The issue of these reports has been unavoidably delayed. Shortly after the publication of the Report for 1907 a crisis overtook the Homes. Owing to the falling off of contributions from various sources and the simultaneous increase of the cost of living, our annual income was no longer adequate to meet our expenditure. An increasing deficit was the result. The Government, after helping us once and again, refused further assistance. The pressure of M.S.C.C. work was so great that it became more and more difficult to get help for Indian Schools. The very life of our Homes was threatened.

After a period of very great perplexity it was decided to reduce the scope of our work by dimishing the staff, the number of pupils, and the general equipment. The whole Institution was remodelled and the most rigid economy instituted. At this juncture, after a long period of illness from overstrain, our Principal, George Ley King, feeling no longer equal to his task, resigned. In his place the Rev. B. P. Fuller was appointed and took charge on 1st September, 1909. In this appointment the Committee feels itself to have been very fortunate. Mr. Fuller is exceptionally qualified for his work both by natural gifts and experience. He has taken hold with earnestness and confidence. And the present state of affairs encourages the belief that, on the reduced scale alluded to, we shall be able to make ends meet.

But this happy result can only be attained by our friends rallying loyally to our aid. The Woman's Auxiliary has undertaken to do what it can; and this promise alone suffices to put new courage into our hearts. We hope to receive from this source at least \$500.00 per annum. Again we are encouraged by the steadfast loyalty of a few Sunday Schools and Parishes, which still continue their support, and their interest in our work. To them and to the Auxiliary we owe a debt beyond words. English friends are also helping us. And if this assistance from England and Canada can be maintained we hope to be able to carry on our work, with the dimished pupillage of about 30 children, without incurring further debt. We plead for its continuance. It is worth while once more reminding our friends that the number of children in the Homes might easily be increased if we had the money necessary to maintain a larger number. Time and again it has been represented that we found it difficult to keep up our number of pupils. This is not the case. The difficulty has been to maintain them. At the present time several are waiting anxiously for admission. But we must not exceed the number we can support, though the danger of would-be pupils being sent to Roman Catholic Schools is obvious.

The Statements appended speak for themselves. They are brief and simple. Many details included in previous Reports are omitted. This is partly because the Reports are so late and partly to save expense.

Our warmest thanks are given to the S.P.C.K., the C.&C.C.S., and the S.P.G. in England, to the Woman's Auxiliary in Canada, and to numrous individuals, Sunday Schools and Parishes on both sides of the Atlantic, for contributions of various kinds.

We have now 24 boys and 12 girls under training.

We confidently hope to be able to give a fuller and more satisfactory Report at the end of the present year.

We trust that the absence of individual and detailed acknowledgments will be pardoned by our friends and supporters. The illness of the late Principle and the confusion resulting from the critical state of affairs, culminating in the appointment of a new Head, have made it impossible to do all we would like to have done.

The new Principal will gladly give information as far as he is able to any who desire it and write to him for it.
