Best Algoma rowers do it indoors

When Gavin Grant dips a paddle in the water, it's usually just for fun, but don't tell Grant he's not a serious rower.

Grant, 50, pulls off between 80,000 and 100,000 metres a week on his indoor rowing machine, and he's not alone.
