

Divinity student, A. L. Chabot 9later ordained) began services.

1946-48 James Thompson-Lay reader and others continued services in Mcleod Public School on Walford Road.

1949 Decision made to name the church St. James when erected

1950 May. Turning of sod for new church

Services would be held in the basement until sufficient funds to complete the upstairs.

October 15th. Cornerstone laid

1955 December 1st. The first services held in newly completed church.

1965 St. James became the first church in the Diocese of Algoma to have a 'free-standing altar' with communion rail in three sides.

Later, the sanctuary was opened and the Narthex expanded and rebuilt to cover the entrance steps. The installation of stained glass windows began.

The '1960s and 1970s were 'booming years of development'. The church boasted an active choir, church school, Junior Auxiliary, Boy's Brigade, Church Boy's League, Servers Guild, Brotherhood of Anglican Church men and a dedicated group of Anglican Church Women.

Time passed, children grew, families moved; activities needed to readjust to changing social times.

Mid 1970s and 1980s-St. James became part of the lakes Parish (the Incumbent shared by French River, Coniston and Minnow Lake).


1990 The first husband and wife clergy team at St. James.

1991 St. James welcomed it's first female Incumbent



St. James', Lockerby Anniversary Observed

On October 14th, St. James' (Lockerby) celebrated the 40th anniversary of the first service held in the church building. That first service was held in the basement as were all services during the next five years of the church's existence.

Friends and former parishioners joined the congregation for the service of Evensong, under the direction of the Reverend Geoffrey Woodcroft, present incumbents at St. James'. Dinner was served following the service in the newly renovated basement.

Pryce Moorhouse, rector's warden during the early years (1950-1955), was guest speaker recalling some the highlights and some of the difficulties involved in building the church. The Reverend Robert Lumley, former parish priest, explained the significance of the memorial windows. Dr. Winslow Case, lay reader, paid tribute to the many dedicated workers who have labored for St. james' over the years.

The Reverend Jennifer Sisson brought a pleasant evening of fellowship to a close by pronouncing the Benediction.

"St. James switched from furnace oil to natural gas. There had been an extremely cold winter, with very little snow, the frost went down very deep. The oil tank split underground and leaked it's contents into the ground behind the church, which also happened to be the tile-be for the septic tank. Whenever the toilet was flushed oil would squirt from the ground! (would that a prospector might have come along and made a substantial offer for the land!)"



"..."when George Doolan (later Archdeacon) was at St. james... a locomotive bell was donated by the CPR to be rung in the 'belfry'. ...the bell was put in place and plans were made for it's dedication at an Easter Vigil Service by Archdeacon gilbert Thompson. This was one of those evenings when nothing would go right! The Pascal Candle gave out only a mere glimmer of light in spite of all the invocations surrounding it's passage from porch to altar; and at the conclusion of the service, when Archdeacon Thompson dedicated the bell and command that it be rung, the rope jammed! We sang the joyful Te Deum anyway, and as the congregation left the church, our sexton Wayne patterson, having dientangleds the rope, was ringing the bell with enthusiasm and vigor!"

re natural gas concerns...

"V'hen I dismissed the teenage confirmation class one Saturday morning, and returned to the basement hall, I was alarmed by the smell of stale cabbages and promptly phoned the gas company. A team was being dispatched right away! It was then I spotted a small, broken, glass vial on the floor... the notorious 'stink bomb'! I just managed to halt the emergency team from the gas company."


St. james was filled to capacity every Sunday at 10:00am...to eliminate the small office to the right of the altar and to add another archway...the first church in the diocese of Algoma to move the altar away from the wall so the celebrant might face the congregation. The organ and the choir were moved to a place behind the altar so they too now faced the congregation.

A year or two later a wall was removed so that the inside porch became part of the church...practical, but not very aesthetic.

"When David (Cole) was teaching High School 'shop' his students produced an eye catching sign which stood for a number of years in front of St. James... Known as "the rocket", made of wood and stainless steel, and painted red, blue and silver, it resembled a vehicle about to launch into outer space! later, i had it removed to Western Canada..."

re stained glass windows...

"...Jack Gennings...helped me glue grey painted quarter-round onto a sheet of plain glass, painting the exposed glass with a special colored paint which 'frosted' as it dried, and then covering the existing window with the new sheet of 'stained glass'. (This worked well until the sun faded the paint and the glue cementing the quarter-round lost it's adherence)"

"I well recall...the glass was a tight fit and it took two to get it into place...one-two-three-fingers away and push! ...my right hand and little finger was still there when the 'push' came! I still have the scar!"

Gas leak sends choir to hospital

Six members of the St. James Anglican church choir who accidentally inhaled carbon monoxide were expected to be back in Sudbury today after spending time in a decompression chamber at Toronto General Hospital.

The six were at the Paris Street church for a choir practice Thursday night when they smelled what they thought was a gas leak.

The church has a relatively new

The church has a relatively new furnace, said Geoff Woodcroft, whose wife Jennifer Sisson is the Church's parish priest and one of those taken to hospital.

those taken to hospital.

A gas company was called and "within minutes had evacuated the building and called the fire department," said Woodcroft. The fire department had the gas shut off and a local contractor was called to adjust the furnace installation.

Sent for blood tests

When told to evacuate the building, some of the six left for home, said Sudbury Fire Department Platoon Chief Jacques Bouffard. Later, they were contacted and advised to go to the St. Joseph's Health Centre for carbon monoxide blood tests.

One person appeared to suffer the effects of the gas more than the others, said Bouffard. That individual lost consciousness for a period and was taken immediately to hospital.

When tests were conducted on the other five, all six showed high levels of carbon monoxide poisoning

About 1 a.m. Friday, all six were flown by air ambulance to Toronto General where they went through the process of decontamination, said Woodcroft.

At least two people had been in the church for at least half a hour, said Woodcraft.

The other four were there for leaser amounts of time.

"It is really important that people realize that it's just a scape of wiffs and you can set yourself into problems," he said.

As far as he knows, said Woodcroft, the victims are not expected to suffer long-lasting effects from the incident.

Five were flown back to Sudbury on Friday by air ambulance and underwent final blood testing at St. Joseph's Health Centre.

The sixth person appeared to have made a later air ambulance flight out of Toronto Friday before Pearson International Airport was closed due to bad weather, said Woodcroft.

If the sixth person was unable to get out of Toronto, he added, the parish was going to make arrangements for that person to stay over until the airport reopened.

Dr. Robert Lepage and his colleagues at St. Joseph's Hearth Centre and nursing staff, including Nancy Horn, Helen Armstrong and Jane Sauve, all merit our grateful thank you. There are likely others we have not mentioned who are no less important to us.

We thank all who have called to enquire about the well-being of our choir members.

And persons who have invited us to join them for services during the temporary closure of our church; the AA groups who

demonstrated understanding when suddenly told their usual meeting location was temporarily unavailable.

All incidents have some ramifications, ours has resulted in a lesson well-earned . . . "take nothing nor no one for granted," and the immediate installation of four carbon monoxide monitors. Our choir following their experience in the hyperbaric chamber in Toronto may now refer to themselves as the "St. James Chamber Singers."

Our doors are open once more. Thank you all.

The Union Gas supervisor was Don Van Daele. We especially thank them for their insisting the remaining five choir members attend at the hospital for blood checks (one had already).


The calmness and positive sense of humour displayed by our firefighters greatly assisted through a near-tragic situation.
