ARCHBISHOP'S LETTER

Must Understand Lent's Full Meaning

My Dear People:

"Of all the Church seasons, Lent is the most ancient, the richest in mysteries, and in many ways the most replete with interest." Such is the statement that receives the concurrence of the Church in her official capacity. Perhaps, however, that is not the impression left on the average Anglican churchman approaching Lent. Too often his idea of Lent would be that it harps too much on one theme, and that a depressing one — the call to penitence for sin, and our answer to it in some form of mortification.

It is well to understand the full meaning of Lent and the reasons which should prompt its observance.

We keep Lent because the Church keeps it and as baptized people we are members of that Body. For us, as members of the Church Militant — the Church at war with evil — it is foremost a matter of obedience and loyalty. It is not our personal choice — whether we should observe Lent or not. Our observance of Lent is primarily a corporate act in which we all share the same observance at the same time for the same reason. Not infrequently the objection is levelled against the Church that it throws too much emphasis on renunciation, as if "giving up" was an end in itself. Of course, that is not so. Even Lent (though this is often overlooked) is not an end in itself. For the right observance of Lent only finds its true significance in the mean-

ing of Easter. The immediate purpose of Lent is to prepare us for Easter.

For it appears that in very early Christian days ONE DAY only was kept at Pass-over time to commemorate our Lord's act of redemption, and combining what we divide between Good Friday and Easter Day. St. Ambrose at the end of the fourth century speaks of the three days or "the threefold day of that triumphant Passion" showing how closely the themes were knit together, and this came to be specially the occasion for the Sacrament of Baptism, when the newly-converted and instructed (who were in those days almost all adults) were baptized. Gradually the longer period before Easter became settled as the season of instruction before Baptism. Forty days came finally to be generally accepted as the recognized period of Lent, probably to connect it with the forty days' fast spent by Christ in the wilderness.

Later on, another significant feature became attached to the Lenten observance. Adult baptisms became less frequent, and baptisms were administered more frequently and not exclusively at Easter. The Church became faced with the problem of sin, as it grew in numbers. It was the duty of the Church to witness to a watchful and critical world the wholesomeness of its life. As sections of the Church failed, a system of discipline had to be provided, to express the Church's sense of the wrong done to her Lord whose witness she is set to be, and

to ensure the true penitence of the sinner before restoration to the privileges of Church membership. Gradually other Christian members of the Body of Christ joined in the penitential exercises and so in time Lent found its character as a time for penitence for sin and for instruction in the Faith.

The forty days are still a preparation for Easter; for the yearly memorial of the act of redemption by the death and resurrection of Christ, in order that Christ's followers may once again enter into fulness of power, joy and usefulness, within the Christian Family. Regarded in this way, every Easter is to be a renewal of the meaning of our baptism; of the "death unto sin, and new birth unto righteousness"; of that new life in Christ which is fulfilled in His Body, the Church.

Such is a partial historical background to the due observance of this Holy Season in which I ask you to share with your brethren everywhere. The method for the due observance of Lent will be made available by your parish priest. Allow me to add this word: whatever form Lent may take in your observance this year, remain faithful. Stick to your Rule.

Lo! now is our accepted day,
The time for purging sins away,
The sins of thought and deed and word
That we have done against the Lord.

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The Rev. David Nelson Mitchell is a Maritimer who came "west" by way of the north. He was born in Halifax County, Nova Scotia, in 1916. His first full-time Church work was as a Church Army evangelist in a Toronto parish. (The Church Army consists of lay persons especially trained for evangelism). After further Church Army work in Ottawa and Timmins, Father Mitchell obtained an S.Th. title from Trinity College, Toronto. He was made deacon at Timmins in 1944 and ordained priest in 1945.

For nine more years Father Mitchell served in the Diocese of Moosonee, going from Timmins to Rupert's House, James Bay and South Porcupine. Besides his parish duties, he became Secretary - Treasurer of

the Synod of Moosonee and was made chaplain to the Archbishop of Moosonee, the Most Rev. Robert Renison.

On transferring to the Diocese of Algoma in 1954, Father Mitchell was appointed Rector of St. Luke's, Fort William. He left there in Dec. 1958 to become Rector of St. Thomas's, Bracebridge, where he still is.

Father Mitchell is married to a former school teacher, Winnifred Kathleen Butler. They have three children: Elizabeth, 14; David, 12, and Margaret, 9.

Father Mitchell is a member of the Algoma Anglican Board of Management, clerical secretary of the synod of our diocese and a member of the executive committee of our diocese. When he has time for hobbies he chooses gardening and photography.

Special tribute was paid to the work of the church wardens George Richmond and Alex Raynard, for service during 1960. Mr. Raynard, who retired as warden after five years, was thanked for his leadership. Special thanks were also extended to the Rev. Mark Conliffe and the Rev. Mark Sauerbrei for their work.

Mr. Richmond, in presenting the church wardens' report, noted that total receipts in 1960 were \$47,725.96. Of this amount, nearly \$20,000 was contributed to the Diocese of Algoma for missionary work and church extension. In addition, a large number of repairs were undertaken to the church.

The wardens reported that

during the past year an appraisal of the church building and its contents was made by a firm of appraisers. This is being used to study increased insurance coverage for the church building. They also reported they had engaged the C. D. Howe Company to inspect the church building and to advise on a ventilation system and new lighting for the church. The contract for the ventilation system has been awarded and this work will be undertaken within the next month. Special thanks were extended to P. R. Cook, chairman of the property committee, for his work in connection with the renovation of the church building.

Reports of various parochial organizations were given by: Junior Auxiliary, Karen Christie; Girl's Auxiliary, Ann McDermaid; Algoma Bible Class, Marlene Arthur; Church School, Martin Grinstead; Scout Group Committee, Emerson Squier; Mothers' Auxiliary of the Cubs and Scouts, Mrs. Ed. Cliff; A.Y.P.A., Rev. M. Conliffe; Woman's Auxiliary, Mrs. C. Frowen; Chancel Guild, Mrs. S. Ashton; Choir, A. Vickers and Wm.

Tozer; Leneveu Funds, A. V. Chapman.

Rev. Mr. Thomson, in giving his annual report, thanked members of the congregation and stated: "We can give thanks that 1960 has been a good year for St. John's both spiritually and materially". He reported that more than 400 services had been held including 246 Sunday and mid-week services, 41 Baptisms, including six adults, 12 marriages, 28 funerals, and many private communions. Forty-five candidates were presented for the Sacrament of Confirmation. He also commented that during the past few years there had been a substantial increase in attendance at church services, and a greater number of communicants. He thanked members of the church staff for their work. He also thanked the wardens and board of management.

FUTURE PLANS

In speaking of plans for the future, Mr. Thomson expressed the hope that in 1961 the congregation would make its final payment on the \$100,000 pledge made to the Archbishop Wright Extension Fund in 1956. The bal-

ance needed is \$14,300. He commented that through the gifts made to this fund, 20 new churches and nine new rectories had been built in the diocese. He also suggested that study should be given to an extension of the Parish Hall to provide for more adequate facilities, including classroom space, church offices, and possibly a small chapel. In concluding his report, Mr. Thomson stated: "Our greatest need is for more people to offer their talents in the service of the church. True stewardship means not only giving time and treasures but also talents." He expressed his thanks to the wardens for the heavy load of administrative work they had carried out and also to the assistant clergy and other church officials for their help.

The 1961 budget of \$48,000 was presented by George Richmond, people's warden. R. K. Andras spoke on the recent successful every member visitation, and P. R. Cook outlined work to be undertaken by the property committee during the coming year. The budget was unanimously adopted.



THE OFFERTORY is the preparation of the materials and the persons needed in order to "do this in remembrance" of our Lord. On page 74 of the renewed Prayer Book we read "The Bread shall be the best and purest wheat bread, whether leavened or unleavened, and the Wine pure grape wine, with which a little water may be mingled." The Passover was not just one service but a series.

We do not know whether our Lord instituted the Sacrament at the meal when the paschal lamb was eaten, or at the meal of preparation the night before. If at the paschal meal then he would have used unleavened bread. If at the preparation we cannot be so sure.

In the early Church both East and West for the first centuries leavened bread seems to have been used. It is still used in the Eastern Church; not bread bought in a store, but specially baked. Some of us can remember in our churches a loaf of fine textured bread being baked for the Communion. Unleavened Bread came into use in the West. It does not quickly get stale or crumble so easily. For convenience sake it has come to be widely used among us.

The sense of sharing in the one Bread is not so clear when
