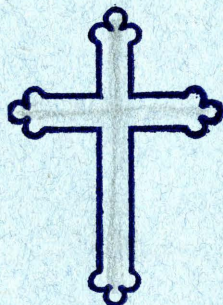

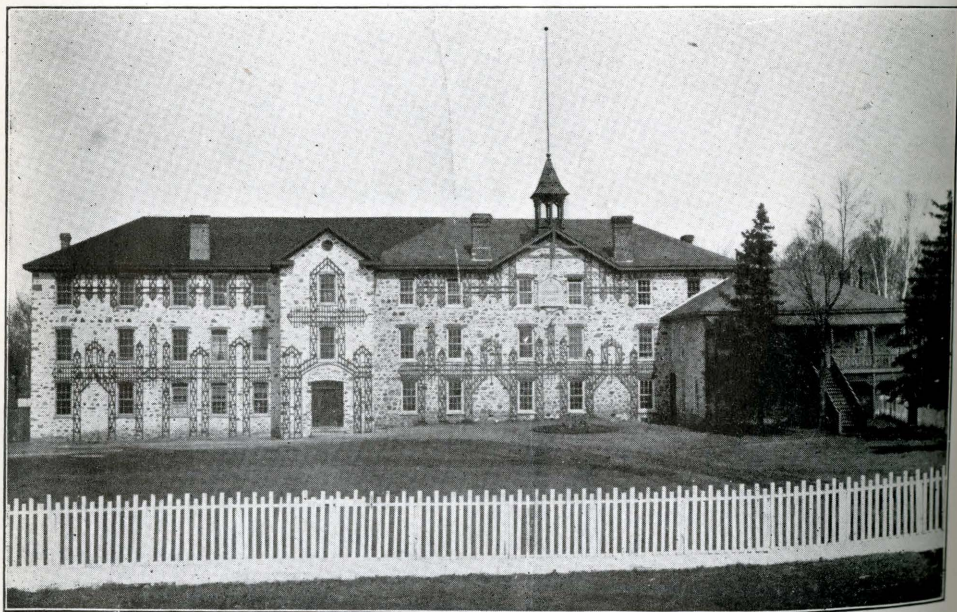

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

To the Friends and Supporters of our Indian Homes :

My Dear Friends,—In presenting to you the thirtieth Annual Report of our Indian Homes the thought dominant in my mind is gratitude to God for the innumerable blessings He has so graciously vouchsafed to us during the past year.

1904 has passed very rapidly with us at Shingwauk. It has nevertheless been a year of steady, uninterrupted work, a year of great opportunity, a year we look back upon with satisfaction in the conscientious fulfilment of its responsibilities and the knowledge that our best efforts have been expended in the moulding and upbringing of the young lives within our doors. Ours is a great work. Nor have thirty years familiarity with it served in any degree to lessen, but on the contrary, to bring home to us with increasing force its obligations and importance.

I record with gratitude a wider recognition of its merits by the public generally during the past year; there have been both more individual instances of liberality and a greater disposition on the part of Sunday Schools to assist. May I take this increased and awakened interest as the beginning of the consummation of ten long, patient years of hope that means would some day be forthcoming to enable us to carry our full complement of pupils?

If our Canadian Sunday Schools, as a whole would take up the work and thus strengthen our efforts, we would shortly be in a position to offer the advantages of Christian training and education to at least one hundred Indian children instead of as at present to but sixty. It would mean the filling of every dormitory and the placing of these old Church of England institutions, if not in the van, their proper sphere, at least on a par numerically with other denominations similarly engaged.

According to the latest official census returns, presumably authentic, the Indian population for the Province of Ontario alone is computed at 21,191, or about one-fifth of the total Indian population given for the Dominion. They are classified under the following denominations:

These statistics testify to the present inadequacy of the Church's efforts and afford much matter for reflection.

There is no work which claims more the sympathy and liberality of all than the lifting up of these neglected, destitute children of the forest, placing them amidst brighter, purer surroundings, securing for their lives something of that happiness and sunshine which we are eager enough to see in the lives of our own children and which can only emanate from a knowledge of Christianity and consequent regard to morality and a well regulated life. *Justice to the Indians, demands this work no less than loyalty to Christ.*

Need I say how glad I shall be to allot individual children as a special charge to any willing to undertake their support, or even partial support in the Home, and to afford any further information needed regarding the work.

The number of pupils enrolled at the beginning of the year was 57 (20 girls and 37 boys); 6 girls and 4 boys were admitted, 3 boys and 1 girl were discharged, 2 boys died of consumption and 1 girl was sent home on sick leave, thus leaving in the Institutions at this date 36 boys and 24 girls.

These children representatives of the following tribes :

Pattawattamie, range from 6 to 19 years in age and are in various degrees of civilization and attainment. Seventeen are fatherless children, 15 are motherless children, and 14 have neither father nor mother.

In addition to secular and religious teaching the older boys are taught farming and carpentry, the girls, sewing, laundry work and such duties as will prove invaluable to them in after life.

They are apt and teachable and take readily to such employment and readily develop into useful men and women.

The curriculum adopted in the schools is similar to those of the Public Schools of Ontario. Twenty-six pupils were promoted during the year into higher classes, 23 were awarded prizes for class work at Christmas.

The average percentage of marks for the whole school at the last Quarterly Examination was 68 per cent.

Diversity of disposition and character is not less marked in our children than in those of any white school and while the former may in some degree lack the energy of the latter they are equally, if not more diligent and painstaking.

Speaking generally, our children are well behaved and not difficult to manage. There are, of course, individual exceptions from time to time, but it is not often a boy or girl is punished for any gross or vicious conduct, indeed the tendency is to do as they are bidden and to perform faithfully their allotted tasks.

In this connection it is only fair to say that many of the parents and older Indians do so advise their children and frequently counsel them "to be good and learn all they can in that Home."

Of those at present enrolled 18 boys and 3 girls are communicants and it is hoped a class of ten more will be accepted by the Bishop for Confirmation during the coming year.

We recall with pleasure those who found it possible to visit our Institutions during 1904, amongst whom were, the Dean of Peterborough, England; Miss Barlow, England; Mrs. Ferrar Davidson, Toronto; The Earl of Stamford, England; Miss Florence Greene, Ottawa; Miss Berry, Ottawa; Professor W. Clark, Toronto; The Clergy, lay members, and W. A. delegates representing Algoma's 7th Triennial Council, and to whom we are not a little indebted for many evidences of their good will and practical help since.

In conclusion, I desire:

First, to heartily thank all who have in any way assisted our Indian Homes during the past year and especially the S. P. C. K., London, Eng., for ten scholarships of £10.0.0 each to the Shingwauk Home, together with similar aid to the Wawanosh Home; the C. and C. C. Society, London, England, for a grant of £75; the Clergy, Sunday School teachers and scholars and finally, though not less, the Woman's Auxiliary in Canada and the Algoma Association, England, for gifts of clothing and money, due acknowledgment of which is herein made.

Secondly, to earnestly plead with each and all for the support necessary to sustain our present work throughout the coming year, and to permit of the admission of at least ten more children, now seeking the shelter and advantages of our Institutions.

There are thirty-six boys and twenty-one girls in the Homes now.

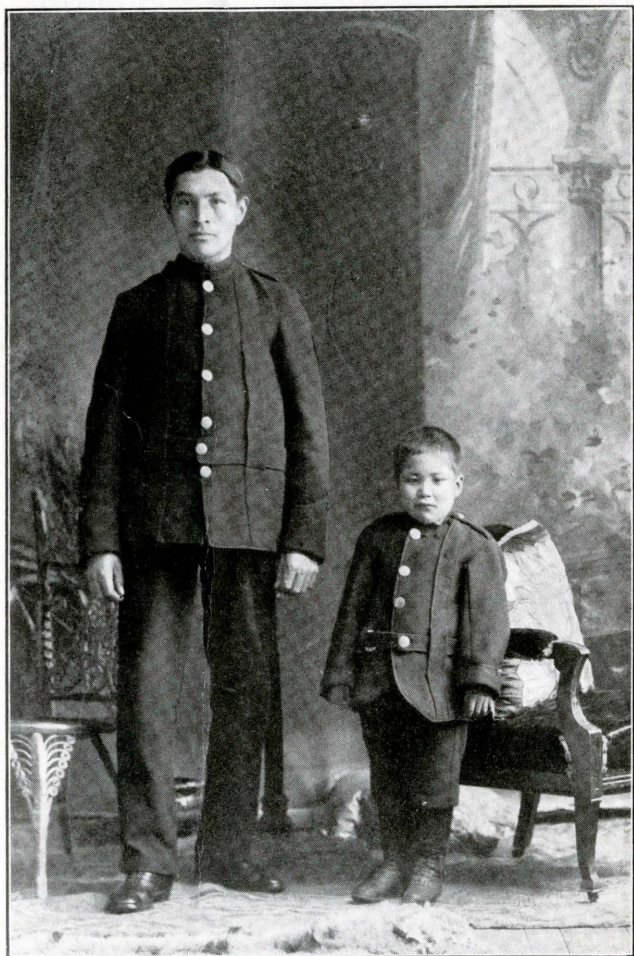
I work in the Laundry in the afternoon and go to school in the morning.

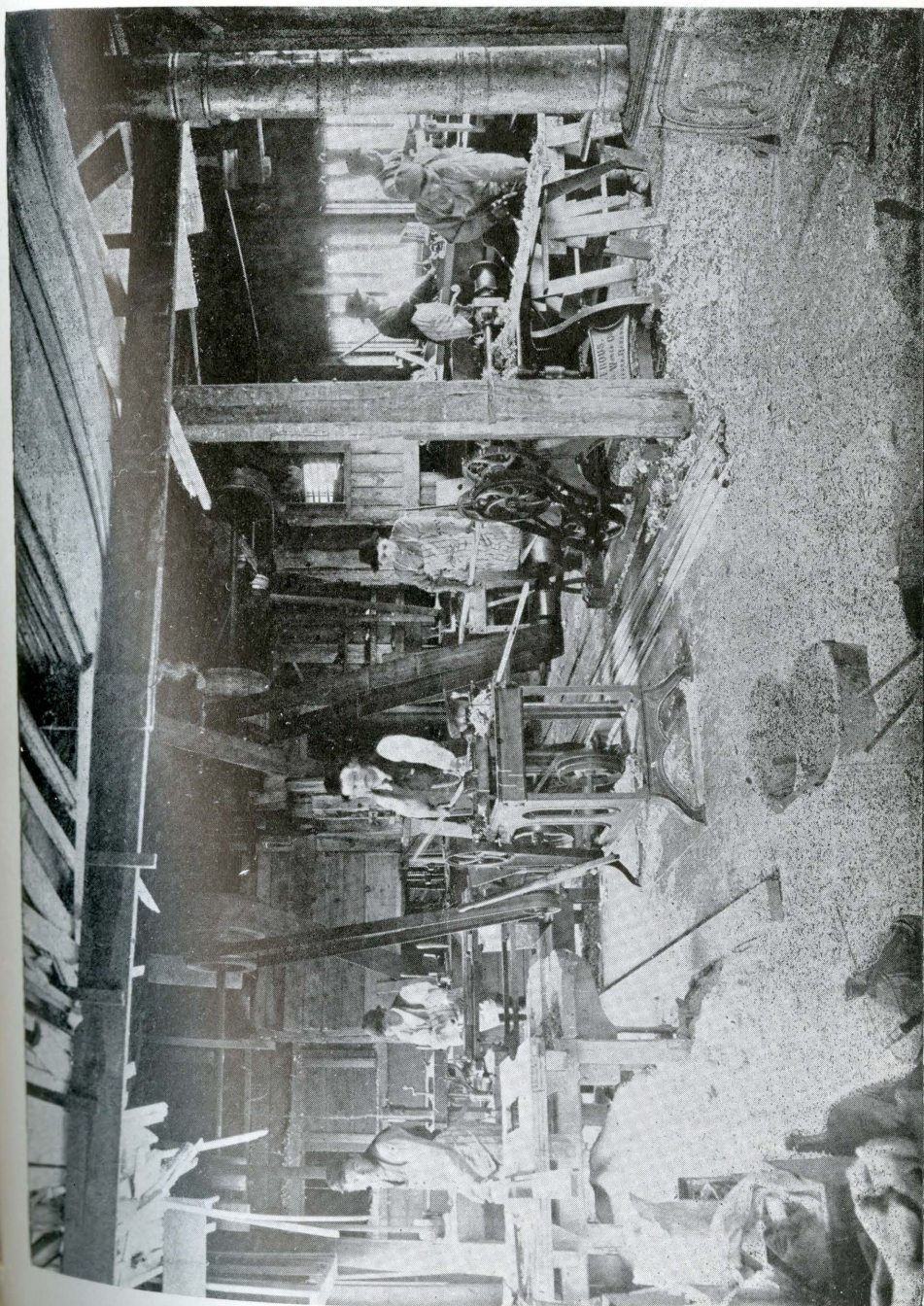

MISSIONARY DIOCESE OF ALGOMA.

I give and bequeath unto the Right Reverend the Bishop of Algoma, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, the sum of.....
.....to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease, exclusively out of such part of my personal estate, not hereby especially disposed of, as I may by law bequeath to charitable purposes; and I hereby lawfully charge such part of my estate, with the said sum upon trust, to be applied toward the general purposes of the said Homes for the Christian training and civilization of Indian children; and the receipt of the Right Reverend the Bishop of Algoma, or the Treasurer for the time being for the Diocese, shall be a sufficient discharge for the said Legacy. (And I direct that the duty upon the said Legacy to be paid by my executors out of the said fund.)

The will or codicil making the request must be signed by the testator in the presence of two witnesses, who must subscribe their names in his presence, and in the presence of each other.

Note.—This testament must have been executed one year previous to death of Testator to give it effect over Mortmain Act.
