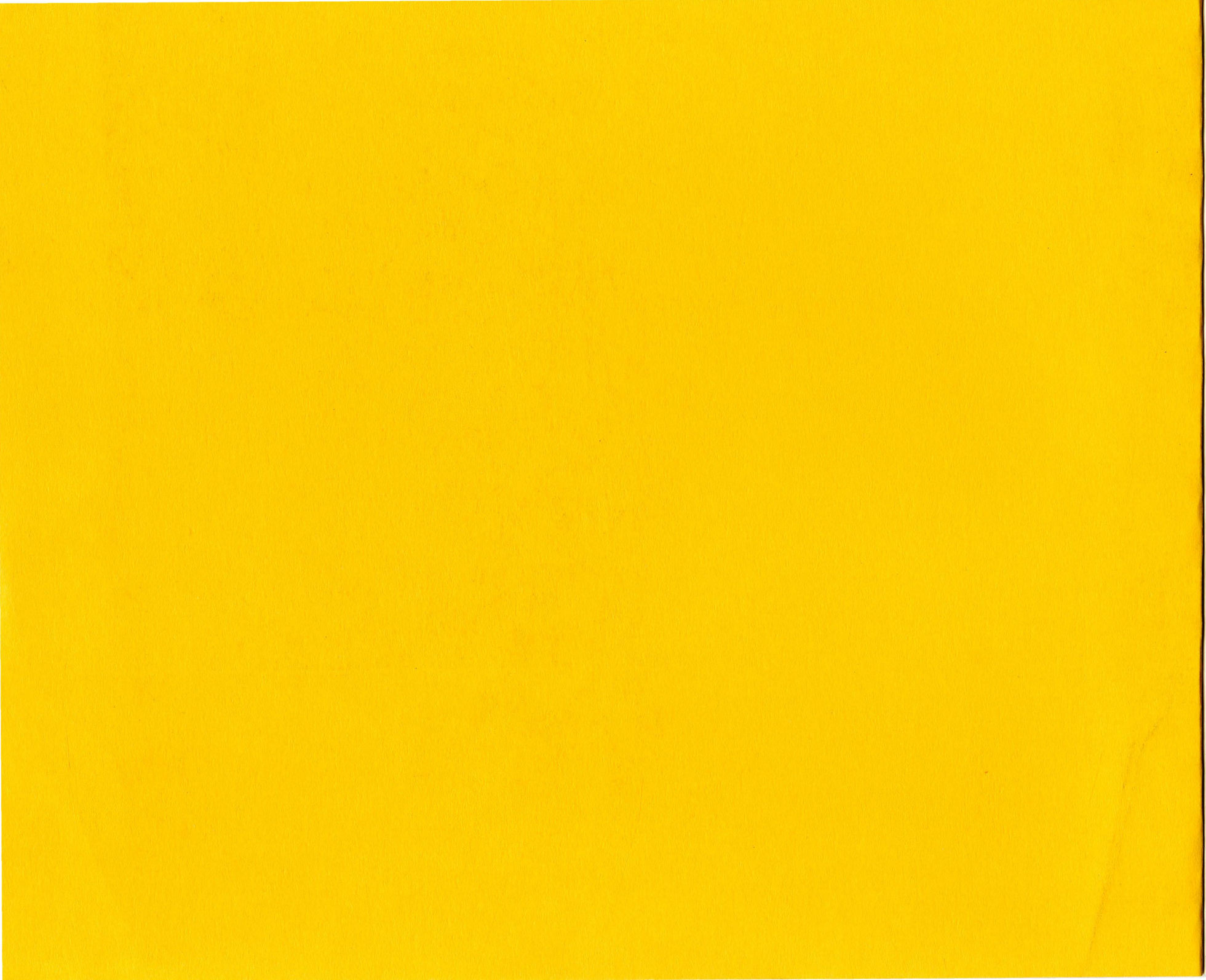

Broughton Island is an isolated area on the north side of Baffin Island. The nearest large settlement is Frobisher Bay.

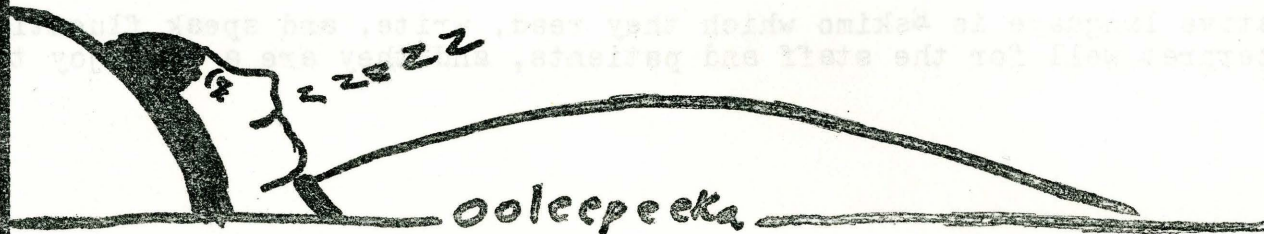
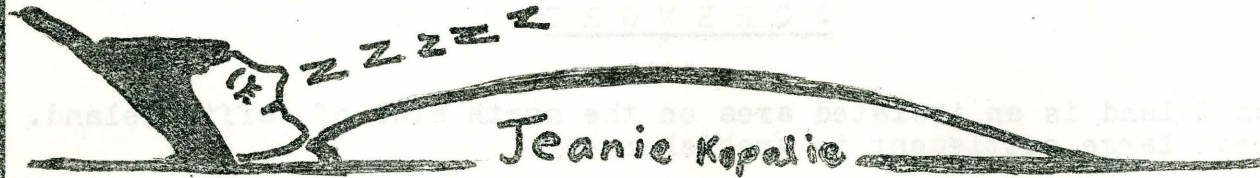
