Things went Home
New Home for Indian Grib.

We have purchased the land — five acres — in a ve, good situation on the main road — a little over a mile north of the Laalt. Our boys have been hard at work getting out the stone before the snow falls so that we may team it to the site of the New Home during winter. There is plenty of good build stone on the Hill back of the Boy's Home, & the boys have put up eighty cords, — just during their play-hours. We had a great time last week going to take possession of the site for the

Grib's Home. Nearly all the boys went — & we took a wagon load of axes, shovels, pick axes, wheelbarrows &c. The boys camped out there three days — & we pointed the union Jack on the site of the new buildy — cleared a quantity of land, made a drain, & commenced digging the foundations!

The buildy is to be of stone — with a portage of 45 feet — & a wing running back about 50 feet. It will probably accommodate from 25 to 30 pupils.

We propose getting out the doors & window-sashes in our Carpenter Shop the winter — & in fact shall take the contract for the building ourselves.

employing outsiders as for the

We want \$3,500 for sett'g up
