inside of the Institution has been
entirely remodelled & number of
cupboards & partitions have
been taken down thereby giving
a great amount of room and
— more

more ventilation. The water supply is very good brought up from the River by pipes to a large tank in the building which affords great protection against fire & supplies the Institution through out with water for the use of the boys.

The Dormitories are kept clean & neat, new bedsteads are certainly ^x required & I believe that a grant has been made for this purpose, the present wooden bedsteads have been in use for our twenty years - everything is conducted in a very - satisfactory

- satisfactory manner, Pruals
 are very good & any Indian
 Child getting into this Institution
 may consider itself well off.
