I am in receipt of your letter of the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. and as you have now written definitely to wind up the affair & withdraw the support of an Indian bag to your Deacons. I write to say that the present indebtedness of the Deacons & our Institution for support of Joseph Waabameens - named from Aug<sup>r</sup> 12/77 to Aug<sup>r</sup> 12/82 is \$181.25. When I was in Hamilton or rather Burlington on the 27<sup>th</sup> June 1877 in view of an "arrangement" promised me support for two children at our Home at \$75 each per annum. I soon after found that support would only be forthcoming for one. The result to the present time has been that over a space of 5 years the sum total of \$193.75 has been contributed leaving arrears to the amount of \$181.25. The bag Jos. Waabameens has been at the Institution his whole time except during the period of my illness when the Home was temporarily closed. It seems to me exceedingly bad taste to be asking questions (evenly ad for information) answers to which have repeatedly been given in our published reports and monthly magazines which are sent to you gratis. The following description of the little Chapel to be erected at the Shipwreck Home, Sault Ste. Marie, in memory of the late Bishop Haugue is furnished by Mr. A. L. Rowland of Collingwood, Architect: -

The Rev. E. J. Wilson desires to urge earnestly upon the members of the Church to give promptly & liberally to the above object. For the walls to be put up & the building complete before winter, at least \$2000 out of the \$3000 asked for must be ready on hand. About \$800 therefore is wanted immediately. Why should there be this apparent spirit of indifference? Is Bishop Haugue and his work so soon to be forgotten? Since it was first proposed to make this Chapel at the Shipwreck a Memorial Chapel, \$974 only, we are told, has been contributed. Of this amount \$549 came from England, \$442 was collected at the Shipwreck, \$75 in the Diocese, and \$31 only has been given by the Clergy & people of the eight Canadian Dioceses. We hang down our heads at this in sorrow and shame. That poor diocese has been struggling on - struggling on - meeting many a rebuff, many an unkind word, many an unsympathetic glance, - but this seems the worst of all, that their dear Bishop's memory should be thus slighted & his name so long forgotten. Well may a thoughtful friend write: "I trust the new-Bishop may induce people to see that there is some sin in all this, and then perhaps the Canadian Church will humble itself & wear sackcloth for the great (in God's sight) and good Bishop Haugue".

Your letter of the 18<sup>th</sup> just received with an enclosed note from Bowering, and an invoice of some shoe pack leather - is not very courteous in its tone & seems to imply that I had been dealing falsely with you which as a clergyman & at the head of a Charitable Institution I do not think you wd. reasonably expect -

I would repeat what I have said in former letters - that after giving you notice wd. receipt an order from Bowering in my name you had no right to do so, that neither the shoe pack leather or the invoice came to me, that Bowering was working on his own account and any work that he did for our Institution I paid him for.

For your information, I may add that when Bowering left the Sault about the 13<sup>th</sup> October last I purchased from him some new stock, including 85½ lb shoe pack leather, which he put in to make up the stock to the original value at which he had taken it from me when he commenced business on his own account - Where he got the shoe pack leather from it was not my business to enquire, I paid him for every lb that I purchased from him & have his receipt.

It is evident to me from Bowering's letter that

He is endeavouring to trick you and get out  
 of pay for the leather. (It as now  
 seems probable) Bowering made his purchases of  
 leather, the pack leather &c from you, pretending  
 that they were for the Shipwreck Home, all I can  
 say is that the man acted dishonestly, and if  
 I had suspected it at the time I would have  
 endeavoured to protect you by giving you warning.  
 However considered that no notice to you was  
 to accept any order except on printed form signed  
 by myself would have been sufficient.
