I have just returned from a visit  
to the Mission of St. Joseph, Superior, and am  
much disappointed on my return to find that there is at  
present no answer to my application for the transfer  
of the \$1000 grant to the building fund & maintenance of  
our "Harrowed Home" for girls.

In consequence of this I have been obliged to stop building  
operations, and we had also dismissed the girls & closed  
the school for the present, - but the girls are all so anxious  
to come back & so many more are applying for admission,  
that our Lady Superintendent has consented to continue her  
services for the current year at half pay, rather than give  
up the work.

I cannot understand the unwillingness of the Department  
to consider this matter (indeed that thought it was already  
concluded until corrected by telegraph). The Indian parents  
are pressing us to take their children, both boys & girls, - we  
expect to have 50 boys at the Harrowed Home, besides our  
20 applications which I have had to refuse, and the girls are  
just as anxious to come to the Harrowed Home. It does not  
seem to me much to ask that an old grant made five years  
ago which we have not been able to use in the way originally  
proposed should now be applied to a work in which we  
are actually & actively engaged. I cannot understand  
the cause of the delay, unless it is that parties connected
