PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

To the Friends and Supporters of our Indian Homes:

My Dear Friends,—With the issue of this report, an annual summary of our work at Shingwauk will have been recorded unbrokenly for a period covering twenty-nine years. These reports serve a three-fold purpose, (1) To keep our work before the Church at large and the public generally. (2) To convey to those who are co-operating with us a grateful acknowledgment for assistance rendered. (3) And to plead earnestly with all into whose hands they go for help to carry on another year's work.

We offer no apology for these annual appeals. They are made not from choice, but of necessity. We have no endowment nor reserve funds. Our need of to-day is our need of to-morrow; and with the exception of a small per capita allowance of \$60 per annum made by the Dominion Government in recognition of the work done in the Homes, we are entirely dependent on the voluntary contributions. This per capita grant, we might add, is based upon each pupil's attendance, and is practically available only in proportion to the amount we ourselves are successful in raising from outside sources.

Our work is exclusively Indian. Its aim and object is the uplifting and betterment of the Redman's children; the descendants of those whom we have dispossessed, who years ago held sovereign sway from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and counted themselves rich in the possession of freedom of those vast domains which we by right of conquest claim to-day. A people wholly untaught; and hence incapable in a struggle for existence with their white brethren, and yet a people whose liberty and only resources of livelihood have been curtailed by the impetuous tide of civilization. Truly they claim our compassion. We cannot, as Christian people, ignore their claims upon us. It is our bounden duty to assist them, and how can we better ameliorate their lot than in extending to their children in some measure those advantages of Christian Education and training we deem so essential for our own. As the late Bishop Sullivan said some years ago: "The work rests on a broad foundation:

(1) Christ's command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature"; (2) a sense of gratitude for the blessings which we ourselves enjoy; (3) the well-ascertained capacity of the Indian for domestic, social, industrial, intellectual, and spiritual improvement; (4) the advantages offered by youth as a starting point

for this improvement. On this broad foundation the enterprise stands four square against all the winds of prejudice or opposition.

The opportunity to assist is afforded you through the medium of our Indian Homes. There within their walls our boys and girls are day by day surrounded by that home influence so formative of moral strength and character, and which is so entirely lacking in their camp life.

In addition to secular and religious training, the boys are taught trades; the girls domestic work, sewing and laundry work,

The system and methods adopted are based upon nearly thirty years' experience in the work, and are the best adapted for inculcating knowledge and in dealing with the Indian characteristics.

The success of our efforts is vindicated in the number of our pupils who are to-day earning the velihood and leading honest, respectable lives; and yet, while we have accommodation in the Homes for 100 children, we lack the necessary support for the 57 at present enrolled.

And now a few words relative to the children at present with us, 20 of whom are girls, and 37 boys; for, while we began the year with 42 boys and 17 girls our records show that 8 girls and 6 boys were admitted, 5 girls and 9 boys were discharged, and 2 boys died of consumption.

They are representatives principally of the Ojibway and the Delaware Tribes, with a sprinkling of the Iroquois, Cree and Pottawattamie, they range from 6 to 19 years in age; 19 are motherless, 9 fatherless, and 16 have neither father nor mother.

In various stages of civilization and training, some are but beginning their career in the Homes and are at present heroically struggling with their A, B, C's, and simple sums, while others, well on in the fourth book, are rapidly nearing the termination of their training, and will soon be qualified to earn their own living. Our children are generous to a fault among themselves, and it is a common thing to see the older ones give place to the younger in their games, or performing some little act of kindness for them.

They are always reverent and devout in church, and far more amenable to discipline than white children taken from a similar class of life.

The too hastily formed opinion of some that the Indian won't work is a mistake, as applied to the trained Indian youth.

Given an inducement and work he is qualified to perform, he will prove equally as industrious and competent as his white brother. Many of our old pupils are to-day holding positions in which they have been steadily employed for the past five and six years.

More especially for the benefit of those supporting individual children in the Homes. I have attached to this report a "Workers"

List," showing how each boy and girl in the Homes is employed. These lists, I might add, are changed from time to time as the pupils qualify for more important posts.

While the year's work is characterized by marked progress, and I am conscientiously of the opinion that pupils and staff alike have made the most of their opportunities, it has, nevertheless, been a year much fraught with financial care and anxiety, as will be seen from our statement of accounts. We close our books \$531.45 in debt. We need more friends, a wider and more liberal support, more in proportion to the merits of the work.

In conclusion, let me heartily thank those who have in any way upheld our efforts during the year, and especially is our gratitude due to the S.P.C.K., London, England, for a grant of ten scholarships of £10 each to the Shingwauk Home, together with similar aid for the Wawanosh Home. The C. & C. C. Society, London, England, for a grant of £75. The Algoma Association in England for gifts of clothing and money, as well as to the Clergy, Sunday School teachers and scholars, and finally, though not less, the Woman's Auxiliary in Canada for numerous kind gifts of clothing and bedding due acknowledgment of which is herein made.

We do not hesitate to ask that each and all will continue their support. Those who have once known the happiness of ministering in however small a way, to "one of these little ones"—and therefore to Christ, will not be inclined to slacken their efforts. Such too, will surely be conscious that their own lives have been blessed and enriched just in proportion to their willingness to follow in the footsteps of Him "who came not to be ministered unto but to minister."

The weather is very cold here now. About three weeks ago the ice was very good for skating but one day it was very stormy and spoilt the ice. Now the ice is frozen right across the river and people are walking across.

We had our Christmas holidays last week. We enjoyed them in playing hockey, and sliding. When it is too cold we play games in the house and read books.

On New Year's Eve we stayed up until one o'clock at night. The boys dressed up in false faces and old clothes and from twelve until one o'clock they made all the noise they could. They marched around in all the largest rooms and before we went to bed our teacher scrambled a lot of candies.

On New Year's night we had our Christmas tree. The Bishop was down with us and he distributed the school prizes. There are thirty-seven boys and twenty girls here at present and they are all well.

There was a riot in town with the working men this week and there has been a number of men put in jail. One was shot in the neck and sent to the Hospital. He was shot by a policeman.

There has been some damage done. They broke the Office vindows near the Pulp Mills. Mr. W. H. Plummer's store was robbed. They took three revolvers, three winchesters and some clothing. They got in from the back end of the store.

There were some soldiers sent from Toronto to protect the Pulp Mills, Steel Plant, Street Cars and the ferry boat.
