of the Gospel we look up to him in adoring

love. "Thanks be to Thee O Lord" is a good response, but does not make it quite clear that it is to our Lord Jesus that we offer praise. In the renewed Prayer Book it is made clearer by responding "Praise be to thee, O Christ."

Of course there is another response to the Gospel and that is the Creed. Because of what we have come to know about God through his holy word we learn to have faith in him, to put our whole trust and confidence in him Father, Son and Holy Spirit; and therefore we say "I believe in one God."

### THE CREED

In the Creed we not only say that we believe certain things about God but that we believe in God. We put our whole trust and confidence in him because of the wonderful things he has done for us and which we recite in the Creed.

In the renewed Prayer Book there are a few changes of translation in the Nicene Creed.

The punctuation is also improved "God, of God" Our Lord Jesus is God who has his being from eternal God. "By whom all things were made" refers to God the Son. In the present translation it may sound to some as though it refers to God the Father. "Through whom all things were made" makes the matter clearer. "The Holy Ghost the Lord, the Giver of life" is better than the present "The Lord and giver of life" "The Lord" is a title to show that the Holy Spirit is true God. He is also "the Giver of life." He is more than the Lord of life, He is God and Lord of all.

"Holy" has been restored before "Catholic and Apostolic Church. It had dropped out through some mistake. Until the members of the Church are holy outward unity cannot be restored.
