and Members of Indian Homes Committee:

In submitting this report of the affairs of the Homes, we wish to make known to you, that we have managed the work, with an eye-

single, to the best interests of the Homes.

The working staff of the Institution has become a very important part in the work and effectual usefulness of the Homes. At present it consists of the Principal, Lady Principal, Matron, two Teachers, Nurse, General Helper, Cook, a Farm Instructor and a General Man who has the care and training of the boys in all kinds of repairs, gardening, flowers, stock and poultry. Of the staff, three came to us through the Womans' Auxiliary, namely: Miss Botterell, acting Matron who is paid by the W. A.; Miss Eaton and Miss Stafford, who are in training, also receive small grants from the W. A. Both these women, as soon as their course of training is complete, will go into Indian work in the West.

At the end of the year we had on the register eighty-three pupils, forty boys and forty-three girls. Up to the end of the year their general health was good. The progress in studies has been very gratifying to the teachers and the Public School Inspector has been quite satisfied. There has been little to complain of and very much to be thankful for.

There is much to report in regard to the outside affairs, farming, &c. It must be understood that much of what we have accomplished is directly due to our farming and gardening operations. The stock has done fairly well. We have at present eighteen head of cattle and seven cows, the milk from these is a large item toward the support of the Homes. Besides cattle we have sheep, pigs and a large number of poultry. We are steadily improving the property and soon hope to clear and cultivate more land and also provide more pasture You will be interested to know that we have a complete outfit of farm machinery which cost us \$1307.00 besides many other small items not included in this amount.

The front of the main buildings have been considerably improved by fencing. The old fence has been removed and new wiring is being used of pleasing design. We hope to fence the sides this coming spring. The cost so far has been eighty-three dollars. Other repairs and improvements must be attended to as soon as funds are forthcoming. The installation of electric lighting during the past year is a wonderful improvement and a great blessing, reducing the grave

danger from fire and saving considerable labour, thanks to the Department of Indian Affairs at Ottawa. Our laundry building is complete with the exception of a few items which can soon be finished as soon as weather permits. The approximate cost was six-hundred dollars, this money was a loan from the Indian Department, which we are endeavouring to pay back quarterly. We have an electric motor and the electric power line is already extended to the buildings and as soon as we have sufficient funds, we intend installing a main line shaft, from which we can operate all our machines.

Before closing we wish to express our thanks to General Board of the Woman's Auxiliary and Branches of the W.A. for monetary assistance and Bales containing outfits, etc. for the children, also for sending adequate help in the way of workers and probationers. To all who have helped us in this great work, we extend grateful thanks.

Also one other most important item should be noted, though expected and understood by all. The religious life and training in the Homes. Bible study is taken up each day in the class-rooms. Every morning and evening prayers are held in the class-room and on Sundays Chapel services are held with the regular celebrations of Holy Communion, also Sunday School. All of which the pupils and staff enjoy very much.
