Principal's Report for September
1895.

Sir,

The little boy Henry Peter
No 41. mentioned in my
report for August, who
met with an accident when
playing football, was
under the doctor's orders
taken to our Hospital on the
5th inst. in spite of medical
skill & good nursing the
little fellow became so
diseased that it became
necessary to amputate the

the foot in order to save the
 boy's life. This was done on
 the 24th inst. Doctors Reid &
 Hunter being the surgeons
 Mr. Benson & myself were
 also present during the
 operation. I am happy to
 say that the boy has not
 suffered much since, is
 bright & cheerful & we have
 great hopes of his recovery.
 Joseph Anthony No. 36.
 who was sent home with the
 Department's approval on the
 3rd June last returned to the
 Squadron on the 7th inst
 & complained of feeling
 unwell a few days after &
 has been laid up ever since.

The boy it appears was thrown
 from a house when at home
 & Dr Reid informs me
 that the spine is injured
 & that the boy is not likely
 to be strong again for some
 time & advises his being
 sent home which I propose
 to do subject to the Depart-
 ment's approval.

On the 23rd inst. Mr Benson
 paid a visit of inspection
 to the Hospital &
 remained in the institution
 until the following Saturday
 during which time minute
 inspection of each
 Department

Departments & all buildings
 was made & all school
 work classes & examined
 stores & inspected.

On the 13th inst. Isaac Sando
 No 63 of Waipio ran away
 from the institution & up to
 the present time I have been
 unable to obtain any clue
 as to his whereabouts, the
 lad is 19 years of age
 & his influence with the
 younger pupils not for
 the best. On the 29th inst.
 three little boys namely
 David Sissual, Teat & Joseph
 Hobegeyull from Drassey
 — were

were admitted into the
 Kingdom & two days
 after ran away & got safely
 back to their Reserve, Spanish
 River making the whole
 distance 125 miles. Chief
 Assenaah is anxious that
 they should return to the
 Home & Dr. Benson when
 leaving here for Manitowaning

The Carpenter shop also
is a separate account, the
shop has to run on its own
basis & independently of the
institution, & all work done
either for the institution or
the public as the case may be

It is erected direct to the shop which is fitted with steam plant & machinery planing mills saws &c. purchased out of Institution funds.

Nearly all the material used in the improvements & repairs already done was originally purchased in the rough & manufactured into matched lumber, ceiling flooring casings & window sash &c & charged to the Institution (repairs) at a lower rate than we could purchase it in a manufactured state elsewhere.

besides which the manufacturing & dressing of the rough material has been more carefully accomplished & as a consequence first class work has been done in the Homes & the pupils who prefer working in the factory to the other trades & take a keen interest in this kind of work have had the advantage & benefit of instruction.

The vouchers sent to the Department were made out in the same form as those submitted to the Dep^t. in times past when no exception was taken. I have however
