 years of age was accidentally drowned
 while rafting off the Shingwauk dock.
 Two younger boys witnessed the
 accident and saw Andrew fall
 off the raft into the water, one of
 them ran immediately to tell
 Mr. Madden the carpenter who
 was working in the factory close
 by, and who got the boy out of
 the water as quickly as he could,
 but the boy was then unconscious
 and all efforts to restore animation
 proved fruitless. Mrs. Stacey the

The boys whether left the Soo
 Michigan on Tuesday for
 Sussalon where I have aimed
 to be. All the smaller boys in
 the Home are oncey too or three

 of this, when he got on the
 raft and told him not to go -

Principal's report for May 1897.

Sir,

The health of the pupils during the month has been satisfactory with the exception of pupil Mike Sacco No 80, who has been ill for some time with pulmonary trouble. Acting on Dr Reid's advice and with the Department's sanction this boy was sent back to the Reserve on the 27th inst.

Pupil Andrew Stacey No 85 was buried in the Shingwan. Cemetery on the 21st inst. Mrs Stacey the mother of the boy, who took a reasonable view of the unfortunate accident was present & Deputy Supr. Gen^l of Indian Affairs Ottawa.

I am exceedingly pleased & satisfied
with the formal arrangements.

During the month the following
have been sent down from the
Shiniquant. Has been satisfactory

- Pupin & said to also for 62 1/2 miles
- James Clement Hill . . . 15
- Thomas Johnson . . . 37
- Arthur Noah . . . 23
- Kathison Whitego . . . 25

The three former boys were loaded
& promptly brought back to the
House, Arthur Noah & James
I have not as yet succeeded in
getting the Shiniquant Company

The Indians on James Island
16 miles down the river encourage
these boys to leave the Shiniquant
& harbour them on the Island.

It is difficult to get them to work for
them. It is difficult to get
them back being American

119

American Territory. I have spoken
 recently to the American Consul
 in Mexico & he has promised to
 caution the Indians, he cautions
 no more he says the Indians
 being non-treaty & not subject
 to the laws of the State.

Schools of the pupils are
 respecting to be allowed to go
 to the school this Sunday & Monday
 their parents & relations are
 also respecting them. I shall
 therefore be glad to see the Pope's
 sanction to permit those people
 who have not seen that you are
 yet free from the laws or more
 are without the fear of violence
 provided the pupils of ages to
 of seven the institutions are
 sent to me - On the 15th in

American Territory I have spoken
 recently to the American Consul
 about it & he has promised to
 caution the Indians. He cannot
 do more he says, the Indians
 being non-treaty & not subject
 to the laws of the State.

Several of the pupils are
 expecting to be allowed to go
 home for their summer holidays
 & their parents & relations are
 also expecting them. I shall
 therefore be glad of the Dept's
 sanction to permit those pupils
 who have not seen their parents
 for two (2) years or more,
 one month's leave of absence
 provided the pupils pay for
 & from the institution are
 sent to me - on the 28th inst.

- on the 28th inst Corporal punishment was administered to pupil Thomas Johnson No 37 by the Principal in the presence of another member of the Staff for being impudent & disobedient to the School teacher. The punishment seems to have had a good effect on the boy. As the Department Agent Mr Van Abbots is laid up with a broken rib & other injuries the result of an accident while driving to Garden River I am sending my report direct.

Trusting that the estimate forwarded to the Department on the 8th inst for the School desks & cooking range, so urgently needed in the Home
 — well

will meet with the Department
favourable consideration.

Dear Chief.

In reply to your letter dated 2nd inst. Dawson Whitey's ran away from the Home on the 26th April, he was brought back on the 9th May and again ran away two 1/2 days later. He is now on Sun Island, which is American Territory & situated about 16 miles down the river. The Indians living on the Island are so the American Consul tells me non treaty and are not subject to the State laws, hence the difficulty in getting the boy back. particularly as the Indians encourage Dawson to remain with them & harbour him.

I have sent for Munson two
or three times, but he refuses
to return to the Shingwauk.

Arthur Noah ran away on the
10th May, for what reason I
do not know, nor probably
does he himself, apparently
he was the happiest boy in the
school & perfectly contented.

Henry & Scots Noah may be able
to throw some light on this?
He aided Arthur to run away
& paid his ferry fare across
the river out of some money
I had given him Scots! for
his expenses to Moravian town.

I have spent time & money
in tracing Arthur's whereabouts.
The latest clue is, he left
Bay Mills on a lumber boat.

for Bay City. I may be able to
get Arthur when the boat returns
to Bay Mills again to reload.

Henry Scott Noah was a
bad boy. I simply could do
nothing with him in the House.
He had a bad influence on
the other boys & I was compelled
to send him home.

Archie & Edmund Noah are
both well & contented in the
Shinguanah. They are getting on
nicely & both are as good as
gold.
